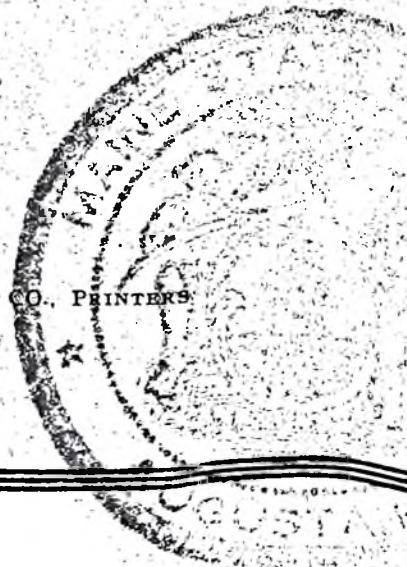

STATE OF MAINE

To GEO. E. TEBBETTS, a constable in the town of Hermon, in said county,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Hermon, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Town House, in said town on Monday, the eleventh day of March, A. D. 1907, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose a town clerk.
- ART. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports as printed.
- ART. 4. To elect three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.
- ART. 5. To elect one member of S. S. committee.
- ART. 6. To elect a truant officer.
- ART. 7. To elect a town treasurer.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will elect a road commissioner.
- ART. 9. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for support of schools and the poor, and the repairs of roads and bridges, for contingent expenses, for school books, for repairs on school houses, and for school incidentals.
- ART. 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to continuing and improving State road in compliance with Chap. 63. R. S., approved March 10, 1904 and acts amendatory thereto.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for special repairs on Hermon hill, avenue road so called.
- ART. 12. To see if the town will grant and raise money to repair all bridge railing in town that needs repairing.
- ART. 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to a snow roller.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for care of cemeteries.
- ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to paint Evergreen cemetery fence and raise money for same.
- ART. 16. To see if the town will raise fifteen dollars for memorial expenses and care of soldiers' monument.
- ART. 17. To fix compensation of tax collector.
- ART. 18. To elect a tax collector and all necessary town officers.
- ART. 19. To fix compensation of S. S. committee, superintendent of schools, town treasurer and road commissioner.

ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the municipal officers, town treasurer and clerk.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to buy a road plow and raise money for same.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to repair the easterly abutments of black stream bridge and raise money for same.

ART. 23. To see what action the town will take in regard to snow fences.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to fence school house lot in district No. 11, and raise money for same.

ART. 25. To see if the town will authorize the superintending school committee to contract with and pay some high school of standard grade tuition of scholars according to the provision of Sec. 62, Chap. 15, R. S.

ART. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate for the current year for free high school purposes.

ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to consolidate schools No. 1 and 4, and remove school building No. 4, to a lot on the west side of Hermon Pond road near the junction of said road, and Robert Swan road for their use and raise money for same.

ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to suspend school No. 6.

ART. 29. To see what action the town will take in regard to protecting the town property against fire.

ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to arrange with A. A. Tuttle, to remove his stump fence on pine tree road so called and replace the same with wire and raise money for same.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town House at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Fail not to make due services of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting.

Size of building, 25x30. The walls of the school-room in addition to being well plastered, are sheathed to a height of 3 feet to protect the same. The seats are from the Vermont School Seat Co., Rutland, Vermont, of the latest pattern, single pupil and graduated to accommodate all classes of pupils. In closing will say that we hope our work has been satisfactory.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF HERMON :

It becomes my pleasant duty to submit the following report of the year's work of the School Department.

Perfect harmony has prevailed in this department in the year past, and the members have given all matters pertaining to the schools their careful and considerate attention.

GRADING

A course of study was arranged for the schools and placed in the hands of the teachers at the beginning of the fall term. With such help as I was able to give the work of grading was begun. This was no easy task, for some pupils had advanced to third or fourth grade reading without being able to do the simplest work in number; while others were doing high school arithmetic and algebra with very little knowledge of geography, history, or hygiene, and practically none of language.

In the schools where the teacher has the ability to arrange her work so as to make every day tell, the results have been very satisfactory.

In schools No. 2, No. 3, No. 7, and No. 8 the work done by pupils and teachers deserve special mention. We hope by next fall to have a uniformity of work in all the schools.

Allow me to say here, that through the course of study, we hope to do the greatest good to the greatest number; that any pupil who intends to continue his studies in the common schools only, may take such work as he is qualified to do; but, that no pupil will be given a diploma or certificated for any high school until he has completed the course.

REPAIRS

School house No. 1, was shingled and the walls and ceiling repaired, but more work must be done on the building if we continue to use it. New windows were placed in the west side of No. 2, the rest of the windows puttied, and a new door purchased. This building is now in good condition.

The members of school No. 3, have brought new window curtains, pictures, an organ and an excellent book case for their new building.

The walls and ceiling of schoolhouse No. 5, should be painted or calcimined at once, as their present condition is not conducive to the health of the pupils. Building No. 7, also, needs a coat of paint on walls and ceiling.

Sheathing has been purchased for ceiling in house No. 9, with one new door, this building would be in very good repair.

Buildings No. 8, and No. 13, are in a deplorable condition; No. 11, excepting the seats, is very little better. No. 12 needs some repairing.

We ask you to be as generous as you possibly can in the appropriation for repairs.

TEXT BOOKS

Except Grammars and Barnes Histories the same books are in use as last year.

Metcalf's Elements of English were exchanged for Mary Hyde's Language Books No. 1, and Rank's Grammars for Book No. 2. These new books were adopted by the S. S. Committee, August 29; Montgomery's American Histories, November 16, 1906.

As recommended last year, the Maury's Manual Geography, and the Elementary Arithmetics should be exchanged for new books. Another series of readers to use as supplementary work would be of great help.

A "Cabinet of Industries," was purchased in October, but has been little used as few of the buildings have a place to safely keep the apparatus. I am very sure results from its use will justify the expense. It seems to me that it will develop in the child a greater desire to know more of the world's activities, thus supplying a long felt need of our common schools.

SCHOOLS

Schools No. 4 and No. 10, were suspended for the spring and fall terms, pupils attending No. 1 and No. 5, No. 3 and No. 11, school No. 6 was suspended fall and winter, pupils attending, No. 12.

Four pupils from Glenburn attended school No. 3, for the whole year; five, part of fall and all the winter term, making a tuition bill of \$33.30 due the Town of Hermon.

ESTIMATES FOR NEXT YEAR.

We can get along with less money for text books, but need more for repairs and school fund. I would recommend that the following sums be raised for the coming year.

For school fund.....	\$200 00
For repairs.....	200 00
For incidentals.....	100 00
For text books	125 00

CONCLUSION

A wholesome respect for those in authority is one of the first lessons to be taught the children in our schools. Unkindly criticism made in the presence of a child often leads to disrespect for his teacher and a tendency to violate rules made for his best good. Will you not, then, ascribe the best motives to the acts of teachers and officials in charge? Upon your readiness to do this, depends largely the prosperity of our schools.

I wish to thank the members of the school board and other town officials for the courtesies I have received at their hands; and to express my gratitude for the many kindnesses shown me by the citizens.

Not least among the pleasant things to be remembered, is the welcome which I have received, everywhere; from the children.

Spelling—Words from reading lesson. Thorough drill in sounds of letters.

Writing—Forming letters, writing words and sentences.

Number—Combination of numbers from one to twenty, stories to illustrate.

2ND GRADE.

Reading and Language—Second Reader. Lesson stories, use of capital letters, period and interrogation point.

Spelling—Words from reading lesson. Phonic drill.

Number—Written work daily in addition and subtraction, using numbers to 100. Multiplication table through fives. Teach pint, quart, gallon peck, inches, foot ; $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{1}{3}$, $\frac{1}{4}$ of objects to twelve.

Writing—Fifteen minutes daily drill.

3RD GRADE.

Reading—Third Reader. Phonic drill.

Language—Sentence building, short stories, written and oral.

Spelling—Words from reading lesson.

Number—Thorough drill in multiplication tables through eights. Work in denominate numbers continued. Simple fractions and problems from elementary arithmetic. Written work in addition, subtraction, multiplication, no result to exceed tens of thousands.

Writing—Fifteen minutes daily drill.

4TH GRADE.

Reading—Fourth Reader. Phonic drill.
