# Report of the Superintendent of Schools and Board of Education

---

To the Citizens of the Town of Hebron:

We herewith submit our annual report as Superintendent of Schools, and members of the School Committee.

## THE COST OF EDUCATION IN HEBRON

During the past year there has been expended a total of \$6,104.75 for all school purposes. Of this amount, \$1,677.92 was returned to the town from state funds. This leaves a net town expenditure of \$4,426.83. There are enrolled in the schools of Hebron, 80 pupils. This means that there has been an average of \$76.30 expended on each pupil's education during the past year.

The expenditure of this \$76.30 on each pupil's education has been divided as follows:

For teaching	\$34 71
For conveyance of elementary pupils	10 36
For fuel	2 28
For janitor service	1 93
For textbooks	1 21
For supplies	1 00
For building maintenance (repairs)	2 19
For tuition of high school students	22 62

## THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

1. A new reading system has been installed in all of the primary schools and it is, we believe, already showing results.

2. The same achievement testing program which has been used before was used again last spring and the results were gratifying. Scores were a little better than in the preceding year in almost every case.



3. On two occasions the services of a State Department of Education Field Agent have been secured to visit the teachers offering suggestions and solving problems of individual differences, etc.

4. Dr. Adams, at the Sanatorium, has rendered us a very great service this year. He made possible the tuberculin test for all elementary school pupils last spring and this fall he was responsible for every pupil having a thorough medical examination by competent sanatorium staff members. The district health nurse very ably assisted in both cases and the school department was put to no expense in either case.

5. The town has maintained five elementary schools during the past year and has enrolled a total of eighty pupils.

From the preceding list it can be readily seen that at least one of the schools is too large for efficiency and that two are too small to justify their maintenance. The Nelson school was operated for Oxford most of last year, but of course when the Pulkkinen family moved back, Hebron had to share in the cost of the school. This year Oxford is paying two-thirds and Hebron one-third of the cost of running the school.

6. An expression on the part of the voters at the last annual town meeting caused us to put on another conveyance so that some of the Sanatorium Hill pupils might be brought in to the Center school, so this year three routes are being operated as follows:

# Warrant for Town Meeting

---

State of Maine.

County of Oxford, ss.

To E. L. Bumpus, a constable in the Town of Hebron, in said County:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hebron, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall in said town, on Monday, the sixth day of March, 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, School Committee, Road Commissioner, Monument Fund Committee, Moody Library Trustees, Clerk and other town officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.

Art. 5. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose a first selectman.

Art. 7. To choose a second selectman.

Art. 8. To choose a third selectman.

Art. 9. To choose one member of Overseers of Poor for three years.

Art. 10. To choose a Board of Assessors.

Art. 11. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.

Art. 12. To choose one member of the school board for three years.

Art. 13. To choose a collector and fix his compensation.

Art. 14. To choose a fire ward and fix his compensation.

Art. 15. To choose all other town officers.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for summer work, roads, bridges and patrol labor. Raised last year \$1,200.00. Budget Committee recommends \$1,200.00.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Welfare Account. Raised last year \$1,000.00. Budget Committee recommends \$800.00.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on town roads. Raised last year \$100.00. Budget Committee recommends \$200.00.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for winter work. Raised last year \$1,000.00. Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.00.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for miscellaneous account. Raised last year \$500.00. Budget committee recommends \$500.00.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for town officers' bills, including school committee and superintendent. Raised last year \$1,300.00. Budget committee recommends \$1,300.00.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Memorial Day. Raised last year \$6. Budget committee recommends \$6.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for wood for Hebron Grange Hall. Raised last year \$30.00. Budget committee recommends \$30.00.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for aid to dependent children. Raised last year \$275.00. Budget committee recommends \$300.00.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$33.00 for Public health work in Hebron, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State department of health and welfare, in cooperation with local authorities. Raised last year \$33.00. Budget committee recommends \$33.00.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to execute a quit-claim deed in behalf of the town and, or, assignments with rights of foreclosure in case of unmatured tax mortgage liens releasing its rights in and to real estate held by it by tax deeds and tax liens upon payment of such amount or amounts in each case, as the Selectmen in their discretion will deem proper.
