

Annual Report of the Public Health Nurse

Hebron 1945

An Immunization Clinic was held at the schoolhouse in Hebron. 11 children were protected from diphtheria and 3 were vaccinated against smallpox. This included infants and preschool children.

Seventeen visits were made to infants and preschool children to encourage parents to have physical examinations by their family physicians and to encourage immunization early in infancy.

Five visits were made to expectant mothers to provide them with information and instructions vital to their own health and that of the child.

Eight visits were made to assist in the control of communicable diseases.

Twenty-three visits were made to the homes of school children to assist in securing corrective work. Five visits were made to schools for conferences with teachers, to demonstrate eye examination and to assist with inspection for skin infection.

The Audiometer hearing test was given in Hebron schools. 72 tests were given. 12% were found to have some hearing loss.

I wish to thank the Town Officials, Health Officer and teachers for their interest and cooperation in the Public Health Nursing Program.

Report of School Committee and Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Hebron:

We hereby submit our annual report covering the fiscal year from February 1, 1945, to February 1, 1946.

We have been fortunate in having local teachers to carry on instruction in the Hebron schools this year. The situation in general in regard to teachers is still a critical one and the towns paying lowest salaries are having difficulty in keeping positions filled. Hebron has been enabled to raise its teachers more than in ordinary years because of additional state funds which resulted from the passage of the McKinnon Bill at the last session of the legislature.

The following elementary schools are now in operation:

Warrant for Town Meeting

State of Maine

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County of Oxford, ss.

To Andrew Hawkins, a Constable in the Town of Hebron, in said County:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Hebron, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Center Grange Hall, in said town, on Monday, the fourth day of March, 1946, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the report as printed.

Art. 4. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see what salary the town will vote to pay its officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for summer work, roads, bridges and patrol labor. Raised last year \$1,700.00. Selectmen recommend \$2,000.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on town roads. Raised last year \$100.00. Selectmen recommend \$100.00.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for state aid road construction, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937. Raised last year \$429.26. Selectmen recommend \$799.50.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Winter work. Raised last year \$1,500.00. Selectmen recommend \$2,000.00.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Welfare account. Raised last year \$600.00. Selectmen recommend \$400.00.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to and raise for town officers' bills. Raised last year \$1,600.00. Selectmen recommend \$1,600.00.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for miscellaneous account. Raised last year \$350.00. Selectmen recommend \$400.00.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for maintenance of third class roads, to entitle the town to receive its allotment of third class road money from the state. Raised last year \$424.00. Selectmen recommend \$424.00.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for cutting bushes on third class roads. Raised last year \$100.00 Selectmen recommend \$50.00.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Memorial Day. Raised last year \$25.00. Selectmen recommend \$10.00.

Art. 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$33.00 for public health nursing in Hebron, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service. Raised last year \$33.00. Selectmen recommend \$33.00.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 11, Sections 62-63-64.

Art. 18. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to take the unexpended balance from Browntail Moth Acct., Civilian Defense Account, and State Aid Bush Acct., amounting in all to \$510.20, and apply same to overdraft account of 1945.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$1,589.84 to cover the balance of the overdrafts. Selectmen recommend \$1,589.84.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 left by the late H. K. Stearns for a fund to care for his lot in the Hebron Church Cemetery.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to buy new snow plowing equipment or contract the winter plowing out.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee of four to work with the selectmen in the selection of new snow plowing equipment.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$9,500.00 to buy new tractor or truck and equipment. Selectmen recommend \$9,500.00..

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$3,500.00 a year for three years, toward paying for contracting, if the last part of Article 22 is accepted. Art. 26. To see how much the citizens of Hebron will vote to raise for each of the school purposes listed below: The recommendations are as follows, (a) Common Schools, \$5,382.27; (b) High School Tuition, \$1,972.79; (c) Textbooks, \$100.00; (d) Supplies \$100.00; (e) Lights and Telephone, \$60.00; (f) Repairs, \$200. Total \$7,815.06. Raised last year \$5,935.00. School Committee recommends \$7,815.06.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the officers to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the town; such loan or loans to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current year, by taxes.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to execute a quit-claim deed in behalf of the town and, or, assignments with rights of foreclosure in case of unmatured tax mortgage liens releasing its right in and to real estate held by it by tax deeds and tax liens upon payment of such amount or amounts, in each case as the Selectmen in their discretion deem proper.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to ratify and confirm and approve the acts of the Treasurer and Selectmen hitherto performed by them in making settlement of tax deeds and tax liens by compromising the claims of the town and accepting less than the aggregate of the taxes, costs and interest at 8 per cent.

Hereof fail not, and have you this warrant with your doings thereon. The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
