Report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor

To the Citizens of the Town of Bingham:

We submit herewith the annual report of the standing of your Town for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1936.

Because of an increase in appropriations it was necessary to increase the rate to \$41.50, and the rate would have been higher but for a savings of close to \$600.00 in State tax over and above the increase in County tax.

In spite of the fact that it was necessary to spend some \$177.55 for control of Austin Stream, \$293.38 for legal fees and costs on 1933 taxes, \$578.04 on Bingham-Concord bridge, a trifle less than \$100.00 for gravel on Special Resolve road and shaping and sanding the new Tarvia surface road on Bridge street, all of which expenditures were not included in our budget, the financial standing of the Town is better by the amount of \$1260.68, and the net overdraft is \$21.14 less than last year.

The Town debt has been reduced by \$1500.00 and at the rate we are reducing same, we will be within the legal limit in a little more than a year from now.

We were successful in having Bridge street Tarvia covered with no expense to the Town, from Main street up around the turn by the residence of A. A. Dinsmore. The balance was Tarvia covered at our own expense for less than \$50.00.

The Bingham-Concord bridge has been painted and reconstructed. In this work we called on the County and State for their proportional part of the expense. This job consisted of cement caps on the piers, new metal corner posts, twelve additional truss rods, expansion plates at each approach and the latest type of surface covering. This job represents a good many thousands of dollars in savings to the tax payers for the next 25 years, the estimated life of the new surface. The total cost of patnting and reconstruction was \$10,650.00,

yet it will only be necessary for the Town to raise \$681.70 to cover the balance needed as our share of the expense.

Some thought should be given toward a small appropriation for Blister Rust in this town. Last season no eradication was done in Bingham, primarily because at that time the Town had not be n mapped for that purpose (but has been since). However, we were successful in procuring labor for fifteen Bingham men in this work, bringing a payroll of \$2120.62 here with no cost to the Town.

A Federal road project under the W.P.A. has been submitted to the proper authorities, calling for construction of 2½ miles on the Mahoney Hill road. Should we be successful, employment on same in the Spring would be of great advantage to our citizens.

Through a Special Resolve at the last session of the Legislature, we obtained a grant of \$800.00 for special road work on Mahoney Hill.

Considerable Federal food and clothing has been obtained for the needy through the FERA and WPA. Although no detailed list has been obtained, some idea may be grasped when we state that over 2,000 lbs. of meat alone was distributed this year.

We take this opportunity to thank all other Town Officials, the Budget Committee, and all the citizens for their cooperation during the past season.

ORGANIZATION

A Board of Engineers consisting of a Chief and two assistants, are in charge of the Department.

The Company is divided as follows: Hose Company No. 1 with fifteen men, and Ladder Company No. 1 with nine men, a total of twenty-four men.

The officers are elected each year by the Department and hold quarterly meetings.

APPARATUS

The Apparatus consists of the following: one six hundred gallon Maxim Pumper equipped with extinguishers, suction hose, extension ladder, roof ladder, and all other necessary equipment.

Fifteen hundred feet of carefully inspected hose is carried at all times; all tires have been renewed in the past two years; also new coats and boots have been added this year.



Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and other Citizens of the Town of Bingham:

The growth of elementary and secondary enrollment in the schools of the nation has been stupendous during the first third of the present century. In 1900, the elementary school enrolled about 15,000,000 pupils and the high school, 500,000, while to-day there are 20,000,000 children in our elementary schools and 5,000,000 in the high schools. This great increase has made it necessary to solve many problems, financial and otherwise. The High School is a distinctly American institution. We are the only people in the world who attempt to give to all our children the benefits, up to the college or professional school, of free education.

In a recent number of the Journal of the National Education Association there was a check list of questions and problems for parents to study, some of which I shall quote since I believe them to be pertinent and be reficial to all of us parents. "What is my child's general attitude toward school and have I given him every possible encouragement to continue at least through high school? How is my child's physical condition? Is he able to see and hear as well as he should? Are his teeth in good shape? How much rest does he have before twelve o'clock, midnight, as a rule? How does my child study? Do I know how much time is necessary for each subject taken? Is my child taking the right course in high school to enable him to proceed to further training without the loss of time or money? Does my child avoid or take a subject because his friend does or does not or because it is easy? Has my child selected a life work yet? How many of my child's teachers do I know personally? Have I ever dis-



cussed my child's work or his possibilities with his teacher or teachers? Have I visited school in session to see what is being done there?". There are many other questions of this nature, but these seemed to me to be the most vital for this report.

In our elementary schools, we have been following for some years, the State Course of Study adopted in 1931. This is a requirement of our State Department of Education. There are a number of minor changes which we have made to meet our own situation but there is no essential deviation from the work we do when compared with that of other schools of the State. Our seventh and eighth grades are considered a part of the high school work by the State Department, therefore we are required to submit to the office at Augusta, the program of work together with the time allotment of both these grades and the high school. These programs must be approved before we receive our rating as a Class A high school. Sometimes we are asked what an "A" Class high school is. According to regulations laid down by the State Department of Education, an "A" Class is one with at least two teachers, properly certified; an approved course of study; suitable buildings and equipment; a school year of 36 weeks, at least; and suitable laboratory and library equipment. If Bingham should lose its rating, the town would then be unable to collect tuition money from adjoining towns and would be required to pay the tuition of any local student who wished to attend the high school of a town which was of the required standard. Our library equipment is not satisfactory to the State officials so I am asking for a special appropriation for this purpose.

TEACHERS

The teachers in the system are doing their usual satisfactory work. The only change in the regular teaching

staff for the year is in the Home Economics department. Miss Eleanor H. Burnham, a graduate of the regular four year course at Farmington is the new teacher. Miss Burnham is doing very satisfactory work and is bringing to her classes much from her own practical, as well as theoretical experience. All the teachers would appreciate more visiting of classes by parents. It is only by earnest cooperation between parents and school officials that school work can be carried on successfully.

GIFTS

We have been fortunate in receiving gifts this year. The American Auxiliary had screens made for some of the windows in the McKinley building. The same organization, together with the Century Club, D. A. R., Good Will Club, and a disbanded Bluebird group, have donated funds which, with the assistance of the girls and their teacher, have procured a range for the Domestic Science room. My thanks are due, also, to Taylor Bros. & Hill for their assistance and contribution toward this project. These gifts show the interest of our organizations in the schools and are greatly appreciated.

HEALTH

There have been no serious epidemics among the children this year. Through the co-operation of Dr. Ball, we have been able to have medical inspection in our schools. Without this service, we should be unable to work with the Maine Public Health Association to secure the various trophies and awards made by that organization. Under the direction of Mrs. Dinsmore the local Red Cross has seen to it that many of the children have received dental attention. This work has been of great value

and the amount of work done, possibly only through the generosity of Dr. Clark. The efforts of these two doctors, often at great inconveniences to themselves, show a fine spirit of service. Arrangements have been made for a clinic conducted by Dr. Paul Wakefield of the Fairfield Sanitorium. The parents of over 90% of our children have given their consent to this simple test and which may mean the discovery of tuberculosis in some of our children in its early stage.

In closing this report, I wish to take the opportunity to thank everyone who has helped to make this a profitable school year.

Report of School Principal

Mr. Howard L. Bowen, Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herewith my annual report as Principal of the Bingham Junior-Senior High School.

The total enrollment for this year is 138. By classes the registration is as follows: Post Graduates 2, Seniors 16, Juniors 22, Sophomores 25, Freshmen 38, Eighth Grade 15, Seventh Grade 20. This total enrollment is approximately the same as that of last year, but shows a decided increase in the number of members in the upper classes. This may be explained in part by an increase in the number of pupils from surrounding towns, and by the tendency of pupils now to remain in school, where a few years ago they would have received outside employment. It is a highly significant, but probably a little known fact, that in 1926 there were only 86 pupils in the building, which is now taxed beyond its normal capacity in attempting to provide adequately for 138. Students of the Senior and Junior classes must necessarily be combined in many courses. Our small class rooms which heretofore had comfortably cared for 20 pupils are now far from adequate for classes of from 25 to 35. Due credit must be given to both class-room teachers and pupils who have carried on the work with such a degree of success under prevailing conditions. Any larger enrollment in the upper classes another year will present a serious problem in regard to proper accomodations.

Last year again our Senior Class made a very creditable showing in the Comprehensive Examinations sponsored by the State Department of Education, which our recent graduates at the University of Maine are making a record of which we may be justly proud. It might be interesting to note that our Honor Students compare very favorably,

both in numbers and averages, with those of former years, while the three high ranking members of this present Senior class will have earned the highest combined average of any class leaders of recent years.

Last spring the baseball team experienced another very successful season, losing only one regular game and closing in a triple tie for honors in the South-western Somerset County League. In the fall we were represented at the Anson Academy invitation track meet, where six of our boys distinguished themselves by carrying away the majority of prizes and the championship cup. Much credit should be given to these boys who are willing to work hard and train carefully for athletic competition.

All parents are cordially invited to visit the regular sessions of our school and to confer with the principal and teachers at any time. Very often a little understanding and cooperation may do a great deal to help the progress of some pupil who finds his work difficult or his efforts insufficient.

In closing, I wish to thank the Superintendent and School Committee for their interest and constructive support, and to express my appreciation for the loyalty and conscientious effort of the entire teaching staff in the High School building. It is only through our combined efforts and the cooperative support of the great majority of students that our progress may be maintained.
