Report of the Superintendent of Schools and School Committee

To the Citizens of the Town of Hebron:

We respectfully submit herewith our annual report covering the fiscal year from February 1, 1937 to January 31, 1938.

The Town has maintained five elementary schools during the past fiscal year and has enrolled a total of 74 pupils.

This school year it has been necessary to maintain only two conveyance routes as follows:

When plans were being made to open schools last summer, it was found that there were no Hebron pupils to attend the Nelson School so it was decided to close that school. However, the parents of the four Oxford pupils living here were very anxious to have the school continued so the Oxford School Committee agreed to pay Hebron the total cost of maintaining the school. A teacher was hired and the school is being continued.

All of the schools in the town took part in a testing program which was conducted in part, by the Department of Education at Bates College. The tests were given by some other teacher in every case

and then all tests were taken to Bates College and scored. The results of these tests were very interesting and helpful. Each teacher was given a copy of the results obtained from all the schools in this union and they could see their weakness as well as their strength. On the whole, these tests showed that the achievement of our pupils compared favorably with other school systems throughout the country where these tests have been given.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. It is unfortunate that Hebron is so situated that five small schools have to be operated when a much better educational program could be furnished if two larger schools could replace them. The Academy school is too large for one teacher to get good results. If the enrollment continues to grow, two teachers will be necessary in the near future.

2. The Center School is growing fast and is now large enough so that if the Academy School could be rebuilt to accommodate two teachers it would be advisable to convey the Back Street pupils in to the Academy again. Next year the Nelson School can probably be closed or maintained at the expense of Oxford so Hebron would still be employing five teachers as they did last year.

3. The school year should be permanently lengthened to thirty-six weeks. Every pupil in his or her nine years of elementary school, loses one whole year on account of the thirty-two week year.

4. We believe that a contract for high school privileges for the pupils in Hebron could be arranged with one of the neighboring high schools and it would either save money or give the Hebron pupils practically free transportation to and from high school.

REPAIRS

The Center School which needed paint so badly was painted two coats. The brick part of the foundation under the Sodom School was falling down and funds were not available to put it back properly, so a new board wall was built to replace it.

FINANCES

The new State Educational Equalization Fund was distributed this year in much the same way that the smaller fund has been distributed in past years. Hebron was allotted \$305 and the following directions came with it:

“No part of the Equalization Fund can be utilized for reducing appropriations at the annual meeting of the Town. Towns at their annual meeting in 1938 should make appropriations at least on a level with those made at the annual meeting in 1937. Otherwise, they may forfeit any right to share in the distribution of Equalization in December 1938. In other words the entire Equalization Fund is to be devoted for further improvement of educational efficiency beyond the present standards.”

This fund was distributed as the financial report shows and is being expended for the purposes which the State Department of Education has approved, that is to increase the length of the school year to thirty-six weeks.

From the State School Fund the sum of \$1,674 was received and it was credited as is shown in the financial report.

Warrant for Town Meeting

State of Maine.

County of Oxford, ss.

To Everett E. Johnson, a constable in the Town of Hebron, in said county:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hebron, in said County, qualified by law to vote in the town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall in said town, on Monday, the seventh day of March, 1938, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor; Treasurer, Collector, School Committee, Road Commissioner, Monument Fund Committee, Moody Library Trustees, Clerk and other town officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.

Art. 5. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose a first selectman.

Art. 7. To choose a second selectman.

Art. 8. To choose a third selectman.

Art. 9. To choose one member of Overseers of Poor for three years.

Art. 10. To choose a Board of Assessors.

Art. 11. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.

Art. 12. To choose one member of the school board for three years.

Art. 13. To choose a collector and fix his compensation.

Art. 14. To choose a fire ward and fix his compensation.

Art. 15. To choose all other town officers.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the poor. Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for summer work, roads, bridges and patrol labor. Budget Committee recommends \$1,200.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting bushes on town roads. Budget Committee recommends \$100.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter work. Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.

Art. 20. To see what sum the town will grant and raise for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937. Budget Committee recommends \$799.50.

Art. 21. To see what sum the town will grant and raise for State Aid Maintenance. Budget Committee recommends, \$80.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$543 to maintain third class road to entitle the town to receive its allotment of third class road money from the State. Budget Committee recommends, \$543.

Art. 23. To see what sum the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on third class road. Budget Committee recommends, \$75.

Art. 24. To see what sum the town will vote to grant and raise for maintenance of unimproved road. Budget Committee recommends, \$35.

Art. 25. To see what action the town will take in regard to its apportionment of the State, County and Town bridge over Bicknell River on third class highway.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the county commissioners to discontinue the old road leading

from Johnson's four corners, by the Goodrich farm, to the Buckfield town line, beginning at the Bicknell River bridge, North to the Buckfield town road; also the road leading from Salo's turn on the mountain road, leading South a mile and a quarter, more or less, to an oak tree beside the barn now owned by Robie A. Sturtevant.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Road Commissioner to enforce the Bush Law which now exists in the Statutes.

Art. 28. To see if the town will grant and raise \$2,966.99 to cover overdrafts for 1937. Budget Committee recommends same.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for miscellaneous account. Budget Committee recommends, \$500.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for town officers' bills, including school committee and superintendent. Budget Committee recommends, \$1,300.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Memorial Day. Budget Committee recommends, \$6.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for wood at the Hebron Grange Hall. Budget Committee recommends, \$30.

Art. 33. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$61 for school nursing, to be expended under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare. Budget Committee recommends, \$33.

Art. 34. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$75 for payment of interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 35. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing a road machine, and raising money for same. Budget Committee recommends purchasing of machine and taking funds from surplus.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Aid to Dependent Children. Budget Committee recommends, \$275.

Art. 37. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to state aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.

Art. 38 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to execute a quit-claim deed in behalf of the Town, releasing its rights in and to real estate held by it by tax deeds and tax liens upon payment of such amount or amounts in each case, as the Selectmen in their discretion will deem proper.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to ratify and confirm and approve the acts of the Treasurer and Selectmen hitherto performed by them in making settlement of tax deeds and tax liens by compromising the claims of the town and accepting less than the aggregate of the taxes, costs and interest at 8%.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to sell either at private or public sale any property to which the town has obtained title, either by tax deeds or by tax liens upon such terms and for such consideration as the Selectmen in their discretion deem advisable, and in such cases, to authorize the Town Treasurer to execute appropriate deed in the name of the town and to acknowledge the same.

Art. 42. To see what rate of interest the town will vote to charge on unpaid taxes.

Art. 43. To see what action the town will take in regard to electing a budget committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 44. To see if the town will authorize the Tax Collector to collect all Poll taxes on presentation of the Poll Tax bill, on or before June 1, 1938.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote, that for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan, to, and for the use of the town, to pay indebtedness of the town due and to become due during the present municipal year, the town treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow from time to time a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate what is needed, and to execute and deliver the note or notes of the town therefor signed by the town treasurer and countersigned by the municipal officers of the town.

Art. 46. To see if the citizens of the town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,025. for all school purposes designated below and apportioned as indicated below:

(If the voters prefer to raise the school money under separate articles, it may be done by acting on parts b to f instead of part a.) The Budget and School Committees recommend the above appropriations for schools.

- (b) To determine the sum of money that the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools.
- (c) To determine the sum of money that the town will vote to raise for high school tuition, or high school contract and high school conveyance.
- (d) To determine the sum of money that the town will vote to raise for school supplies.
- (e) To determine the sum of money that the town will vote to raise for school textbooks.
- (f) To determine the sum of money that the town will vote to raise for school repairs.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to continue school where an average attendance of eight pupils has not been maintained the past year, if they consider it advisable.

Art. 48. To see what action the town will take in regard to building a two-room schoolhouse to relieve the congestion at the Minot school.

Art. 49. To see what action the town will take in regard to contracting with another town for high school students.

Art. 50. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not, and have you this warrant with your doings thereon. The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
