Report of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor

To the Citizens of the Town of Bingham:

We submit herewith the Annual Report of the standing of your Town for the year ending Feb. 15, 1943.

Financially this has been a very successful year. Your bank balance has increased from \$2,697.76 last year to \$5,522.10 this year, an increase of over 100%.

The tabulated form in your report headed "Schedule of Appropriations" shows a "Net Gain From Appropriations" of \$2,348.46, the largest this board has ever known.

The last figures on the page showing "Financial Standing of the Town of Bingham" represents a decrease in the liabilities since last report in the amount of \$4,068.21. This is very gratifying as it shows a healthy trend.

Your debt has been reduced \$2,000.00 by payment on the bond issue leaving your debt about one-half of what it was ten years ago. This reduction in debt reflects itself in your yearly payments covering interest on Town debt. Ten years ago we were paying annually \$2,200.00 interest while this year we will only have to raise \$910.00 for interest.

We have submitted to the present Legislature three Special Resolves covering work we would like to do on our rural roads.

The annual municipal audit was made by the State Department of Audit as required by law.

Your budget committee has recommended raising only \$1,000.00 by taxation this year on the \$2,000.00 bonds that come due. The other \$1,000.00 they recommend being paid from the Treasury because of the increase in our bank balance.

Once again we take this opportunity to thank all other Town Officers, the Budget Committee and the Citizens for their loyal cooperation in helping us to make so fine a record for the Municipal year.

Supt. of Schools Report

To the Superintending School Committee and other Citizens of the Town of Bingham:

I am pleased to present to you the annual fiscal report on School receipts and expenditures for the year 1942-43 together with a brief commentary on some of our problems.

Teacher shortages are an exceedingly grave danger to the well-being of this State and Nation at this time. Maine has lost over one-sixth or about eleven hundred teachers from its schools during the period from May 1, 1942 to October 1, 1942. High salaried defense positions besides enlistment in the various branches of the armed forces are the reasons for this with-drawal. Under the wise leadership of the State Department of Education with the support of Governor Sewall, a bill has been introduced into the Legislature which will help the several towns to bear the increased cost of education and perhaps avoid the leaving the teaching profession of so many of our promising people who have been trained for an exacting profession. I quote from a letter from Commissioner Harry V. Gilson:

"The nature of the request made in this proposed legislation appears to be logical, reasonable and equitable. Under its provisions all cities and towns in the state would benefit on a basis of an additional \$90.00 per teaching position. The bill, if passed, would require \$500.000 of State funds, which are available from current revenues and would not require new taxation. In recognition of the acute need of this assistance, the Governor has recommended to the Legislature that this money be made available for school purposes. Few restrictions are placed upon the use of these funds except to provide that minimum expenditures be made under the terms of the equalization act, and, further that a minimum salary of \$720 be paid for each teaching position beginning with the school year 1943-44. Other amendments have been made to the equalization law simply to provide that towns shall receive approximately the same amounts of state aid from other sources as in the past, so that this new allocation may represent actual increases in all senses." I urge every citizen to use his influence to see to it that this legislation is enacted. It will mean several hundred dollars to our town and help other towns less fortunate than ours.

In this first year of total war, Bingham has been fortunate in retaining its teaching force. Mr. Harlow, principal of the high school for over four years resigned to accept a better position in Connecticut; Mrs. Evelyn Atwood, after several years of faithful and efficient services to our young people, resigned for family reasons; and Miss Eleanor Jones after only one year as teacher in the second grade resigned to take a position nearer The principalship of the high school has been most capably filled by Mr. Hollis P. Ingalls, a graduate of Washington State Normal School and the University of Maine. Mrs. Dora Stacy Brown was secured to replace Mrs. Atwood; she too, is a graduate of the University of Maine. One of our own girls, Laura Hunnewell, was secured for the vacancy in Grade Miss Hunnewell is a graduate of Farmington State Normal School. All these new teachers together with the faithful corps remaining from last year are doing splendid work for us and our children. At present, we are without a music supervisor after the resignation of Mrs. Worth who has gone to Biddeford.

The many calls by the Federal and State governments this past year has caused us to make some re-arrangements in the work at the high school. We have always insisted on a thorough grounding in mathematics in the school and this might be one reason why our young men have made such fine records in their army life. The Government has insisted that certain programs in mathematics, physical education, science and above all English be emphasized. To this end, we have lengthened the school day somewhat and have offered refresher courses in science and mathematics to the upper class students. All students are required to take some form of physical education and since the inability to provide conveyance for contests with other schools, our athletics have been inter-school which after all may not be too bad. At least more students can participate.

The high school enrollment has increased this year and promises to be still larger next year. This increase has been brought about to some extent by students from other towns which aids the financial set-up for the high school. The seventh and eighth grade room is over crowded but the remaining rooms have a normal number of pupils. We are beginning to see the great advantage of having two teachers in the first two grades, I feel. The importance of having a sound preparation for the first grade is difficult to estimate particularly to those who do not understand the difficulties of children in learning to read.

We have begun to change arithmetics in the lower elementary grades and hope to complete this work this coming year. The

sixth grade should have new geographies but war conditions would appear to make it unwise to change these texts since their work covers chiefly Europe and Asia. We have the literature in the high school nearly unified now to meet the requirements of the English Association. This is expensive but by doing one class at a time, we shall be complete next year. We are asking for more money this year for both text books and supplies because of the increased cost of articles in those two departments.

The many changes in district health nurses has made the health work in the schools somewhat of a hit and miss proposition but the work of the district supervisor, Miss Dizney has enabled us to keep the program going. The new appointee, Miss Hunt, comes well recommended and I feel that new progress will be made. The importance of health education with the shortage of nurses and doctors is easily understood.

We did some interior decorating in the Primary School building this year. The McKinley Building should have the same treatment during the coming summer and the roofs of the high school and the McKinley building should be painted. We hope to do this if labor and materials are available.

In closing this report, I want to thank everyone who has in any way contributed in making this a good school year—the School Board, teachers, children and parents, particularly. The gifts from the Century Club, American Legion and Auxiliary and the Carnival dinner sponsored and prepared by the Congregational Church Circle last year are much appreciated. All contacts with the other town departments have been harmonious which makes it pleasant for the superintendent of schools. The valuable assistance of teachers and other town's people in the various rationing programs has been very much appreciated.

Art. 45—To see if the town will vote to instruct the tax collector to use the method prescribed in Chap. 244 Maine Public Laws 1933 and acts amendatory thereto for collection of delinquent taxes. anthonis

Art. 46-To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to procure a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year by taxes.

Art. 47—To see if the town will elect a budget committee to assist the Selectmen, in recommending to the next annual Town meeting, the necessary appropriations of money for the ensuing wear.
