# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Hebron:

I respectfully submit herewith the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

The town of Hebron has maintained five elementary schools during the past fiscal year, and has enrolled a total of seventy-five pupils as follows:

The enrollment in the Academy school would have been larger (in fact too large) of the conveyance of the Back Street pupils had not been changed to the Center School. This brings the two schools nearer the same size and it was getting to a place where it was very difficult for one teacher to handle all of the pupils at the Academy school.

#### HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

During the last School year Hebron paid over nineteen hundred dollars to other towns and private schools for high school privileges for boys and girls of Hebron. It occurred to me that Hebron and Paris might both benefit from a contract between these towns, by the terms of which Paris would furnish high school privileges for all Hebron pupils at a cost of about eight or nine hundred dollars per year. This would allow Hebron to pay all, or a part, of the cost of transporting these pupils to and from South Paris and still save money. At a public meeting of interested persons held at the Center School in August, this was explained and looked upon with considerable favor until it was learned that the roads would not permit bus travel for about six weeks during the spring.

#### REPAIRS

The following repairs have been made on the school buildings during the past year:

New floor and painting at the Nelson School.

New larger blackboards at the Academy School.

Old Academy School blackboards installed at Center School.

"School Zone" signs have been erected on the highways at all of the schools.

Sodom School shed was shingled.

The following repairs are very desirable for the coming year:

Sodom-Paint inside and repair foundation.

Center-Paint ontside of building.

Nelson—Repair fence and flagpole.

All schools need inexpensive urinals.

Also other small repairs are needed from time to time.

#### FINANCES

In order for a town to be eligible to receive money from the State Equalization Fund it is necessary that the municipal tax rate of that town shall be "in excess of a rate which is 3 mills less than the average of such rates for all the towns of the State." Also the apportionment is made only "to towns wherein a rate of taxation considerably in excess of the average rate for the state fails to produce a school revenue sufficient to secure a reasonable standard of educational efficiency." Hebron did not receive any apportionment from this fund this year as they have in the past. This means that the policy of increasing the length of the school year from 32 weeks by means

of equalization fund money can not be continued this year unless the money comes from another source.

Some more money could be spent advantageously in the textbooks and supplies account. Many teaching aids are now available that are certainly worth while.

In closing this report may I express my appreciation to the citizens of Hebron and the teachers for their willingness to cooperate with the School Committee and me in our efforts to maintain and improve the educational system of Hebron.

# Warrant for Town Meeting

State of Maine

County of Oxford, ss.

To H. E. Verrill, a constable in the Town of Hebron, in said county.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hebron, qualified by law to vote in the town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall in said town, on the 1st day of March, 1937, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.
- Art. 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose a First Selectman.
- Art. 6. To choose a Second Selectman.
- Art. 7. To choose a Third Selectman.
- Art. 8. To choose one member of Overseers of Poor for three years.
  - Art. 9. To choose a board of Assessors.
- Art. 10. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- Art. 11. To choose one member of the school board for three years.
  - Art. 12. To choose a collector and fix his compensation.
  - Art. 13. To choose a fire ward and fix his compensation.

- Art. 14. To choose all other town officers.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of poor.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for summer work, roads, bridges and patrol labor.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting bushes on town roads.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter work.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for town officers' bills, including school committee.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for miscellaneous account.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for A. A. Dwinal Post for Memorial Day.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$4,430.98 to cover overdrafts for 1936.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of common schools.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for high school tuition, according to the school laws of 1903.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school textbooks.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school rent, insurance, light and power.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school desk and laboratory supplies.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school repairs.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school supervision.

- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to continue school where an average attendance of eight pupils has not been maintained the last year, if they consider it advisable.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$135.00 for insurance on schoolhouses to cover overdraft.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 173, Public Laws of 1935.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$100.00 to maintain State Aid Road No. 1, 2, and 3 to entitle the town to receive State apportionment.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$150. to cut bushes on State Aid No. 1, 2 and 3 and Third Class, to enable the town to receive State apportionment.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$503.70 to maintain third class road to entitle the town to receive its allotment of third class road money from the State.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$50.00 to enable the town to receive \$50.00 from the State for State Aid maintenance.
- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for payment of interest for the ensuing year.
- Art. 38. To hear report of Library Trustees and act on same, and elect necessary officers.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote, that for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan, to, and for the use of the town, to pay indebtedness of the town due and to become due during the present municipal year, the town treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow from time to time a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate what is needed, and to execute and deliver the note or notes of the town therefor signed by the town treasurer and countersigned by the municipal officers of the town.

- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer with the approval of the Selectment to execute a quit claim deed in behalf of the town, releasing its rights in and to real estate held by it by tax deeds, upon payment of interest at 8 per cent, taxes and costs.
- Art. 41. To see if the sum of \$60. will be raised for school nursing in the town of Hebron under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$30. for wood at the Hebron Grange Hall.
- Art. 43. To see what action the town will take in regard to electing a budget committee for the ensuing year.
- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to use the Monument Fund for fence for Hebron church yard cemetery.
- Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the county commissioners to descontinue the old road from Bearce four corners leading north to Paris town line, No. 4 Hill road, so called.
- Art. 46. To see if the town will authorize the Tax Collector to collect all Poll taxes on presentation of the Poll Tax bill, on or before June 1, 1937.
- Art. 47. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to state aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.
- Art. 48. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not and have you this warrant with your doings thereon. The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
