WARRANT

To Alfred Overlock, a Constable of the Town of Hermon, in
said County

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hermon, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house in said town on Monday, the fifteenth day of March, A. D., 1920, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.

Art. 4. To elect three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.

Art. 5. To elect one member of the S. S. Committee.

Art. 6. To elect a town treasurer.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to have one or more road commissioners.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to elect a road commissioner.

Art. 9. To elect a road commissioner.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools, the repair of roads and bridges, for the support of poor, for contingent expenses, for school books, for repairs of school houses and for school incidentals.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free high school purposes.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for care and improvement of cemeteries.

Art. 13. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of twenty-five dollars for care of soldiers' monument and memorial expenses.

Art. 14. To fix compensation of Tax Collector, S. S. Committee, Town Treasurer and Road Commissioner.

Art. 15. To elect a Tax Collector, Constable, and all other necessary town officers.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more fire wardens, one of which shall be designated fire inspector and fix compensation for services.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Highway and State Aid during the ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions 9 and 18 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 19. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to accept and receive under provisions of section 13 and 14 of chapter 20, R. S., from Mrs. M. J. Drew the sum of one hundred dollars, (\$100.00) the

income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of John Bryant lot in Snow Corner Cemetery.

Said perpetual care to include cutting of grass and keeping the lot property sodded and graded.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to accept and receive under provisions of section 13 and 14 of chapter 20, R. S., from Sargent of Winterport the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of Sargent lot in Snow Corner Cemetery.

Said perpetual care to include cutting the grass and keeping the lot properly sodded and graded.

Art. 22. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the purpose of hauling gravel onto the places where it will be the most beneficial on the "Pine Tree" road.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to allow the treasurer to hire money with the approval of the selectmen for the purpose of paying town charges.

Art. 24. To see if the town will grant and raise money and what sum for the purpose of fencing Pine Hill Cemetery.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money and what sum for the purpose of completing the E. T. Smith road.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) for mothers' aid.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of eighty dollars (\$80.00) for the maintenance of street lights.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to accept and receive under provisions of sections 13 and 14 of chapter 20, R. S., from the estate of Agnes K. McCoy the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) the income from the same to be used for the perpetual

care of the Enoch Leathers [and John McCoy lots in Snow Corner Cemetary. Said perpetual care to include cutting the grass and keeping the lot properly sodded and graded.

Art. 29 To see if the town will vote to accept and receive under provisions of section 13 and 14 of chapter 20, R. S., from Rose Kelley the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Job Kelley lot in Pleasant Hill Cemetary. Said perpetual care to include cutting the grass and keeping the lot properly sodded and graded.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money to purchase wire for road fence on the west side of Garland hill.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more special constables.

Art. 32. To elect one or more special constables.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the town house at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Fail not to make due notice of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting.

School Report

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hermon, Maine, March 1, 1920.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens:—

Owing to the fact that I entered your service after the closing of the schools for the Winter term, I am not able to make an intelligent report on the school system. At my request, your retiring superintendent has very kindly prepared a report to me, and I ask that you accept his statement in place of the report that you would naturally expect of me. I append Mr. Stoddard's report below.

To the Superintendent of Schools:—

At your request I am briefly stating what has been accomplished this year in the schools of the Town of Hermon together with recommendations which present conditions seem to warrant. I will take up first the problem which is most important in the eyes of every community; that of securing teachers for the schools.

The call for teachers is nation wide. Young men and women are either leaving the profession or else are choosing other lines of work in preference to teaching. The reason is purely financial; the present wages offer no inducement to those who have the natural inclination to teach and the high cost of living has forced many already in the profession to seek employment elsewhere to earn a living wage. Until matters are satisfactorily adjusted the schools must suffer and many will undoubtedly be forced to close. The people must prepare to forestall such a crisis during the coming year.

During the past year the average of the teachers of Hermon has been eleven dollars per week, the highest being fourteen dollars per week and the lowest being ten dollars per week. Of the thirteen teachers five have been obliged to pay board of from five to in some cases seven dollars per week. The amount remaining to the teachers for necessary living expenses, to say nothing of money for necessary recreation, professional improvement or small savings is negligible. If it were not for the fact that a number of local teachers could be secured, some of the schools would be necessarily closed for considerable lengths of time.

It is now beyond my province to recommend the appropriation of any moneys but I must call attention to the fact that next year it will be necessary to pay teachers a minimum of ten dollars per week to secure any teachers at all whether they be local or out of town teachers. As there are thirteen teachers in town at the present time, the sum total can be easily worked out on a thirty or thirty-one week basis.

The next problem for consideration is the length of the school year. The minimum required by State law is thirty weeks but a great majority of the towns and all of the cities maintain a thirty-six week school year. The State of New Hampshire has already adopted this length of school year as a standard and it is only a question of time when it will be the standard in this State. The town should consider this carefully and, in my judgement gradually lengthen the year so that a sudden rise to that standard will not be too heavy a burden in one year.

The subject of a high school is still as vital as ever but financial conditions for the coming year would seem to preclude any definite appropriation of money for that purpose. I would suggest that those interested in a new high school form an association for the purpose of raising money for a building and its equipment. It may be that prominent citizens in town and those who once made Hermon their home might be induced from feelings of public spirit to donate money for such a worthy

cause. This plan has been very successful in several towns and cities.

REPAIRS

The opening of the school building in District seven necessitated among other repairs, the shingling of the building. The unexpected outlay of money in this quarter, together with the scarcity of labor caused the abandonment of the proposed plans for District two. The building in that district was shingled and other minor repairs were made. General repair work has been done on several of the other buildings in town. It is recommended that next year the foundation of the building in District two be repaired, that conditions of heating and ventilation be remedied in District thirteen and that the heating system at the Junction school be thoroughly overhauled.

EQUIPMENT

Equipment for the schools has been purchased to the extent of the appropriation. This has included maps and sanitary drinking arrangements as well as the practice paper necessary for the conserving of the teachers and the pupils time. One or two sets of maps are yet necessary as is the proper blackboard space for the schools in Districts one and twelve.

TEXT BOOKS

Very few changes have been made in the text books during the past year. The only new book introduced has been Guiteau's History in place of Montgomery's History in the upper grades. Twenty of these have been purchased to meet the demand for more books as well as to replace old texts that had become unfit for use. The replacement of the old texts in spelling and geography has been continued from last year. Several new supplemental readers have been also purchased. The increase in the number of pupils together with the increase in the price of text books will make a larger appropriation necessary for the coming year.

INSTRUCTION

The standard of instruction reached last year has been for the most part maintained, altho a number of our best teachers resigned at the end of the school year last June. Of the thirteen teachers beginning this school year five had had no previous experience. One of these resigned at the end of the Fall term for a better paying position. The others have continued their excellent work of administrating their schools. The town is also indebted to several experienced teachers who have rendered excellent service to their home town, some times a sacrifice. Concerning the teachers we have been able to keep with us from last year we can add no more than was mentioned in last year's report. As a proper summary we can say that the progress of the pupils under the guidance of the teaching force speaks for itself and we invite comparison between the progress of the pupils in the Town of Hermon and those of other towns.

TRANSPORTATION AND ATTENDANCE

Very little transportation, if any, has been necessary as all of the schools in town have been open.

The attendance has been very gratifying as has been the low percentage of tardiness.

FINANCES

The figures in the Financial Statement will show that only in the case of the Common School Account is there any considerable overdraw. This overdraw was due to three reasons: First, One weeks school in the Winter Term last March; second, it was necessary to pay teachers a higher wage than was anticipated; third, the unexpected opening of the school in District seven. This overdraw should be taken into consideration when appropriating money for another year.

The raise in the legal rate of tuition for high school pupils from \$36.00 to \$45.00 will also necessitate an added appropriation for that account.

In conclusion let me express thru this report my appreciation of the pleasant relations I have had with the town officials and citizens of the Town of Hermon. Toward you all who have been patient with my mistakes, frank with your criticisms, and helpful with your suggestions, I feel a sense of gratitude can not fail to bring most pleasant memories.

No public officer can do his duty intelligently and properly without the aid of the people, and I most earnestly request that you all feel very free to come to me with criticisms and advice at all times, whether you feel that your suggestions are favorable or against the school policies that may be in force. I shall reserve Friday afternoon of each week as an office hour at the Town Hall, and shall welcome your visits, and you may be sure that I shall give each problem my closest attention. I realize that I am following a man whose shoes will be hard to fill, and can only promise you that I shall serve the school system and town of Hermon to the best of my ability.
