Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Hebron:

I respectfully submit herewith the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

The town of Hebron has maintained four elementary schools during the past year, enrolling 79 pupils, distributed as follows:

There has been a gradual change in the school population during the past two years. The larger schools have diminished some in enrollments while the smaller schools have increased.

A school of average size is more ideal from a teaching standpoint. The increases have involved transportation charges in some instances so the cost per pupil has not been reduced so much as would otherwise be possible.

The cost has increased also, but not as much accordingly as the number conveyed would indicate.

Cost per week for conveyance, 1931-1932—\$15.00.

Increase,—\$7.33 or about 50 per cent.

A part of this expense is due to the fact that the Alder's School has remained closed. However, it is far cheaper to transport to larger schools than to maintain smaller ones without conveyance. The medium or large school provides more interest for the pupil and, in general, progress is more satisfactory.

A strong educational program has been carried on during the past year and the teachers have taken an active interest in professional advancement. As a whole, the present school year has been quite an improvement over last year. In certain cases this has been outstanding.

Teachers' meetings were held at Buckfield during the fall term. Hebron teachers attended these sessions. The following program was carried out:

HEALTH PROJECTS

Much interest has been aroused in attaining credit as a "seven point" child. This project sets up definite health goals and attainments. Plans are being developed whereby it is hoped that each child may have the privilege of a free dental examination.

The county nursing service is a valuable adjunct to the school program. This is especially true at a time when children may be neglected because of financial limitations.

REPAIRS

The school buildings in the town of Hebron are in a good condition. A constructive repair program has been carried out and a small outlay each year will keep these buildings in fairly good condition. Several important repair and improvement jobs were carried out during the summer vacation.

The Nelson School was painted on the outside and inside. This not only preserves the wood, but it made a wonderful transformation on the inside which was especially dark and dingy. Only one coat of paint was put on, however, and it is recommended that the inside work be finished this coming year.

The large rocks and boulders near the front door of the Brighton Hill School were blasted and removed during the summer. The removal of these rocks from the school yard eliminated a constant source of serious injury to the children.

The following repairs are suggested for the coming year:

Academy—1. Floor needs painting.
2. Possibly a leak in roof.

Nelson—1. Floor shaky.
2. Paint walls and ceiling.

Sodom—1. Roof leaky.
2. Ceiling needs whitening.

B. Hill—1. Door needs fixing.

FINANCIAL

The surplus in the common school account is easily accounted for. The budget last year was made up on the basis of the then existing wage scales. The School Board at the May 9th meeting voted to re-adjust salaries as follows:

A cut amounting to \$8.50 per week made a total saving of \$306.00 for the school year of thirty-six weeks. This would make a reduction of \$1.63 on a tax bill of \$100. Economies were also made in the purchase of fuel and the board of pupils.

A large part of the school appropriations is for high school tuition. This, like certain other items, is regulated by state laws and there is no way at present to lighten this load. At the same time, there are more young people going to high school than ever before. Hebron has a high percentage of its young people in secondary schools. They are doing good work.

There is no question but what Hebron will support the school program as much as it is able. It is a sad commentary, however, on our so-called civilization that children should be deprived of not only opportunities, but of the necessities of life in many instances. The real trouble is not that too much money is spent on education, but that the support is coming from the wrong sources. It is a question of gradual retrenchment toward the middle ages, or a readjustment of our scheme of taxation. The following quotation is taken from the report of the National Survey of School Finance, page 2:

“Thousands of communities throughout the country find themselves unable, under present methods of taxation, to make even elemental provision for the care and education of their children and youth. Scores of thousands of youths of high school age are wandering about the country. An even larger number, including hosts of younger children, are suffering from malnutrition and inadequate care in both rural and urban sections. So serious are the dangers to American children and to public welfare that immediate steps should be taken by state legislatures to prevent the deepening of the disaster.”

Writing in the Philadelphia Ledger of Jan. 17, 1932, Alfred E. Smith says, “Whatever may be the exigencies, whatever may be the reasons for drastic reductions in appropriations, one thing must not happen. There must be no curtailment of educational facilities.”

Education costs more now than it did in pioneer days because schools are better and more children attend them for longer periods. The American people have demanded better homes, better transportation, better clothes, better schools—and they have obtained them.”

As towns find it necessary to retrench, it seems only fair that other departments reduce at least the same per cent as the schools. Out of

an average reduction of municipal rates in the state last year for all purposes of \$2.69 per thousand dollars of valuation, the public schools took a cut of \$1.62 and all other municipal activities a cut of \$1.07. This is hardly equitable and just.

This is obviously a fluctuating figure. Disbursement of equalization money is under state control. It is not in the control of the local school board.

The budget this year calls for a reduction of \$385. less than last year's appropriations, a decrease of 7½%.

Warrant for Town Meeting

To H. E. Verrill, a constable in the Town of Hebron, in said County.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hebron, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall, in said town, on the sixth day of March, 1933, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.
- Art. 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose a chairman to the Board of Selectmen.
- Art. 6. To choose a second Selectman.
- Art. 7. To choose a third Selectman.
- Art. 8. To choose one member of Overseers of Poor for three years.
- Art. 9. To choose a Board of Assessors.
- Art. 10. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- Art. 11. To choose one member of the school board for three years.
- Art. 12. To choose a collector and fix his compensation.
- Art. 13. To choose a fire ward and fix his compensation.
- Art. 14. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of poor.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for summer work on roads and bridges, and patrol labor.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter work.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$1,500.00 in payment of note due March 16, 1933, on tractor.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting bushes.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Town Officers' bills.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for miscellaneous account.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for A. A. Dwinal Post for Memorial Day.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Free High School, according to the School Laws of 1903.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Common Schools.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for superintendent's salary for 1933.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school committee, office expense account, text books and repairs.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to continue school where an average attendance of eight pupils has not been maintained the past year, if they consider it necessary.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,066. in accordance with provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 157 of the Public Laws of 1919 for the construction of a State Aid Highway through the towns of Minot, Hebron and Paris. This to continue the work of last year.

Art. 30. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to state aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$150.00 to cut bushes and maintain State Aid road to entitle the town to receive State apportionment.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$516.00 to maintain Third Class road to entitle the town to receive third class road money from the state.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$100.00 to cut bushes and maintain resolve road to entitle the town to receive resolve money from the State.

Art. 35. To hear report from Library Trustees and act on same.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Moody Library.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote, that for the purpose of procuring a Temporary Loan to, and for the use of the Town, to pay indebtedness of the Town due and to become due during the present municipal year, to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year, the Town Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow from time to time a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate what is needed, and to execute and deliver the note or notes of the Town therefor signed by the Town Treasurer and countersigned by the municipal officers of the Town.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to sign Quit Claim Deeds when necessary to release real estate held for taxes.

Art. 39. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for payment of interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 40. To see if the sum of \$32.00, or more, will be raised for school nursing in the town of Hebron under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.

Art. 41. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not and have you this warrant with your doings thereon.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
