Gentlemen:

There has been no marked change in the work and progress of the schools during the year now closing. It has been quite difficult to get teachers, and in two or three instances we have not found teachers for all our schools until near the time for the schools to open. In such cases we have usually been fortunate, but the result was not always what might have been desired.

We have followed the general plan of years past in retaining the same teachers as long as possible, unless there appeared some good reason for not doing so. Among our teachers there have been some especially capable ones, in fact, with the exception of two instances, the teachers have all proved well adapted to the positions they have filled. Of our most recent Rural teachers, Bertha Cook, Vesta Carl, Eva Knowlton, Addie Kelley, Francis Cook, Lulu Irvine and Mrs. Peter Mahoney, have done especially good work.

The village schools are progressing about as usual. Some changes have occurred, viz:—Miss Knowlton was called to a position

in Massachusetts, Miss Lizzie Gilman of the Intermediate school took her position in the Grammar school, and Miss Gertrude Pierce has filled the vacancy in the Intermediate school caused by Miss Gilman's change. Miss May Baker still continues in charge of the Primary school.

I think the town can not do better than to retain them all, as long as they will stay, especially those in the Village schools.

Owing to the increased amount of school money raised for town schools last spring, we have been able to give much better service on the whole and more weeks of school as will appear in the increase of 27 weeks more than last year. Apparently the people got all the school this year they wanted, for instance, in the Gilman District they did not want a winter term.

In the High school there has been at times a tendency of some of our people to want a man teacher, and when we got one they would be dissatisfied. During the fall and winter terms the High school has been under the charge of Prof. M. A. Campbelle a faithful, painstaking teacher, but there seems to be the usual feeling that a woman would do as well or better in the school. I personally have always been of the opinion that a wide awake woman teacher would do more effective work in a school of the size of our High school than a man. This year, unfortunately, the High school attendance has been much smaller than in 1905, but that is no fault of the teachers; it comes rather in a lack of interest manifested by the parents.

I feel, that if the scholars and parents realized the need of regular attendance at school we should not be troubled with the little annoyances attendant on half days lost and tardiness, and the scholars would have more interest and make a decidedly better showing at examination time. While the work of the teacher in a part makes the school a success, the work of the scholars and the attitude of the parents counts for at least one half, either for success or failure. You need to send your boys and girls to school and see that they stay there and work.

Our people have always responded heartily from a financial standpoint, now, if they would do as well in helping keep the boys and girls in school, things would be very encouraging.

You will notice an Article in the town warrant for you to vote on the matter of having a District Superintendent, one in common with other towns. This matter was brought up before you some four or five years ago, but at that time you voted to keep on as you had been doing. It is all right to do either way, but the intention of the law in such provision was that several small towns might unite in employing one man to have charge of all these schools, putting in all his time and thus get better service. I, myself, think this plan the better one and recommend its being tried for awhile, then if not satisfactory change back. This arrangement can be made yearly if desired.

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

Somerset, ss.

State of Maine.

To I. C. Pierce, Constable of the Town of Bingham, in said County, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Bingham, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Kennebec Hall in said town on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1907 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the tollowing articles, to-wit:

- 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To choose Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- 4 To choose Assessors for the ensuing year.
- 5 To choose Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- 6 To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 7 To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, and establish his per cent for collecting.
 - 8 To choose a Road Commissioner for the ensuing year.
- 9 To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.
 - 10 To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 11 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said town and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.
- 12 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.
- 13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair schoolhouses, and for school supplies for the ensuing year.
- 14 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to purchase text books for the ensuing year.
- 15 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the town poor for the ensuing year.
- 16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to support a Free High school in Bingham Village for the ensuing year.
- 17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray the necessary expenses and liabilities of the town for the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.
- 18 To see if the town will vote to accept the following proposal of the Bingham Electrical Company for furnishing street lights in Bingham village for the space of one year, and if so, to raise the

sum of money necessary for the same, to-wit:—Lights to be furnished by the Company and kept in running condition, and to be at least 32 Candle Power each, at prices as follows, for one year; for ten lights \$300; twelve lights \$350; fifteen lights \$400; and all over fifteen lights to be \$15 per year each. Location of lights to be designated by Selectmen.

- 19 To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of an act for the permanent improvement of Main Highways or State Roads as proposed by the State Highway Commissioner, or as may be passed by the present Legislature relating thereto.
- 20 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on the State road leading through Bingham to Solon.
- 21 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of building a sidewalk from the end of the present concrete sidewalk opposite the house occupied by Carroll Clark, to be extended along Main street to the Iron Bridge which crosses the Austin stream. Said sidewalk to be built of any material that the selectmen may see fit to use, and to be built on either side of the street as the selectmen deem most fit.
- 22 To see if the town will vote to exempt the Grange Hall in Bingham Village from taxation for the ensuing year.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money sufficient to build a concrete sidewalk along Preble Street.
- 24 To see if the town will vote to authorize its Superintending School Committee to unite with other towns in the employment of a District Superintendent, as provided in Revised Statutes of Maine, Chapter 15, as amended, and raise a sum of money sufficient to pay this town's proportional part of the salary of said Superintendent.
- 25 To see if the town will vote to raise a sufficient sum of money to paint the school building in Bingham Village.
- 26 To see if the town will vote for the Superintending School Committee to maintain schools in Districts having an average attendance of less than eight scholars.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at Kennebec Hall, at 9 o'cleck in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and have you there this warrant with your doings thereon.
