STATE OF MAINE.

To LESTER PATTEN, a constable in the town of Hermon, in
said county.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Hermon, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house in said Town on Monday, the ninth day of March, A. D., 1914, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art 2. To choose a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports as printed.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect one member of the S. S. Committee.

Art. 6. To elect a truant officer.

Art. 7. To elect a town treasurer.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to have one or more road commissioners.

Art. 9. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools, the repairs of roads and bridges, for the support of poor, for contingent expenses, for school books, for repairs of schoolhouses, and for school incidentals.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the care of cemeteries.

Art. 11. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of twenty-five dollars for the care of the soldiers' monument and memorial expenses.

Art. 12. To fix compensation of tax collector.

Art. 13. To elect a tax collector and other necessary town officers.

Art. 14. To fix compensation of S. S. committee, Supt. of Schools, town treasurer and road commissioner.

Art. 15. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise to be expended in improving Evergreen Cemetery and what action in regard to care of same.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to maintain a free high school.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free high school purpose for the current year.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 19. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the state highway commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to fence Lake Hermon cemetery and improve the within and to see what sum of money they will grant and raise for the same.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to gravel the Odlin Road and to see what sum of money they will grant and raise for the same.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to gravel about 50 rods of the newly turnpiked road on the Coldbrook Road and to see what sum of money they will grant and raise for the same.

Art. 23. To see what action the town will take in regard to protecting the public at the railroad crossings in Hermon.

Art. 24. To see what action the town will take in regard to painting the cemetery fence at No. 9 and what sum of money they will grant and raise for same.

Art. 25. To see what action the town will take in regard to building the road at Northern Maine Junction near Crowley's store as laid out by the selectmen in 1913 and to see what sum of money they will grant and raise for the same.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for destroying brown tail moth nests in the streets of the town.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to purchase the Thayer farm for gravel and to see what sum of money they will grant and raise for same.

Art. 28. To see what action the town will take in regard to a centennial celebration and to see what sum of money they will grant and raise for the same.

Art. 29. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying a hearse and see what sum of money they will grant and raise for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising the list of voters at the town house at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting. Fail not to make due service of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting.

TEXT BOOKS

Montgomery's Revised History has been purchased for the ninth grade pupils. Several copies of Frey's geography that were badly worn have been replaced by Frey's Leading Facts of Geography.

Twelve copies Wentworth's Algebra were purchased for the ninth grade.

Davidson's Health Lessons were purchased for the eighth grade.

Ten copies Webster's Secondary School Dictionaries have been purchased. Twelve copies of Hamilton's large arithmetic were purchased as a trial and have proven very satisfactory to the teachers who have used them.

Story Hour Primers and First Readers, Progressive, Introductory Third and Progressive Third, six copies, Cooper's Last of the Mohicans and several different copies of classics have been purchased for supplementary reading.

There is still a great demand for supplementary reading.

It is a proven fact that a child does not gain in his reading by reading a story he has read many times.

The worn books in all the grades have been replaced by new ones as far as I could do so.

Several of our Heath's Complete Arithmetic are in poor condition.

REPAIRS

No. 1 has been extensively repaired, the sills and foundation thoroughly repaired, a hard pine floor has been laid, new seats placed and a steel ceiling put up, walls calcimined and the woodwork painted. A very satisfactory job. A word for steel ceilings, it was found by your S. S. committee that steel can be used for ceilings about as cheap as pine and is much more satisfactory. Several of the other buildings have had minor repairs.

Storm windows have been purchased for two buildings.

Nos. 10, 11 and 13 need new floors.

No. 11 must have a new ceiling this year.

It was our earnest endeavor to paint some of the school buildings but our funds failed us; however, several of the buildings need painting badly.

CONCLUSION

Thirteen ninth grade pupils took the State examination in June and were given certificates of promotion. Of this number five have been attending high school.

We now have twenty pupils in high school. One pupil from the town of Glenburn attended school No. 3 the whole year. For tuition the sum of (\$7.50) has been paid the town of Hermon.

We feel that an unusual amount of thorough work has been accomplished this year. Though we have had the measles in four different schools the attendance has shown a marked improvement.

The S. S. Committee have shown me every kindness possible. S. S. Committee, town officials, parents and children of Hermon, I thank you.
