# 'Auditor's Report.

Your Auditor upon visiting the New Home, found the Superintendent and Matron deeply interested for the care and comfort of the inmates who were neat in appearance and in conversation with the writer spoke very highly of the kindness shown to them by the Matron. In examining the house and outbuildings everything was found to be carefully looked after.

The Superintendent and Matron, during their five years services, have discharged their duties with strict fidelity, both to the town and to the inmates.

In taking an inventory Feb. 19, there was found on hand about 8 tons hay, 1½ barrels of pork, 50 bushels mixed potatoes. The stock consists of 3 cows, 1 two year old heifer, 2 yearlings, 2 horses, 1 shoat. There is on hand about 20 cords of wood prepared for the stove.

Have carefully examined the books of Selectmen, Overseers of Poor and Treasurer, and find the accounts correctly cast and vouchers for same.

# REPORT OF THE Superintendent of Schools.

The year just ended presents few new matters to occupy the report of the superintendent. The committee have again wisely elected the teachers by ballot. They have also looked after expending the repairs account and the buying of all books and supplies. The appearance of some buildings has been improved by paint and white-The black-boards have received much needed rewash. pairs. Curtains have been placed at many of the windows. This work needs to be continued until all available space is covered by black-boards, and each room has curtains. Money spent for clocks and pictures would be far from wasted. The sheds in some districts need remodeling, especially at Agamenticus. A large south window would also improve the building. North Village school is fast outgrowing its quarters and will soon need an addi-More grading should be done, especially at York tion. beach.

The books are now in very good condition; the arithmetics, geographies, and grammars being new. Very servicable reference books have been furnished six schools. Paper is an item of expense which should not be curtailed. The modern teacher requires much written work and at times seems to use large quantities of paper, but it is not used in vain, and a generous supply is recommended. The book account should now furnish suitable wall maps and globes to each school. Better dictionaries should be in each school room. A sand table or modeling board would be much aid in teaching geography.

In writing a report which is to be a review of a year's work one remembers the weak as well as the strong characteristics, the efforts which resulted in failure with those crowned with success. And it is well to remember all that the future may profit by both experiences.

Written examinations have been held at the end of each term's work; though the changing of books has made it impossible for the questions to come from the superintendent as the best result requires. The use of rank cards showing the result of each month's work has proved a wise course.

Most of the schools are made up of so many grades that the teachers have found much difficulty in arranging to have sufficient time for each class. This results in questions calling for yes or no in answer, and too frequently the form is such that only the dullest wit could fail to guess which was proper. This trouble could be remedied in some cases by combining schools, retaining the same number of teachers; in others by a combination of classes. The latter, while not ideal, would give much better satisfaction than the present method. It would call for much tact on the part of the teachers and patience from the parents, who dislike to see younger pupils in the same classes with their own hopefuls, and are slow to see any advantage to them.

It is hard to compel advanced pupils to attend the High school, but it would seem that a less lenient course should be pursued as the time of the grammar teacher belongs to the grammar scholars.

The condition of the Village school calls loudly for some remedy. The high school now occupies two rooms which are needed for the grammar school. When the high school is removed from the building the congestion of the other rooms will be relieved and the addition of another year to the course as is recommended, will fill the four class rooms and give space enough for the pupils now attending neighboring schools who desire to avail themselves of the advantages of a well graded school.

The pupils at the South Side have been brought to the Village school during the fall and winter terms much cheaper than that school could have been maintained and at much advantage to themselves. This should be continued and extended to other schools.

The course of study in the grammar schools now calls for seven years work. This seems too short a time in which to accomplish so much work in a manner at all satisfactory. Another year should be added, thus allowing two years for American History and obviate the forcing of the third grade into geography and language. Too little attention is paid to the reading of good standard literature as is recommended by the committee of fifteen, and required to enter more advanced schools. Few realize the amount of knowledge, culture and pleasure available in the standard works of fiction and poetry now so easily obtained. The child mind should be trained to its proper selection and enjoyment.

The fact that such a large class entered the high school and the average attendance was maintained at sixty, indicate the work of the school to have been excellent without further comment.

The school has again been fortunate in securing a teacher whose education and training thoroughly fit him for this field.

The year having been cut short, a spring term of fourteen weeks is earnestly recommended. Thirty-three weeks is the least time a years work can be done in. It is to be recommended that all the schools be opened early enough so that they may close by June 1. It hardly seems necessary to repeat the story, the urgent need the school has for a building. Not only is the room now occupied needed for other purposes, but it is not so arranged, that the best work can be done by either pupils or teachers. I feel sure the town understands this matter and can be left to make necessary arrangements.

The course of study should be revised to give four years in the English course. The course annexed seems the best fitted for our needs.

The parents should be commended for the increased interest shown in the schools by the suggestions, letters, and petitions they have addressed those in charge. Each such communication has been received in the spirit in which it was sent and has occupied the attention of the committee. It is to be hoped this will continue.

## STATE OF MAINE.

To Samuel A. Preble, Constable of the Town of York.

In the name of the STATE OF MAINE, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of York, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town House in said town, on Monday, the eleventh day of March, A. D., 1901, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:---/

First—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second—To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Assessors of Taxes and Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes and Constable, Town Agent, one School Committeeman, one Superintendent of Schools, one or more Road Commissioners, one Auditor of Accounts, and all other officers necessary for the ensuing year.

Third—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of common schools the ensuing year. Fourth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of a Free High School the ensuing year.

Fifth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purchase of text books the ensuing year.

Sixth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for t the repairs of school houses the ensuing year.

Seventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote () () () to defray the incidental expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

Eighth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the repairs of highways and bridges the ensuing year.

Ninth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purpose of removing snow from the highway.

Tenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the interest on and for the reduction of the debt of the town the ensuing year.

Eleventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of the poor the ensuing year.

Twelfth—To see if the town will vote to instruct and authorize the treasurer to hire money on the credit of the town to meet pressing liabilities.

Thirteenth—To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid on or before January 1, 1902.

Fourteenth-To fix the remunerations of town officers for services for the ensuing year.

Fifteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for water supply the ensuing year.

Sixteenth—To see if the town will vote to accept the doings of the selectmen in laying out the road, beginning at point in the County way leading from York Harbor to York Beach, near the residence of the late William Norwood, and following approximately the private way built by the Norwood heirs through Norwood farm to a point in said county way near the stable known as the "Club Stable," and to appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Seventeenth—To see if the town will vote to accept the doings of the selectmen in laying out the road beginning at a point in the highway leading from York Village to York Beach, said point being between the houses of Evans and Charles F. Blaisdell, running thence between said houses to Fernald Avenue, thence along and over Fernald avenue to the first named highway near the house of Cordes. Said proposed road to follow the streets as laid down on the plan of York Heights, and to vote a sum of money therefor.
