We hereby submit our annual report covering the fiscal year of February 1, 1941 to January 31, 1942.

THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Elementary school tuition is being paid for 8 pupils who attend the West Minot School and one pupil who attends elementary school in Mechanic Falls.

There are 82 Hebron pupils attending elementary school and 43 of them are being conveyed to and from school at town expense.

The Sodom School and the Nelson School were closed last September since their enrollment was to be small this year, and also because we received notice that on account of their size they were to be considered luxury schools by the State Department of Education and would not be considered in figuring Equalization. This means that the State would not have assisted us with Equalization Funds in operating them.

The Equalization Fund received this year was about \$1,000 larger than last year. It has been and is being spent to improve educational opportunity for the pupils of Hebron. It has provided salary increases for the teachers, a music teacher, new textbooks, supplementary reading books, reference books, globes and maps.

CONVEYANCE

Three conveyance routes are being maintained during this school year. One of them has been lengthened and enlarged considerably to include the pupils who formerly attended the Sodom School.

Report of Public Health Nursing, 1941

In these troubled times the health of a nation is of great importance. Is it not our duty, then, as privileged citizens in a democracy, to avail ourselves of the material at hand for the maintenance of optimum health.

"Upon what is done to assure physical and mental health during maternity, infancy, childhood and youth depends the vigor and health of the adult population."

During the year visits were made by the State Bureau of Health Nursing Service to prospective mothers to help them carry out the physician's instructions, or if not yet under medical care to urge them to secure the services of a physician as early in pregnancy as possible.

Postpartum cases were visited to urge that the mother return to her physician for her postpartum examination following delivery and to give instructions in the following of a good health routine.

Visits were made to young infants during the year to urge the mother to keep the baby under medical supervision, to give assistance, when necessary, with the planning of the daily schedule and to establish good behavior habits. Particular emphasis was placed on the prevention of communicable diseases which take such a heavy toll in childhood. It was urged that each child be vaccinated against small pox and immunized against diphtheria.

Pre-school children were visited to give instructions to the parents regarding dietary needs and general health care. Assistance was offered if needed in the correction of any emotional problem which might be present.

Visits were made to the homes of school children for the accomplishment of corrective work.

Visits were made to the homes of crippled children to interpret clinic instructions and to assist the family in the follow-up care of the patient.

Health supervision visits were made to those adults admitted to service for assistance with some emotional or health problem.

Two Child Health Conferences were held during the year. Interested townspeople made themselves responsible for obtaining the clinic rooms, providing transportation for those needing this service, and assisting at the conference as volunteer helpers. Twenty-one children were examined by the physician. There was an attendance of thirteen children at the first conference and eight at the second one held. Seventeen were immunized against diphtheria.

The assistant Home Demonstration Agent served at the June conference in the capacity of consultant nutritionist. Problems in diet, buying and budgeting were brought to her attention and the necessary assistance was given to the mothers.

In the spring, physical examinations were given in the schools for the year 1940-1941. This project was made possible by the fact that the staff physicians of the Hebron Sanatorium gave their services for this health work. Of the total enrollment of 88 pupils, 80 were examined. Tuberculin tests were given and 64 pupils availed themselves of this.

Tuberculin tests were given at the parents' request to all new pupils or to those not having had this test previously. A total of 15 pupils were tuberculin tested.

The cooperation and interest shown in the furthering of health measures has been most stimulating.

Warrant for Town Meeting

To Ernest L. Bumpus, a Constable in the town of Hebron, in said County:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hebron, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Center Grange Hall, in said town, on Monday, the second day of March, 1942, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the reports of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, School Committee, Road Commissioner, Monument Fund Committee, Moody Library Trustees, Clerk and other town officers.

Art. 4. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.

Art. 5. To see what salary the town will vote to pay its Treasurer, Selectmen, Road Commissioner, Tax Collector and Fire Warden.

Art. 6. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To choose a first Selectman.

Art. 8. To choose a second Selectman.

Art. 9. To choose a third Selectman.

Art. 10. To choose one member of the Overseers of the Poor for three years.

Art. 11. To choose a board of Assessors.

Art. 12. To see if the town will elect a Road Commissioner or decide in what other way the roads shall be cared for, for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To choose one member of the school board for three years.

Art. 14. To choose a Tax Collector.

Art. 15. To choose a Fire Warden.

Art. 16. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for summer work, roads, bridges and patrol labor. Raised last year, \$1200.00. Budget Committee recommends \$1200.00.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on town roads. Raised last year, \$100.00. Budget Committee recommends, \$50.00.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for State aid road construction, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937. Raised last year, \$799.50. Budget Committee recommends \$799.50.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on State aid road. Raised last year, \$80.00. Budget Committee recommends \$90.00.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$650.00 to maintain third class road to entitle the town to receive its allotment of third class road money from the State. Raised last year, \$594.00 Budget Committee recommends \$650.00.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on third class roads. Raised last year, \$75.00. Budget Committee recommends \$50.00.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on unimproved roads. Raised last year, \$35.00. Budget Committee recommends \$35.00.

Total, \$4,650.00. Raised last year, \$3,685. Budget Committee recommends \$4,650.00.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for payment of interest for the ensuing year. Raised last year, \$150.00. Budget Committee recommends \$100.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Memorial Day. Raised last year, \$3.00. Budget Committee recommends \$10.00.

Art. 31. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$33.00 for public health nursing in Hebron, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service. Raised last year, \$33.00. Budget Committee recommends \$33.00.

Art. 32. To see what action the town will take in regard to hiring Hebron Grange Hall and if necessary raise money for same.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$1,204.60 to cover overdrafts for 1941. Raised last year, \$874.79. Budget Committee recommends \$1,204.60.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such loan or loans to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year, by taxes.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to execute a quit-claim deed in behalf of the town and, or, assignments with rights of foreclosure in case of unmatured tax mortgage liens releasing its rights in and to real estate held by it by tax deeds and tax liens upon payment of such amount, or amounts, in each case, as the Selectmen in their discretion will deem proper.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to ratify and confirm and approve the acts of the Treasurer and Selectmen hitherto performed by them in making settlement of tax deeds and tax liens by compromising the claims of the town and accepting less than the aggregate of the taxes, costs and interest at 8 percent.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to sell either at private or public sale, any property to which the town has obtained title, either by tax deeds or tax liens upon such terms and for such consideration as the Selectmen in their discretion deem advisable and in such cases, to authorize the town treasurer to execute appropriate deeds in the name of the town and to acknowledge the same.
