School Report

Mr. Howard Gilpatrick, Superintendent of Schools:

I am handing you herewith my second annual report as principal of Bingham Junior-Senior high school.

The present school year opened with a total registration of 105 pupils. The number of pupils attending at the end of the first half-year in 1922-1923 was 107. Since then we have received 29 and lost 44, leaving 92 at the end of the first half of the current year.

The average attendance for the first half of the year was 89.4 per cent of the total enrollment. The average for the fall term was 90.4 per cent and for the first three weeks of the winter term was 96.3 per cent of the enrollment for each term. The lower percentage for the fall may be attributed in part to attendance of pupils at fairs on school days.

A larger teaching force has permitted us to round out the curricula more fully. A fairly good line of commercial subjects is now offered under competent instruction, including: one year of commercial arithmetic, two years each of bookkeeping, shorthand and typewriting and one-half year each in commercial The college preparatory course offers subgeography and law. jects admitting to most colleges. The privilege of entering students without examination was granted for the first time by the New England College Entrance Certificate Board in the case of all colleges which are members of the board. At present we have four alumni making good as students at three Maine col-We are also offering a general course which permits considerable freedom of choice of subjects to students not desiring either of the specialized curricula.

I desire to express my appreciation for the continued support and kindness of the school board, for the goodwill shown by the townspeople toward the school, for the courteous, helpful attitude of the superintendent and especially for the spirit of co-operation and harmony which dwells among the members of the teaching staff and the student body.

To the Superintending School Committee and citizens of Bingham:

It now becomes my duty to render my first report on the condition of your schools. The few months I have been with you enable me to make a survey of the schools and to discover some of their peculiar problems. The plan for the junior and senior high school is excellent but the preparation for entrance into these schools has been neglected. This is not so much the fault of the teaching force as that the necessary text books, equipment and supplies have not been furnished. In the first six grades the foundation is laid for all future work in high school, college, or life. In these grades the fundamentals, reading, writing, spelling, language and arithmetic should be thoro-Very few children entering school at the tender ughly taught. age of five years can do the required work of the first six grades The teachers have done the best they could with in six years. the tools that have been furnished them. Already a beginning has been made towards supplying them with more modern tools, and in introducing more practical methods.

The work in the high school has gone on well considering the lack of proper preparation for high school work.

Our aim is to give each child the best possible opportunity to fit himself to enter the social, economical and political life of a great country, and to become a useful citizen. At the end of the sixth grade we intend that each pupil shall be able to solve any ordinary business problem, write a well arranged business or friendly letter with correct spelling and punctuation.

Under efficient supervision for a few years Bingham schools ought to rank as high in efficiency as any town of its size.

I would advise an appropriation for medical inspection and the services of a nurse. The towns of this union might employ a part time nurse. Such supervision and inspection would probably prevent closing schools on account of sickness.

The Hamlin rural school has been repaired and a very good school kept this fall and winter.

Some unexpected repairs on the high school building were found necessary. By careful management the annual appropriation was made to cover all expenses with a small surplus. Old bills for text books and supplies dating back as far as 1920 have been paid. These bills amounted to about \$439.00.

The school buildings need painting on the outside. A large supply of textbooks, supplies and equipment are needed for the lower grades especially.

Unless the town wants special courses in music and drawing I would recommend the same appropriations as last year with a small addition for medical inspection and school nurse.

There ought to be some organization which will bring parents, teachers, and superintendent into closer touch. Then teachers and superintendent would be better able to understand their pupils. Parents would then be able to comprehend something of the problems and difficulties of the teachers.

It is always the purpose of the superintendent to see to it that the teachers teach children and not put undue emphasis on the subject.

In conclusion let me thank the citizens for their support and cooperation, the teachers for their loyalty, and the superintending school committee and town officers for their courtesy.

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

Somerset, ss.

STATE OF MAINE

To Frank L. Gipson, a constable of the town of Bingham, in said county.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Bingham, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Kennebec Hall in said town of Bingham on Monday the third day of March A. D. 1924, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Municipal officers as printed.
 - Art. 3—To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4—To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 5—To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6—To choose a tax collector for the ensuing year and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 7—To choose one or more members of the superintending school committee.
- Art. 8—To see if the town will vote to elect a road commissioner and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.
 - Art. 9—To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.
- Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text books for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to support a free high school in Bingham Village for the ensuing year.

- Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for building and repairing highways and culverts for the ensuing year and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 16—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$480.00 for patrol maintenance.
- Art. 17—To see if the town will vote to spend the sum of \$250.00 for graveling Whitney street, so called, extending from the west side of Main street to the residence of Edward Miller, said amount to be expended from the regular highways appropriation.
- Art. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the building and repairing of bridges for the ensuing year and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking snow roads in town for the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.
- Art. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes within the limits of the highways for the ensuing year, and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 21—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the town poor for the ensuing year and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 22—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting the streets for the ensuing year and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 23—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1250.00 for hydrant rental for the ensuing year.
- Art. 24—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Bingham Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 25—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$270.70 to pay the balance due on tomb.

- Art. 26—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
- Art. 27—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for Bingham Union Library.
- Art. 28—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 29—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for salary of Superintendent of Schools, and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.
- Art. 30—To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 31—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges, the above being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 32—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for night watch and police protection for the ensuing year.
- Art. 33—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of taking care of cemeteries in town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 34—To see if the town will vote to continue the Hamlin school for the ensuing year, if the average attendance is less than eight pupils.
- Art. 35—To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to support the teachers' institute in Bingham under the direction of Chas. E. Ball.
- Art. 36—To see if the town will vote authorizing and instructing its selectmen, to make temporary loans of money thruout the year when required for the payment of bills.

Art. 37—To see if the town will vote to elect a tree warden and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 38—To see if the town will vote to fix a time when taxes shall be due and payable.

Art. 39—To see if the town will vote to elect a budget committee to recommend to the next annual town meeting the necessary appropriations of money for the ensuing year.

Art. 40—To see what action the town will take in regard to the sale of lots in the new cemetery and pass all necessary votes respecting the same.

Art. 41—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting, including the passing of any and all votes that may be considered necessary to carry into effect any and all votes passed under this warrant.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
