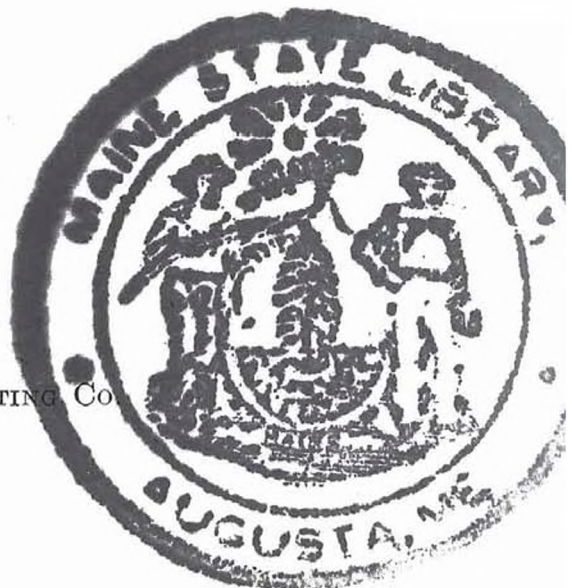

## WARRANT

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PENOBSCOT SS.

STATE OF MAINE

To LESTER P. PATTEN, a Constable in the Town of Hermon,  
in said County. GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Hermon, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house in said town, on Monday, the twelfth day of March, A. D., 1917, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose a town clerk.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.

Article 4. To elect three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor.

Article 5. To elect one member of the S. S. committee.

Article 6. To elect a town treasurer.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to have one or more road commissioners and to take an informal vote for the same.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools, the repair of roads and bridges, for the support of poor, for contingent expenses, for school books, for repairs of school houses, and for school incidentals.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free high school purposes.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 11. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of twenty five dollars for care of soldiers' monument and memorial expenses.

Article 12. To fix compensation of tax collector, S. S. Committee, superintendent of schools, town treasurer, and road commissioner.

Article 13. To elect a tax collector, constable, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more fire wards, one of which shall be designated fire inspector and fix compensation for services.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State highway during the ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions 9 and 18 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.

Article 17. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of section 19 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay L. J. Wright, principal and interest on

money loaned to the town for the purchase of the Thayer farm so called.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to purchase seats for the town house and raise money for the same.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$300.00 dollars for permanent improvement on the Avenue road.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of wire to be used for the purpose of building road fences in such places as in the opinion of the selectmen it will be a benefit to the town.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Superintending school committee to join with the following town to wit, Newburgh, or such other town or towns as it may deem expedient for the purpose of employing a superintendent of schools in accordance with the provisions of sections 55 to 62 inclusive of chapter 16 of the revised statutes.

Article 23. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money for the use of girls' and boys' agricultural club and how much.

Article 25. To see if the town will grant and raise money to build a wood house in school No. 6 and how much.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to build a new school-house in School No. 10, and grant and raise money for the same.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money to fence school yards, No. 7, 9 and 10.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money to build snow fences where the selectmen think necessary.

Article 29. To see if the town will unite with the grange in holding a grange and town fair and raise the sum of \$25.00 to meet an appropriation already made by the grange.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the town house at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Fail not to make due service of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting.

### TEXT BOOKS

Our books are in good condition. Our lower grades are well supplied with readers. We have five series of first readers, four series of second readers, four series of third readers and four series of fourth readers. Grades III, IV, V, VI, and VII have a good supply of supplementary readers, also. A few classics are needed for the VIII and IX grades.

Mary Hyde Language Books I and II, were not changed in the fall. Forty copies Scott and Southworth Lessons in English have been purchased and are in use. I did not have sufficient funds to introduce the books throughout the town. The books have proven very satisfactory to the teachers using them.

### REPAIRS

No. 2. Needs a hardwood floor, and the entry needs repairing.

No. 3. The outside of the building has had two coats of paint.

No. 4. The room has been painted and papered. Two inside doors are needed.

No. 8. Hard wood floor is needed.

No. 9. Hard wood floor has been laid. Room needs painting.

No 10. A hard wood floor has been laid. This building needs extensive repairs. A special appropriation is needed.

No. 11. A hard wood floor has been laid. Wood shed needs new sills.

No. 13. Two new outside doors have been hung and 9 new plank platforms laid.

No. 5 and No. 12. Shingles are in the yards to shingle one side of each roof.

Most of the buildings heave in the winter, making it hard to close and lock the doors. They need solid foundations.

### CONCLUSION

Ten ninth grade pupils took the State examination in June and nine were given certificates of promotion. Of this number seven have been attending high school.

We now have twenty-four pupils in high school. Nineteen in Bangor, four in Hampden and one in Oldtown. The work done in the schools this year has been very gratifying.

In closing, this my sixth and final annual report I wish to thank all who have so kindly aided me in my work; every courtesy possible has been shown me.
