I respectfully submit herewith the annual report of the Superintendent of schools.

The town of Hebron has maintained four elementary schools during the past year, enrolling a total of sixty-nine pupils as follows:

NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

The special town meeting in June requested the School Board to estimate the cost of erecting a school building on the South side of Greenwood Mountain. Plans and estimates were obtained from the State Dept. of Education. It is estimated that \$1,800 would purchase a lot and erect a one room rural school building to accomodate a maximum of 25 pupils.

During the year 1934 there were enrolled in the West Minot school 18 pupils from Hebron. The names are as follows:

Hebron paid as its proportional share of the cost of operating the West Minot school, \$346.24. This would be turned toward the cost of operating a new school should the town so vote. There would also be a hundred dollars available from the State for the additional teaching position.

If a building were erected and equipped, the operating cost would be yearly, something as follows:

Excellent work has been done by both teachers and pupils during the past year. Three Hebron teachers attended summer school and all the teachers attended the district teachers' meetings in Buckfield. At these meetings special study was given to methods and aims correlating school activities more closely with desirable citizenship.

REPAIRS

The Sodom schoolhouse was extensively repaired as an FERA project. The interior was whitened and painted and the seats put on runners. The furnace at No. 8 was also moved into the Sodom schoolhouse. It was planned to do work on the Nelson school also,

but the funds were cut off leaving this school in need of repairs. This building needs especially a new floor. The doors need new knobs and the interior should have another coat of paint. The pupils would greatly benefit by new desks.

Two back windows in the Academy school leak around the top casing during heavy rains. Several schools need new shades.

FINANCIAL

It has been the aim of the School Board and Superintendent to give the town as much as possible in return for the money expended on schools. The progress of the pupils proves that this has been attained. The schools have also kept within the budget in spite of a large increase, in per cent, in the enrollment.

The equalization fund is used in extending the length of the school year one week, making 33 weeks in the year.

Great is the need for a broader tax base for the support of public schools. Every citizen should support the recommendations of the Public School Finance Commission which calls for just the relief that is so urgently needed. Under the proposed plan Hebron would receive \$1,042 next year in addition to the \$1,801, making a total of \$2,843. Besides this, property tax would receive a reduction of several mills.

I wish to express at this time my appreciation for the co-operation of the people of Hebron in making the past school year both successful and pleasant.

Warrant for Town Meeting

STATE OF MAINE

To A. T. Eastman, a constable in the Town of Hebron, in said county.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hebron, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall in said town, on the 4th. day of March, 1935, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 7. To choose a third Selectman.
- Art. 8. To choose one member of Overseers of Poor for three years.
- Art. 9. To choose a board of Assessors.
- Art. 10. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- Art. 11. To choose one member of the school board for two years.
- Art. 12. To choose one member of the school board for three years.
- Art. 13. To choose a collector and fix his compensation.
- Art. 14. To choose a fire ward and fix his compensation.
- Art. 15. To choose all other town officers.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of poor.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for summer work, roads and bridges, patrol labor, cutting bushes.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for blasting and removing stone to make clearance for snow plow.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will raise for winter work and overdraft.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for town officers' bills, including school committee.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for miscellaneous account.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for A. A. Dwinal Post for Memorial Day.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free high school, according to the school laws of 1903.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for common schools.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to instruct the school committee to open the Center School.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to buy a lot and erect a school building on the south side of Greenwood Mountain.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for office expense account.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for text books.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for superintendence salary for 1935.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to continue school where an average attendance of eight pupils has not been maintained the past year, if they consider it necessary.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 33. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chap. 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$200.00 to cut bushes and maintain State Aid Road to entitle the town to receive State apportionment.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$551.00 to maintain third class road to entitle the town to receive third class road money from the State.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$100.00 to cut bushes and maintain State Aid No 2 commonly called Resolve Road, to enable the town to receive resolve and State apportionment.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote, to grant and raise the sum of \$4,500.00 to pay unpaid notes.

Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for payment of interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 39. To hear report of Library Trustees and act on same.

Art. 40. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Moody Library.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote, that for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan, to, and for the use of the town, to pay indebtedness of the town due and to become due during the present municipal year, to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year, the town treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow from time to time a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate what is needed, and to execute and deliver the note or notes of the town therefor signed by the town treasurer and countersigned by the municipal officers of the town.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen to execute a quit claim deed in behalf of the town, releasing its rights in and to real estate held by it by tax deeds, upon payment of interest at 8 per cent, taxes and costs.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to determine the time when the commitment of taxes shall be made, at what time they shall be payable, and what rate of interest shall be collected (from and after such time.)

Art. 44. To see if the sum of \$30.00 or more, will be raised for school nursing in the town of Hebron under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.

Art. 45. To see what action the town will take in regard to hiring the Grange hall for town purposes.

Art. 46. To see what action the town will take in regards to electing a budget committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 47. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not and have you this warrant with your doings thereon. The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
