## Mayor's Address

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*Gentlemen of the City Council:*

We are again assembled as we were a year ago with but few new faces; and because the citizens of Auburn have seen fit to again intrust the City affairs in our hands we must again demonstrate our fitness and our appreciation of the confidence displayed by exercising renewed zeal. Let us endeavor to show our appreciation of the honor bestowed by attending to our duties and running the affairs of the City in a more conscientious and business-like way, if possible, than ever before. I am fully determined, as I am sure you each are, to give the best of my judgment and time to the City's affairs as I have previously.

The previous year has taught many things. We know more about our duties and the largeness of the work cut out for us than we did a year ago. We have proved, to our satisfaction, at least, and to the public I believe, that the City of Auburn can be run throughout the year and inside the appropriations by most careful economy, but we have also learned that little, if any, permanent work can be accomplished. The reason is plain to those of us who are compelled to realize that we have a very large City in area and none of the large manufacturing plants to be taxed and from which our sister city reaps such a harvest. As you are well aware our City, extending some fifteen miles along the Androscoggin River and to a depth of about five miles, comprises some seventy-five square miles of area and a system of roads comprising some three hundred and sixty odd miles. It is considerable City to be gone over and cared for where the income derived

from all sources is some two hundred and thirty thousand dollars a year.

One of three things must be done and it is for you gentlemen to consider which method should have your seal of approval. If I should advocate limiting the area of the City by cutting off a portion here and a portion there, you gentlemen would say most emphatically "no." What then is the next consideration? This year we have new obligations to meet by reason of the new School Building, and the furnishing thereof. Right here gentlemen, allow me to say that I believe we have the best School Building that ever has or ever can be built for the amount of money that we have had available for that purpose. Due to the new obligations, the furnishing of the School Building I am convinced that there will be no money available for permanent work under the present rate of taxation. It is for you to determine whether the citizens of Auburn would be better satisfied if the City stood still or whether it would be better to make some permanent yearly improvements in our City even if it be necessary to add a couple of mills to the present tax rate.

I believe the several departments of the City have been handled to good advantage the past year and I am sure it will be a pleasure to you to know that several departments have finished out the year with a balance in the Treasury in their favor. This year I am convinced that some permanent work should be done on our streets; portions of our business streets need resurfacing, and there is always the need of extending permanent construction.

By reference to the Treasurer's report you will be able to ascertain that, outside of decreasing the temporary loan of the previous administration, paying some fifteen hundred dollars of bills due the prior year and the addition of horses and new equipment to the Street Department to an amount approximately two thousand dollars, we still have a balance of several thousand dollars on hand to carry to the Sinking Fund.

Now, gentlemen, we are here for the purpose of organizing and choosing men for the various positions to administer the affairs of this City for the coming year; let us choose the most efficient men possible to manage the affairs of the City in the various departments. We will then be in a position to serve the people of this City to the best of our ability and I hope that every one of you will do your level best to see that at the end of the coming year there is no charge of mismanagement or wilful neglect against you.

# Report of Committee on Sewers

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Auburn, Maine, March 14, 1916.

*To the Honorable Mayor and the City Council, Auburn, Me.*

Gentlemen:—During the past five months your Committee on Sewers has supervised the making of a thorough survey and plan of the System of Sewers belonging to the City of Auburn and it was thought best, at this time, to make a brief report of progress together with recommendations for the future work, in order that this report might be embodied with the Official Report of the Administration. A brief statement of facts showing the necessity for the survey and plan will not be amiss.

The City of Auburn has already various plans which purport to show the location and size of sewers in the different streets, but these plans are on separate sheets. Profiles of the sewers are in existence, but the elevations given on each profile are referred to a different datum from that shown on other profiles, so that no one can tell how much fall there may be between a certain part of one sewer and a certain part of another sewer in another location.

It has been the custom of former Committees on Sewers, City Engineer and Street Commissioner to look over the site of a proposed sewer and to estimate, without particular study, the size of sewer to be installed, no detailed study being made to establish grades or sizes such as may be required to accommodate future extensions, except when the work has been large enough to let out by contract, the result being that many of the existing sewers are overtaxed and storm water overflows have had to be cut in at various points,

these discharging into nearby water courses in thickly settled parts of the city creating nuisances and unhealthy conditions.

When the work has been authorized, each Street Commissioner has done the work in his own way, without general specifications as to method of construction.

In making the above statements we do not wish to be placed in the attitude of criticising the City Engineer or the present or former Street Commissioners. The trouble is not with the men but with the system of the Administration.

The members of the Sewer Committees, as a rule, have no knowledge of sewer design or construction and can only pass on the necessity for a sewer in a certain location and can only recommend the construction of the same if they deem it necessary.

The City of Auburn pays its Engineer \$300 a year and the city receives, through services of the Engineer, more than its money's worth in work done. Certainly the City Engineer, for the salary mentioned, cannot make a comprehensive plan of the sewer system, neither can he make a comprehensive plan of the sewer system, neither can he make an extensive study of the necessities, establish grades or draw up specifications covering each particular case as the same should be done.

The Street Commissioner, having only the grades and sizes furnished him and with no definite plans or specifications is obliged to do the work in a manner deemed best by him.

In order that the present and future Administrations might have a definite plan to work with two or three engineering assistants under the direction of the Chairman of the Committee on Sewers have made a thorough survey of the grades of all streets and brooks in the residential and business parts of the city.

A map has been made from the best available sources showing all of the streets of the city within the sewered district and in some cases extending beyond the sewer



system to districts which will have to be taken care of in the future. The location and sizes of existing sewers have been placed on this plan together with the elevations of the streets and brooks. A system of bench marks or reference points has been established throughout the sewered district to aid in future work. The profiles of sewers, where available, have been reduced to common datum so that the relation of a sewer grade in one part of the city to the grade in any other part may be found.

An attempt was made to locate existing manholes and to obtain the exact grades of sewers, but owing to the lateness of the season and the expense of uncovering the manholes, which in many cases were covered with frozen earth, this work was abandoned.

A study of Auburn has been made and a sewer system has been designed as if there were no sewer system in existence at the present time.

The work to be done and which will have to be put off until the ground is open in the Spring is as follows:

Existing manholes must be located.

Grades of existing sewers must be accurately determined and referred to the common datum.

The plans and profiles must be adjusted to the facts as found.

The size and grades of existing sewers must be studied in connection with what may be termed "the ideal system" and plans for future work must be worked out so as to make the present system of as much use as possible.

In doing the work outlined above the engineering assistants were placed on the payroll of the Street Department at the exact sum paid for their services by their regular employer. No compensation has been given to any member of your committee.

The appropriation of the council for the work was \$1,000, of which about \$510 has been spent up to March 15th, 1916. No more of this particular appropriation

will be spent. Your Committee asks that a new appropriation of \$600 be made to complete the work, the conditions as to employment of engineers being the same as that under which the work has already been done. The total cost, with the new appropriation and that already spent, will be about \$1,100.

A considerable increase in the number of non-fiction books circulated may still be reported as applying to all classes save one, that of music. The amount of music used last year was exceptionally large because of special purchases. Books of travel and history, biography, and the natural sciences have been in greater demand this year. But the greatest increase is shown in the periodical section, 53 per cent more in number of items charged than last year. That our periodical collection is of greater usefulness to us than any other one class is undoubted, although the recorded circulation shows but a small fraction of this use. By a very conservative estimate 12,000 articles have been consulted in the building this year, exclusive of those read merely for entertainment. The subscription list has been revised this year, some titles being dropped and others added to make the list more nearly suited to the needs of our readers. We receive a number of desirable gifts for this department, including some needed duplicates.

The increased use of non-fiction books applies also to the children's section of the library. The re-classification, finished early in the year, follows closely the classification in the main library, so that children learning to use these books will feel at home in the larger rooms. The new arrangement has been most successful in that they may more readily find what they want for them-

selves, and so are encouraged to make use of their ability. This re-classification was made the occasion for a careful revision of the juvenile subject headings in the card catalog. A good number of all kinds of books, including a set of the "Everyman Encyclopedia," has recently been purchased for this room.

Every pupil in the three upper classes at the High School has received instruction by Miss Cornforth in the use of books here at the library. As this instruction is in connection with certain required work in English and debating, and applies to the use of the catalog, reference books and particularly of the periodical indexes, it is of great practical value. Mr. Lewis's classes in history also do work here, some of them several times a week. If it were not for this training in self help, the library force would not be large enough to wait upon the students, so many of them come. On request, books are kept for class reference that might otherwise be taken from the library. This means a wider use of such books, but diminishes the circulation records.

The book purchases have been for the most part current publications of a very general nature, including some of the best for all readers. A few valuable sets of books have been added, such as the new edition of the Schaff-Herzog "Encyclopedia of Religious Knowledge," Hawkin's "Electrical Guide," Williams's "History of Science," "Photographic History of the Civil War," and a set of 50 volumes of Shaw's Business book series. We have also bought a good number of books on the European War and general international relations.

We have received gifts from 110 different people and institutions 32 of them local, of books periodicals, pamphlets and maps. All these gifts are welcome, but two should be especially noted. Mrs. J. B. Mayhew gave us several volumes in Moon type for the blind. Mr. Arthur G. Staples has given the New International Year Books, 1911-1914.

• In the summer a new book room, measuring 20 by 27 feet, was made by building a brick partition across the cellar. The room has four windows, shelving all around, eight double stacks, and shelves with rollers for bound newspapers. It is to be used chiefly for United States documents, which are now so arranged in it as to be easily and quickly consulted. These documents are used every day but not to such an extent as the other books. With these books removed, the crowded condition of the regular stacks was much relieved. At the time of removing, every book, pamphlet, map, and listed picture was dusted and compared with the shelf list.

In the report of last year mention was made of some fundamental revisions that had been begun to adapt our methods to the wider service required of us. These revisions have now been brought to practical completion so as to include the whole library.

These improvements have been made possible by the continuous hard work of our two trained assistants, Miss Georgiana Lunt and Miss Mabel Eaton. Miss Lunt still remains with us but Miss Eaton resigned at the close of the year. Miss Marguerite Hill, a young lady just graduating from the High School, has been engaged to do such parts of the work as an untrained assistant may.

In looking back over the first quarter century of our work, we may say that, so far as the financial support afforded us would permit, we have accomplished our purpose as stated in the by-laws: "It shall be the aim of this corporation to make the library what is known as a working library having the best books of reference and the works of the standard writers on history, science, economics, art, biography, belles lettres, poetry, philosophy, travels and fiction."

In the total expenses for the purchase of books, the sum of \$40.05 is included, expended for replacing worn-out books. Of the amounts expended for periodicals and binding during the past year, the sum of \$146.04 has been paid for subscriptions and binding of periodicals which have been placed permanently on the shelves, and have been added to the accession record. These amounts should be considered as having been spent for new books.

The invested funds of the Library consist of the following securities:

- 1 \$1000 First mortgage 5% bond No. 1803 of the Syracuse Lake Shore & Northern R. R. Co.
  - 1 \$1000 First mortgage 5% bond No. 2074 of the Puget Sound Power Company.
  - 1 \$1000 First mortgage 5% bond No. 2249 of the Eastern Steamship Company.
  - 3 \$100 First mortgage 5% bonds No. C187-189 of the Eastern Manufacturing Company.
- Making a total fund at the par value of the bonds of \$3,300.

In my report of last year it was noted that a \$500 bond of the Fond du Lac Water Company had matured and been paid, and that the proceeds were included in the amount of cash on hand. The crowded condition of the book stack rendered necessary some steps for securing additional room. The trustees decided to

separate that portion of the basement under the reference room from the boiler room, and to fit it up for the reception of the United States government publications, of which the Library has a large and increasing collection. This has been done at a total expense of \$488 65, which has been paid from the proceeds of the bond above referred to. The items of expense incurred in this change are included in the building account above rendered and explain the apparently large expense on that account. Otherwise the upkeep of the building during the past year has been a very small expense. The new accommodations for the publications of the United States government will, it is hoped, provide for the demands of many years to come.

The suggestion has occasionally been made that the reading rooms of the Library should be kept open Sundays, and also that some provision should be made in the nature of circulating libraries or branch libraries for the accommodation of the rural sections of the city. After several years' service as treasurer of the Library I think that until the Library can have more income these changes must be deferred. To meet the demands of the rural population the Library is open at ten o'clock in the morning and kept open continuously until eight o'clock at night, except on Saturdays when it does not close until nine o'clock. In a city as compact as ours it would seem that this would give reasonable service to all sections, and at the same time, with the opportunities to take books from the Library, it would seem to give satisfactory service for the patrons of the reading, reference and children's rooms.

The calls for service upon the Library are constantly increasing with the educational demands of the city, and to meet these calls along the lines upon which the Library is at present being administered I think that the city should assume the expense of fuel and upkeep of the building. This will give the management between \$275 and \$300 annually to be expended in books

and in increasing the usefulness of the Library as a part of the educational system of the city.

# Report of Board of Education

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*To the Citizens of Auburn:—*

In accordance with the time honored custom your Board of Education presents herewith its report for the year ending February 29, 1916.

And first, we wish to congratulate you upon the fact that the Webster Grammarschool building is nearing completion and will, no doubt be ready for use at the opening of the fall term next September. The additional room thus obtained with the new Plan of Organization, which is fully explained in the Superintendent's report, will relieve the crowded condition in all of the city schools including the High school, which has been a great handicap in their work during recent years.

In order to show the necessity for the extra room and for the increased expenses of our schools, a little comparison may be helpful. In 1900 our total enrollment was 1998, now it is 2699. Then in the grades there were 1698 pupils with 43 teachers, now there are 3246 pupils with 67 teachers, assistants and supervisors. Then the total attendance at Edward Little High school was 317 with 9 teachers, now we have 451 pupils and a faculty of 16 teachers.

In this time we have added Commercial, Manual Training and Domestic Science departments, with the necessary teachers and equipment. These have required a large outlay but it has been money well spent and it was necessary in order to give our pupils the advantages required to keep abreast of the times.

During the last five years the average annual increase in school attendance has been 98 while for the last three years it has been 128.

It has been the aim and effort of the present Board to maintain the standard of our schools as second to none in the State. That we have been successful, in part at least, is shown by the fact that desirable families are constantly moving here in order to enjoy the advantages of our schools and there are 45 tuition pupils from twenty cities, towns and plantations of the State taking the courses at our Edward Little High School.

During the last two years considerable sums have been spent in repairs upon the schoolhouses in the rural sections, and they are now in better condition than they have been for many years.

More might profitably be spent in grading and beautifying the grounds and providing better sanitary arrangements.

We refer you to the reports of the Superintendent, Principal Moulton, and the several Supervisors, which are herewith submitted for a more detailed account of the work of our schools.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

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*To the Superintending School Committee:*

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting my ninth annual report which is the thirtieth of a series of similar reports.

This has been an unusually busy year in the school department. Many details have arisen as work on the new Webster school has progressed in regard to making provision for equipment, etc. Then a great deal of time has been consumed in developing the plan of reorganization and in revising the courses of study. With the exception of the recent epidemic of the grippe the work of the year has not been interrupted. In one day in the Webster school one hundred and six pupils from a registration of five hundred and twelve were absent, and with few exceptions, on account of the grippe or grippe colds; the percentage in several buildings was nearly as great and the attendance in all schools for the period was very poor. The conditions, however, are greatly improved and I anticipate that, debarring further interruptions, the requirements will have been met by June.

School interests at present are centered more especially upon the new Webster building and the plan of reorganization whereby the number of grades will be reduced by one and a Junior High School established.

The normal seating capacity of the building will be eight hundred which will be sufficient to relieve the overcrowded condition, in all of the city schools. By providing for a Junior High in this new building and one class of first year Junior High pupils in the Lincoln school it is probable that the accommodations of

Edward Little will be sufficient for the Senior High for a term of years. Then in the elementary schools the registration will be reduced to normal by transferring to the new building the fifth grades in the Park Hill, Merrill and Washburn schools and the fourth grade in the Franklin. The social centre idea has received due consideration. The auditorium with a seating capacity of 1100 is located on the first floor and it is so arranged that it can be used while the schools are in session without interfering with the work. The same arrangement obtains in regard to the gymnasiums and the departments of mechanical arts and domestic arts. The construction speaks for itself and in arrangement, heating, lighting, ventilation and sanitation, it is thoroughly modern. It will be completed by the first of June, but will not be occupied until the opening of schools next September. In the meantime it will be opened to the public for inspection. In the consensus of opinions of men in position to speak with authority Auburn is getting big returns for the expenditure.

In treating the 7-5 plan of reorganization I propose to be brief and to confine myself mainly to the phases of it in regard to which questions may arise. The plan provides for a Senior High School of three years, a Junior High of two years, to be preceded by seven elementary grades. Then provision has been made for offering some kindergarten training in connection with first grade work. There will also be an eighth grade in the rural schools for the benefit of pupils whose training will be confined to the elementary work or who would be unable to come to the city for the first year of the Junior High. Pupils having completed the work of this grade will be entitled to admission to the second year of the Junior High which will correspond to the Freshman year of the present organization.

The Senior High School as a unit will include the three upper classes of Edward Little High. The organization of these classes will remain practically unchanged. New electives, however, will be offered par-

ticularly in the departments of Mechanical Arts and Domestic Arts. The high school courses of study have been completed by Mr. Moulton and copies may be had upon application.

As previously stated grade seven will be the highest in the city elementary schools. Instead of promoting the ninth grade pupils to the Freshman class in high school our present eighth and ninth grades will be united to constitute the Junior High. Junior High Schools have been established with marked success in many of our leading cities. With few exceptions the organization consists of six elementary grades, a Junior High of three years and a Senior High of three years. Considering the school accommodations in Auburn the number, capacity and location of the buildings particularly of the rural schools—and the large number of tuition pupils enrolled each year in high school the 7-5 plan which provides for a Junior High of two years seems especially well adapted to meet local conditions.

In revising the courses of study one of the chief aims has been to overcome the break between the grammar and high schools. We feel that this has been accomplished in the main by introducing practical subjects earlier in the courses. In making the readjustment special consideration has been given also to pupils who will be obliged to drop out of school particularly when having reached the compulsory school age limit. however, there will be no logical point at which a pupil can leave school: In other words the courses have been arranged in view of encouraging the pupil to remain in school as long as possible.

There will be two sessions in the Junior High. A teacher will be assigned to each room for a part of the day and the class organization will be retained in as far as possible. The work of several teachers will be divided between the two schools.

As a part of the plan of reorganization the total requirements have been put on a twelve year basis instead of thirteen according to the present plan of nine elementary grades and four of high school.

When in full operation this feature of the plan will tend to decrease the cost of maintenance of the schools.

Several factors have contributed toward the elimination of one grade. There has been a material gain in the primary grades in the past few years in penmanship and especially in reading thereby effecting a saving in time. Less time is also devoted to the so termed non essentials in arithmetic and to the more technical work in grammar. The teaching in general is more efficient and the grading more uniform.

The requirements of grade seven of the new course of study are practically one year in advance of those of the course now in use. Thus the seventh grade of the new system will be formed by promoting from the present seventh. Grade six will include all sixth grade pupils and approximately 20 per cent of the ablest pupils of grade five. This per cent will be increased by approximately 20 as each of the successive grades are formed, whereby the elimination of one grade will be effected.

Nine grade systems are confined to New England and more especially to Maine, but they are being displaced by eight grade systems or by organizations with provision for junior high schools.

The elementary courses of study to be used as an aid in reorganizing have been prepared and are in the hands of the teachers. The teachers have also been supplied with a copy of the plan of reorganization whereby one grade will be eliminated.

It should be kept clearly in mind that a promotion from grade seven of the old system to seven of the new or from six to six etc. will be equivalent to a promotion according to the present plan from one grade to the next higher. This phase of the plan will be explained more fully in a note which will accompany the promotion cards to be issued in June.

I feel that further explanation should be made in regard to the beginners' grade referred to above. In past years a large number of first grade pupils varying

from twenty to thirty p. c. have become discouraged and dropped out during the year or have drifted along and been required to repeat the work of the grade. The beginners' grade provides for this class of children by offering some kindergarden work in connection with that of the first grade. This feature is not an experiment in Auburn. Two of these grades were established two years ago, one in the Chamberlain school and one in the Wilson and the results have been very satisfactory. The children are classified by groups and promotions are made freely, as they develop, from one group to another. The usual test for promotion to grade one is ability to make progress in the formal work in reading. Teachers in charge of these rooms may have at times a group doing in part if not wholly, first grade work. Thus promotions may be made direct to the second grades.

It is very gratifying to me to be able to report a decided improvement in the condition of Mr. Mower. In the work in music the reputation of the Auburn schools is not confined to Maine or even New England. New ideas have been developed and individual talent encouraged. All of this has been accomplished under the able, conscientious, and enthusiastic leadership of Mr. Mower.

The report of Principal Moulton and of the supervisors with the exception of Mr. Mower are included. All merit careful reading.

I am pleased to note from year to year an increasing unity of purpose and ideals in the teaching corps. The teaching quality is fundamental in the school. In closing I wish to express to you as members of the Superintending school committee my appreciation for your support and the time which you have given so freely to the interests of the schools.

## Report of Principal of Edward Little High School

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Dear Sir—The work in Edward Little during the year of 1915-1916 has been much like that of the preceding year. All of the departments, including the special class in harmony and the orchestra, have completed the required schedules, and a high grade of scholarship has been maintained. The new teachers who began their work in this school last September were especially well prepared for their duties, and they are getting good results from their classes.

I wish to call your attention in this report to the excellent work that has been done by the departments of English and History in developing debaters. Last year our team won from the Jordan High School a closely contested debate in the City Hall, Lewiston; and later the same team won from the Portland High School the final debate of the Bowdoin Interscholastic Debating League in Hubbard Library, Bowdoin College.

While these interscholastic debates are an incentive to faithful work and a winning team is gratifying to the friends of the school, yet the real value lies in the fact that the foundations for debating are taught in the last three years of high school, and that class and inter-class debates are a part of the regular program of the English department.

The interior of the Edward Little building presented a much improved appearance at the opening of school last September. The varnishing and tinting, which had been begun by the preceding administration of the city government, were completed last summer. The rooms are now much more attractive and cheerful for school work.

The building is old; and consequently it needs considerable repairing from year to year to keep it in good condition. I would request that you ask the committee

to consider the laying of a new floor in the Sophomore Room and the equipping of Room 14 for chemistry during the next summer vacation. The laying of a new floor in the Sophomore room has ben put off for a number of years. I trust that the next city government will make it one of its first considerations.

When the addition was made to the building in 1900, Room 14 was intended for the chemistry; and the necessary piping was done at that time; but on account of the crowded condition of the building, this subject has been taught in a small room in the basement. The adoption of the 7-5 plan and the removal of one class to the New Webster Building will make the use of Room 14 possible for the chemistry. I would urge that this room be supplied with the necessary equipment, because the work in chemistry is badly congested.

In conclusion, I wish to thank you and members of the committee for many helpful suggestions and advice, and to express my appreciation of the faithful work of the teachers in Edward Little.

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## Report of Supervisor of Manual Training

Mr. H. H. Randall, Superintendent of Schools

Dear Sir—In submitting my third annual report, I take pleasure in calling attention to the extention of the work in the Manual Arts department. With the addition to the department of a very able assistant, it was deemed advisable to start the work a year earlier in the grades. Consequently, courses in Elementary Handwork are now given in the fifth and sixth grades. The courses include work with clay, plasticene, paper, cardboard, Venetian iron and wood. The results have been quite gratifying, particularly in the case of the note-

book covers and iron work, which shows that the committee chose wisely in securing the services of such a capable and efficient man, Mr. Banks.

The general outline for the three upper grammar grades has not been changed materially.

A class, composed of rural school boys, has been organized this year. A special course has been arranged for the class, giving special attention to projects in wood suitable to the farm.

We are co-operating with the Androscoggin County Humane Society in its campaign for the protection of the native song birds, by having the grammar and rural school boys build bird houses to be sold at an exhibition to be held early in the Spring.

The practical work of the past two years has been continued, most of it being done by the High School classes. Some sheathing and repair work has been done at the Edward Little building in addition to constructing eighteen more kindergarden tables. A sanding table and lumber rack for small stock have been made for the shop.

Accommodations have been arranged in a corner of Sophomore Hall for the High School Mechanical Drawing class, which has doubled in size since last year. The work has been placed on a quantity basis, and in most cases the results have proved this to be the better system.

Since we must try the proposed courses for the new system before we can tell wherein changes are necessary, I need make no recommendations at this time.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to all who have helped and taken an interest in this phase of the school work.

## Report of Instructor of Domestic Science

Dear Sir—I submit with pleasure my fifth annual report of the Department of Domestic Science.

We, as teachers and pupils of the Domestic Science Department are looking forward to the new Grammar School Building as it means for us an enlarged and very much broader course.

This year we have had an opportunity to offer sewing in four Rural Schools, East Auburn, Auburn Plains, Stevens Mills and Haskells' Corner, also cooking to a class of girls made up from all the rural sections.

This class is well attended considering the unfavorable weather and also the fact that the pupils have to furnish their own conveyances. They have displayed unusual interest in the work and have made remarkable progress considering the limited time they have had. Two afternoons a week are given to the pupils of the High School, one for the girls who have never had the opportunity to study cooking and one for the girls who are taking the advanced course.

One credit for one half year's work of two hours per week is allowed.

I recommend that both cooking and Elementary Dressmaking be scheduled as a regular study in the Junior High School, as these subjects are considered an important branch of the present day school curriculum.

In closing I wish to thank all who have shown a helpful and kindly interest in my work.

The topical course has been the same as in previous years.

Fall term-Nature Drawing for line, mass, and color.

Winter term-Object Drawing based on type solids.

Spring term-Application of line, form, and color in design.

The main object has been to teach the children to see beauty and simplicity in everyday life rather than to provide them with means of earning a livelihood; to eliminate superfluities and aspire toward refined simplicity in all our work, and to discriminate between the passing fad and the purposeful and enduring end.

Better taste in dress and home decorations—wall coverings, rugs and curtains has been accomplished through the work in nature drawing and close observation of color combinations.

Paper furniture for simplicity of line and color and fitness for its needs has been made in the primary grades.

Poster work with cut paper forms to show fitness of things has been made.

I give a lesson each week in every grammar grade and high school and once in two weeks in each primary grade and visit each rural school twice each term, thus coming in personal contact with every school child in Auburn.

Outlines for work are discussed at our regular teachers' meetings.

I wish to thank the teachers and pupils for their help and inspiration in all my work.

# Report of Board of Health

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of  
Auburn:*

Gentlemen:—The Board of Health respectfully submits its 29th. annual report for the municipal year ending Feb. 29th. and mortality statistics for the year ending Dec. 31, 1915.

## ORGANIZATION

The board consists of Dr. D. A. Barrell, Mr. H. A. Young and Dr. C. H. Cunningham.

At the annual meeting held in April, Mr. H. A. Young was chosen president and Dr. D. A. Barrell secretary and health officer. Mr. John J. Lawlor was appointed Plumbing inspector for one year.

## CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

During the past year we have had forty-nine cases of scarlet fever, Two cases of Diphtheria and two cases of typhoid fever reported, but have had no epidemics of any kind.

The board has investigated numerous complaints in regard to disposal of sewerage and various other minor complaints and have been able to abate the nuisances in most cases with satisfaction to all parties.

The board respectfully renews the recommendations of several preceding reports and hopes that soon they may have a full time inspector in conjunction with the police and fire departments.

# Report of City Solicitor

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Auburn:*

I wish at this time to submit for your consideration an annual report in conformity to the requirements of Section 8, Chapter 10, of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Auburn.

Of the matter pending at the outset of the municipal year 1915, I believe each to have been adjusted with some degree of advantage to our City, as follows: the case of the City of Auburn vs. E. S. Paul, twice carried to the Law Court and twice reported unfavorably, has been settled by Mr. Paul paying a satisfactory sum. The three cases of the three members of the Board of Registration, namely Garcelon, Loring and Langley, in which suits had been instituted in the Supreme Court were deemed meritorious and paid. One other matter pending at the time of our advent was the Dexter case to which I will refer briefly: a suit was instituted in the S. J. Court during the previous administration by Charles W. Dexter for land damages due to the raising of the highway in front of his residence. By agreement the matter was referred to a committee of three Lewiston citizens, previously considered most able, namely George W. Pottle, Ernest Saunders and Geo. A. Emerson, who inspected the premises and reported a substantial damage to Mr. Dexter.

During the year several matters have been referred to me by your honorable Board and among them I will refer to two, my reports in connection with these matters are on file with the City Clerk. Felix W. Chouinard has entered a claim for damage while driving his automobile near Danville Junction and across the Maine Central Railway tracks and settlement of this matter is pending. J. D. Fine of this city has commenced suit, returnable the April term of our S. J. Court, claiming

that the City has been negligent in using planking not suitable in a cross way on Second Street.

Several suits have been commenced by the City, seven in number, on claims due the City for back taxes, Sewer and Sidewalk Assessments, and although the indebtedness in several instances dated back several years all have been settled advantageously with one exception. The one exception is a claim arising out of an Assessment by the Board of Public Works, the acts of which Board have universally been held invalid by the Law Court.

Other duties before the Auburn Municipal Court have been rendered most satisfactory, due to the able presentation of the evidence and active assistance of the Marshal and his Deputies.

In closing I wish to attribute any degree of success that I may have had in settling claims against or in favor of the City of Auburn, to the most courteous and able assistance and co-operation of the entire City Council and the Heads of the various departments of our City.

# Milk Inspector's Report

*To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Auburn:*

As Inspector of Milk for the City of Auburn for the year ending March 1916, I have the honor to submit to you the following report of the work accomplished during that time.

In all, 557 samples of milk have been secured and tested by your inspector. These have all been examined for fat, total solids, solids not fat and visible dirt. Fat has been determined by the use of the well known Babcock centrifugal method, which is the standard for this work. Specific gravities have all been determined by the use of the New York Board of Health combined lactometer and thermometer and all readings are corrected for temperature. Total solids and solids not fat are computed by the use of the Richmond formula for milk solids, from the corrected specific gravity and fat readings. This formula is as follows; Total solids equal  $\frac{1}{4}$  specific gravity plus 1.2 x fat plus .14 and total solids - fat equal solids not fat. All samples which have shown an abnormally low percentage of solids not fat, by this method, have been checked by an actual gravimetric analysis before the result has been published.

The grading of the samples, with regard to their dirt content, has been carried on by the same method as is used at the laboratories of the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station. A sample of milk, allowed to stand quietly for two hours, is marked clean, if at the end of that time, no visible sediment has collected on the bottom of the bottle. If there is a small amount of very fine dirt, it is graded *very slightly dirty*; if a moderate amount of fine and coarse dirt or perchance a hair or two, it is called *slightly dirty*. Milk with an appreciable amount of coarse dirt, hair, straw etc., is called

*dirty*, and milk which contains a large amount of dirt is graded, *very dirty*. There is no excuse for milk or cream being delivered, of a grade lower than that of *slightly dirty*, and with a little care the grade of all the milk sold, can be kept in the two upper divisions. The public in general should appreciate the effort expended on the part of the milkman who always secures a report of *Clean*. I am sure, that if the public knew the amount of work and care that is required to produce clean milk and the amount of labor required to bottle it in such a manner that no dirt is introduced, they would not object to paying a premium, if necessary, to secure clean milk. However, at present, no such premium is being charged, so, if anyone were to demand that their milkman always deliver milk that would grade clean, a great improvement in the quality of the milk supply would be effected at little or no cost to the consumer. It may not be out of place to say here, that the milkmen of Auburn, as a class, are furnishing milk of a higher standard of quality, bacterial count excepted, than that of any other Municipality in the State.

There is one phase of the milk question, in which Auburn is sadly behind other more up-to-date municipalities. This in the matter of the number of bacteria in the milk, as sold. We have no State or City standards regarding the bacterial count, nor any appropriation to enforce such standards, if they existed. Portland has such standards and is doing very good work enforcing compliance. It must be understood, that a milk may analyze all right chemically, while it might easily be dangerous and unfit for human food, on account of the disease germs, with which it may be loaded. On this account, I recommend that the next administration make the appropriation for the milk work, sufficient to allow of a bacterial count on each sample of milk as collected.

The figures for the average values of all the samples of milk and cream secured, are as follows. Cream—22.13% Butter fat; legal minimum 18.00%. Milk—4.21% Butter fat; legal limit 3.25% Butter fat.

Total solids—13.01%; no legal limit; solids not fat—8.88%; legal limit—8.50%. From this, it may seem that our milk supply, in general, is far above the minimum set by statute. There have been less than six cases where the analysis was so low as to be suspicious and only three cases were low enough to warrant prosecution. I think that this is a record which the City may well be proud of.

Your inspector is handicapped, during the winter months, by the actual impossibility of sampling milk on the street, owing to the fact that the milk is often frozen or freezes during the exposure necessary in sampling. I would recommend that the City appropriate enough money, so that during cold weather, the inspector could purchase unbroken packages of milk and not be under the necessity of opening them till they reach the laboratory. This is the method usually followed in other cities. The expense would be nominal and this method will allow of as many samples being taken during the winter, as during the summer. At present, your inspector can secure samples only when the outside temperature is above 32 de. Fahrenheit, so that inspection is practically limited to the few warm mornings, with the result that only half or two-thirds of the dealers are sampled.

In conclusion, I wish to say that I consider publicity to be the great cure-all for existing evils in the milk business and for this reason, all results of my inspection work have been given to the daily papers. From the comments thereon, I judge this to be both popular and appreciated.

One motor driven Seagrave combination truck at the Central Station in first class condition. Since March 1st, 1915 the truck has traveled approximately            miles at fires.

### HOSE

We have on hand 12,000 feet in good condition.

### HORSES

One pair at the Central Station for the hook and ladder truck. One horse at New Auburn Station. One of the pair of hose horses has been placed at New Auburn to take the place of old Jabe and the other one of the pair with Jabe has been sold.

### CHEMICAL

We have twenty-seven hand chemicals at the station all in good condition. Outside of the City limits chemicals are placed as follows:

At West Auburn; One at Gib Hersey's, one at Fuller's store, one at Storer Crafts. Also one thirty foot extention ladder and one fifteen foot roof ladder are kept at the side of the Chapel.

At North Auburn; One at O. E. Johnson's, one at the Grange Hall and one at Weston's. Also one thirty foot extention ladder and one fifteen foot roof ladder kept at the Grange Hall.

At East Auburn; One at Martin's Store, two at Addison Whitman's, No. 3 Oak Street.

At Danville Junction; three at Fred Parson's store.

## INSPECTION

The annual inspection was made in October by the Chief and the assistant engineers. This inspection included all three story buildings, fire escapes, basements, chimneys and general inspection for the prevention of fire. I have recommended that fire escapes be placed on the following buildings: Foss and Packard Shoe Factory, Bickford's Block, Field Bros. and Gross Shoe Factory, Goff Block, Standard Box Factory, Brush Factory. Also that one be changed on the Wise and Cooper Factory. All of these recommendations have been carired out. During the last two years there have been two new fire escapes placed on the various buildings, thereby, giving better protection to the occupants. The owners have been in all cases willing to comply with my request for better conditions for protection against fire.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

I would recommend as I have in my previous report that the men in the house be given more time off, at least, one day out of seven. At the present time they have only one night off a week.

## CONCLUSION

In conclusion I wish to extend my thanks to His Honor, the Mayor, and to the members of the Council for the interest they have shown in the work of the department and in all matters pertaining to it. I also wish to thank the Fire Commissioners for their interest and for the support and able assistance which they have given me. The department today is one of the best, if not the best which the City has ever had. The men are loyal to their trust and have performed their duties in a very exemplary manner. I wish at this time to extend my thanks and appreciation to the members of the Press for the assistance which they have given me in my endeavor to give the City better protection against fire. The City has been fortunate this year in having so few fires and I congratulate them on this point

## Report of Police Matron

*To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the Auburn City Government:*

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending March 1st, 1916. One cannot do justice to a year's work in a few brief statements. The character of this work is such that you cannot state it in figures. Suffice it to say I have been on duty every day with the exception of ten days the first of September. I have responded to all calls for assistance, or for investigation. In many cases the first call leads to many more.

At the beginning of the municipal year business depression was such that many families needed much assistance in way of clothing, shoes, etc.

There have been no contagious diseases or serious illness among the poor. One little girl was sent to the hospital for treatment. Two girls have been sent to the Industrial School at Hallowell.

I have found employment for many women and at all times tried to lighten the burden of those who came to me for assistance.

It is my opinion that there has been more suffering caused by indulgence in intoxicating liquors than from a lack of employment during the past year. The three following cases will illustrate this point. The first, a family of ten, the father in jail for 90 days, the oldest boy being an inmate of the same place but not for the same offence, the next oldest boy out of employment and the mother with a babe in her arms and five children to be fed and clothed. A hard outlook at the beginning of a cold winter.

The Chamberlain school where four of the children attend made them a generous donation of vegetables, groceries, etc., also, through Capt. Wood's influence, another party sent provisions to the amount of \$10, then the city came to their assistance and in this way

they managed to exist until father and son were released, and now, with little assistance, they can get along nicely as long as father remains sober. The second case, a father of seven children, a good man to work and care for his family when sober, but when drinking, is away for days at a time. While he earns good pay, when drinking he gets so far behind with his bills that it is impossible for him to provide proper clothing for his family. In this case the mother is very backward about asking for any assistance and it is only by personal investigation that their worthy needs are revealed. The last case, a man who kept sober for two years went back to his old habits. Were it not for a capable wife the city would have the family to care for, as it is, the mother works, leaving her little ones to be cared for, by strangers or keeps the older ones out of school. In this family there are five children.

Where I find extreme poverty the cause is usually apparent.

One family came back to Auburn the man having been disappointed in what he thought was a permanent job elsewhere. They arrived in cold weather, having no kitchen stove and with little furniture and no money, five in this family. Through an appeal in the Lewiston Journal a kitchen range, beds and comfortable bedding were provided. One of the churches gave them a donation party and the man found steady employment in a local shoeshop where they have been most kind to him and his family. The baby has been seriously ill but through the generosity of people interested they have passed a comfortable winter. This is one case where drink was not the cause of the distress.

At Thanksgiving time, with the assistance of the president of the W. C. T. U. and a few interested members, also City Marshal Buchanan, forty families were remembered with vegetables of all kinds, preserves and canned goods also jelly and other delicacies for the sick and shut-ins.

As in the years past the City Marshal gave me the use of a room in the basement of Auburn hall which was

used as headquarters for receiving and delivering the donations. "I want to thank all who so generously donated. Many of the schools, as is their custom, made large contributions also some of the Sunday Schools and many generous hearted individuals.

Several families helped thanked me and said if they had not been remembered they would have had nothing.

I wish, I might relate a few cases that came to my attention but time and space will not permit.

I sent ten pounds of candy to the city farm as I have every year since I have been Police Matron.

At Christmas time, as there was to be no Lewiston Journal Santa Claus, several of the ladies of Auburn volunteered to assist me in spreading cheer to the needy families. Through the generosity of Everett Smith we had the use of a room in the National Shoe and Leather bank building, which was kept for a storeroom during the two weeks preceding Christmas. Through the cooperation of several ladies working under the name of the Christmas Committee, great good was accomplished and cheer and much new clothing, shoes, rubbers and stockings, furniture and bedding placed where most needed. In this way fifty families were helped and cheered but the work did not stop at Christmas, it is still going on, and much good clothing and shoes are still being passed along.

I want to thank the good people who so generously responded to every appeal and or the good spirit shown throughout the entire Christmas work.

The winter just passed has been in many respected a very comfortable one, I mean by that, of the families which I visited regularly many of the men are well employed.

I have had more calls for bedding this winter than any before but thanks to church societies and G. A. R. women I think all demands have been met.

Although many complicated cases have come to my attention the work has been pleasant and I have always received courteous treatment and advice from the

City Marshal and force also from Overseer of the Poor A. A. Garcelon and all others with whom I have associated.

As to the character of the work I want to say we have fewer cases of desperately poor families now than at any time during my acquaintance with the work.

I still urge the great need of a room to be used by the Police Matron for a store-room also as a headquarters in which to do business and the use of a city team to collect bundles, etc.

In conclusion I wish to thank all city officials and anyone who has in any way assisted me in the discharge of the duties of Police Matron.

In conclusion I recommend that \$40,000 be appropriated to the Highway Dept. for the ensuing year. The necessary material for the coming year is as follows, and should be purchased early in the Season. One pair of horses exchanged, One driving horse purchased, One single harness, Two sets of double harnesses, Two sets of six horse reins, Two sets of four horse reins, Twelve Wiggin drags should be built, Two thousand feet of hemlock plank for driveways, Six thousand feet spruce plank for box culverts, One car load of cedar posts, Two Champion Road Machines, Carts, Sleds, and Snow-ploughs repaired and painted. The above named materials and the expense of cutting bushes which is compulsory by law will cost approximately four thousand dollars.

For Permanent Improvements eight hundred feet of ten and twelve inch iron pipe should be purchased to replace old stone culverts that have fallen in and will not take water.

For Bridges twenty-five hundred dollars should be appropriated, if possible the South Bridge should be painted, Abutments at Lapham brook should be replaced and planked, Bridge at Cobbs Mills should be replaced. Bridge at outlet of Lake Auburn should be rebuilt.

Appropriation for Old Sewers should be increased to \$1500.00.

Paving on Minot Ave. should be continued from Elm St. to High St. extension. Paving on Broad St. from Third to Fourth St. Paving on Main St. from Laurel St. to Little iron bridge. A start should be made on relaying paving on Main St. Turner and Dennison Sts. should be made permanent.

A liberal appropriation should be made for permanent walks and crossings, as this gives the City a clean appearance and benefits the general public.

Wilson St. should be completed. Fifth St. East of



Gill should be built. Twelve hundred dollars should be appropriated for new streets.
