# WARRANT

PENOBSCOT SS.

STATE OF MAINE

To Lester P. Patten, a Constable of the Town of Hermon, in said County.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hermon, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house in said town on Monday, the tenth day of March, A. D., 1919, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Article 2. To choose a town clerk.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.
- Article 4. To elect three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.
  - Article 5. To elect one member of the S. S. Committee.
  - Article 6. To elect a town treasurer.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to have one or more road commissioners.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Schools, the repair of roads and bridges, for the support of poor, for contingent expenses, for school books, for repairs of school houses and for school incidentals.

- Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free high school purposes.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for care and improvement of cemeteries.
- Article 11. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of twenty-five dollars for care of soldiers' monument and memorial expenses.
- Article 12. To fix compensation of Tax Collector, S. S. Committee, Town Treasurer and Road Commissioner.
- Article 13. To elect a Tax Collector, Constable and all other necessary town officers.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more fire wards, one of which shall be designated fire inspector and fix compensation for services.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Highway and State Aid during the ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions 9 and 18 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Article 17. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay L. J. Wright, principal and interest on money loaned to the town for the purchase of the Thayer farm so called.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to accept and receive under provisions of sections 13 and 14 of chapter 20, R. S., from L. J. Overlock of Bisbee, Arizona, the sum of four hundred dollars, (4400.00) the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of Jacob Overlock and Annie M. Alley's burial lots in Snow Corner Cemetery. Said perpetual care to include cutting the grass and keeping the lot properly sodded and graded.

To see if the town will vote to accept the laying out of alteration of a portion of the Smith road so called, at Hermon Pond, Hermon, Me. Surveyed Jan. 22, 1919, by David J. Nason, C. E., beginning at a cedar stake in the southerly line of land owned or occupied by Edwin T. Smith, standing (60) sixty feet measured at right angles, south westerly from the southwesterly line of the Maine Central R. R., location thence S. 51°, 45' east parallel with and (60) sixty feet south westerly of said south westerly line of said Railroad location, nine hundred fifteen and five-tenths (915-5-10) feet to a cedar stake, thence S. sixty six degrees (66° 45') E. one hundred eighteen and three-tenths (118 3-10) feet to a cedar stake at an angle in the North easterly line of the road laid by the town of Hermon, March 3rd, 1910. Said road to be forty-nine and one-half  $(49\frac{1}{2})$  feet wide, measuring at right angles south westerly from the above described line, and raise money to build said road.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to install street lamps, one at the monument at Hermon Corner, one at the Junction of Cold brook road, one at Hermon Center, one at Northern Maine Junction, at the rate

of twenty dollars per year per light, light to be 100 Watt and to be wholly maintained and installed by the Black Stream Electric Co., and renewals furnished by the Company, and raise money for the same.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for Mothers' Aid. Article 23. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of five hundred dollars for permanent improvement of the new Boston road.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the following list of Jurors as revised by the Selectmen and Treasurer and Town Clerk: Ernest P. Bishop, Marion C. Hunt, Russell H. Patten, B. W. Pomroy, Edgar G. Verrill, J. Mellen Taylor, Silas P. Warren, Howard B. Leathers, Chas. N. Patten, Herbert M. Bates, Geo. E. Kimball, Emery L. Leathers, Loren E. Goodspeed, Hiram C. Warren, Everett W. Miller, Fred A. Wing, Lafe Bartlett, Claud O. Hunt, Edward I. Snow, Frank B. Small, Ernest L. Grant, Wilbur E. Brown, Clarence A. Philbrooks.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the town house at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Fail not to make due notice of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Hermon:

I hereby submit my first annual report on the condition of the schools of Hermon, for the year ending March 1, 1919.

In the first place, let me express my thanks to the members of the Superintending School Committee for their good-will and cooperation in this my first year's work with you. The problems to a man in a new position are many but their solution has been greatly aided thru the sound and timely advice of the Committee. Let me also express my appreciation to Mrs. Jennie C. Snow, your former Superintendent, for the careful and pains-taking manner in which she acquainted me with the duties which she was laying down. With such aid and advice, I have been greatly aided in administrating the school work this year and in making a survey of conditions with a view of recommending a line of procedure for the future.

Among the problems of education at the present time none is considered more vital to the welfare of the nation than that of the rural school. Thinking men and women have long realized that something must be done to improve our rural schools as that families would not be called to the cities and large towns for the sake of a better education for their children, thus leaving abandoned farms and depleted communities. The advantages of country life to children are many especially from a standpoint of health and to add to these advantages the benefits which accrue from advanced standards of education has been the aim of administrators of education.

The first step toward better rural education has been made by a concerted action for the improvement of rural school buildings.

New buildings are built to conform to modern methods of lighting, heating and ventilation and old buildings are remodeled to conform to the same standards. A standard school house at the present time should be placed on a good foundation, with outbuildings connected. The windows should be placed so that the light will come from the left or from the left and rear of the pupils. Single adjustable seats and a jacketed stove are the important features in the school room, while slate blackboards are installed when practicable. These are the main features of a school house that is as comfortable and hygienic as any of those at the larger centers of population.

The next step toward better education in our rural schools, is toward the improvement of the teaching force. This is to my mind the most important of all. An inefficient teacher can waste more time and money for a town than an efficient and capable teacher can ever save. Everyone recognizes the fact that rural teachers are poorly paid. When conditions are right capable local teachers can be secured at a much smaller salary than their services are worth and the schools do not suffer. But when it is necessary to procure teachers from out-of-town, the small salaries only attract teachers who have generally no experience whatever and very little training. To build up rural education then, it is necessary to raise more money for purposes of instruction. The rural school needs the expert teacher as much as the city school.

Having briefly stated the two main policies in connection with improving rural education, let us consider how they effect the town of Hermon.

### SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The school building at Northern Maine Junction conforms to the standard set by the State Department with perhaps one or two minor deficiencies. The other buildings to conform to standard will need remodeling. This year the building on the Cold Brook road was extensively repaired; the building was shingled, clapboarded and painted, repairs were made on the foundation and the lighting and coat room arrangement was changed. The high cost of material made an overdraw in the repair account necessary but we think that the results obtained justify it. New blackboards, new seats and a new floor are still needed.

In addition to repairs on this building the school house at No. 9, was shingled and a few small repairs necessary to the upkeep of buildings in general were made on other buildings.

Next year it will be necessary to repair the building in District 2. This building should be placed on a good foundation, the roof should be shingled and the chimney repaired. Minor repairs are needed in several of the other districts.

In regard to repairs I recommend that the town raise money enough each year to remodel at least one building. This is the method which seems to be giving the best results toward raising the standard of rural school buildings thruout the State.

# SCHOOL EQUIPMENT

An inventory of the equipment in the school rooms in town shows that a shortage of maps, globes and sanitary drinking arrangements exists in some districts. Such equipment will have to be purchased this coming year. The money this year has been spent for cleaning school houses, necessary equipment and teacher's supplies of crayon, paper, etc.

#### INSTRUCTION

•The town of Hermon has been more fortunate than many other towns in the fact that several excellent teachers who lived in town could be secured for work in the schools. We have also been fortunate in securing from out-of-town, teachers

of ability. The work of all the teachers has been very good and the results obtained by several are extraordinary. Altho the schools have been badly broken up on account of sickness splendid progress is being made. I wish to especially commend all of the teachers for their conscientious attention to duty and for the fine spirit of cooperation they have shown.

#### TEXT BOOKS

The appropriation for text books this year has been largely expended for the replacement of badly worn books. A limited number of books in physiology and hygiene have been placed in the schools and a number of the geographies in the lower grades have been replaced by a later edition. An up-to-date reader on the war has been introuced in the ninth grade. Next year it will be necessary to replace the spelling books with new texts. Several new sets of supplemental readers will have to be purchased.

#### COURSE OF STUDY

A new course of study, based on the State course of study, has been placed in the hands of the teachers. Emphasis is placed on reading and language in the lower grades and arithmetic and grammar in the upper grades. The subjects are worked out in considerable detail, especially in the lower grades, for the guidance of the teachers.

#### FUEL AND CONVEYANCE

The severe winter last year caused a shortage of fuel for this year and it will probably be necessary to purchase additional fuel for a majority of the school buildings. Some has already been purchased. All of the fuel for the coming year has been engaged altho at a considerable advance over the price for last year.

This year the school in District 1 has been closed and the pupils conveyed to District 2, with the exception of two for whom arrangement was made with the town of Carmel for their instruction. Additional pupils in District 1 will make it more practical to reopen the school there another year.

Before closing my report I wish to bring to the attention of the citizens of the town the need of some form of school in town where the boys and girls can take studies in advance of the common school.

At the present time the boys and girls to get a high school education must go to other towns and cities. To those who are for various reasons unable to go the road to further study seems closed. This to my mind does not seem just and right in these days when a high school education is becoming a necessity.

It is impossible to place high school studies in the common schools and a two year high school developing in one or two years to a Class A. school would seem to be the solution of the problem.

Such a course of procedure would call for the erection of a school building and I respectfully recommend that you give this matter early and careful consideration.
