Superintendent's Report

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Wiscasset:

Gentlemen:

In conformity to law and custom your superintendent respectfully submits the following report at the close of the fiscal year, March 1, 1926.

Another regular session of thirty-six weeks has closed, and, fortunately, without interruption. The schools are in a highly satisfactory condition and good progress has been made. I feel that, on the whole, the year has been a profitable one. The work has been conducted according to a well planned schedule with an effort to strengthen a bit here and there where possible.

· The fall term opened with the following teachers in charge:

Jessie Jackson-First Grammar, 28 pupils.

Zina Davis-Second Grammar, 34 pupils

Ethel Redonnett-Intermediate, 27 pupils.

Elinor Cutts-Primary, 31 pupils.

Lillian Smith—North, 16 pupils.

Mary Trussell-West, 7 pupils.

Edna Currier—South, 19 pupils.

Helen White-Birch Point, 21 pupils.

The last school census numbered 386 persons, a decrease of six. The number of pupils registered will not vary greatly from that of the preceding year. The aggregate attendance has been a little larger. During the present term the attendance at North, Birch Point, South and Primary schools has been broken to some extent, due to illness among the pupils. We regret to report the death of two of our little people, Richard

Ifill and Roberta Shea. The registration at West School is small, but the children are very regular in attendance and are doing good work. We would recommend the continuation of that school.

There has been but little change in the teaching force. Mrs. Currier was returned to South school in place of Miss Bradford, resigned, and was granted leave of absence during winter. Mrs. Metcalf, a former teacher of the school kindly consented to supply for her. The resignation of Miss West, our primary teacher was greatly regretted by us all.

Miss West has given long service and has ever been a dependable and efficient teacher. Miss Elinor Cutts, a normal graduate and successful young teacher was secured for the primary department and we felt fortunate in securing her services.

The teachers' salaries have remained same as last year with the exception that Mrs. Currier was raised one dollar per week. They are now as follows:

Village teachers, \$18.00 per week; North, South and Birch Point teachers, \$16.00 per week; West school teacher, \$15.00 per week, or \$612.00, \$576.00 and \$540.00 respectively, per year. These salaries are rather lower than teachers of equal ability and training receive elsewhere. We have a strong corps of teachers deserving of the highest degree of confidence. As a co-worker with them, I can hardly commend their faithfulness and devotion to their pupils' good too highly. I deeply appreciate their cheerfulness in co-operating in every endeavor for the good of their schools.

During such visits as I have been able to make at the Academy, I have, as usual, been very favorably impressed with the appearance of the school, and thoroughness of the work done. Principal Sewall and his assistants have earned the fullest confidence and appreciation of the patrons and citizens. As his report of the Academy is expected it will be read with interest,

and, I have no doubt, will meet with approval and afford some a better understanding as to the work of that institution.

As the financial condition of the schools will appear in the town report, citizens are referred to that document. It costs to maintain schools and the tax payers may rightly insist that the investment yield the best results possible under the circumstances. I believe that Wiscasset is receiving good value for the money invested, even though the results, present or future, cannot be estimated in hard cash. Our young people are our most valuable asset and should have the best possible opportunity for making useful citizens.

The feeling which has existed for some time on the part of the school officials, that a readjustment of the educational program might be of decided advantage, led to the appointing of a committee to consider the feasibility of conducting a junior high school. The report of that committee is awaited with interest. It is our belief that such school, functioning with the Academy, would greatly strengthen our school system.

Outside of the usual expenditures for the upkeep of school property, the important repairs of the past year were made at Birch Point. The school house was equipped with an approved sanitary toilet and wood shed combination, the old shed being made useful. In spite of a rather difficult situation a very creditable piece of work was done. The school room was treated to a coat of fresh paint and whitewash and greatly improved in appearance. The exterior of the building needs paiting badly, a matter which should receive early attention. We would advise that repairs on West school house be made the coming summer. With the above exceptions the buildings are in excellent condition.

In concluding my brief report I wish to express my deepest appreciation of the opportunity of serving the schools so long,

for the generous co-operation accorded and for the many courtesies and helpful suggestions received.

D., 1926, at 10 o'clock, in the forenoon and then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.

Reconnect - Programmes

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk, for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years.

Art. 4. To choose one or more Road Commissioners.

Art. 5. To choose a Board of Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year. (Including a member of the School Board, for three years).

- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no," on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916."
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State and State Aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 8, 17, 26, 27, and 28 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will appropriate and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for interest and reduction of the town debt, the maintenance and support of schools, support of poor, repairs of roads and bridges, and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$300 for repair and gravel, beginning at the corner near the residence of Melville Dickinson, and extending south on the road leading past the residence of Walter Leavitt.
 - Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$300 for repair and gravel on what is known as the Ox-Horn Corner road.

- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$300 for repair and gravel beginning on the road near the residence of Samuel Lafond and continuing southerly and easterly toward Wiscasset Village, where most needed.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$700 for the repair and gravel for the improved and unimproved sections of the Gardiner and Sheepscot roads, including Federal street.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Superintending School Committee to make a contract with the Trustees of Wiscasset Academy, for the tuition of its scholars, qualified to attend such school, in accordance with the provisions of Section 84, of Chapter 16 of the Revised Statutes.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for maintenance of a free high school for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to continue the Lowelltown school, so called.
 - Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to purchase the two Traffic Beacons, now established in the village and appropriate and raise the necessary sum of money for same, or do or act anything relating thereto.
 - Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to borrow on the faith and credit of the town such sums of money from time to time during the ensuing municipal year as may be necessary for the payment of town charges, such sums to be paid during the said year.

- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for outlay on the town cemeteries.
 - Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to accept a bequest of \$100 from the Executor of the Estate of Annie A. Blinn, to be held in trust and the income therefrom to be used in the perpetual care of the lot in the cemetery where the said Annie A. Blinn is buried.

- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to oil the principal streets of the village as heretofore, and what sum of money it will appropriate and raise therefor.
 - Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the payment of hydrant rental for the ensuing year.

- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise money and what sum, for Wiscasset Public Library.
 - Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise under this article to be paid by the Town Treasurer on warrant properly drawn to the order of the Treasurer of the Maine Development Association, a corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of Maine, for the purpose of developing the resources and attractions of the State of Maine, it being understood that all of said money shall go for direct publicity and none of it to be used for salaries or expenses of any sort.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will authorize its Selectmen to sell and convey by properly executed deed to Rines Brothers of Wiscasset, Maine, the two lots or parcels of land, situated on the Easterly side of Water street, opposite to the Postoffice, and fix a price for same.
 - Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to instruct and authorize its Board of Superintending School Committee, to have the lines run on the lot of land known as the "Ball Ground," particularly pertaining to the Southern line of said lot.
 - Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$100 toward the establishment and maintenance of a Rest Room.
