WARRANT

Penobscot ss.

State of Maine

To Alfred Overlock, a Constable of the Town of Hermon, in said County.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hermon, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house, in said town on Monday, the fourteenth day of March, A. D. 1921, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose a town clerk.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.

Article 4. To elect three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.

Article 5. To elect one member of the S. S. Committee.

Article 6. To elect a town treasurer.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to have one or more road commissioners.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to elect a road commissioner.

Article 9. To elect a road Commissioner.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for the support of schools, the repair of roads and bridges, for support of poor, for contingent expenses, for School books, for repairs of school houses and School incidentals.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free high school purposes.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for care and improvements of cemeteries.

Article 13. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of twenty-five dollars for care of soldiers' monument and memorial expenses.

Article 14. To fix compensation of Tax Collector, S. S. Committee, Town Treasurer and Road Commissioner.

Article 15. To elect a Tax Collector, Constable, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more fire wardens, one of which shall be designated fire inspector, and fix compensation for services.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Article 18. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under provisions of section 19 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for maintenance of State Highway and State Aid during the ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions 9 and 18 of chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to accept and receive under provisions of Section 13 and of chapter 20, R. S. from Estate of Rosetta J. Holmes one hundred dollars (\$100.00) the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of John Holmes lot number 55 in Snow Corner Cemetery.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to accept and receive under provisions of sections 13 and 14 of chapter 20, R. S. from Estate of Elizabeth Swett one hundred dollars deposited in Penobscot Savings Bank, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of Benjamin Kimball lot in Hermon Pond Cemetery.

Article 22. To see if the Town will grant and raise money, and what sum for the purpose of fencing, laying out and improving Mount Evergreen cemetery of Northern Me. Junction.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money and what sum for the purpose of completing the E. T. Smith road.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of two hundred and fifty (\$250.00) for Mothers' Aid.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of eighty (\$80.00) to pay for street lights for the year ending August 15th, 1921.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Black Stream Electric Co. to install additional street lights, same to be installed as follows, one at Junction of Annis Road and Carmel road, one at Leathers corner, one at Snow corner and one at Hermon corner, at Junction of Pond and Levant roads and raise money to pay for same at \$20.00 per year for each light.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to establish a free High school and raise money for same.

Article 28. To see what sum the town will vote and raise to repair the coldbrook Schoolhouse.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Municipal Officers to instruct the Road Commissioner to build a bridge fence at Snow Corner.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more special constables.

Article 31. To elect one or more special constables.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of five hundred dollars for the repair of the Arvin Annis road.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to raise money for the repair of the cheese factory road.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to repair the road from Hermon Corner to Nason place, and raise money for same.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote and raise twelve hundred dollars to pay principal and interest of two notes for five hundred dollars each one to J. A. Snow and one to Sylvester Campbell.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote and raise two hundred and fifty dollars a year for two years in case the State pays five hundred dollars to build the road on Swett Hill.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old E. T. Smith road when the new is completed.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to sell the buildings on the town farm and a piece of land in the corner of the farm next to the late F. A. Bishop home and facing the Billings Road, to Eddie Pomroy and choose some one to convey the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the town house at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Fail not to make due notice of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of meeting.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Hermon:

The following report aims to give an accurate account of the work done in your School Department during the past municipal year, and to show the actual financial standing March 1, 1921. It also gives a few suggestions or recommendations for the coming year.

SCHOOLS

The school year has been thirty-two weeks in length, divided into spring, fall and winter terms of ten, fourteen and eight weeks respectively. Thirteen schools were maintained during the spring and winter terms and twelve during the fall term. The Light School which was suspended by law at the end of the last school year, because it failed to maintain an average of eight pupils, was reopened in the winter by a vote of the town at a special town-meeting held for the purpose Jan. 1, 1921.

The school year has been lengthened from thirty weeks to thirty-two. This is certainly a step forward. A constant effort should be made to increase the number of weeks gradually, until we reach thirty-six, the standard of the larger towns throughout the state. Our pupils are children of average ability but we should not expect them to accomplish as much in eight months as other children accomplish in nine.

It is most gratifying to me that the citizens have manifested so much interest in the schools during the last few years. If Hermon continues to progress along educational lines at the same pace, it will be only a short time before she will take her place beside the best rural districts of the State.

TEACHERS

The town is particularly fortunate in having a large number of resident, experienced teachers. Many of them are giving their best to the girls and boys in the elementary schools. If it were not for these teachers, the amount paid in salaries would be nearly double what it now is. It would be difficult to find a more efficient teaching force than we now have, at the salaries paid. Indeed, it would be hardly possible to secure better instruction for our boys and girls at any salary. I feel confident in saying that the children in Hermon are in schools that will compare favorably with those in any of the surrounding towns.

REPAIRS

It has been necessary, for various reasons, to have most of the repair work done during the holidays and Christmas recess. Consequently, the work has not been quite so satisfactory as it would have been, I feel sure, had it been done during the summer vacation. As all the rooms were in dire need of blackboards, we purchased 300 ft. of hyloplate and divided it up among twelve schools. The teachers will agree with me that nothing could have been more acceptable. The walls and the ceiling of the

Leathers Corner Schoolhouse have been painted. Other repairs of lesser importance have been made on the buildings that seemed most in need of them.

The walls and ceilings of No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3, need decorating.

No 7 needs new adjustable desks. The interior also needs painting.

The entry of No. 10 must have a new floor before the spring term can open. It would be a good plan to repair the walls of the interior with wall board.

There should be a special appropriation for No. 12. The building needs steel ceiling for the walls and ceiling. New seats are absolutely necessary. The school there is the largest in town and it is only right that the children should have a comfortable schoolroom.

A bill is before the present legislature, which, if it passes, will require more sanitary conditions in our school toilets. This should be anticipated and provided for in advance when the appropriation for repairs is made.

TEXT BOOKS

Our text books are in a promiscuous condition. For example, some of the schools are using Hamilton's Complete Arithmetic in the higher grades, others are using Hamilton's Standard and still others the Silver-Burdette Arithmetics. The same chaotic condition exists in other branches, geography being the most noticeable. Obviously, the child who has to transfer from one school to another during the year, finds himself at a disadvantage because of a difference in texts. This unmethodical manner of buying books is not only unsatisfactory, but is expensive as well. We have made no changes in text books, neither do we anticipate making any. The best we can hope to do is to fill out as rapidly as possible the sets that seem best adapted to our present needs.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

To safeguard the health of the child should be one of the principal aims of education. We believe that physical development is of as much importance as intellectual development. In compliance with a state law courses in calisthenics and personal hygiene have been introduced into our common school curriculum. These courses, elementary as they sometimes are necessarily, are conscientiously taught in all the schools "that the coming generation may be physically fit for the duties of peace as well as for war."

FREE HIGH SCHOOL

We now have about thirty pupils attending secondary schools. For each, the town pays tuition to the amount of \$45.00 a year. Many of the 1919-20 tuition bills have been paid out of the 1920-21 funds. This makes our present high school expenditures seem excessive. However, we should take into consideration the fact that we receive in reimbursement from the State, two-thirds the amount actually paid out for tuition up to five hundred dollars.

It is obvious that the need for a high school in Hermon is imperative. Many other towns with a smaller population and lower assessed valuation are maintaining standard high schools. What other towns can do, Hermon ought to be able to do. Many of our boys and girls who complete the course of study in the elementary schools, either cannot or will not attend high school out of town. In these days the girls and boys who have not had a high school course, are but poorly prepared to compete with others who have had superior educational advantages.

Those who can afford to go away to high school, undoubtedly get a good training, better, perhaps, than we could give them at first in a high school of our own. However, many children are prepared for high school at the age of thirteen or fourteen years. Most parents will agree with me that they are altogether too young to leave home alone. If we had nothing more than a B

Class high school, we could keep them at home two years longer and they would then be much more mature.

A local high school would cost more than we are now paying in tuition, but it would certainly benefit more pupils. A standard high school would be an invaluable asset to the town from a commercial point of view. It would increase the selling-price of farms and residences. This town without a high school will not prove to be an attractive location for people with children to educate. Consequently, the price of farms will be relatively low. It is my honest opinion that the extra amount in taxation for maintaining a high school, would be more than balanced by the increased value in real estate.

CONCLUSION

In closing this report, I want to thank the town officials and especially the members of the S. S. Committee for the valuable assistance they have given me. I also wish to thank the citizens for the many acts of courtesy shown me. I desire, too, to assure the teachers that I am grateful to them for their cooperation and the fine spirit in which they have received and carried out my suggestions. Last of all, I want to express to the children my appreciation of the hearty welcome which they have everywhere extended to me.
