Report of Superintendent of Schools.

The past school year has, as a whole, been satisfactory although the fall term in the village schools was badly broken on account of the scarlet fever epidemic. Courses of study have been introduced into all the schools, both village and rural, and in the three lowest grades, detailed outlines furnished. These courses and outlines seem to be working out well and if continued for a year or two will undoubtedly result in securing a uniformity in the work which has been lacking in the past.

I wish, here, to express my sincere appreciation of the interest which all the teachers have shown in their work and of the good work which they have done. I have found them always ready to receive suggestions and carry them out, and our school relations have been most harmonious and pleasant. Last September five of the teachers passed the State examinations and secured State certificates.

During the year the schoolhouses at Lowelltown and the North District have been thoroughly repaired and are now in good condition. The buildings at Birch Point and South school must be repaired extensively during the next summer vacation. New seats must be installed into the South school as the present benches are a menace to the health of the children who have to use them. The new high school building must be painted and I would recommend that the boiler be removed from that building and placed in the basement of the old Academy and a new and larger boiler installed in the new schoolhouse.

The present heating apparatus is inadequate and the change suggested would result in a considerable

saving of fuel and much more satisfactory service would be rendered all around. As will be seen from the financial statement attached, the appropriation for text books the past year was not large enough to cover the expense of books purchased and more must be expended next year if the pupils are to have proper equipment with which to work.

I believe the courses in the Academy should be remodeled so as to offer a College Preparatory Course which will fit for college and an English Business Course which will train the pupils to do as well as to know. This we are in hopes to be able to put into operation at the beginning of the next school year in September.

Warrant for Town Meeting.

STATE OF MAINE.

To Frank H. Colby, Constable of the Town of Wiscasset, in the County of Lincoln, *GREETING:*

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Wiscasset, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Franklin Hall in said town, on Monday, the 17th day of March, A. D., 1913, at 10 o'clock A. M., then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see if the town will choose one or more Road Commissioners, whose duty shall be to overlook all roads in the town, and to oversee all work on said roads.

ART. 4. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to carry out the provisions of Chapter 15, Public Laws of 1907 and Acts amendatory thereof and additional thereto, relating to "Protecting of trees and shrubs from dangerous insects and diseases," to be known as the brown-tail moth fund.

ART. 5: To see if the town will vote 'yes' or 'no' upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the P. L. of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, P. L. 1909, also chapter 21, P. L. 1911, and chapter 183, P. L. 1911, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1913.

ART. 6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$400.00, being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chapter 112, of the P. L. of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, P. L. of 1909, also chapter 21, P. L. 1911, and chapter 183, P. L. 1911:

ART. 7. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for interest and reduction of the town debt, the maintenance and support of schools, and poor, and repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of a free high school for the ensuing year.

ART. 9. To see if the town will authorize their Treasurer to borrow on the faith and credit of the town, from time to time, the ensuing year, such sums of money as may be necessary for the payment of town charges; such sums to be paid during the current municipal year.

ART. 10. To see if the town will accept the list of abatements as prepared by the Selectmen.

ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to extend the Main Street sewer to low water mark, and what sum of money it will appropriate for the same.

ART. 12. To see what action the town will take in regard to the town farm and boarding the paupers.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for repairs for the South End bridges and approaches thereto for the ensuing year.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to increase the number of electric lights for lighting the streets, or do or act anything relative thereto.

ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchase of a power sprayer for the extermination of brown-tail and gypsy moths.

ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to accept from the representative of the estate of Sarah E. Ward, deceased, the sum of two hundred dollars bequeathed to said town in trust, and to invest said sum and use the income yearly to keep the Elm's lot in the cemetery in good condition.

ART. 17. To see what action the town will take in relation to the purchase of a lot of land suitable for a town dump, or do or act anything relative thereto.

ART. 18. To see what action the town will take relative to the purchase of an outfit for sealer of weights and measures, and such further action in said matter as prescribed by law.

ART. 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to the disposition of the uncollected taxes due the town.

ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to replace any of the old wooden sidewalks with a more permanent material, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to invest the sum of six hundred dollars constituting the following mentioned trusts and

donations to the Town for the purpose of the care of cemetery lots and cemeteries, viz.:

John Greenleaf, donation in trust,	\$100.00
Ann H. Bailey, " " "	300.00
Mary T. Scott, " " "	200.00

Each of said trusts so created to be invested as provided by section 14 of chapter 20 of the Revised Statutes, and to be under such control of the Selectmen as is provided by Section 1 of Chapter 262 of the Laws of 1907.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to permit George P. Colby, or his assigns, to use the dock between the wharf of said Colby and the Wiscasset Bridge, so called, for the purpose of erecting and maintaining a building or platform over said dock, or do or act anything in relation to same.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the road as laid out by the Selectmen, beginning at the Westport Ferry Road, so called, and continuing to the dwelling house of M. A. Ready; and appropriate such sum as is necessary for land damage and construction.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the road as laid out by the Selectmen on the Creek Hill, so called, leading from Clark's Point to the main road; also to raise and rebuild the bridge across Mill Creek, and to make the necessary fill to diminish the grade between said bridge and the W., W. & F. R. R. crossing, and appropriate such sum as is necessary for land damage and construction.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Mrs. Sarah Blake for damage to her dwelling house caused by blasting on the highway near said dwelling house, year 1910.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting a copy thereof, attested by you, in a public

and conspicuous place in said town seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return of this warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Selectmen or Town Clerk, on or before the time of holding said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the time and place above stated.
