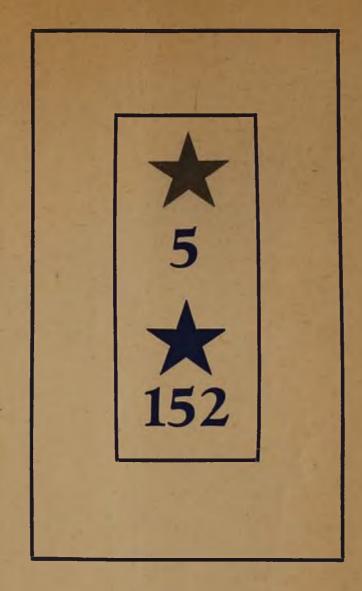

IMPORTANT

All taxpayers should read the following requirement and comply with it:

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine 1930:

"Before making an assessment, the Assessors shall give seaosonable notice in writing to the inhabitants by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or shall notify them in such other ways as the town at its annual meeting directs, to make and bring in to them, true and perfect lists of their polls and all of their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner, after such notice, does not bring in such list, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed."

CASH

All receipts and Warrants of record were examined and found to be in order, and properly recorded. Receipts were found to be promptly deposited in the bank as requir-

ed by law. Warrants issued were signed by the required number of officials and paid by check and supported by detail vouchers on file.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

SHERMAN-SILVER RIDGE - 1945

Public Health Nursing is primarily to help keep the well person well. This can best function through helping make known facts about health, creating a positive attitude toward obtaining and maintaining good health, encouraging and teaching the use of health and medical resources, emphasizing the provention of and protection against communicable diseases, and contributing toward the adjustment of social conditions to the end that the individual and family will become resourceful in meeting their own health needs.

With the cooperation of the mother in the home the public health nurse has endeavored to carry on a practical health program with special emphasis on the health of the expectant mother, the infant and pre-school child.

Thirty visits were made to prenatal and postpartum mothers to assist in securing medical and dental examinations early in pregnancy and to help the family carry out specific medical advice as to maternal and infant care.

The infant and pre-school periods are recognized as the time when lasting health habits are formed. Therefore, from a public health viewpoint this makes these two periods very important. One hundred and eighty-nine visits were made to infant and pre-school children to assist in securing complete birth registration, medical supervision for defects, to assist the family carry out medical instruction concerning hygiene and daily regime of the child and to assist in the control of communicable diseases through teaching the recognition of early symptums, importance of isolation and value of immunization.

The nurse in her service to a comunity is always interested in the growth and development of children. The school nursing program offers a great opportunity along this line. She is a part of the teaching staff in the capacity of a liason between the home and the school and as a health advisor to teachers, parents, and school children. Through home visits the nurse helps the parents to recognize the importance of early establishment of habits which contribute to good health. Throughout the year teacher-nurse conferences have been held and visits made to the homes of school children.

Our service to crippled children is worthy of mention. The best in medical nursing and hospital care is made readily available to every crippled child referred to us. Since early diagnosis is so essential in order that treatment can be started early clinics are held in Houlton, Presque Isle and Fort Kent the year around. These clinics make available to the child and his parents expert diagnosis and offer recommendations for early treatment. Here some children are referred to the hospital for surgery, others are referred to the nurse to assist the family to carry out the treatment ordered, while others are referred to the medical social worker for social or educational adjustment.

The control of communicable diseases, including the venereal diseases, is an important part of the public health program. The public health nurses have participated in this program through tracing alleged contacts and other persons suspected of having a venereal disease and referring them to physicians for medical care; through visiting delinquent patients and advising them to return to their physician for treatment; through assisting with individual and community education regarding the venereal diseases.

The shadow of the war lies behind us—a year of peace lies ahead. Let us use all our community resources to continue our care of the handicapped, to keep the well from

becoming sick, and to teach healthful living to the men, women, and children of our town.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Sherman:

I hereby submit for your consideration, my second report as Superintendent of your schools.

This year the eighth grade has become a part of the high school, thus instituting a five-year high school. For the first year, sufficient progress has been made to warrant the continuation of this plan. In the near future, I hope that more room will be made available so that the seventh grade, also, may become a part of the high school. We should then have a regular six-year high school. This would be an ideal arrangement as it would separate the different age groups, and span the gap between the grammar and high schools. Numerous progressive school systems in this country are using the 6-6 plan with very good success; and I should like to see it in Sherman.

The school enrollment has increased in both elementary and secondary schools, and very crowded conditions prevail in the 2nd and 3rd grades. Thoughtful citizens will realize that in the near future more room must be provided.

Last year a survey of the lighting in the school was taken, and in some of the rooms the lighting proved to be most inadequate. Your committee is recommending that the Sub-primary and Grade 1 room be repainted and lights installed, therein, to meet the requirements. Several citizens have brought to our attention the necessity of guarding and fencing the primary school playground. This seems a necessity and we are inserting a special article in the town warrant to bring this matter before the people.

The attendance this year has been much better than last, as we have had no serious epidemics up to the present time.

Good attendance is of primary importance to the success of your child in school. Days lost are never adequately made up and I urge every parent to have his child present every day possible, in order that he may get the most out of his work at school.

Since the purchase of our fine new school bus, transportation is no longer a problem: and this year, both elementary and secondary pupils are conveyed free of charge.

Since the budget meeting, the auditor has called to my attention the recently-discovered fact that the sum of \$865.00 for tuition for the fiscal year ending Feb. 28, 1942 had been double credited. Therefore, through no fault of my own, the balance for this year has been reduced by the above amount leaving \$1206.30 as the unexpended balance instead of the \$2071.30 which I had expected to report.

We have discontinued teaching Saturdays and school will close June 7 if there are no interruptions. We hope that parents will cooperate with us and have their children in school every day this spring.

WARRANT

To P. F. Gallison, a constable of the Town of Sherman, in the County of Aroostook, GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Sherman, in said County of Aroostook, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Sherman Town Hall, in said town, on Monday the 18th day of March 1946, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To elect a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3 To hear and act on the Town Report as prepared by the Town Officers.
- Art. 4 To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to employ a Town Manager under the provisions of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of

1939 and to fix the compensation for said Town Manager.

- Art. 5 To see what action the Town will take relative to fixing the duties to 'be performed by the Town Manager.
- Art. 6 To elect three or more Selectmen and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

- Art. 7 To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers.
- Art. 8 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of a local Public Library.
- Art. 9 To see what amount of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Government including Miscel., Town Officers, Town Hall Expense, Town Office Expense, Election Expense, and Lien Costs.
- Art. 10 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Protection, including Street Lights and Insurance on public buildings.
- Art. 11 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to be expended by the Aroostook Anti-Tuberculosis Asso. for the suppression and control of Tuberculosis.
- Art. 12 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$74.00 for Public Health work in Sherman. Said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Dept. of Health and Welfare in cooperation with local authorities.
- Atr. 13 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways, including Town Roads, Cutting Bushes, Snow Removal, Snow Fence, 50-50 Road.
- Art. 14 To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the pro-

visions of Section 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.

- Art. 15 To see of the Town will vote to purchase a road machine and a gravel loader and raise money for same.
- Art. 16 To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Patrol Maintenance.
- Art. 17 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$259.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads, or to be used in connection with third class apportionment, made by the State for improvement of third class roads.
- Art. 18 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Support of Poor.
- Art. 19 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Public Welfare (Aid to dependent children).
- Art. 20 To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for Elementary and Secondary Schools, including wages, fuel, janitors, conveyance, books and supplies.
- Art. 21 To see what sum the Town will raise for School Repairs.
- Art. 22 To see what sum the Town will raise for School Insurance.

- Art. 23 To see if the Town will vote to grade and fence Primary School yard and appropriate money for same. Recommended appropriation \$600.00
- Art. 24 To see what sum the Town will raise for Interest Account.
- Art. 25 To see if the Town will raise \$2,000.00 to retire Bonds of the Town coming due May 1, 1946.
- Art. 26 To see what sum the Town will raise for Comm., Disc., Abat. taxes.
- Art. 27 To see what sum the Town will raise for Memorial Day.
- Art. 28 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to purchase fire equipment and for maintenance.
- Art. 29 To see what sum the Town will raise for care of Cemeteries.
- Art. 30 To see if the Town will vote to charge Int. on 1946 unpaid taxes, fix interest rate and date.
- Art. 31 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quitclaim deeds for such properties.
- Art. 32 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bring writs of entry for the recovery and possession of such parcels of land as have

been conveyed to the Town for the non-payment of taxes and the time of redemption having expired.

- Art. 33 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans in anticipation of taxes and to issue and negotiate notes therefore, or renewals thereof, or any notes in place of the original notes when paid, to an amount, which at any time shall not exceed in the aggregate the total Tax Levy of the preceeding municipal year, all such notes to mature and to be paid during the municipal year in which they are issued out of money raised during such current year by Taxes, in accordance with the provisions of R. S. Maine 1930, Section 83, Chapter 5 as amended.
- Art. 34 To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation all tax payers in the Armed Forces for the ensuing year.
- Art. 35 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell that part of Public Lot 191-192-193 lying west of Patten branch R. R. for such price as they deem advisable.
- Art. 36 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any or all rural school houses in Town of Sherman for such prices as they deem advisable.
- Art. 37 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish marking of at least three roof tops according to request from the Maine Aeronautics Commission to enable pilots to establish his location quickly.

- Art. 38 To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 39 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be set aside for future use toward a gymnasium and school project.
