### WARRANT

#### STATE OF MAINE

Penobscot ss.

To Lester P. Patten, a constable in the Town of Hermon, in said County:

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Hermon, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the eighth day of March, A. D. 1915, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Article 2. To choose a town clerk.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.
- Article 4. To elect three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.
  - Article 5. To elect one member of the S. S. committee.
  - Article 6. To elect a town treasurer.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to have one or more road commissoners.
- Article 8. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools, the repairs of roads and bridges, for the support of poor, for contingent expenses, for school books, for repairs of schoolhouses and for school incidentals.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for care of cemeteries.

Article 10. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of twenty-five dollars for care of soldiers' monument and memorial expenses.

Article 11. To fix compensation of tax collector.

Article 12. To elect a tax collector and other necessary town officers.

Article 13. To fix compensation of S. S. committee, Superintendent of schools, town treasurer and road commissioner.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.

Article 15. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.

Article 16. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State and State aid highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town, under the provisions of section 9 and 18 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.

Article 17. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars to rebuild the cross bridge so-called near Fred Lowd residence on Carmel road of reinforced concrete with a span of fifteen (15) feet.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more fire wards, one of which shall be designated fire inspector, and fix compensation for services.

Article 19. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of weights and measures.

Article 20. To see what sums of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay L. J. Wright, principal and interest on money loaned to the town for the purchase of the Thayer farm, so-called.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to fence schoolhouse lot in district No. 8 and raise money for the same.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to purchase a road machine and grant and raise money for the same.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to fence the old portion of North Hermon Cemetery and grant and raise money for the same and to determine under whose care it shall be expended.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept and receive under provisions of section 13 and 14 of chapter 20, R. S., from Susan A. Nowell of Melrose Mass., the sum of one hundred (\$100) dollars, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Granville M. Nowell lot in the cemetery at Snow's Corner, said perpetual care to include cutting the grass and keeping the lot properly sodded and graded.

Article 25. To see if the town will grant and raise money to rebuild the culvert between Wm. Uetz residence and schoolhouse No. 1, at Hermon Pond.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to allow Johnathan Hunt Chapter, O. E. S., to build a toilet on the south end of town house with entance from town hall.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to purchase settees or chairs for town hall and raise money for same.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to sell gravel from the Thayer farm to the citizens of Hermon and to contractors for the building of the proposed State road on Carmel road and fix compensation for the same.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to discontinue those schools formerly known as district Nos. 6, 7, 12, 13 and authorize the municipal officer to sell school buildings at district No. 7, 12, 13.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to locate and establish a school at the junction of the Coldbrook Road and Carmel Road and instruct the municipal officer to procure by purchase or otherwise a lot at said location to contain not less than three-fourths of an acre.

Article 31. To see what action the town will take in regard to erecting a schoolhouse at the location designated in Article 30, and provide money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at Town House at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Fail not to make due service of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting.

### TEXT BOOKS

We now have thirty-six copies of Montgomery's Revised History in the hands of our eighth and ninth grade pupils. The remaining copies of Montgomery's History in the hands of the seventh grade are in very poor condition and need to be replaced by the Revised.

Eighteen copies Frey's Leading Facts of Geography have been purchased. Twelve copies Blaisdell's Physiology, Revised Edition, have been purchased. We feel we have made a great step in our reading this year, we have never had a basal method of reading for our little folks. In the fall I purchased and introduced the Progressive Road to Reading Book I, Plan of Work and Perception Cards. The results have been very gratifying.

There is a demand for supplementary reading in the higher grades.

Our Heath's Complete Arithmetics and Milne's Book I and II are in very poor condition.

### REPAIRS

No. 13 has had the sills and foundation thoroughly repaired and a hard pine floor laid. The building needs painting.

No. 11 has had a steel ceiling put up.

No. 5 a plank platform has been laid and the outside of the building given two coats of paint.

Several of the other buildings have had minor repairs.

Several of the out buildings need repairing.

No. 2 needs new walls and ceiling

No. 8, new walls and painting.

The buildings in No. 10 and 12 are in very bad condition; it seems to me to put them in suitable condition a special appropriation is needed.

### CONCLUSION

Fifteen ninth grade pupils took the State examination in June and twelve were given certificates of promotion. Of this number four have been attending high school.

We now have fifteen pupils in high school. The work done in the several schools, for the most part, has been very satisfactory.

In school work we need the hearty co-operation of parents. There is no greater source of strength to the teacher, nor inspiration to the pupil, than the kindly words spoken of the school in the home. Constant criticising, even of a mild variety and without hostile intent can not fail in the end to injure the efficiency and influence of the school.

In closing, I wish to thank the S. S. Committee for their many kind words and good advice which they have been willing to give at all times.

I thank the town officials, the citizens of Hermon and children for the courtesy extended me at all times.
