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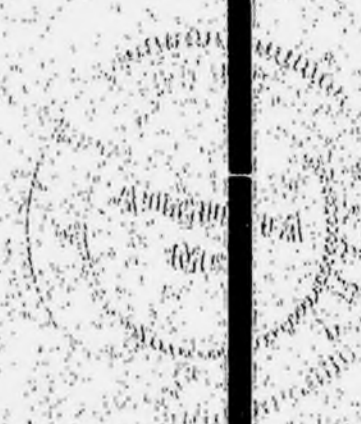

Report of the Superintendent of Schools and Board of Education

To the Citizens of the Town of Hebron:

We hereby submit our annual report as Superintendent of Schools and members of the School Committee covering the year from February 1, 1940, to January 31, 1941.

THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Five elementary schools have been maintained during the year as follows:

The total enrollment this year in the schools of Hebron is fourteen more than last year. At the academy school there has been a 31% increase. With this large enrollment in all grades it is unreasonable to assume that pupils can receive the same training that they would in a smaller school or in a consolidated school.

Several pupils moved into the district served by the Sodom school, bringing the enrollment to twelve, so we decided to continue the school this year.

We had expected to close the Nelson School since there are no Hebron pupils in attendance, but Oxford has arranged with us to run it for the six Oxford pupils and the one Minot pupil who are attending school there. Hebron is being paid the entire cost of this school by Oxford and Minot.

Report of Public Health Nursing 1940

HEBRON

"Adequate provision to assure satisfactory growth and development and protection of the health of children is a public responsibility warranting special consideration and emphasis in any program directed toward the better health of the people as a whole. Upon what is done to assure physical and mental health during maternity, infancy, childhood, and youth depends the vigor and health of the adult population."

The above quotation is taken from the report of a conference on "Children in a Democracy" held in Washington last Spring at which leaders in many fields of child care discussed the problems of youth and ways to solve these problems.

Public health is concerned with securing and maintaining better health for all members of the community. Recognizing that whatever is done to assure physical and mental health during maternity, infancy, childhood, and youth will affect the health of the adult population, we have, as in the past, placed most emphasis on the work with the pregnant mother, the infant, and the pre-school child.

During the year, six visits were made, at the request of the attending physician, to prenatal patients to help them carry out his instructions, or if not yet under a physician's care to urge them to secure medical advice as early in pregnancy as possible. In many cases the mother was helped to make plans for her confinement.

Four post-partum cases were seen to ascertain that the patients return for their post-partum examinations and to see that instructions in diet and care were being followed.

Eleven visits were made to young infants to urge the mother to keep the baby under medical supervision, to have him vaccinated against smallpox and immunized against diphtheria. When

necessary the nurse assisted the mother in planning a daily regime for the baby. Special emphasis was placed on the prevention of communicable diseases which takes such a heavy toll in childhood.

Forty-five preschool children were seen to instruct the parents in their diet and general care.

Sixteen home visits were made to school children for the accomplishment of corrective work.

One home visit was made to a crippled child to interpret clinic instructions and to assist the family in the follow-up care of the patient.

Two health supervision visits were made to adults.

One well-child conference was held during the year.

Three infants were examined by the physician.

Ten pre-school children were examined by the physician.

Seven school children were examined by the physician.

Eight children were immunized against diphtheria.

Shick test was given to one child.

Dentist present at conference.

Warrant for Town Meeting

State of Maine.

To E. L. Bumpus, a Constable in the Town of Hebron, in said County:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hebron, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall, in said town, on Monday, the third day of March, 1941, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the reports of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, School Committee, Road Commissioner, Monument Fund Committee, Moody Library Trustees, Clerk and other town officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.

Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose a first Selectman.

Art. 7. To choose a second Selectman.

Art. 8. To choose a third Selectman.

Art. 9. To choose one member of Overseers of the Poor for three years.

Art. 10. To choose a board of Assessors.

Art. 11. To choose a Road Commissioner, and fix his compensation.

Art. 12. To choose one member of the school board for three years.

Art. 13. To choose a tax collector and fix his compensation.

Art. 14. To choose a fire ward and fix his compensation.

Art. 15. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for summer work, roads, bridges and patrol labor. Raised last year \$1,200. Budget Committee recommends \$1,200.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on town roads. Raised last year \$100. Budget Committee recommends \$100.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for State aid road construction, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937. Raised last year \$799.50. Budget Committee recommends \$799.50.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on State aid road. Raised last year, \$80.00. Budget Committee recommends \$80.00.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$594.00 to maintain third class road to entitle the town to receive its allotment of third class road money from the State. Raised last year \$554.00. Budget Committee recommends \$594.00.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on third class roads. Raised last year \$75.00. Budget Committee recommends \$75.00.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on unimproved roads. Raised last year \$35.00. Budget Committee recommends \$35.00.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for winter work. Raised last year \$1,000.00. Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.00.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to transfer the unexpended balance of \$50.00 on Aid to Dependent Children Account to welfare account. Budget committee so recommends. Raised last year \$400.00.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for town officers bills. Raised last year \$1,400.00 Budget committee recommends \$1,400.00

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for miscellaneous account. Raised last year \$500.00. Budget committee recommends \$500.00.

Art. 27. To see how much the citizens of Hebron will vote to raise for each of the school purposes listed below. The recommendations of the Superintending School Committee are as follows: (a) common school \$2,000; (b) high school \$1,400; (c) textbooks \$75; (d) supplies \$75; (e) lights and telephone \$35; (f) repairs \$100. Total, \$3,685.00. Raised last year, \$4,560. Budget Committee recommends \$3,685.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for payment of interest for the ensuing year. Raised last year \$150. Budget committee recommends \$150.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Memorial Day. Raised last year \$8.00 Budget Committee recommends \$3.00.

Art. 30. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$33.00 for public health nursing in Hebron, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service. Raised last year \$33.00. Budget committee recommends \$33.00.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for wood for Hebron Grange Hall. Raised last year, \$30.00. Budget Committee recommends \$30.00.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$874.79, to cover overdrafts for 1940. Raised last year \$713.15. Budget committee recommends \$874.79.

Art. 33. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$200.00 for Blister Rust Control, in cooperation with the State Forest Service and the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Alders schoolhouse, so called.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such loan or loans to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year, by taxes.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to continue school where an average attendance of eight pupils has not been maintained the past year, if they consider it advisable.

Art. 38. To see if the town would be in favor of extending the state aid road No. 2 from the turn near the residence of H. E. Thorpe, down to the third class road near the residence of N. D. Dixon, and apply the state aid money to this location, together with any special resolve money which the town may receive.

Art. 39. To see what action the town will take in regard to combining the state aid and third class road money.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to execute a quit-claim deed in behalf of the town and, or, assignments with rights of foreclosure in case of unmatured tax mortgage liens releasing its rights in and to real estate held by it by tax deeds and tax liens upon payment of such amount, or amounts, in each case, as the Selectmen in their discretion will deem proper.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to ratify and confirm and approve the acts of the Treasurer and Selectmen hitherto performed by them in making settlement of tax deeds and tax liens by compromising the claims of the town and accepting less than the aggregate of the taxes, costs and interests at 8 per cent.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to sell either at private or public sale any property to which the town has obtained title, either by tax deeds or tax liens upon such terms and for such consideration as the selectmen in their discretion deem advisable, and in such cases, to authorize the town treasurer to execute appropriate deeds in the name of the town and to acknowledge the same.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to buy a culvert for Brighton Hill and raise money for same.

Art. 45. To see what action the town will take in regard to electing a Budget Committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to authorize the tax collector to collect all poll taxes on presentation of the poll tax bill, on or before June 1, 1941.

Art. 47. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not, and have you this warrant with your doings thereon. The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
