REPORT OF NURSING SERVICE

February 1, 1936 to February 1, 1937
TO BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND CITIZENS OF
DOVER-FOXCROFT:

Our aim is to teach nealth protection and prevention of disease and to give assistance with all community problems.

During September and October the nurse completed her inspection at East Dover, Macomber's Corner, Brockway, South Dover, Norton Hill and Bear Hill schools, and assisted the school physician in his physical examination. The pupils at North Street school were also completed except for hearing which is to be done with the audiometer which has been loaned by the Maine Public Health Association for February.

170 corrections since last examination were reported, throats 86, teeth 44, vision 37 and ears 3. Notices of defects were sent to parent or guardian with advice that the child be taken to the family doctor. Glasses have been secured for six school children.

The outstanding health project for the year was the case-finding program in Tuberculosis. Where written request was filed by parents or guardian the Von Pirquet test was given and all children reacting were provided with an X-ray. Only one child was recommended to have sanatorium treatment. We are indebted to Dr. Cromwell of Fairfield Sanatorium for examin-

ing children and Miss Gay their field nurse for doing tests and taking X-rays, also the Nurses' Guild who helped with the cost of X-rays.

Special classroom inspections were given by the school physician and nurse at Pleasant Street school for mumps and at North Street and Bear Hill for symptoms of communicable skin disease; a few were excluded.

Assistance was given in arranging the P.T.A. Summer Round-Up and at the Infant pre-school clinic held in connection with "Hospital Day."

Tuberculin was secured and tests given to five families. Two applications were filed for the sanatorium. Two patients were accompanied to Fairfield, one for an X-ray who was later admitted as a patient. One patient was taken to a physician in Milo. Assistance has been given at operations and anaesthesia given by nurse. Many home visits of investigation, instructive, and social service nature, as well as to give bedside care, to meet an emergency, have been made.

Office and telephone calls, conferences with doctors, superintendent of schools, selectmen and State social worker have been many. All calls have been answered and taken care of or turned over to the proper authorities to care for.

In July a pre-school clinic was held at the Chapel, the use of which was kindly given by the Community Church. This was well attended and much interest shown. Dr. E. D. Merrill who so kindly gives his services, was the examining physician.

In August a new health worker, Miss Lucy Clark, (who will work with the mothers and pre-school children) was added to the county workers under the auspices of the Bureau of Health, thus making it possible for your Nurse to give more service to school children and Tuberculosis patients.

We express our appreciation and wish to thank the town for its financial support of the county health work.

**SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT FOR
DOVER-FOXCROFT TOWN REPORT**

The school year of 1936 ending last June was most satisfactory. There were very few absences due to sickness. The progress and grade of work in our schools was excellent. The present year, because of the epidemic of mumps, has been somewhat broken. It is questionable, many times, just how to handle an epidemic in our schools. Your physician, health officer and school officials were advised from the State Bureau of Health as to the method to use in the control of mumps in town.

Ranking is one angle of the school work which has always been a problem to the teacher, the parents, and without doubt most disturbing to the child concerned. The child who fails to grade feels that he is a failure, which is not true. The point is, that he has not achieved the standard set for a passing grade. The reason in seventy-five per cent of the cases for children not meeting grade standards is not mental inability, but rather wrong grade placement, due in most cases, to children entering school before they are ready for school work. With the cooperation of parents and guardians, the necessity of repeating grades would be

very small. The results would be pleasing to the teachers, parents, and pupils, at the same time a saving in dollars and cents would be realized by the town.

An article has been placed in the town warrant which reads as follows: "To see if the town will vote to authorize the School Committee to discontinue the operation of the Brockway and Macomber schools." Certain parents of this section have asked if a plan to convey children to the grade schools in town could not be worked out. It is possible to buy a bus and convey the pupils of these two schools to town which would not increase the grades to any extent. At present we are conveying seventeen to twenty children from the North Street to Pleasant Street school. A program has been presented to the Budget Committee, showing costs of maintaining the two schools and the cost of conveying with bus. By this plan, one teacher would be moved to the North Street school and the room now used as dining-room would be converted into an extra classroom, which would take care of the over load existing at the present time, thereby doing away with the conveyance across town. The State will pay \$500 toward the cost of the bus and the saving estimated at \$600 per year, applied toward the balance would pay for the bus at the end of two years.

Due to new families moving into the Macomber section, your School Committee found it advisable to reopen the Macomber school, which will increase the school expense to June, \$644. Miss Frances Webber, a graduate of the three-year normal course at Presque Isle Normal School was elected as teacher.

At the beginning of the school year Miss Dorothy Packard, second grade teacher at North Street, asked the School Committee for a leave of absence for the school year because of ill health. Mrs. Stella Ayer has been substituting in this position.

During the fall term Mrs. Mildred Pratt was taken ill with pneumonia. Mrs. Elinor Tripp is substituting in her grade at North Street school.

Mr. Leon Andrews, a graduate of Machias Normal School with several years' experience in schools of the Southwest Harbor Union, was elected teacher of Grade 7B in the Grammar School, vacated by Mr. John Harri-man. Mr. Andrews is taking a great interest in his

work, both in the school room and in outside activities.

All your teachers with the exception of two, attended the State convention in Lewiston, and all attended the County convention held at Sangerville. The fine spirit of cooperation of past years has been maintained by your teachers.

Miss Gertrude Gately, music teacher in our system, put on a very excellent cantata for grammar school graduation last June. It was recognized by all as a very fine piece of work by teacher and graduates. Miss Villa E. Hayden, Field Agent for Rural Education from the State Department, whose special phase of school work is music, visited our schools during the fall term. She spoke in highest terms of the work being done in the Music Department. Miss Hayden also visited the Boys' Band and complimented the American Legion for its interest in education. She was much impressed with the progress made by the members of the band.

Dr. C. N. Stanhope, school physician for the past sixteen years having received an appointment by the State Bureau of Health as Health Officer of District No. 2, resigned from his position. Dr. Stanhope is to be congratulated on his period of service, in which he gave freely of his time and medical advice. Dr. Ruth B. Thomas was elected to the vacancy and is carrying on the work in a very satisfactory manner to all concerned.

Mrs. Louise Nichols, County Health nurse for the past several years, a position which she very ably filled, resigned to take up other state work and Miss Clye Ricker, R. N. has carried on the work, cooperating with our schools very efficiently.

The report of the Academy will be found elsewhere in this report. As I stated last year, the long period program has proven very satisfactory and at the present time we find most of the more progressive schools of the state organizing this form of class schedule.

Those connected with the schools, as well as the townspeople, regretted the resignation of Mr. Arnold G. Westerberg, teacher of History, who was carrying on a very efficient and much talked-of Social Studies program. Mr. Westerberg accepted a more lucrative position as a member of the Auburn High School faculty.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

With the appropriation asked for books at this

year's town meeting, it will be possible to bring our books up to a very satisfactory standard. The following introductions were made: elementary community civics grade eight, histories grade four, geographies grade five, science readers for grades four, five and six, two sets of supplementary reading for Sub-primary, grades one and two. One hundred dictionaries were purchased, completing the supply for all grades above the third. One nature library was purchased for the Grammar school.

The supplies furnished our schools is very liberal compared with that furnished by many other systems. However, this amounts to only a dollar per pupil and to the minds of your Superintendent and School Committee, this is one of the most economical accounts, for the service that it gives, of the school appropriations.

At the present time we are taking advantage of a W. P. A. project employing one woman who is working in the office repairing books and doing other work that is not done by those connected with the schools.

REPAIRS

Mr. Pearl, as in past years, is delegated general supervision of repairs by the School Committee and his work has been well done. Repairs for the year were as follows: North Street; one piazza roof retimbered, boarded and covered with steel roofing, another, was covered with steel roofing. Pleasant Street: one lean-to roof was covered. A porch with cement floor was constructed on the south end of the Grammar School building. New sills and porch floor were laid at East Dover. The Norton Hill and Bear Hill chimneys were re-topped. The furniture in a number of the school-rooms was re-varnished and general repairs were carefully looked after. By this method, your school buildings are in excellent condition. Whenever members of the state department have visited the buildings, they have mentioned not only the quality of work but also the splendid condition of the buildings.

Beginning last year and continuing through the present, your librarians have cooperated with the schools in many ways. The use of a travelling library instituted some years ago but for some reason dropped, has been revived. Each year the rural schools are serviced with five boxes of books, totalling one hundred

and fifty copies. This service has meant a great deal to our rural school children and is much appreciated by your Superintendent and teachers.

THE COMING YEAR

Again your school department is pleased to report substantial balances in most accounts, none carrying an overdraft. The maximum wages for teachers remains the same as last year. Conveyance costs due to favorable conditions have again been reduced. Further reductions would seem at the present impossible and it is quite likely that changes may increase this account considerably. For this reason your committee have asked the Budget Committee for an additional five hundred dollars for the support of common schools, appropriations for other accounts remaining the same.

Your committee members have continued their untiring interest in your schools, which has been manifested during my period of work with them. Their interest is for your schools to steadily progress. They are ready to accept suggestions from any citizen, which will in any way produce better schools for the boys and girls of Dover-Foxcroft to attend.

The past year has been one of cooperation among teachers, pupils, parents, school committee and other town officials. It is a pleasant situation and one which is enjoyable to work in as Superintendent. In closing I wish to extend my personal thanks for the splendid cooperation accorded me during the year.

THE BUILDING

During the past year, the Building Committee has found it necessary to install a new boiler for the heating system at a considerable expense. This will have to be financed in the future. Thirty new student desks have been installed to meet the increased enrollment.

Two new drinking fountains have been installed on the first floor to replace the one previously located there. New plumbing has been installed in the Science laboratory.

New treads have been laid on all stairs above the basement. The grading about the building has been completed, the loam for which was donated by Mr. Thompson L. Guernsey. Students assisted in grading as an Arbor Day project.

To do the above has stretched the budget severely, but all excepting the boiler have been financed out of this year's budget.

THE SCHOOL PROGRAM

The school program is being carried on with little change from that of a year ago. As these reports have indicated, in the past four years Foxcroft Academy has developed its program with a change of the school day from seven periods of 45 minutes each to a day of five periods of 70 minutes each. The past four years have proved the wisdom of the change and have given the faculty some indications of the direction in which further progress may be made. One of these is the school library. Our yearly budget carries a substantial provision for the library and has helped our program. The results of what has been done point to the conclusion that additional provisions along this line with a trained teacher-librarian would be most beneficial to the success of our work.

In conclusion, may I again express my deep appreciation to all who have so generously co-operated to make the operation of Foxcroft Academy so successful. Especially are we indebted to parents, members of the Board of Trustees, Building Committee, the Joint Committee of Trustees and School Board, and the Superintendent of Schools.

To Perry F. Shibles, Supt. of Schools:

I herewith submit my third annual report as music supervisor in the schools of Dover-Foxcroft.

Last spring the programs for exhibition week of the various schools were largely musical. Pleasant street and North street schools each gave an operetta. The Grammar school Glee Club and Orchestra also performed during this week. Last year's orchestra was exceptionally well balanced for a Grammar school. Several of the players have graduated leaving this year's orchestra weak in certain sections. The Boys' Band which the American Legion is sponsoring has helped fill out both the Academy and Grammar school orchestra greatly. We now need many more violins in both organizations. Violin classes are not as well attended as they should be. It is well for a pupil to start violin study as low as the fourth grade in order that he may be sufficiently skilled in his instrument to play in the orchestra through the Grammar school and the Academy.

Having an exceptional graduating class, musically speaking, it was decided to give the Cantata "Caravan" by Richard Kountz for our graduating exercises last year. The children worked diligently on it and did a very acceptable piece of work.

Several Academy students went to Castine last summer to attend the State Music Camp. The music department sent two. It is hoped that many more will attend this year.

The Academy Band has been playing for all the home basketball games. The orchestra played for the Senior play and for a state meeting which was held in Dover-Foxcroft.

The Glee Club and the girls' voice class are preparing to put on an operetta "Hollywood Bound" sometime in April. It is very light and amusing. The girls and boys are enjoying putting it on.

I wish to thank the Superintendent, Teachers and Parents for their cooperation during the past year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN FOR YEAR 1936-7**To Superintendent Perry F. Shibles:**

The function of a school medical service is three-fold:

1. To limit as far as possible the spread of communicable disease among the school population.
2. To discover and urge correction of remediable defects among school children which, in the light of present medical knowledge, are known to have a bearing upon their present and future health.
3. To supplement the home training in health education among school children, partly by precept and partly by the example set by the foregoing activities.

In the execution of these functions, a medical inspection of students in the lower schools and in Foxcroft Academy for the school year 1936-7 has been carried out, with the invaluable help of Miss Ricker and the generous co-operation of the school personnel. Particular attention was paid to such communicable diseases as impetigo and scabies (itch), and the relatively few cases found were excluded until the condition was cleared up. Early in the school year mumps made its appearance in one school. An attempt was made to check its spread by examination of all the exposed students, and exclusion of all suspects and contacts for the duration of the incubation period. The infection continued to spread through the town, probably because not all cases were reported from the homes and not all members of the community co-operated in maintaining quarantine of infected persons. The usual policy of excluding susceptible contacts from school was found therefore to be ineffective, and was discontinued. Better results were obtained with the few cases of German measles that appeared. So far this year the influenza epidemic is the only other infectious disease that has caused much absence.

The number of children in the lower schools inspected, and the defects found and recorded, are given in the report of the county nurse. Reference to the figures will show that dental defects are most numerous. Others which are all too frequent are disease conditions

of the nose and throat, faulty posture of varying degrees, poor nutrition, and errors of vision. In a number of cases correction of defects has been postponed for years. This is regrettable because by the time the correction is finally made, the other physical changes resulting from the original defect have become so well established that the individual will in many cases carry them through life. For example enlarged adenoids which cause partial blocking of the upper air passages and mouth breathing bring about not only an increased likelihood of ear infection and consequent impairment of hearing, but an inadequate growth of the structures of the nose so that even if later the adenoids themselves are removed, the faulty nose development continues to give trouble.

In this climate some defects, such as nose and throat abnormalities, are perhaps not always preventable. Other defects which occur with all too great frequency are, however, in many cases due to errors in hygiene and could to a great extent be prevented by faithful and well-instructed attention to the daily living. Many cases of underweight are the result not only of poor eating habits and an improperly balanced diet, but, especially in ambitious and active children, of years of too much stimulation and too little rest. It seems to the medical inspector highly undesirable for those children whose nutrition is markedly below standard, or who are actually losing weight, to take part in strenuous or competitive athletics. The possibility of real damage to the individual's health is not to be ignored.

Faulty posture appears in the younger grades in relatively slight but easily perceptible degree, and grows steadily more noticeable with increasing age. It is perhaps more pronounced in poorly nourished children whose muscles are not firm, but there can be no doubt that in the vast majority of cases some degree of chronic fatigue is a very important cause. The correction of this defect should begin before it starts, with adequate rest in the early years.

So many defects in school children are traceable to the lack, in their early environment, of knowledge, means or determination for prevention, that the third function of the school medical service, namely health education of future citizens, is by no means the least

important. Even the relatively limited examination which can be carried on under school conditions, and which may necessarily overlook some defects, will, we hope, contribute toward rearing a future generation that is not only of higher physical standard, but intelligently appreciative of that standard.

To Charles E. Washburn, or any Constable of the Town
of Dover-Foxcroft in the County of Piscataquis:

GREETING.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Dover-Foxcroft qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Central Hall in said Town, on Monday the eighth day of March, A. D., 1937, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk, fix the compensation and raise and appropriate money therefor.

ART. 3. To choose one selectman for three years and fill any vacancy in accordance with the provisions of the Town by-laws.

ART. 4. To choose one Assessor of Taxes and fill any vacancy in accordance with the provisions of the Town by-laws.

ART. 5. To choose one Overseer of the Poor and fill any vacancy in accordance with provisions of the Town by-laws.

ART. 6. To choose a Town Treasurer, fix the compensation, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

ART. 7. To choose a Collector of Taxes, fix the compensation, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

ART. 8. To choose an Auditor of accounts.

ART. 9. To choose a member of the School Committee for three years and fill any vacancy in accordance with the provisions of the Town by-laws.

ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to accept the report as printed.

ART. 11. To see if the town will vote that the Selectmen act as Road Commissioners.

ART. 12. To choose one or more Constables.

ART. 13. To choose one or more Road Commissioners.

ART. 14. To choose one member of the Board of Trustees of the Mayo Memorial Hospital, for not more than three years.

ART. 15. To choose all other officers to be elected at the annual meeting.

ART. 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Common Schools.

ART. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Free High School.

ART. 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for textbooks for Common Schools.

ART. 19. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school telephones, lights and water service.

ART. 20. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for services of the School Committee.

ART. 21. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on school houses.

ART. 22. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school supplies.

ART. 23. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary for Superintendent of Schools.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the School Committee to appoint a school physician in accordance with provisions of Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

ART. 25. To see if the town will authorize the School Committee to make arrangements with the

Trustees of Foxcroft Academy for tuition for its High School scholars.

ART. 26. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance on school buildings.

ART. 27. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for officers' bills and miscellaneous expenses.

ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to purchase the bonds for the Treasurer and Collector.

ART. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salaries and expenses of the Board of Health and recording Vital Statistics.

ART. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Sewer Maintenance.

ART. 31. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for construction and repairs of sidewalks.

ART. 32. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for general repairs of highways and bridges.

ART. 33. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Road Patrol.

ART. 34. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of raising and appropriating money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid in accordance with the provisions of Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

ART. 35. To see what sum the town will appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 173, Public Laws of 1935.

ART. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred and Thirty-

five (\$1235) for the maintenance of Third Class Road.

ART. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to treat the village streets against dust.

ART. 41. To see if the town will vote to, and elect one member of the Board of Mothers' Aid for three years.

ART. 42. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day.

ART. 43. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts or other music.

ART. 44. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the services of a Public Health Nurse or take any action thereon.

ART. 45. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

ART. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Sixty-five Dollars (\$365) to pay Wester Blethen and wife one dollar per day for the ensuing year.

ART. 47. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Boys' and Girls' Agricultural clubs within the town.

ART. 48. To see how much money the town

will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Thompson Free Library.

ART. 49. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for abatements.

ART. 50. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising the advantages and attractions of Dover-Foxcroft and Sebec Lake, money to be turned over to the Town Club for same purpose.

ART. 51. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to make a temporary loan not exceeding \$35,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

ART. 52. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver release deeds for the town to convey the town's interest in lands previously sold to the town for taxes.

ART. 53. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer and Collector to refuse payment on all orders given while persons receiving the same are indebted to the town.

ART. 54. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to locate and install a light on Autumn Avenue near residence of Elwin Pingree, and to raise and appropriate an amount therefor.

ART. 55. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended for a night officer and the regulation of traffic, or take any action thereon.

ART. 56. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand dollars (\$3,000) to pay on Bond Issue of 1934.

ART. 57. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred dollars (\$900) to pay interest on bonds for the ensuing year.

ART. 58. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand dollars (\$5,000) to pay on indebtedness of 1935.

ART. 59. To see if the town will vote to raise

and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Seventy-three dollars and Ninety-six cents (\$973.96) to pay interest on indebtedness of 1935.

In comparison with last year please note that \$5,250.00 was voted at Town Meeting for tractor, \$100 for Town Club and \$1,500.00 for Police Protection that was not included in Budget recommendations. This year we have, in anticipation of your vote, included the Town Club and Police Protection with an additional \$5,000.00 for Support of Poor, \$5,000.00 for Bond to be retired and \$973.00 interest which we trust will enable the Town Officers to meet all appropriations and eliminate any deficits.

We would call attention to the fact that any increase in appropriations over the amount which we have recommended, if in an amount which will not be covered by the overlay, will necessarily mean an increase in the rate over .049. We do not feel that it is for us to say at what rate the tax should be kept, but we do feel that it is proper for us to recommend that every possible effort be made by all municipal officers charged with the expenditure of money to keep within appropriations. We regard it as more important to keep our expenditures within our available resources than to try to keep our tax rate at any arbitrary figure. It is no advantage to the tax payers to keep the tax rate down unless the expenditures can be kept within the limits of the money produced by that rate.
