To the Superintendent and School Committee:

It is my privilege to present herewith my first annual report as Principal of Sherman High school for your consideration.

School began September 11th, with a very large attendance. The entering class of 24 made a sum total of 68 students during the Fall term. You will note by the statistics that the attendance has been satisfactory. I take great pleasure in presenting the following list of students who have maintained an average rank of 90% or more, and whose names are on the honor roll:

Boys: Ronald Cummings, Bertrand Hoyle, Jack Sleeper.

Girls: Nettie Daggett, Freida Robinson, Beulah O'Roak, Fastnet Joy, Pearl Hamilton, Julia Sides, Margaret Quailey, Dorothy Caldwell, Lora Sleeper, Doris Dickinson, Elsie Daggett, Blanch Sleeper, Doris Grant, Theresa LaPlant.

The teaching force has been completely changed during the year.

The addition of another teacher and a new division of work has improved the character of the work done and broadened the opportunities of the students.

I have charge of the work in Mathematics and the Sciences. Some new equipment has been placed in the Physics Department and more needed. In my opinion the work in Sciences needs special attention and improvement,

Miss Clark has had admirable success with her French and Latin classes. We feel that a large measure of our efficient work is the result of helpful suggestions from Miss Clark's wider field of experience.

The work in History and English under the direction of Miss Kelley has been full of that enthusiasm, which alone can harmonize the efforts of teacher and pupils. The outside activities have been carried on with unusual interest. I heartily commend Miss Kelley as an invaluable assistant in the activities of school life, outside the class rooms.

RECOMMENDATIONS

There is real need of an examination of our students once each year by a physician. Children are very often the prey of adenoids, without anyone comprehending the danger, until too late. The eyes should be more carefully examined than by the present system of test cards. The State law gives the school committee a right to appoint a physician, provided the town has so voted.

A proper patriotic spirit in our schools is one of the purposes of education—to cultivate an appreciation of our indebtedness to the past and a realization of the necessity of good citizenship for a continued national prosperity.

There is need of a school building attractively furnished, properly heated, lighted and ventilated and provided with sanitary toilet facilities. Such a building would be a source of benefit and satistfaction for generations to come.

I wish to call attention to the growing interest of our students in agricultural department at University of Maine. Courses in Elementary Agriculture are now being offered in many schools. The State gives an appropriation of \$500 for the starting of a specified course or series of courses. Such a course in a new building might increase the interest of the boys of our town in practical lines of education.

I submit this report and these recommendations in the best interests of the town of Sherman and its future citizens.

To the citizens of Sherman:

Among the necessary changes and improvements for the past year have been the painting of three schoolhouses; the establishing of a school at or near Braggville; the finishing of an assistant's room for the high school; as three teachers were needed this year, an outbuilding for the grammar and intermediate grades; the fencing of school yards and other usual and necessary repairs.

Among the needed improvements for the coming year are new seats, better hearing facilities, new closets, and more maps and black-board room and other minor repairs and supplies for the Doble school. This school has been so small for several years that little has been done to keep the building and equipment in first class order, but the school is growing. The registration this year is about twenty scholars while there are several smaller ones who have not yet entered school. New seats are needed at the Morgan and Goldenridge schools and additional equipment. Inside repairs would help the house at number one. There are many other improvements needed but as our policy is and has been to make them gradually, we expect to make the most necessary ones only this year.

We have a temporary arrangement with Mr. Ludgate to use one of his houses for the scholars living near Braggville. This bridges us over the difficulty there till some permanent adjustment can be made. This school has about fifteen scholars.

There is need of additional equipment at Woodbridge, such as slates, maps, etc. The house at number three is in excellent condition.

There is one need that has been called to your attention many times and is growing more urgent every year. We have tried to meet the crowded condition in our village schools without affecting their efficiency by resorting to methods that we can no longer use. To make more room for our growing schools the selectmen vacated

their office in the town hall that it might be used for a laboratory and recitation room for the high school which became for the first time a two teacher school. Later our schools increased so that another grade teacher was needed and again the selectmen were kind enough to vacate the office they had in the Mason building that it might be used for an intermediate room. Again our high school needed another and third teacher and a small room has been finished in the corridor of the town hall this year. There seems to be no more rooms available for school purposes and still our schools are overcrowded and the outlook for the opening of the Fall term of schools appears worse than at any time in the past. We have a total registration this Winter term in the grammar school of 31 scholars and in the intermediate 25, making a total of 56. In both rooms there are 57 seats and the condition is so crowded that with the teacher's desk close to the front seat in the grammar room there is not space to pass behind it without stepping on the platform of the alcove. Of this number seven are ninth grade scholars, but there are 19 in the third grade to come to this building next Fall and if no one drops out or no new ones come in there will be a registration in the two rooms of 68. If we judge by the past there will be more come in than will go out and it is not unreasonable to expect from 70 to 75 scholars next year with a seating capacity crowded to the limit of 57. We are unable to meet this situation with our present accommodations.

Our high school is larger than we expected having a total registration of 68 of whom about 60 remain in the school. Several entered from other towns without sufficient preparation and a few others have dropped out. We expect no material increase next year, but as there are approximately thirty eighth grade scholars in town we may expect very material increase in two years. We, therefore, recommend that the town build a high school building sufficiently large to accommodate the high school scholars and the three upper grammar grades.

Our high school is under the instruction of three able teachers, two of whom are graduates of Bates College and one of Colby. The work is growing very satisfactorially.

It is interesting to note that several of our young graduates are persuing courses in Normal schools, business colleges and University of Maine and others are engaged in teaching. Two of our town girls have completed normal courses and have come back as teachers in our rural schools. Four other teachers, one of whom is a graduate of our high school, who have partly completed normal courses have been teaching in our rural schools with splendid success. Only two schools have been under the instruction of teachers who have had no further training than the high school gives and these have done very satisfactory work for young teachers.

Our village grades have been under the same able instructors as of last year with the usual splendid results.

Our estimates for the coming year are: common schools, \$1,400, high school, \$1,300; repairs, \$900; books, \$300; high school supplies, \$225.
