## Annual Report of Superintendent of Schools.

---

TO THE CITIZENS OF HERMON :

I most respectfully submit the following report of the schools of your town for the past year.

I shall endeavor to be as brief as possible in this, my last work for the year, making my report of the schools as a whole instead of making a detailed report of each school as in the past.

Our schools in general have been under the instructions and management of the best teachers available and in nearly every instance their work has been satisfactory, thereby helping to bring our schools nearer to that standard for which we have so earnestly labored while in this work.

The suspension of school No. 7 by State law and of school No. 13 by vote of the S. S. Committee and the conveyance of the scholars from these schools to No. 5 proved a success from two points of view.

First. It provided the scholars with better instruction than could have been given them in a small school.

Second. A large saving of expense was made, thereby giving us more weeks of schooling all over the town.

School No. 4 was also suspended and scholars conveyed to No. 1, which in our estimation was a very profitable move. More of this kind of work should be done in the future, thereby bringing together some of our small schools and allowing a chance to provide better qualified instructors.

The attendance to the several schools for the past year has been fairly good, although not up to what we would desire. There seems to be a lack of interest manifested by the parents



in some localities, to get their children to school. We consider this to be almost criminal negligence, and yet, we find it practiced in all parts of the country. Parents should see that their children attend school more regularly.

Some of our school houses and outbuildings are in fairly good condition, while others need repairing to make them comfortable for our children. It is my belief that many a child loses good health in a school room unfit for occupancy.

Our text books are, in part, in good condition. It is to be expected, that books in the hands of small children need to be changed quite often, making it necessary to purchase some every year. If I should be called upon to make an estimate of the number of poor books in town, I should say that twenty per cent. of all text books owned by the town were unfit for use, although many of them are in the hands of scholars.

Before closing this report I wish to say to the citizens of this town, that I feel very grateful toward them for the many favors I have received in my work, and also to state that I have been ably supported by our S. S. Committee. They have always responded promptly to every call where their decision was necessary, and have carefully considered every case requiring their attention, thereby making my duties a great deal easier to perform. And I would appeal to the voters of this town to see that these men are paid for their valuable services.

I have endeavored to perform all duties devolving upon me in this work to the best of my ability, and faithfully to the interests of all concerned.
