NOTE: Besides necessary minor repairs, we had approved a five week ERA project for the farm buildings calling for \$30.15 for material and \$195 for labor. To get this project approved, it was necessary for the town to furnish about \$95.00.

Under this project all rooms were painted and papered and the ceilings whitened. A new soft wood floor was laid in the kitchen and covered with linoleum.

A small room was partitioned off on the second floor, a window put in and flush closet installed. Other minor repairs were also made which, on the whole, put the house in condition so that very few repairs will be needed for several years.

Report of Public Health Nurse

TO: Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Dover-Foxcroft, Maine.

We hereby submit a report of Public Health Nursing Service given to your town for the period February

1, 1934 to February 1, 1935:

Your fine co-operation and financial support have made it possible to accomplish a vast amount of work during the past twelve months. If all items of accomplishment were to be incorporated in this report, there would not be space enough to accommodate them. Therefore, an effort will be made to show only a few of the special features of the large program given your town.

While the prime objective of our organization is health education for all, it has been necessary to supplement many other phases of public health work. Among these are bedside care, demonstrative and palliative, social welfare, inspections, hospitalization, and others.

Since July 1, 1934—the beginning of our fiscal year and taking the last seven months of the town year—we have already given service to over one hundred families in Dover-Foxcroft. In these families there have been from one to four patients and in many instances more than one visit has been given. This is exclusive of school and clinic work. The visits have been made largely in the home or at the office and have included patients of all types such as preschool children, children of school age not in the school, prenatal patients, tuberculosis and general adult types, and visits have been made for bedside, instructive or investigative purposes, arrangements for hospital care or accompanying patients to hospitals and other institutions.

During the summer in order to save a patient's life, he was taken to the office. It was a severe accident case, arteries and veins being cut. The patient was given first aid after anaesthesia was administered and later taken to a hospital where he remained many weeks. Assistance has been given doctors in other

anaesthesias and minor surgery.

One patient was taken to the Eastern Maine Gen-

eral hospital three times and many others conveyed to institutions and clinics outside the county after arrangements had been made for their admission. The American Legion Child Welfare Committee was generous in paying for three corrections on children of Veterans.

That there is still tuberculosis among us cannot be denied. During the year several patients have been admitted to sanatoria. Some have returned and are going back periodically for treatment. If we consider what authorities tell us in regard to the proportional number of undiagnosed cases of tuberculosis, contacts, etc. in relation to number of positively diagnosed cases, then we still have a great deal to do in this line.

Last spring under the auspices of the Forty and Eight of the American Legion as a part of their National Program, it was possible to hold a clinic at the office and Dr. Stanhope immunized twenty-five children permanently against diphtheria. We hope to continue this project the coming year.

Also during the warmer months, the regular infant and preschool clinics held jointly with Miss Ricker of the Maine Baby Saving Society were held. The large attendance, which is growing year by year, is evidence of the interest of mothers in the welfare of their babies. An innovation was made this year in the form of a Summer-Round-Up under the auspices of the Dover-Foxcroft Parent Teachers' Association held with us at the regular June Clinic. All children entering school for the first time in the fall of 1934 were especially invited to attend this Round-Up and twenty children attending fell into this category. The physical examinations and dental check-ups were made Dr. Merrill, Dr. Brown, Dr. Robbins and Dr. Whittredge, who gave their services. In a fall check-up of these children it was found that several had accepted the doctors' advice and had corrections made before the children entered school.

While our service as offered to Dover-Foxcroft at the present time does not afford a full time school program, the nurse has helped in this work as much as time and allotment of service will permit.

The old "ghosts" of communicable skin disease such as pediculosis (lice), scabies (itch) and impetigo (apple sores) seem to have vanished or at least receded into the background this year, leaving the field open to more dangerous invaders such as whooping cough, chickenpox, measles and scarlet fever. In this invasion of the county as well as other sections of the state, Dover-Foxcroft certainly was not left out and has suffered as much if not more than any town in the county.

Parents cannot be urged too strongly to isolate children who have symptoms of a "cold." When we consider that most of the so-called Children's Diseases begin with symptoms of colds, we can readily appreciate that strict isolation of the child is the road to prevention of epidemic. Anyone with a cold receives no personal benefit by being in a public place and he is a menace to others. The combined efforts of school officials, public health authorities, doctors and nurses cannot offset the negligence of parents in the control of communicable disease.

A child excluded from school should remain in isolation until such time as he is no longer suspicious of communicable disease. These diseases oft-times leave in their wake a long line of permanent disabilities such as impaired eyesight, defective hearing, heart and kidney complications and sometimes orthopedic difficulties.

Due to extra time needed to cope with epidemics throughout the county as well as in town, the regular routine of school inspection has been delayed. Early in the fall the U. S. Government requested a check-up of malnutrition cases found at last winter's survey as well as correction of defects on needy children and this has been done. A marked improvement in the nutritional standards of the children was noted. This may be due in part to the fact that a large supply of extra milk and cod-liver oil was given to the children after the survey. Approximately 200 pints of cod-liver oil were given to Dover-Foxcroft children. The supply is now exhausted. In checking the correction of defects, it was found that there is still a large number of defects uncorrected, mostly in families that cannot afford the cost of such corrections and thus is shown the need of corrective and reparative clinics in the town, especially renarative dental work. It is hoped that a plan for this can be worked out by some local agency this coming year.

The school physician has already made examinations of the school children at North St. and the nurse has supplemented this examination in three grades by hearing and vision tests and weight check-up. Practically all the children weighed show the required gain in weight and of the children who have had complete examination approximately 50% are without symptoms of defects that might develop into permanent disabilities or retard mental progress. This is a good average, in comparison to previous years. Much stress has been put on dental hygiene and the children have done well in the matter of cleaning the teeth.

The nurse has helped in other ways as much as possible upon request. The calls for material aid have been referred to other agencies. Medical-social problems have been handled in co-operation with other agencies and rather a large number have been taken care of.

It has indeed been a full year. When we consider that there is more than enough work in the town alone for one nurse to handle, it is quite remarkable that so much has been accomplished. The value of a public health nursing service has been properly demonstrated as being a necessity and that health education is as important if not more so, than any other phase of education—the prevention of disease, teaching of care in the home, hygiene and the many other things that educational. It has been further demonstrated that health education is a sound investment for any town, bringing in return to the community better health, more happiness and certainly more useful citizenry through the years.

We wish to thank the people of Dover-Foxcroft, the school authorities, town officials, fraternal orders and clubs, Christmas Seal Sale Committees, doctors, dentists and even lawvers—in fact everyone for their loyal interest and hearty support in our efforts for your town.

In June, after the town roads were put in condition, all work on general highways was suspended except εmergency repairs, and these were reduced to absolutely necessary work.

Third Class Road: On the road from East Dover Bridge to Dow's Corner, 900 feet not finished last year was surfaced and 2700 feet of new construction was completed.

State Aid Road: 2000 feet of new construction was completed, extending the State Aid towards Merrill's Mills.

Special Resolve: The Starbird road was completed to the State Road, a distance of 1400 feet.

Park Street: Under an ERA project, there was built on Park Street 2650 feet of road of the same type as is required by the State for 3d Class and State Aid roads. The cost to the town was less than a thousand dollars for trucks that the town was obliged to furnish, and, as this was a relief project, the Selectmen charged the expense to the Relief account.

Last year the School Committee recommended transferring the Pleasant Street Sixth Grade Pupils to the Home Economics room in the Grammar School building, thereby doing away with two grades in a room at Pleasant Street. This recommendation has been carried out and the Sixth Grade have now, a very pleasant and well arranged room. At the same time, it has been a decided advantage to Grades 4 and 5 at Pleasant Street.

At the beginning of the school year in September. several transfers of teachers were made. Mrs. Effie D. Bolton was transferred from Grades 4 and 5 at Pleasant * Street, to Grade 6 Grammar School; Mrs. Ava Goff to Grade 5 Pleasant Street; Miss Alice Austin from Bear Hill to Grade 4, Pleasant Street; Miss B. Thelma Nichols from South Dover to Grade 3 Pleasant Street. teachers for 1934-35 include: Miss Gertrude Calkins of Calais, a graduate of Machias Normal School with six years experience, was elected to Grade 1 Pleasant Street. Miss Calkins is also doing work in drawing in the first six grades at Pleasant Street and Grammar School. Miss Florence Cosman, graduate from Machias Normal School with six years experience, was elected • teacher at South Dover. Miss Marion Doore, who assisted Miss Nichols at South Dover the latter part of last year, was re-elected this year. Miss Louise Campbell, of this town, a graduate of Aroostook Normal School, with two years experience, was elected teacher at Bear Hill. All of our new teachers came to us with the very best of recommendations.

A field worker of the State Department has made the statement that the work in our schools is of a very high standard. Although our new teachers have worked very conscientiously, I feel that it is a real problem for new teachers to make adjustments to a new system, and that our new teachers, in some instances, are finding it difficult to maintain the grade of work which has been carried on in our schools. At the beginning of the winter term, due to the added costs of conveyance, it was voted to open the Norton Hill school. Miss Marion Doore, assistant teacher at South Dover was transferred to this school.

The departmental type of work instituted last year in the Pleasant and North Street school has been maintained. The plan for the most part is working out

very satisfactory.

None of our teachers attended Summer School last year. It is probable that many are planning on a six weeks course this summer. Practically all teachers attended the County and State Teachers' Conventions at Brownville Junction and Portland.

Books and Supplies

New English books for Grades 3 to 8 inclusive, have been introduced. The Daily Life Language Series by Lyman, Johnson & McGregor, authors for Ginn & Co. was adopted after making a careful study of several series of English books recently published. The Sixth Grade Histories, covering our old world background, were also changed. A text written for 6th Grade level has been difficult to find. With this idea in mind a text-book having a simple vocabulary and so-written that it could easily be comprehended by the average 6th Grade pupil was chosen. Teachers report that pupils are doing very satisfactory work in the text adopted. New Geographies for Grade 4 were introduced in all schools, Many of the books being used by the children were in very poor condition. Last summer, through an ERA project, books were completely gone over. All those unsuitable for use were discarded. Any book that could be made usable was repaired. By this method most books were in good condition at the beginning of the school year.

Our Supply Bill again has been unusually large due to the added cost of ERA work, which it was thought economical to do, when the cost of labor was furnished by the Federal Government. Approximately \$400.00 has been spent from the Supply account for this pur-

pose.

The total cost of Electricity, Telephone and Water Service was \$550.96. This leaves \$1,174.32 of this year's account for actual School Supplies, or approximately \$1.50 per pupil, which is low when compared with the expenditures in other towns. All standard

supplies have advanced from 10 to 35 per cent over prices of a year ago. To meet this added cost and other uses of funds from the supply account \$575.00 has been transferred from the Common School Fund.

Repairs

The repairs have been directed by our School Committee and all labor has been under the supervision of Mr. Pearl. No one can say but what the work has been well carried out and economically done. All repairs for the year have been carried on in conjunction with ERA Projects. Major repairs for the year are as follows: North Street: Building painted outside; sewer and grading projects completed and front yard seeded; also posts erected for fence; all radiators were cleaned and painted; shelves have been placed in rooms; suitable playground equipment has been erected on all sections of the playground.

Pleasant Street and Grammar Building: A tennis court and croquet ground has been constructed and all necessary grading completed; playground equipment has been erected for all grades; Home Economics room was made into a 6th grade room, materials and furniture coming from material already available from the buildings. This room was redecorated and all furniture refinished.

East Dover: The building was painted outside; the chemical tanks, which were never satisfactory, were becoming a source of trouble with the need of new tanks being installed and were done away with. A well was drilled on the school grounds, an electric pump purchased, and flush toilets installed. A 425 foot sewer was laid to the river. The committee arranged with the East Dover Grange Trustees for use of water, whereby the Grange paid ½ the cost of drilling the well up to 150 feet. The depth of well is 223 feet. Mr. A. G. Betts drilled the last 73 feet without cost to the town, which was a most generous gift. A good supply of water is available and is very much appreciated by all. Playground equipment has also been erected on the grounds.

Bear Hill, South Dover, Norton Hill, Macomber and Brockway buildings have all been painted outside and playground equipment erected on all grounds except Norton Hill. Brockway has been painted inside

and all desks refinished. The south roof has been shingled also. I question whether your buildings as a whole have ever been in as good condition as they are at the present time. Now that they are in good condition it is economical to keep them so.

The Academy

A very progressive program is being carried out at the Academy with the 70 minute period instituted last year. Students are having an opportunity for research work and under guidance, study habits are being formed, which should equip the graduates for future study and work. I believe the new courses in Freshman and Sophomore Speech Training and the General Bookkeeping Course, introduced this year have been very favorably received by the students. Principal Stone has a well balanced program and a very capable faculty to carry it out.

Special Teachers

Mrs. Louise Nichols, District Nurse and Dr. C. N. Stanhope, School Physician have certainly given more service to our schools during the past year than they have been paid for. With Whooping cough, measles, and chicken-pox prevalent their services have been required almost daily during the past ten weeks. Many of our boys and girls have lost a great many days. In many cases children will have to repeat their grades. It is unfortunate that communicable diseases cannot be checked. Parents should be more cautious and cooperate to meet the requirements of our State laws regarding these diseases.

At the beginning of this winter term Miss Barbara. Miller, Music Supervisor, tendered her resignation to the School Committee. Miss Miller's work for the past three years has been very outstanding. Graduation and musical functions put on by her have received! many tributes. It was with regret that the School Committee accepted her resignation and the loss of her services is deeply felt by all. To fill Miss Miller's position the committee was most fortunate in securing the services of Miss Gertrude Gately, a graduate of Lowell Teachers' College, Degree of Music. Miss Gately comes to us very highly recommended and is carrying out the work in both, the Academy and Elementary schools very satisfactorily.

The Coming Year

Another Municipal Year of 36 weeks ended February 22. The school department is pleased that the Common School account shows a substantial balance. All schools have been well furnished with books and supplies. No additional expense has been incurred that was not necessary. The maximum wage of \$22.75 for principals and 22.00 for other teachers has been maintained.

The great need at the present time in our school system is some method of closer supervision of our boys and girls regarding communicable diseases. It is impossible to prevent all cases, but it does seem as though, under adequate supervision, the spread of these diseases could be kept from the Epidemic state, and prevent the serious interruption of our school work. such as has occurred this winter. Many children have been absent 1/4 to 1/2 the time school has been maintained since September 11, due to sickness. Isn't it possible through the several departments of the town that the services of a full time nurse and welfare worker would be an economical investment for the people of Dover-Foxcroft? I am sure that the school committee would be pleased to co-operate if a plan of this kind was thought feasible.

Your Committee, as last year, has submitted to your Town Budget Committee a complete financial record of the standing of your school accounts, together with an explanation of the expenditures. Also, the plans which they contemplate for the coming year and the amount of funds necessary to maintain the schools for the next municipal year. They have exercised the best of judgment, having given freely of their time that your school money should be spent efficiently and economically. Your school board and Superintendent are always ready to discuss any school problem which you wish to bring before them, and constructive criticism from interested citizens is appreciated.

I appreciate the cooperation of my School Committee, the Board of Selectmen, Parents and Citizens, Teachers, Boys and Girls. I thank all for your interest in your schools during the past year.

THE BUILDING

Only necessary repairs to the building have been made. The addition of six folding tables constructed under the ERA for use in assembly room for library and study purposes had added measurably to the utility of this room. In a short time ten new typewriting tables similarly constructed will bring the equipment of the commercial department to a better standard.

The time cannot be wisely delayed much longer when the building must undergo extensive improvement to meet the needs of the school.

The school Program

For the second year the school program has been conducted on the longer school period and longer school day. The advantages of this reorganization have become more pronounced. It enables the faculty to better adapt the curriculum to the needs and aptitudes of individual students; it makes possible better provision for study and the use of boks in the school library; labratory periods for the science classes and commercial classes are more easily arranged and with greater eocnomy of time; and as a result there is evidence of improved mastery on the part of the students.

New courses have been added as follows:

General Business Training has been offered as an elective to Junior and Senior Students in the English Curriculum.

The history courses are being reorganized in the English Curriculum as follows: 2nd. year World History, 3rd. year American History; 4th. year American Problems. This year the World History was introduced. In three years the full change will be accomplished.

Speech training is offered to the sopohomore and freshman classes for a period of six weeks.

While the present reorganization of our school has done much to increase efficiency yet another step remains to be taken. This step calls for a careful revision of the school curriculum. Our curriculum is built to serve the needs of a specialized type of intelligence: the type that can read, speak, and write. It has been amply demonstrated that the ability of many students lies in other directions. To improve the older type of curriculum content and to add such new materials and courses as a careful survey of our local needs and resources will justify would seem to be the aim of such revision.

In conclusion, I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to all who have made possible the successful operation of Foxcroft Academy for the year just passed and especially to the members of the Joint Committee, the Board of Trustees, Superinten-

dent of Schools, and parents of pupils.

To Perry F. Shibles, Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as Music Supervisor of the public schools of Dover-Foxcroft and Music Director of Foxcroft Academy for the

school year 1934-1935.

John Galsworthy, in his Candelabra says: "Beauty alone, in the largest sense of the word has civilized mankind and if our civilization is to endure, it must have an ideal on which to fix its gaze—something to draw it on beyond the troubled needs of the moment. In these unsuperstitious days no ideal seems possible save beauty: and the teaching of what beauty is to all, through the fine arts, music, literature and painting, to children even in the humblest schools, should be our castle in Spain."

We start toward this ideal in the child's first year of school by teaching him to use his voice properly. This is accomplished through the mediums of rote songs and tone drills. Special attention is given to the child who has not yet found his singing voice or who is pitch latent. Daily drill has accomplished amazing results from the board as presented and each year a new new problem is introduced until the student has learned to read unison, two, three and four part music with little difficulty. In each grade tone quality, which is developed through proper breathing and voice placement, is stressed. The Christmas assemblies in each school showed vast improvement in this line.

In the upper grades memorizing a group of well known songs such as "Auld Lang Syne" and "Love's Old Sweet Song" has been a required part of the music. program.

Appreciation of music through rhythm drill, rhythm bands and the use of records is teaching the child to listen intelligently to music.

Since departmental work in the town schools has been in effect, amazing results in the music department have been possible. It is hoped that this work may

continue.

The extra-curricular activities have met with great enthusiasm this year. The E. M. Smith Music Club holds a regular monthly meeting with a fine program given by the students. Music pins are presented by the club to all new members. The Grammar School Voice Classes are doing splendid work. A group of new students are learning the rudiments of vocal technique, while last year's class is developing not only unusual tone quality, but proper phrasing and interpretation.

The Grammar School Glee Club has been one of the most interesting and enjoyable features of the work. The enthusiasm of these students can only compare with their exceptional ability. As an organization they planned and served at the Chapel in November, a supper, the proceeds of which went toward operetta books. The operetta, Yanki San, which has been started, parts chosen and music well under way, was to have been presented during National Music Week. It is sincerely hoped that this may be carried on.

The schools have furnished music for most of the Parent-Teacher meetings and the children feel honored if they are chosen to sing or play there.

Last year the eighth grade graduation play was coached by the music supervisor and in this play several of the more talented students were featured.

The rural school work is carried on as nearly as possible in the manner of that in the town schools. New books were again put into these schools and the children are enjoying them thoroughly. A notebook project is being worked out in conjunction with the new books by locating on maps the country from which each folk song comes. East Dover students have been most interested in rhythm band work this year. In fact, some of the older students have written scores for rhythm band records. At Christmas, Brockway school presented an operetta which was very well received.

At Foxcroft Academy the three credit courses were organized as usual with a chorus of 110, band of 12 and orchestra of 18. The orchestra has played several times for town affairs. The Girls' Glee Club, the membership of which has greatly increased this year, followed out its annual custom of singing Christmas carols to shut-ins. Members of the Girls' Conducting Class have taken over several chorus periods and have

handled this large group exceptionally well. Last spring the Academy band attended the Eastern Maine State Music Festival at Belfast, marching in the parade and playing with the massed bands. The inspiration derived from that trip has carried over noticeably. Another phase of this work, Castine Music Camp, lends instruction and inspiration. One student attended last year and with the help of one of the town clubs along with the music department it is hoped that part expenses of several students may be paid this year. A trio and a clarinet quartet are two new Academy groups. Small group work is most interesting and beneficial to students. The music department made plans for a Cabaret to be presented in March and they hope to continue this work.

May I say here that my work in Dover-Foxcroft has always been most pleasant and that 1 shall always be interested in the progress of the music department. Let me express my sincere appreciation to the superintendent, principals, teachers and parents for their

very splendid co-operation and interest.

- Art. 12. To choose one or more Constables.
- Art. 13. To choose all other officers to be elected at the annual meeting.
- Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Common Schools.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Free High Schools.
- Art. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for textbooks for Common Schools.

vote to raise and appropriate for Boys' and Girls' Agricultural clubs within the town.

- Art. 50. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Thompson Free Library.
- Art. 51. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for abatements.

- Art. 59. To see if the Town will ratify the action of the Superintending School Committee in making agreement with the Trustees of East Dover Grange and Mrs. Nellie Downs for use of water from the East Dover school well.

- Art. 60. To see if the Town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to make suitable arrangements with our citizens of East Dover for use of water from East Dover School well.
- Art. 61. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eleven Hundred Dollars (\$1100) to reimburse the School Department for Academy overdraft in 1934.
- Art. 62. To see if the Town will vote to install two (2) electric lights on Grove Street and raise and appropriate Twenty-Four Dollars (\$24) to pay for same.
- Art. 63. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1200) to be expended for a night officer or other police protection and the regulation of traffic or take any action thereon. (Per petition of M. S. Blethen and 75 others.)
- Art. 64. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000) to pay on Bonds.
- Art. 65. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Hundred Forty Dollars (\$1140) to pay interest on bonds for the ensuing year.
- Art. 66. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue three short term notes of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) each to take care of Tax loans not paid, until available assets come in.
- Art. 67. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) to balance the accounts for the year 1934.
