During the past year the school work has been, in a general way, similar to that of former years. There has been, however, a decided increase in the manifestation of interest taken in the schools by the parents. Very little fault has been found, and the teachers' reports show a large increase in visits by parents and friends. I have often urged the parents to go into the schools more and encourage the teachers by their support; and am very glad to find they are doing so more than formerly.

The schools throughout town have been generally successful, and a good amount of work done.

The same old trouble of some scholars and their par-

ents feeling that when the ages of from fourteen to sixteen are reached there is no real need of going to school more, exists to some degree and can only be remedied by such parents getting into a different frame of mind.

As I have stated in former years, we have an outline course of study from the beginning in Primary work to and through the High School, similar to the work in those grades in other towns having graded schools, and this is being followed very well. In the High School department are three courses, viz: A three years English Course, a four years Classical Course and a four years College Preparatory Course. These cover in outline the same work as in other High Schools.

Our schools are on a fair working basis, and I ask all persons having children in school, and persons not having children in school, but being interested in the educational prosperity of the town to visit the schools and help the teachers make them successful, always remembering that no matter how capable the teacher may be, the quality of work she is able to do, depends very much on the co-operation of the parents.

To I. C. PIERCE, A CONSTABLE IN THE TOWN OF BINGHAM IN SAID COUNTY.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Bingham, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Union Hall in said town on the 6th day of March, A. D., 1905, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose selectmen for the ensuing year.
- 4. To choose assessors for the ensuing year.
- 5. To choose overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
 - 6. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 7. To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year, and establish his per cent for collecting.
- 8. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year and establish the price per day he shall receive for his services.
- 9. To choose one or more members of the superintending school committee.

- 10. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair school houses, for cleaning school houses, and for school supplies for the ensuing year.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to purchase text books for the ensuing year.
- 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for a Free High School in district No. 1.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges and to liquidate the town debt.
- 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on the State road leading through Bingham and Solon.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote for the superintending school committee to maintain schools in Districts having an average attendance of less than eight scholars.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the County commissioners to discontinue the county road from Hall Corner, so-called, to Mayfield south line and establish a private way in the same place.
- 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 22. To see if the town will vote instructing its Collector of taxes for the ensuing year to collect of all persons paying a poll tax only such taxes on or before the first day of August A. D. 1905.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at Union Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
