All Taxpayers should read the following requirements and comply with them:

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930:

"Ferore making an assessment, the Assessors shall give reasonable notice in writing to the Inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in town, or shall notify them, in such other ways as the Town at its Annual Meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists, of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner, after such notice, does not bring in such lists he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed."

In accordance with the request of your municipal officers, this department, represented by F. A. Doble and M. E. Libby, has completed an examination of the accounts of your town officials for the municipal year ended February 1, 1942.

Our report, herewith submitted, was prepared from your town records and, to the best of our knowledge and belief, properly reflects the true financial condition of your municipality as of that date; subject however to a probable shrinkage in the final settlement of uncollected taxes, tax liens and deeds.

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COMMENTS

CASH:

All cash recorded as received was properly accounted for and is summarized on Exhibit B.

Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants as summarized on Exhibits B and D.

The cash balance was reconciled with the bank as per detail shown by Schedule 1.

The Food Stamp Fund was verified and the total was represented by stamp books on hand, cash, and vouchers due from the state, other towns and the town charity account.

TAXES:

The 1941 tax commitment was added and found to agree with the Assessors' records. The total commitment was accounted for by cash, abatements, or was still unpaid as shown by Schedule 2.

The unpaid balances on prior years' taxes were checked for payment and those still unpaid, according to the records, are shown by Schedule 2.

TAX LIENS AND DEEDS:

All tax liens, tax deeds and Sheriff's deeds on file were checked and are shown by Schedules 3, 4 and 5.

All tax liens in the hands of Attorney Harold M. Hayes for collection or execution were checked with his secretary and found to agree with the lists which are carried on the Selectmen's ledger.

TRUST FUNDS:

All savings pass books covering trust fund investments were examined and the detail is shown by Schedule 8. It appeared that all income had been properly accounted for.

LEDGER:

It is our suggestion that in the future the General Expense account be broken down under the following classifications:

Town Manager's Salary

Town Office Expense

Municipal Building Income and Expense

Election Expense

Miscellaneous Expense

GENERAL:

A partial check was made of paid bills and payrolls and as far as our examination went, all appeared to be proper charges and correctly recorded.

With the exception of cash, trust funds and food stamps, no external verification was made of your asset or liability accounts.

The George Babson account was checked and although it does not form a part of this report, a schedule of same is included.

This fund is held in trust by the Merrill Trust Company of Bangor and is loaned to worthy students for higher education with the approval of the local Board of Trustees.

The notes and savings pass books are in the possession of the Town Treasurer.

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REPORT OF TOWN MANAGER To the Board of Selectmen, and citizens of Dover-Foxcroft:

Herewith is submitted a report on Town affairs for the past year.

Town Debt

The Town debt has been reduced \$8,000.00 since the last report. This was accomplished by paying a note of \$5,000.00 and bonds amounting to \$3,000.00. This brings the total outstanding debt down to \$9,000.00. This indebtedness is in the form of bonds which were issued in 1934, and which mature at the rate of \$3,000.00 each year. The last of these bonds will be paid in 1944.

Taxes

The amount of uncollected 1941 taxes at the close of the fiscal year, February 1, 1942 was \$7,603.81, which appears to be the smallest amount for many years. Much credit is due the taxpayers of Dover-Foxcroft for their efforts in bringing about this splendid condition which has enabled the Town to pay its bills each week throughout the year. Several 1941 taxes have been paid since the books were closed. These are indicated by a star in front of the name in the Town Report.

Charities

The total expenditures for direct relief for the year 1941 was \$13,897.83. A large amount of this expense was for medical care, and hospitalization. The Food Stamp Plan which went into effect in August 1941, has not reflected a savings to the Town, but it has enabled those families who could participate, to have a more adequate supply of food for the money expended.

Highways

During the summer of 1941, 1500 feet of State Aid Highway was built in East Dover, extending toward Sebec. 1,200 feet of Third Class Highway was constructed on the Anderson Road, an extension of the Third Class construction of 1940. It is not certain at this time whether or not the State will allocate any funds for either State Aid or Third Class road construction for 1942, owing to the reduced amount of in-

come from the Gas Tax, and registration of automobiles, caused by the Civilian Defense curtailment of the sale of tires and new automobiles. \$1,000.00 in Special Resolve money was spent on the Range Road where 800 feet of improved road was built last year. This was a continuation of the Special Resolve construction of the past three years. It is expected that the same amount will be available from the State for the coming year. If the money is available, construction on the Range Road will be continued. \$1,030.00 received from the State in 1941 for the Improvement of unimproved highways was spent on the Back Road to East Dover, where several new steel culverts were placed, and the remainder of the money was spent for graveling. We feel that this road will show a great improvement the coming spring. River and Mayo Streets and Court Street from Main to River Street were tarred this year in addition to the streets that were previously treated. At least a part of the new W. P. A. construction should be tarred in 1942.

Sidewalks and Sewers

Sidewalk construction was curtailed this year on account of not being able to obtain sufficient material. However quite extensive repairs were made on the sidewalk in Merrick Square, and on Lincoln and Green Streets. It is hoped that material will be obtained for sidewalk work the coming year.

377 feet of new sewer was built on Union Street, between the Railroad Crossing and Lincoln Street, connecting with the sewer which empties into the river. It was necessary to construct three catch basins on this project. A catch basin was constructed on Pearl Street near Merrick Square, to catch the water which runs into Pearl Street from the Square, and which in the past has runover the sidewalk and across the property beyond. The remainder of the sewer appropriation was spent on Green Street sewer, where 575 feet of 10 inch pipe was laid to replace the original' 4 inch pipe, which has given considerable trouble during the past year. We have a sufficient quantity of pipe to complete the remainder of the job, which we plan to finish as soon as the frost is out of the ground in the spring.

Lunger and the st

W. P. A.

During the period from February 1 to May 28, 1941 a W.P.A. crew of 25 men were employed on drainage and construction of Town streets. During that period work was done on Morse Ave., Paul, Forest, Hancock and Mechanic Streets. These streets were ditched and graveled, and should be passable at all seasons of the year. It is recommended that as much of this work as possible be treated with tar the coming summer, in order to preserve the surface, and control the dust. On May 28, 1941 the entire W. P. A. crew was transferred to the Dexter Airport Project, where they have since been employed.

N. Y. A.

The N. Y. A. Sewing Project which operated very efficiently at Central Hall under the supervision of Miss Barbara Livermore, in making new garments, and remodeling and repairing used garments for the Dover-Foxcroft Town Club, to be distributed to the needy families of our Town, was terminated in November 1941, and all except three girls who were assigned to the School Lunch Project, as waitresses, were automatically dropped from the Project at that time.

Owing to the many services required by the State Civilian Defense Corps, the duties of your Town Manager have been greatly increased. All branches of the Civilian Defense set-up have been organized, and are functioning at the present time. Information regarding any branch of the organization may be obtained at the Town Manager's Office. More than 1600 men and women of Dover-Foxcroft have registered for Civilian Defense work by filling out and signing the regular registration cards. We feel that this is a splendid testimonial of the loyalty of our citizens in a time of National emergency.

In closing I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Selectmen for their wholehearted cooperation in conducting the affairs of the town during the past year. Also the citizens of Dover-Foxcroft for their co-operation and helpful suggestions, which have led to the better solution of many problems. I want especially at this time to thank the employees in the Town Office and in all of the departments, for their loyalty and cooperation. They have given freely of their time and best efforts for the benefit of the town. It is only through the close cooperation of the Municipal Officers, the citizens and the employees, that the most economical and efficient government can be made possible.

The Town Office is open each business day from 8:30 to 12 and from 1 to 5, except Saturday, when it closes at noon. The Town Manager will be glad to have any citizen come to the office during these hours for any available information, and will welcome any suggestion for the improvement of any service which the Town Office can render to the people.

The part of the year that I have been here has been a happy one, and I am proud to be the Superintendent of Schools of Dover-Foxcroft. I sincerely hope that during my term of office the schools will continue to provide sound education and continue to progress as they did under my predecessor. I wish to take this opportunity to thank you and other citizens, for the cordial welcome which my family and I have received in your community.

Schools have been maintained thirty-six weeks closing the municipal year, February 1, 1942. It will be observed that the common school account shows a balance of \$5173.17 which is necessary to cover the payroll up until the new appropriations are made. This year, as a result of a vote of the teachers, half are receiving their salary on a twenty payment plan, and the others on a twenty-four payment plan. Beginning the school year 1942-43 all teachers and janitors will receive their salary on a twenty-four payment plan, and conveyance drivers on the twenty payment plan.

There have been some changes in the personnel of our schools this year as follows:

The Grammar School had two vacancies in its teaching staff at the end of the school year 1940-41. These were filled by Mr. Russell W. Perry and Mr. Lewis Scott. Mr. Perry is a graduate of Farmington State Normal School and has had six years teaching experience, several of which have been as a principal. He was employed last year as a teacher in the Waterville Junior High School. Mr. Perry is Principal of our Grammar School, teaches seventh and eight grade mathematics and general science, and directs the athletic program of the school. Mr. Scott was graduated from the threeyear course at Farmington State Normal School in 1941, and is teaching seventh and eighth grade English and Music. He works with the Music Supervisor in all musical activities of the school and also assists with the boys' athletics. The other teachers at the Grammar School are the same as last year and are all doing a splendid piece of work.

The fact that there were two new teachers entering the Grammar School last fall, made a few changes necessary. This was done after careful consideration. Miss Crockett, former principal, was made Dean of Girls, a position which is proving to be a valuable one in the school. She teaches spelling, writing and has all

of the art, including grades three, four, and five of the Pleasant Street School This is made possible by an exchange of teaching duties in the two schools. A departmentalized program is functioning successfully in the Grammar School, whereby the boys and girls pass to the different rooms for the various classes. This plan helps to bridge the gap between the Grammar School and the Academy by giving pupils the practice of moving about in an orderly, but informal manner, and of having several different teachers. Stress is also being given this year in home work for the seventh and eighth grade pupils. A schedule developed by the principal and teachers, is followed so that pupils have one lesson a night to prepare at home, and never more than one. The assignments for grade seven are such as to require approximately thirty minutes of the child's time and those in grade eight approximately forty-five minutes each night. The main objective of such a plan is not primarily for the homework itself, but for the purpose of teaching the boys and girls to assume such a responsibility so that they may be better prepared for greater responsibilities in the Academy.

The teaching staff at the Pleasant Street School has two new members this year in the persons of Miss Martha Green in the Sub-Primary, and Miss Corinne Johnson in Grade I. Miss Green, of Dover-Foxcroft was transferred from the Bear Hill rural school. In addition to her sub-primary work, Miss Green works with the girls of the Grammar School in their athletic program. Miss Johnson, of Monson, is a graduate of Farmington State Normal School and has had eleven years teaching experience. Both teachers are fitting nicely into the work of the school which is functioning very well due to the fine cooperation of all teachers.

The teaching staff at the North Street School remains the same as last year with fine work being accomplished.

Opportunity Room

Due to a crowded condition existing in one of the grades at the North Street School during the past several years, the Opportunity Room, previously established in the school, has more or less automatically become a regular classroom. Special study is being given this problem with the expectation that the room will eventually resume its rightful place. Such a room should be of an ungraded nature and consist of pupils who, for various reasons, are retarded in their grade. They may receive more individual attention in such a room and possibly reach the point much sooner where they are able to work with their own group again. It is a room where a child may remain for a year or more, or only for a few weeks as the judgment of the teacherso designates. It is desirable to keep the enrollment down to twenty pupils and to admit children from any classroom in the town.

The vacancy at the Bear Hill school, created by the transfer of Miss Green, was filled during the early part of the year by Mrs. Geneva Campbell Earley of Dover-Foxcroft, who has since resigned. Miss Mary Osborne of Rockland, Massachusetts was secured as the new teacher at this school. Miss Osborne was graduated from Fitchburg Teachers' College in 1940 and holds a Bachelor's degree. She is doing fine work with the boys and girls at Bear Hill.

The teachers at East Dover remain the same as last year and very fine work is being accomplished.

Mrs. Harriett Ladd, a teacher of a number of years teaching experience was engaged as a substitute to fill the vacancy existing at South Dover. The work is going along very well in this school.

Public School Music

Miss Dorothy Dolan of Worcester, Massachusetts, a graduate of Lowell Teachers' College in 1941, was engaged to fill the vacancy existing in the music department. Miss Dolan has very successfully taken over the work in this field and is doing her best to give as many pupils as possible a real appreciation of music. The report of the Supervisor of Music will be found elsewhere in this book and I commend it to your attention.

Physical Education

Mr. Ernest Scribner of Auburn, Maine, a graduate of Springfield College with a degree in Physical Education, was engaged this year as a full-time Director of Physical Education. Mr. Scribner carries on actual classroom work with all pupils of the Academy and supervises the instruction in all of the grades. Special stress is being given in the schools toward better posture and many noticeable results have been observed. Much worthwhile work has been accomplished in this department this year and the only regrettable fact is that the boys and girls of the Academy are obliged to have their physical education classes in Central Hall during the winter months. The hall itself could be made quite satisfactory, but under the present conditions it is necessary for the pupils to travel back and forth from the Academy, thus eliminating the opportunity for a shower bath at the proper time. I sincerely hope that better facilities for a Physical Education and Health Program will be available sometime in the near future.

I commend to your attention the report of the School Physician and County Nurse. Both Dr. Noel and Mrs. Gibbons are working very hard toward the protection and betterment of the health of our boys and girls. Mrs. Gibbons serves the whole county and gives us our proportional share of her time The epidemic of measles which we have just had, and other epidemics which we are sure to have from time to time, serve to emphatically point out the fact that there should be a full-time nurse available in Dover-Foxcroft. The resulting benefits to our boys and girls would more than pay for the extra cost of such a service.

Through the cooperation of the teachers, town officials, the American Automobile Association, and the boys and girls themselves, a Schoolboy Patrol has been organized in the schools of the town this year. Due to the several dismissal times it has been necessary to have approximately seventy-five boys participating in the work. They range in age from ten to fourteen, and are all doing a commendable job in making it safer for their classmates in crossing the streets in the vicinity of the schools. Through the courtesy of the Center Theater a group of about 20 boys are given complimentary tickets to the movies each week so that all patrol boys have the opportunity during the month.

Through the cooperation of the Superintending School Committee, Town Manager, Selectmen, Central Grange, the Kiwanis Club, and many other organizations and individuals in town, a school lunch program is being successfully operated. Approximately one hundred seventy-five boys and girls, who would ordinarily carry lunches to school, are being served a complete hot meal each day. This program is also made possible by the assistance of the Surplus Marketing Administration, WPA, and NYA.

Repairs

Mr. Henry Pearl has been in charge of repairs and this program has been well handled. The labor situation created a real problem last summer but, nevertheless, quite satisfactory results were obtained. The North Street School was painted on the outside. The tennis court at the Grammar school which was unusable was graded and given a tar and sand surface. All schools were cleaned and the necessary minor repairs completed. It is our desire to install lights in the subprimary and first grade rooms at the Pleasant Street School, and to begin a long-range improvement of the lighting in all schools. Due to the anticipated labor shortage this summer we do not plan any large repair jobs, but do intend to do some extensive washing of classrooms, repairing of ceilings, and redecorating of rooms where necessary The stokers which were installed at the Grammar and Pleasant Street Schools are noticeably proving their value. Due to the healthful and financial benefits derived from stokers, this year's report to the Town Budget Committee carries a recommendation for the purchase of a stoker for the North Street School. An unexpected boiler emergency occurred at this school during the fall term which necessitated the purchasing of five new sections to add to the newer of the two boilers. This emergency also brought about the elimination of the old boiler. This explains the overdraft in the repair account.

The citizens of Dover-Foxcroft should feel proud of the fine boys and girls who make up their schools, and at the same time they should feel fortunate in having such a loyal and cooperative group of teachers. It has been my observation that the teachers are continually working for the welfare of the boys and girls and are improving themselves professionally whenever possible. Evidence of this is the fact that nearly one hundred per cent of the teachers took a fifteen-week extension course from Dr. Payson Smith during the fall term. The course was on "Current Problems in Modern Education" and proved to be a very valuable one.

Foxcroft Academy

Foxcroft Academy is functioning exceptionally well this year and from my short time here I should say that this is due to the splendid administration under Principal Wood, to his fine teaching staff and to the cooperation of the student body. Due to the fact that Mr. Wood has a complete report of the Academy to be found elsewhere in this book, I see no reason for duplicating his efforts. I commend his report to your attention.

In closing I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the citizens of Dover-Foxcroft, and to their boys and girls, for their cooperation they have extended to me; to the teachers for their friendly and helpful cooperation; and to you the members of the Superintending School Committee, for your cooperation, support, and advice.

THE BUILDING

During the past year, our enrollment has remained consistently around the 250 pupil level. The extensive improvements carried out a vear ago did not necessitate large repairs this year. Through the co-operation of Town Manager Trufant we were able to re-surface the front walk leading to the building and during the summer, the Building Committee removed several trees on the lawn, whose age and state of decay render-

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ed them hazardous. The interior of the building was carefully cleaned and each room placed in excellent condition prior to the opening of school.

THE SCHOOL PROGRAM

A splendid step forward was taken this year with the introduction of new courses in Physical Education, Forestry and Spanish. Careful examinations by the School Physician and Nurse have been followed and supplemented by a corrective program in the Physical Education classes where emphasis has been placed upon the acquisition of fundamental skills. Definite improvements have been noted in posture and carriage, particularly among the girls' classes. The administration problem of conducting classes at Central Hall, so far removed from the Academy has not proven prohibitive. The student body has shown its appreciation of this opportunity by excellent cooperation in the matter of moving to and from the hall on schedule.

Foreseeing the new developments in inter-American relations, it seemed advisable to include Spanish in our list of Modern languages. In the immediate future, it seems very probable that boys and girls with a working knowledge of this language will discover it to be a very valuable asset.

Following our determination to include practical courses in vocational fields as rapidly as the expansion of our facilities would permit, a course in Forestry was opened to Senior boys last fall. Through the generous gift of Mr. Louis Oakes, a tract of land, much of which is extensively wooded is now available for study and work classes. A careful survey of the processes of propogation, seedings, cuttings, and the like have been carried on. A nursery has been instituted and seed beds laid last fall while it is planned to expand these facilities to care for several thousand transplants this spring. Much study has been devoted to the natural forest floor, the nature of fungi and other enemies of the forest and to favorable conditions of growth and development. In all of this we wish to gratefully acknowledge the splendid cooperation and courtesy of the Department of Forestry at the University of Maine and particularly to Professor Dwight Demeritt, who has rendered much valuable advice and assistance. It is now planned to extend this course to a full two years next fall and include members of the Junior class.

We note with especial pride the high standard achieved by our Commercial Department. Better than 70% of our last class are now employed in Washington having passed Civil Service exams directly from the Academy. Many of our present pupils have gained good experience in the offices about town. It is no exaggeration to say that our people have made much greater progress than pupils who have come to us as transfer students from other towns.

Our remedial English work continues with profit. Reading skills improve and the field of comprehensive ability extends favorably with each year level. We regretted greatly the loss of Miss Ruth V. Belknap, head of our English department for the past three years, but were fortunate in securing the services of Miss Jean Hilliard in her place. The induction of Mr. Briggs into the armed forces of our country will deal another blow to this department but it is hoped that we will be able to hold this all-important department of our school at its present high level.

In the extra-curricular field we continue to attain success. A state championship track team added further to the laurels of our athletic teams while the students engaged in Prize Speaking, Spelling and Debating were uniformly successful. Once more the Foxcroft players reached the finals at Bowdoin last spring in the One-Act Play Contest. For the current year, the record of victories is not so impressive but lessons of real value in sportsmanship and endeavor continue. Of the thirtytwo State of Maine Scholarships awarded to outstanding Maine students by the four state colleges, Foxcroft Academy and the community were honored by having two of our boys named as recipients, Bradley Maxim was thus honored at Bowdoin and Harold S. Roberts at Colby. The disclosure of mid-year grades which has just reached us from these colleges show Foxcroft graduates in high percentages upon the Dean's List in all.

students, and especially the citizens and parents of Dover-Foxcroft for their fine cooperation which has been so readily given during the past year.

MUSIC SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

To C. Everett Page, Jr., Superintendent of Schoo's:

I herewith submit my first annual report as Supervisor of Music in the public schools of Dover-Foxcroft and Foxcroft Academy.

The Academy orchestra was replaced this year by the Academy band which is to make its initial appearance at the Public Speaking contest to be held in March.

The Academy Girls' Glee Club and Mixed Choir have performed during the year at school assemblies and were heard in two radio broadcasts during the month of December. Due to transportation difficulties and limitations, it is expected that the annual Music Festival, scheduled to be held in Bangor, may be cancelled; should it materialize, the Academy Girls' Glee Club will participate.

A new Academy chorus schedule has been put into effect this year with great success; namely, an hour period weekly consisting of the student body at large instead of the former arrangement of two divided periods weekly. The textbook used for this activity is "Assembly Songs and Choruses".

The Grammar School Glee Clubs are planning to present the Gilbert and Sullivan operetta, "Pinafore" in the early spring. This production will include every member of the grammar school in addition to the glee club members.

A colorful Christmas pageant was presented by North Street school using its entire student body. The musical portion of this presentation consisted of two large choruses: the first chorus made up of fourth, fifth and sixth grade pupils; the second chorus made up of first, second and third grade pupils.

A "Music Travelogue" will be the nature of the Pleasant Street school program to be presented in April. This, too, will include every member of the school with the addition of the sixth grade of the Grammar school.

In the course of the year, several programs have been presented by the individual rural schools commemorating special holidays; such as Thanksgiving, Christmas, etc. Each one of these schools will also present, in their own communities, some form of musical program in the spring.

Textbooks used this year include the complete "World of Music" series in the grades, the "Silver Book" in the Grammar school, the "Music Hour" one book course in South Dover, "Singing Days" in the Bear Hill school and "Blending Voices" in East Dover.

I now wish to express my appreciation and sincere thanks to the Superintendent, Principals, teachers, parents and students for their earnest and kind cooperation.

REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

To C. Everett Page, Jr., Supt. of Schools:

Herewith is submitted the report of the school physician for the current year.

At the time of the opening of school last fall examinations for itch, impetigo, etc. were made and the usual number of these conditions were found. Emphasis was made that these children should see their family physician for treatment of same.

With the sanction of the School Board a form of daily physical exercise was introduced into the schools to aid the children in attaining better posture. These exercises were under the supervision of the Physical Education Department and carried out by the wholehearted cooperation of the individual classroom teachers. On my tours of inspection through the schools it has been gratifying to note the improvement in the posture of the children.

Between November 24 and December 5 routine examinations of all children in both the town and rural schools were made. Defects in teeth were many and diseased tonsils running a close second. Recommendations for the correction of these conditions were sent to the parents and it is hoped that during these better times necessary corrections will be made.

We are very fortunate to have Mrs. Gibbons with us this year. She has been very cooperative and has given freely of her time in observation of suspects and in helping with examinations. During her examinations with the State audiometer many defects in hearing were found.

I feel that it is unfortunate that our school system does not have the full time services of Mrs. Gibbons or a nurse of her ability. If this were possible much more could be done for the health of our future citizens.

The attendance record of our school system has suffered greatly this year from an epidemic of measles. Records show that epidemics of this nature seem to occur every five to seven years. The cooperation of the parents during this epidemic has been very gratifying.

The cooperation received from the School Board, you, and every teacher in the system has been very encouraging. It is only with this assistance that the medical betterment of the children can be attained.

ANNUAL REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING---1941

During the year home visits were made to impress upon the parents that good health habits develop in very early childhood. The importance of early recognition through periodic health examinations of beginning defects and disease was stressed. Vaccination against smallpox and immunization against diphtheria was urged.

Some visits to prenatal patients were made at the request of the attending physician while others were made urging them to secure medical supervision. Visit schedules and instructions were made according to the individual needs of the patient. Much emphasis was placed on diet in relation to comfort and safety.

Two child health conferences were held in conjunction with the Farm Bureau. In June 14 infants and preschool children were examined by a local physician and five received immunization against diphtheria. In August 19 children attended and eight received toxoid.

Much of the time scheduled for this town during the last months of the year has been spent in cooperation with the National Defense program in organizations of

Home Nursing classes and the teaching of a class in the rural area.

The Red Cross Chapter has cooperated through the Home Nursing Committee in developing this program. The Town Club has given help in the loaning of articles which are of invaluable aid in the teaching of a Home Nursing Class. Plans are under way for several classes to be taught early in the new year.

It is to be hoped that in the coming year regular child health conferences will be established and a Mothers' Club started.

REPORT OF COUNTY NURSE

I hereby submit the annual report of health service rendered Dover-Foxcroft for the period January 1, 1941 to December 31, 1941.

The major part of the program is concerned with the health of the child of school age and Tuberculosis Prevention.

School Nursing

One of the real problems to combat this past year was the epidemic of communicable diseases in the winter months. Every effort was made by the Nurse to assist the school physician and health authorities to keep these diseases in control. Daily check-up of absentees in the homes and children in school was made, and 158 field visits were made by the nurse and over 1059 reinspections of children in school rooms were made with 42 office conferences with parents, 26 visits to school buildings, and 83 visits to school rooms.

The Nurse has assisted the school physician in making the annual health examinations of each student, preparing and sending notices of defects to parents and in making necessary home calls. Assistance was given to each physician in examinations of 988 pupils.

Space does not permit a list of large number of school defects revealed in health examinations, but the Nurse will be glad to discuss with any parent the health examination findings of their child.

The health service rendered by the Percolator Club in providing glasses and financing throat operations for needy children is a real contribution to the school program.

Tuberculosis Prevention

Every effort is made to assist patients to have repeated and the necessary check-ups and to care for our contact cases of Tuberculosis. The Tuberculin Testing of 101 Academy pupils in November revealed an additional number of reactors. We have about 40 patients, the larger number of which are childhood types and contacts whose X-ray examinations are due, but at this time we haven't been able to book for any definite date the State Clinic service. About 32 visits have been made in follow-up of patients by Nurse.

Crippled Children Service

Assistance is given to this program in providing a place in the office for the Exercise Clinic in follow-up of these patients and in urging attendance at Clinic.

Health Education

This year the Nurse conducted 11 classes with Academy girls on Personal Hygiene and Home Nursing and prepared and donated health material for individual school room libraries in upper grades. That people might become more interested in preventing Tuberculosis, the Early Diagnosis Campaign for the Prevention of Tuberculosis was emphasized in April. A new film was shown in the moving picture house. The title of this film is "They Do Come Back." An exhibit in one of the store windows and special grade programs, posters, and pamphlets, were devices used. The service is only effective through cooperation so we thank all who helped.

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE OF 1942

Dover-Foxcroft, Maine.

February 24, 1942.

To the Voters and Tax Payers of Dover-Foxcroft:

In recommending the amounts to be raised and appropriated for the various departments of Town Government we wish to draw your attention to several items.

It becomes more apparent as each year goes by that there is a rising tendency in the cost of operating your town affairs. The chief reason for this being that there are continual demands made by our citizens for additional services. All these extra services, while probably small individually, total to a considerable cost, and cause the department under which they come to need more money. This sometimes causes overdrafts in the accounts and in times like we are facing now we feel that it is very important that overdrafts do not occur in any account. Real Estate Tax Payers should realize that the large burden is on them and if they vote for additional services and expenditures then the burden will be increased.

Education of our children costs a great deal of money and it is very difficult to keep that cost from rising with the general tendency of wages and materials going up. The recommended amount of \$24,300.00 for Common Schools is \$500.00 higher than last year's amount, but we feel that it is a reasonable increase and should be ample to care for all needs. For High School Tuition an amount of \$17,500.00 is recommended.

The General Highway Account requires a large amount of money, and the demands made on this department are very great. We are recommending an amount of \$15,365.00 be raised for this account knowing that it will require strict economy in every way to keep within this amount.

The Charity Account is another of our large accounts and it presents a difficult problem. There are quite a number of cases that require aid which must be furnished whether money is available in the account or not, and medical care must be given in most cases when demanded. The tendency of recent years is for more charity and many have been led to expect it, but in these times when work is plentiful great care should be exercised to discourage laziness and sponging on Charity. With this in mind your Committee recommends an amount of \$11,000.00 for this account.

We have commented on the larger accounts only.

GREETING:

The sum raised to be supplemented with State and Federal funds, dependent of course upon funds made available by cooperating agencies.

ART. 21. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools.

ART. 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the School Committee to appoint a School Physician in accordance with provisions of R. S. Chapter 19, Section 47, and raise and appropriate money for same.

ART. 23. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance on school buildings.

ART. 24. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on school fund.

ART. 25. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvement of the School playgrounds.

ART. 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Superintending School Committee to employ a full-time Community Nurse to serve the schools and welfare department, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

ART. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the services of a Public Health Nurse.

ART. 28. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for salaries of the Board of Health, and the recording of Vital Statistics.

ART. 29. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Public Dump.

ART. 30. To see what sum of money the Town

will vote to raise and appropriate for sewer maintenance.

ART. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for sewer construction.

ART. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction and repair of sidewalks.

ART. 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general repairs of highways and bridges.

ART. 34. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Patrol.

ART. 35. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

ART. 36. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Third Class roads.

ART. 37. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Special Resolve roads.

ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Bessie Road, so-called, beginning at the State Road near the residence of Ferd E. Clapp (formerly the Lee Schoolhouse) thence northerly to the center line of range 3, thence westerly to the road leading to Foxcroft Center, at the west line of lot 6, range 3.

ART. 39. To see if the Town will vote to dis-

continue the road through the "Old Gray Neighborhood", from a point on the east line of lot 14, range 7, near the Hosmer place so-called, thence northerly, westerly and northerly to the Guilford line.

ART. 40. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road beginning at the point near the residence of Daniel Meade; thence westerly on the south line of lots, 16, 15, and 14, range 5 to the road leading to Hosmer Hill.

ART. 41. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road beginning on the east line of Lot 16, range 6, near the Chandler place so-called, now owned by the Anderson Bros., thence northerly to the site of the former Gray schoolhouse.

ART. 42. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to treat the Village Streets against dust.

ART. 43. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.

ART. 44. To see if the town will vote to install a street light on Autumn Avenue between the residence of S. Barker and Rondal Steeves.

ART. 45. To see if the Town will vote to install a light on South Street near the Texaco Filling Station, for the purpose of lighting the Parking Lot.

ART. 46. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Mayo street, near the residence of Aaron Kinney.

ART. 47. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Mayo Memorial Hospital.

ART. 48. To choose one member of the Trustees of Mayo Memorial Hospital.

ART. 49. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Support of Poor.

ART. 50. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day, and the decorating of Soldiers' graves.

ART. 51. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts and other music.

ART. 52. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Superintendent of Burials, whose duty it shall be to supervise the care of all of the public burying grounds in Dover-Foxcroft, and to take charge of all burials therein, and raise and appropriate money for same.

ART. 53. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

ART. 54. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repair of fences around burying grounds in which war veterans are buried; for the repair of graves, headstones, monuments and markers designating the burial place of such war veterans; and for keeping the grass on such graves suitably cut and trimmed during the summer season.

ART. 55. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Boys' and Girls' Agricultural clubs within the town.

ART. 56. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Thompson Free Library.

ART. 57. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for abatements.

ART. 58. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our

natural resources and attractions under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Town Club of Dover-Foxcroft.

ART. 59. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.-00) to pay on bond issue of 1934.

ART. 60. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and fifteen dollars (\$315.00) to pay interest on bonds for the ensuing year.

ART. 61. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to make a temporary loan not exceeding thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) in anticipation of taxes.

ART. 62. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.

ART. 63. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for carrying out the Civilian Defense Program.

ART. 64. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on Fair Ground property.

ART. 65. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and execute quit claim deeds for such property.

ART. 66. To see if the Town will adopt the following ordinance:

Sec. 1. No person at all under the influence of intoxicating liquor shall be permitted in any public dance hall, or on any public dance hall property, and no per-

son shall bring any intoxicating liquors on the public dance hall property, during the progress of any public dance, within the Town of Dover-Foxcroft.

Sec. 2. Whoever violates any of the provisions hereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars or more than fifty dollars, to be recovered by complaint or indictment.

The undersigned, the selectmen of Dover-Foxcroft, will be in session at their office in Central Hall Building, Monday, the ninth day of March, A. D., 1942, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming the right to have their names entered upon the voting list of said town.
