Report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor

To the Citizens of the Town of Bingham:

We submit herewith the annual report of the standing of your Town for the year ending February 15, 1937.

Because of some increase in taxable property we were able to reduce the rate of taxation to \$41.00 per \$1000.00.

The Town debt has been reduced to the legal debt limit, and by authority granted at a special Town meeting held last April we bonded \$36,000.00 of the debt over a period of 18 years, payable \$2000.00 per year at the low rate of $3\frac{1}{2}\%$.

This enables us to reduce our debt \$2000.00 per year plus interest, without raising any more money than we have been doing in the past when we raised \$1000.00 on the debt and \$500.00 on the Macadam Road note plus interest. In other words our debt is being reduced \$2000.00 per year instead of \$150.00 per year with no added burden to the taxpayer.

Altho there is an overdraft in the poor department, the total cost of same is some \$650.00 less than last year. We trust that this downward trend will continue. The same applies to the overdraft which is somewhat over \$120.00 less than last year.

The financial standing of the town shows that we are in better shape to the amount of \$1,285.49.

A special resolve grant for road work on Mahoney Hill was granted by Legislature and expended in conjuction with State Aid money. Another grant of \$5,000.00 for work on Austin Stream was expended under direction of the County Commissioners. Under W. P. A. we did some road work very early in the season and under Federal direction distributed considerable food and clothing. Some idea of such distribution is gain by the fact that 4 tons of potatoes, 1 ton fish, ¹/₂ ton, prunes 350 lbs. rice, 250lbs. dry milk, 700 doz. eggs, 725 lbs. butter, 600 cans grapefruit juice, 59 bushels of apples, cosiderable other products and clothing were distributed.

We take this opportunity to thank all other Town Officials, the Budget Committee, and all other citizens for their cooperation during the past season.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and other Citizens of the Town of Bingham:

I take pleasure in presenting to you the annual report on the schools of our town.

As you will see, we have a substantial balance at the close of the fiscal year but since we have had but thirtyfive weeks of school since the books were last closed due to the scarlet fever epidemic the balance is necessary to pay the cost of this extra week.

Several changes have occurred in the teaching force during the year. Mr. Chapman after ten years of excellent service as principal of the high school resigned to accept a position at Bangor High School. This vacancy was filled by Mr. Stuart C. Chaplin, a graduate of the University of Maine with graduate work at Maine and Columbia. Late in the summer, Miss Burnham resigned to accept a much more lucrative position at Freeport High School. Miss Janet Smith with her B. S. degree from Farmington was secured for this place. Mrs. Tupper after long and successful service in the first and second grades retired and this vacancy was filled by Miss Ada Senior, a graduate of the three year course at Gorham. Mrs. Tupper will long be remembered and loved by the generations in this community to whom she was their "First Teacher." All three of these new teachers are proving to be excellent choices as they, together with our other teachers, are doing commendable work.

Our repairs this year have been more extensive than we had planned. After a roof fire at the McKinley School, the resulting insurance enabled us to re-roof the south side of the building besides redecorating the interior which had been somewhat damaged by smoke and water. With the addition of new window shades, this building is now in a satisfactory condition on the inside. Some desk arm chairs were provided for the English room at the high school building. Probably our greatest repair was the installation of the new boiler at the high school. The old one was leaking badly and we were advised that a new one would be more economical than to try to repair the old one if, indeed, that could be done. The decrease in the consumption of fuel is considerable and will pay for the boiler in a short time. The contract price for the new boiler was \$587.58 and changes thought desirable in the location of the plant from the point of efficiency and economy entailed the expenditure of \$44.00 more. The following is an account of this expenditure:

This excess of cost was absorbed by the regular repairs appropriation together with a reduction of \$7.00 which the contractor deducted for the removal of the old boiler from the basement by the junk dealer.

The Red Cross has provided eye glasses for several children in the grades. This is a splendid project and the efforts of Mrs. Dinsmore and her committee are worthy of praise. These causes should make one glad to contribute to the annual Red Cross roll call. Last November, Miss Katherine Gay, R. N., from the Fairfield Sanitorium re-x-rayed fifteen school children who had shown a tendency to tuberculosis a year ago and later, Dr. Cromwell, Superintendent of the sanitorium, gave thorough chest examinations to those x-rayed. Of

the fifteen, five were disc'arged from the clinic. The remaining ten will be re-examined each year until all are discharged. The cost of these clinics is borne entirely in our case by the sale of the Christmas Health Seals and Bonds. Somehow the impression has gotten about that we derive no benefit from this sale and I am giving this information to correct this belief if possible. The sale of these seals is used throughout the state and nation to help wipe out the white plague, tuberculosis, wherever it exists and for preventive treatment and the money given for this cause is certainly well spent. This town did not meet its quota this year but I hope that we may go "over the top" in the 1938 sale. Dr. Ball has inspected the school children for the seven point awards and for any other cause for which he has been called and both he and Dr. Howes gave freely of their time during the scarlet fever epidemic. I am very grateful to them both.

We should paint the McKinley building during the coming summer; new window shades throughout the high school building together with more desk armchairs are needed there; the blackboards in two of the buildings should be changed. Some of those now in use are in bad condition and reflect the light so that it is bad for the vision of children sitting in the rooms. We are asking for a larger repairs appropriation to do some of these things.

Despite the low textbook appropriation, we are able to keep our book supply fairly adequate. Authorities say that we should spend from \$2.00 to \$3.00 annually for each pupil which, in our case, would demand a \$600.00 appropriation. Constantly changing methods and new materials make new books necessary if we are to keep up with educational progress. Poor tools in the form of old and out-of-date books and supplies in the hands of the most excellent teachers cannot help but lower the efficiency of the system just as it would in any other trade or profession. We have put the desks in the assembly room at the high school on stringers so that they may be moved and make a place for socials etc. This, since there is no place for that part of school life in town, has been a worth-while project. We should have a place where basket ball could be played and some organized physical training could be carried out. With the exception of baseball and track, we have little in the way of physical education and these two sports can be participated in by only a few. I wish the town might do something to change this condition.

A room has been made at the high school for a library. This is a recommendation of our State Department of Education who also says that we must increase our library facilities if we wish to maintain our A-class rating for tuition purposes. We welcome gifts of suitable books, works of fiction and non-fiction material. Current numbers of the better magazines after they are used in the homes would be acceptable. In Mr. Chaplin's report, you will see what has been done for the library during the year.

The Home Economics Club has purchased furniture and linoleum for their room and provided new sash curtains. This adds to the attractiveness of their department.

On the whole, this has been a profitable school year, thanks to the co-operation of all concerned—teachers, children, school board, and all other citizens of the town. I am very appreciative of this and for the unfailing courtesy of the town's people to me.

The State Department of Education recommends longer periods with fewer classes per day. For this reason our daily program has been changed. The usual seven periods of forty minutes each have been replaced by five one-hour periods. To take care of the seven different periods the schedule is rotated. The first five periods are held one day. The next day the sixth, seventh, first, second and third periods meet in that order. In the same manner the schedule is always continued from the previous day. This plan saves time because less passing between classes is required. It also offers variety since a class does not come at the same time in the daily schedule twice in succession. Both teachers and students are able to do better work because fewer preparations are necessary each day.

It is a function of the modern school to prepare each future citizen to take his place in a cooperative society. To develop these desirable characteristics, leadership and cooperation, the assemblies are student arranged and student conducted. The interest being shown is very pleasing. We are fortunate this year in having Miss Richan to help with assembly music. Her enthusiasm and manner of presentation have made these assemblies interesting and profitable even to the nonmusical students.

Public Speaking has been introduced to replace the Junior Play. Each student is required, as part of his English course, to speak in assembly. From each class the students select, by secret ballot, one girl and one boy to represent the group in the public contest. Other outstanding speakers are invited by the faculty to participate in the contest. It is felt that with such a program a far larger group is benefited.

It seems advisable at this time to bring the subject of attendance to the attention of the parents. Although excuses from home are required for all absences, there are still so many that the work of the school, as a whole, is affected. Certainly there are legitimate reasons for remaining out of school, such as sickness or necessary work. However, any absence lessens the student's chance of successfully completing the year's work. If these things were considered by the parent before the excuse was written, surely attendance would improve.

At present there are nineteen former students of Bingham High School who are furthering their education in institutions of this state and neighboring states. Their fine records are conclusive evidence of the splendid work that has been done in Bingham schools. You, the citizens of Bingham, have reason to be proud of the schools which have prepared these young men and young women. Realizing that it is your generosity which has made such attainments possible, we solicit your continued interest and support.

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Bingham qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at Kennebec Hall in said Town of Bingham on Monday, the seventh (7th) day of March, A. D. 1938, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:
