Report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor

To the Citizens of Bingham:

We herewith submit our annual report of the financial standing of the town for the year ending February 9th, 1928.

You will note that the tax rate was reduced from \$40.00 per \$1000.00 to \$37.00 per \$1000.00. This is the lowest rate we have had for quite a few years.

While the bank balance dropped from \$4131.59 to \$2397.53, it must be noted that we have paid off \$400.00 on interest bearing notes and that we have \$1701.45 due us from various sources. These last two items more than account for the difference in the balance.

In spite of the fact that we had various overdrafts, including overdraft of \$556.65 for support of poor, which is really an uncertain factor to control, you will note that the increase in our net liabilities for the year over and above that of last year is only \$40.58.

We might also advise that we have in our treasury \$150.00 received from the sale of school buildings from the back part of our town; \$204.65 for trust funds pending your acceptance and also \$631.35 the remaining balance of the miscellaneous account which should be utilized to pay off on our town debt at a future date.

In closing we wish to thank all the officials and citizens of the town of Bingham for their co-operation during this past season.

School Report

Mr. Howard L. Bowen, Superintendent of Schools:

I submit, herewith, my second annual report as Principal of the Bingham Junior-Senior High School.

The total enrollment of pupils for this year is 96. The Junior High room is particularly crowded, there being 55 pupils in these three lower grades. Class enrollment is as follows: Special 1, Seniors 7, Juniors 16, Sophomores 17, Freshmen 20, Eighth Grade 13, Seventh Grade 22.

The attendance for the fall term was excellent, but the prevailing epidemics have prevented regular attendance during the first weeks of the present term.

Three courses of study are offered as last year namely: College Preparatory General and Industrial courses. The college preparatory course has been strengthened by the addition of a second full year of algebra, which with solid geometry given every second year, will enable us to fully meet the requirements of all colleges under the New England College Entrance Certificate Board, whose certificate privilege is granted to this school.

Last spring the high school baseball team had a very successful season, losing only one game. Also a school paper "The Boreas" was published for the first time. This paper was partially made possible by the advertising support of the business men of Bingham, for which the school wishes to express its appreciation.

This fall the second annual Prize Speaking Contest was held, together with a school Fair, where articles from the Home Economics and Manual Training Departments were sold. A good sum of money was realized from this sale to help defray expenses of these departments. Prizes for the Speaking Contest were donated by the D. A. R., the Century Club and the Augusta Trust Company.

The school has received the gift of an excellent set of Compton's new encyclopedias from funds provided by the class of 1917. Several magazines have also been donated by friends of the school.

Scholastic standings of both individuals and classes are on a par with previous year. An encouraging fact is that the Freshman class is represented by more names on the Honor Roll, those averaging over 90%, than any other class, although the Seniors lead in general class average.

I wish, in conclusion, to thank the superintendent and school board for their cooperation and support. Changing conditions and the constant influx of new students bring about new problems which I trust may be solved, as in the past, so as to bring about the development and advancement of Bingham High School.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Bingham:

The time has again come for an annual report on the condition of our schools. These reports become something of a habit and are likely to be passed over lightly, if indeed they are read at all. Yet it is the duty of the Superintendent to make a report, each year.

TEACHERS

Some changes have occurred in the teaching force; Mrs. Doris G. Springer replacing Miss Hincks in the High School as teacher of French and Latin. Mrs. Springer is a graduate of the University of Maine with some graduate work besides being a teacher with several years' experience, and has shown herself to be an excellent teacher. The remainder of the High School faculty returned to us and are doing as they did last year, most efficient and satisfactory work. In the grades, Mrs. Hilton was replaced by Mrs. Annie M. Spalding who, because of ill-health, resigned at the close of the fall term. Mr. Herbert C. Weller of Machias, a graduate of Washington State Normal School, was secured to fill this vacancy proving himself to be a very good teacher. The other grade teachers are the same and have been as conscientious as formerly. thing that should be mentioned here, namely the long and efficient service of two of our teachers, Mrs. May B. Tupper and Mrs. Edith K. Dinsmore. Their work in the town has been of inestimable value, both being excellent teachers, the retention of whom has shown the very good judgment of your several school boards. Two of our teachers, Miss Hobbs and Miss Kellogg, attended summer school at the University of Maine the past summer.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

Our new courses have continued the more than satisfactory success of last year. The boys and girls have been as interested as ever and have done some really remarkable work as those of you who have seen it will agree. The boys have earned

for the department since the last town report nearly \$150.00 which has been used in paying for material used in the course. The girls have around \$50.00 in their club which they have earned at the school fair and by other projects. The value of their work has been as great as that of the boys but they have furnished the greater part of the material themselves, especially that used in clothing. The success of these departments is due in no small measure to the outstanding efforts of both Miss Kellogg and Mr. Foss who have worked most conscientiously. The Bingham Century Club has aided these two departments in a monetary way which has been used in purchasing equipment to make the course more interesting and broader.

MUSIC

Music under the leadership of Miss Hobbs has been very successful. Just now the students of the Junior-Senior High School are working on an operetta to be presented some time before the close of the school year, while some kind of musical entertainment will be given by the lower grades.

CONVEYANCE AND BOARD

These two items are a source of anxiety to your Superintendent. With the children so widely scattered, the establishment of another school outside the village limits, while probably less expensive would not take care of the children. Besides it is believed by most people that children do better work with a large number of other children of their own grade and age. We are boarding six children at an average cost of \$4.00 a week, which amounts to quite a bit in the run of a year. We were obliged to furnish conveyance to children living on Mahoney Hill this year, but as these are temporary residents only, we shall be reimbursed by the State for this added expense. These two items, board and conveyance, together with the fact that we have been obliged to pay two wood bills this year, have caused our slight overdraft in common schools this year.

REPAIRS

Our repairs this year have been almost entirely plumbing. The pipes and toilets in all buildings were put in good condition during the summer vacation but this fall a most expensive repair job on the sewer pipes of the two grade buildings was necessary. We believed to have solved the difficulty but dur-

ing the winter term the pipes filled again so that this summer something different must be done. This sewer job is the cause of the overdraft in this department.

NEEDS

The greatest need for the coming year is another teacher. This is not only necessary but it is imperative. Our grade schools are greatly overcrowded, rooms having dimensions for 30 pupils being crowed with from 45 to 50 children. With conditions as they are we shall have at least one hundred new pupils by the opening of school in the fall. We are therefore strongly urging that we have an increased common school appropriation. The intermediate school building needs to be redecorated a thing we had planned to do this year but were not able.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

Physical examination to be successful should be followed by treament advised and is being done in many instances. The County Health Nurse has been doing follow-up work here in Bingham this year and there is opportunity for more of this work. I hope that the town will see fit to raise a sum of money to help defray this expense for the coming year.

As a whole, I believe this to have been a successful and prosperous year. Our students who graduated from the High School last year are doing excellent work in the higher institutions of learning which they attend. I urge parents and others to visit the schools and to come to me when things are troublesome. I cannot guarantee to settle all difficulties, especially in your favor, but will do all possible to straighten out matters.

I appreciate the many courtesies shown me by he town's people and those officials with whom I have come in contact, especially the Superintending School Committee. The teachers have taken whatever criticism I have made kindly and the children have always greeted me kindly on my visits.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

The menace of smallpox is assuming more prominence in this country.

I will call your attention to Section 101, Chapter 19 of the Revised Statues.

The Board of Health of each city, town, village, or plantation shall annually on the first of March, or oftener, if they deem it prudent, provide for free vaccination of all the people in their respective localities with cowpox.

It is of great importance that as many persons as possible have vaccination against smallpox.

From Feb. to Sept. quarantined and raised the quarantine on 44 houses.

During Dec. and Jan. I have reported to the State more than 75 houses that have cases of influenza.

During April I distributed the food handler's certificates, and went thru the same proceedure again in Oct.

On Jan. 24th, appointment was made to Harry Spalding as plumbing inspector for the year 1929, said appointment having been accepted by the State Board of Health.
