School Report

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF BINGHAM JUNIOR-SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL

MRS. L. A. BRADBURY, Superintendent of Schools

I have the honor herewith to submit my first report as principal of Bingham Junior-Senior high school.

The present school year opened September fourth with the following registration by grades: 7th, 19; 8th, 20; 9th, 23; 10th, 24; 11th, 21; 12th, 11; total for all grades, 118 pupils. This number was decreased to 107 during the first half-year, the following seeming to be the reasons:

The average attendance has been about 89 per cent. I am informed that the average for Maine high schools runs from 92 per cent to 96 per cent, one school of 480 pupils having maintained an average of 98 per cent for the fall term. The following pupils merit special mention for having been neither late nor absent during the first half-year: Miles F. Goodell, Keith P. Hunnewell, Alice E. Owens, Merle R. Arno, Iva T. Bean, Harold N. Hunnewell.

The following courses are offered this year in grades 9 to 12:

Grade 9—Required: English I, algebra, penmanship, spelling; elective: Latin I, commercial arithmetic, general science.

Grade 10—Required: English II, Geometery (all who have completed algebra); elective: Latin II, French I, bookkeeping. Grade 11—Required: English III; elective: French II, Latin

IV, English History, typewriting I, shorthand I, review algebra, solid geometry, physics.

The course of study has been arranged with a view to presenting subjects which will be useful to those whose education ends in high school and at the same time providing subjects required for admission to Maine colleges.

The larger percentages of failures are in the usual branches: mathematics, science and English.

Two much appreciated improvements which have increased the efficiency of the school are the installation of drinking fountains in the corridors on the first and second floors, and electric lights in the senior room and laboratory. An increase in the physical apparatus enables us to complete an approved course in physics and general science. The gift of a Spencer microscope of a wide range of magnifying powers and 12 biology s'ides by the class of 1922 will be of special value in our science courses.

Social activities have been limited this half-year. The

students and their friends have held a few Friday evening socials in which the object sought and realized was a social good time. Three basketball teams were organized and a few games played. This activity was greatly handicapped by the lack of adequate funds. The Senior class is preparing a play to be given shortly.

In general we are having a fairly successful year. emphasis is being placed on purposeful activity, efficiency and economical use of time. The average number of words per minute being attained at this time by second year pupils in typewriting is 51, on standard tests, comparing favorably with an average of about 40 words per minute attained by second year pupils last year. I would urge that constant cooperation between the parents and teachers is essential to the accomplishment of the best results in the school. this connection we would welcome visits by parents and others interested, both for observation of instruction and for conference with regard to any matters concerning the welfare of the school. A practical suggestion would be the cooperation of parents in securing punctual attendance upon every session of the school, as far as possible. While the pupils, on the whole, are doing a fair grade of work and there are comparatively few failures, we are earnestly asking that parents and citizens use every effort to aid in reducing the number of failures to the minimum and at the same time raising the school to the highest intellectual and moral standard. policy and purpose of the school is to serve this community in the best way possible.

In conclusion I wish to express my gratitude for the helpful spirit shown on the part of the parents and citizens whom it has been my good fortune to meet, for the unfailing courtesy and support of the members of the School Committee and for the kindly counsel and co-operation of the Superintendent of Schools. To the Selectmen of Bingham:

The annual report of the Bingham schools is herewith Since the close of the last fiscal year, we have submitted. maintained thirty-nine weeks of high school, thirty-seven weeks in the village grades, thirty-four weeks at the Webster, twentythree weeks at the Russell, thirty-three weeks at the Goodrich, and twenty-eight weeks at the Whittier. Unavoidable changes during the spring term at the high school made this work less effective than desired. The new school year opening September 5, has been carried on successfully and bids fair to attain an excellent degree of success. The village grade teachers were re-elected and are doing an excellent year's work.

The rural schools present an unusual problem. These four schools, maintained at a cost of about \$55.00 per week, have an aggregate registration of 23 pupils. The cost per capita seems prohibitive, but no better plan has been suggested than to carry on these small schools for as many weeks as the weather permits. Be it said to the credit of the teachers who have those schools in charge that they make the work interesting and pleasant for the few children committed to their charge.

A rather large outlay for repairs has been found necessary the past three years. The schools are fairly well housed for the present, and the only cost in this line for the coming year will be in the way of general repairs.

The village library in its improved scope and capacity, bids fair to be a powerful asset to our high school classes.

Debating leagues are becoming more and more popular among the secondary schools. It may be that Bingham high school could profitably take part in such a league. While it may never be thought best to make claim for state and federal aid by the introduction of a regular agricultural course, we would urge that a line of reading on those subjects be favored in our schools and libraries.

As soon as means will permit, a few points along the line of manual and domestic training should be taken up. There are always students who would be helped by such teaching.

In presenting this report, we would say that our teachers have been most faithful and conscientious; school officials, prompt and efficient; town officers, courteous and helpful. To each and all, we extend sincere thanks.

GREETING:

- Art. 25—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting the streets for the ensuing year and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 26—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1250.00 for hydrant rental for the ensuing year.
- Art. 27—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Bingham Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 28—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for payment on tomb.
- Art. 29—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
- Art. 30--To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for Bingham Union Library.
- Art. 31—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 32—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for salary of Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 33—To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 34—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 35—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to repair Meadow Street sidewalk.
- Art. 36—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Nightwatch and Police protection for the ensuing year.
- Art. 37—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of taking care of cemeteries in town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 38—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to continue any schools that have failed to maintain the legal average attendance during the past year and re-open any schools that have been suspended when they find it necessary to do so.
- Art. 39—To see if the town will vote authorizing and instructing its Selectmen, to make temporary loans of money throut the year when required for the payment of bills.
- Art. 40—To see if the town will vote to elect a tree warden and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 41—To see if the town will vote to fix a time when taxes shall be due and payable.
- Art. 42—To see if the town will vote to extend the sidewalk from Alton Carl's east line to end of street and see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the same, the distance being about 450 feet.
- Art. 43—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to install a street light on Milford Street, said light to be located on the second electric light pole south of the junction of Milford and Rollins Streets.

Art. 44—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to install a light at the corner of Milford and Rollins Streets.

Art. 45—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to install a light near the residence of Robert Laurison.

Art. 46—To see if the town will vote to discontinue a piece of road beginning at the east line of Frank Gleason's lot and running in an easterly direction to the end of the road near where the Mike LaPoint buildings were burned, it being about 25 rods.

Art. 47—To see if the town will vote to elect a Budget Committee to recommend to the next annual town meeting the necessary appropriations of money for the ensuing year.

Art. 48—To see if the town will vote to purchase of A. C. Dinsmore a certain parcel of land located just north of the present Bingham Cemetery, 135 feet wide and bounded on the east by the Main Street and on the west by the Kennebec River, and raise such sum of money as will be necessary for the same.

Art. 49—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting, including the passing of any and all votes that may be considered necessary to carry into effect any and all votes passed under this warrant.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
