#### IMPORTANT

All taxpayers should read the following requirement and comply with it:

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930:

"Before making an assessment, the Assessors shall give seasonable notice in writing to the Inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or shall notify them, in such other ways as the Town at its annual meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls and all of their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner, after such notice, does not bring in such list, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed."

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens & School Committee :--

As required by Statute, I herewith have the honor of submitting my seventh annual report of the financial and disciplinary conditions of the public schools of Sherman.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS cont-

## ENROLLMENT

The serious problem in Sherman is a lack of space in the high school while the rural school buildings are adequate to handle the numbers of pupils. In the village graded schools there is enough room but no extra space. The solution most easily found would be to make another classroom 'for the fifth and sixth grades, possible another room in the Town Hall. This would mean re-organization into a six-year school. The transition from the grades to the high school level is much more easily made in this type of school. Under this socalled "six-six" plan the seventh and eighth grade children would be taught by all the teachers in the building whether such teachers were classified as secondary or elementary teachers.

There are many sound arguments for such a plan. The teachers may all specialize in their own field. In English, for instance, the teacher would handle six years of that subject, daily, teaching nothing else. The mathematician, of the faculty, would handle six years of that subject, from seventh grade arithmetic to senior mathematics review. Agriculture could start in grade seven while the other subjects would fall in line. In addition, the six-six plan would make for a more evenly divided teaching load for each teacher. The rather heavy enrollmont at present in grades 7 and 8, makes it a hard job for a teacher to successfully teach all subjects in that room.

## HEALTH

This past year has been the best in Sherman school history in the subject of health, and this is a vital subject. Mrs. Dyer, as school nurse, has worked in the grades with fine results. She not only inspects the children but is a skillful teacher of health matters and the pupils cannot but gain from contact with her.

#### HEALTH cont-

The cost of this health project in Sherman is \$51.00 a year, including the salary, travel and incidental expenses of the service. Now that a good start has been made, I recommend the continuance of this activity.

Early last fall, another step forward was made in the placing of Miss Clara Tapley, a dental hygenist, in the Sherman Schools. Miss Tapley reports that there are very few well kept mouths in Sherman. She worked in grades 1, 3, 5, and 7 and in the rural schools this year. Hor service included cleaning the teeth of the children and in talking to them, as she worked and in classroom assemblies, about the importance of good teeth. Since the work of this year was in the odd numbered grades I recommend the continuance of this service for at least another year so that those children missed this year may receive the service next. The cost of this dental work to the town was but one-thirdof the cost of the service. The State pays the rest of the cost to intoduce the plan to towns. No announcement has reached the town as to next year's cost, but I would recommend the continuance of this plan if the cost does not exceed \$30.00 for the project.

#### FINANCES

General school expenditures this year total \$16,587.97. the highest figure for several years. This made it possible to replace much badly work equipment and supplies. The textbooks are now in fine shape. Despite this total, there remains in the school accounts \$1370.92 unexpended. The source of all this

extra money was the Equalization money made available to Sherman because of the high taxrate for schools and the low valuation of the town to support education.

This Equalization fund for the present fiscal year this fund will amount to \$2469.00 according to the Department of Education. This means, of course, that the difference or \$2619.00 will not be available to Sherman for next year. On the other hand we have \$1370.00 in the account unexpended, hence \$1249.00 will have to be taken care of by lower expenditures that this year assuming that the same town appropriation is made. Careful consideration of next year's requirements, leads me to feel that the schools can be carried on next year at a lower expenditure of money that this year by \$2250.00 and for that reason I feel that we would be safe in appropriating \$1000.00 less for general school purposes that was voted this year.

It is realized by all connected with the schools, that the tax burden for school support in Sherman is high and that the income to earn that tax is low. The scale of wages paid in cherman varies from \$576.00 to \$666.00 per year in the common schools while the high school salary range is from \$684.00 to \$1600.00. These figures, particulary in the elementary schools, are low as compared with state figures. The cost of textbooks is about \$3.80 and \$4.05 per year per child in the elementary and high schools. Supplies cost \$1.38 per child in the elementary schools and 90¢ per child in the high school this past year. These figuros also are low and it is hard to further cut down the expenses. The part the state is now playing in attempting to lift this burden by the awarding of equalization money to towns that make a sincere attempt to keep up

their school standards, is highly commendable and a step in the fair direction. It is to be hopes that this policy will continue for the present law is designed to help just such towns as Sherman.

#### WARRANT

To Arnold F. Curtis, a constable of the Town of Sherman, County of Aroostook and State of Maine. Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Sherman, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall at Sherman Mills, in said Town, on Monday, March 20th, 1939, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as prepared by the town officers.
- Art. 4. To elect Town Officers for the ensuing year; three Selectmen for year, three Assessors for one year, three Overseers of the Poor for one year, one member of the School Committee for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector and fix rate, Road Commissioner and fix wages, any other necessary Town Officers.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Covernment, including Miscellaneous, Town Officers, Town Hall Expense, Town Office Expense, Election Expense and Lien Costs,
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to reise and appropriate for Protection, including Street Lights, and Insurance on Public Buildings.

- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to be expended by the Aroostook Ant1-Tuberculosis Association for the suppression and control of tuberculosis.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$78.00 for Public Health work in Sherman, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways, including; Town Roads, Cutting Bushes, Snow Removal, Snow fence, 50-50 Road, WPA Material & Trucks.
- Art. 11. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$367.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of third class road, or to be used in connection with the third class apportionment, made by the State for the improvement of third class road.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Patrol Maintenance.

- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Support of Poor.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Dependent Children.

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- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for general school maintenance. Recommendations of the Superintending School Committee as follows: Support of Schools \$6500.00, Repairs \$200.00, School Insurance \$240.00, Total Amount \$6940.00.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay interest.
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to pay School House Note Due April 23, 1979.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, for Commission, discount and abatements on taxes.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care and maintenace of cemeteries.
- Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 4.05, or any pert thereof, per capita, to be expended and used solely for advertising the attractions, advantages and natural resources of Aroostook County and of the Town, the same to be expended through and by the Aroostook Development Association, Inc. with the the cooperation of the Maine Potato Growers and Shippers Committee, Inc., Aroostook County Council, Maine Development Commission and Ste of Maine Publicity Bureau.

- Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Safe for the Town Clerk and Town Treasurer's use.
- Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to have the future Town Reports fully itemized.
- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to enter into a contract for Snow Removal and the necessary Ice Sanding for a period of three or five years, it being made in one contract regardless of duration.
- Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to give discounts on 1939 taxes, and fix discount Date, and rate of discount.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest on unpaid taxes, and fix interest date, and rate of interest.
- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bring writs of entry for the recovery of and possession of such parcels of land as have been conveyed to the Town, for the non-payment of taxes and the time of redemption having expired.
- Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to ratify and confirm as debt of the Town the sum of \$11,300.00 in notes now held by the Katahdin Trust Co., and to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to execute in the name and behalf of the Town any renewals of said notes.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loan in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town; such notes to be paid during the current municipal year by taxes.
