Superintendent's Report

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Wiscasset.

Gentlemen:

Your Superintendent respectfully submits the following brief report of your schools for the fiscal year ending March 1, 1927.

It was gratifying to be able to report the schools in a very satisfactory and prosperous condition. Good work has been accomplished and a good measure of progress made. The year has been one of harmonious working together, of officials, teachers and pupils, and the school machinery has functioned very smoothly.

At the opening of the present school year the Board adopted a new term schedule. Instead of three terms of 14, 11 and 11 weeks respectively, a four term plan of 13 7, 8 and 8 weeks was adopted as an experiment. It is not certain that this plan will be permanent. At this date it is too early to form a definite opinion as to its success and popularity until further trial.

All of the schools have been in session thirty-six weeks without loss of time, or hold-ups.

The last school census, which we think was accurate, revealed the presence of 394 persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years, 200 males and 194 females. This number represents an increase of eight persons over the previous year.

Six of our former teachers accepted reelection. We sustained a real loss in the resignation of Miss Cutts who come to us well trained, and who performed a highly

successful service in the primary school. We were fortunate however, in securing Mrs. Preble for her former department. We also lost by resignation Miss Trussell, after two years of service at West School. Miss Gladys White, a product of our own schools, and a normal graduate, was assigned to that school. We probably have the strongest corps of teachers yet employed. Their ability is recognized and their reputation for efficiency, honest effort and devotion to duty require no eulogy.

A request was made by the village teachers for a salary increase of \$2.00 per week, half of which was granted by the committee after due consideration. The same increase was granted to the rural teachers who have been in service. The wage schedule of the present school year is as follows: Grade teachers \$19.00 per week. Teachers of North, Birch Point and South Schools \$17.00 per week. West School teacher \$15.00 weekly.

It was also felt that the janitor of the village schools was not receiving a just remuneration so his wage was raised to \$17.00 per week. The janitor has not only been very faithful to his trust, but his general usefulness has contributed towards a substantial saving in various ways.

About the usual number of pupils are registered and the attendance has been nearly normal. An epidemic of measles prevailed in the village schools, also to some extent at Birch Point, in the early fall, and the attendance of many pupils was temporarily interrupted. The primary pupils are always irregular, especially during winter, which is to be expected. South School shows an enviable attendance record. No pupil has been tardy during the past term and six have lost no time. There is an opportunity for better cooperation of the home in securing as large aggregate attendance as possible, as every

pupil at school is an asset. Our portion of state school fund being somewhat larger this year, would indicate a larger aggregate attendance during 1925-1926. We could wish that every parent might realize his full responsibility of keeping his child at school whenever possible. Satisfactory progress cannot otherwise be expected.

Though my visits at the academy have not been frequent, I have always felt a deep interest in the pupils there. I hold in high esteem as ever, the ability of the faculty and the efficiency of their work. It seems to me the duty of citizens and patrons to give the schools their loyal support. There is little doubt, but the product of the academy will compare favorably with that of the majority of secondary schools similarly situated, and similarly handicapped.

Last summer, at the request of the State Department, I made a survey of school rooms, to ascertain in what respects they were "standard," according to the accepted i ea of the term. In sanitary conditions, North, South and Birch Point schools were found to meet standard requirements. In room capacity as per number of pupils all were O.K. In the matter of heating only the South School was approved. In lighting, none measured quite up to standard, though the North and South schools were much improved in the above respect. Improvements on West School had not been made at time of survey. The above statements refer to the outside schools. All conditions for standard rooms are practically met in the grammar building.

Our schools have been amply supplied with up-to-date text books and plenty of useful material as needed. I have found the usual appropriation of \$400 reasonably sufficient for this purpose. Everything for schools is expensive enough, and much is poor for the price. Books

are intended to be short-lived and most of them are. Money can easily be wasted in the purchase of school material, and one of the best pieces of service that a superintendent can render, is through his ability to discriminate, where so much is good, in making a choice of the most useful for his needs.

Work in all the schools has been uniform so far as possible, all pupils faring alike. The only innovations during the year have been a study of the constitution, and the introduction of Every Day Civics. We shall also provide each school with the "Ayer's Scale" of writing this spring.

To observe the development of many children, physically, mentally and morally, through many years; to have shared in the pleasure of many of them as they have successfully finished their secondary work; and to have had the privilege of being associated with several of them as my teachers, has been an unusual experience, and one that has been deeply appreciated. We hope that our efforts to be of service to them, may have been, in some small measure, successful.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the loyalty of my fellow teachers, of the many courtesies shown me by the people of Wiscasset; and of the continued tolerance and confidence of my officials.

Town Warrant

State of Maine.

To Chancellor C. Blagdon, Constable, of the Town of Wiscasset, in the County of Lincoln,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby notified and required to warn the inhabitants of the Town of Wiscasset, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Red Men's Hall in said Wiscasset, on Monday, the fourteenth day of March, A.D. 1927, at ten o'clock in the forenoon and then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years.
- Art. 4. To choose one Selectman for the term of two years, to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of John F. Jackson.
 - Art. 5. To choose one or more Road Commissioners.
- Art. 6. To choose a Board of Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

- Art. 7. To choose all other necessary officers for the ensuing year (including a member of the School Board, for three years).
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 9. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916, or under the provisions of Section 21, Chapter 25, R. S. amended by Chapter 258, P. L. 1917.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State and State aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Sections 8, 17, 26, 27 and 28 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$700 for maintenance of Third Class Highways, including Federal Street.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will appropriate and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for interest and reduction of the town debt, the maintenance and support of schools, support of poor, repairs of roads and bridges, and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$350 for repairs and gravel beginning where left off last year and extending south on road leading past the residence of F. R. Hodgdon.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to resurface Bradford Street and make repairs and permanent drainage to that section of road leading past the residence of Walter Averill and C. Q. Bailey, agreeable to the petition of Clarence Bailey and twelve others.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$300 for the repair and gravel on what is known as the Old Stage road leading from the ice pond by Edwin L. Holbrook's place.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for gravel and material, to be expended upon the road leading from the school house, at the North District, so called, to the Gardiner road, past the dwelling of Thomas A. Fowles and Fred Nute.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$300 for repair and gravel on the Old Sheepscot road, beginning at the Thompson bridge, so called, and extending northeasterly past the residence of Everett Jackson.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote for a special appropriation of the sum of \$300 to gravel the road leading from Damon's Corner or the residence of Wilson Blagdon, to the Dresden town line, in places where most needed.

- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for gravel and improvement of road between Montsweag Station and residence of Fred A. Soule.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for gravel and improvement of the road leading from the Sheepscot road to the property of the Northern Pines Development Co.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote instructing the Road Commissioners to consult with, and act in conjunction with Sol Holbrook, in relation to the improvement and repair of that portion of the Holbrook road, so called. between the ice pond and the Holbrook homestead.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will authorize the purchase of a Fordson Fulcrawler Tractor, Sargent Snow Plow, and one man grader for use with the same to be used in the maintenance of the town highways and that a sum of money be appropriated and raised sufficient for the purchase of the said tractor and equipment.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to accept as a town way, the road as laid out by the Selectmen, upon petition of fifty-one citizens and legal voters of the town of Wiscasset, as follows:

Beginning at a point where the right of way of Irving R. Lewis, joins the Old County road, so called, on the premises of Emery H. Gibbs, and extending in a southerly direction to the southerly line of the land of said Emery H. Gibbs, thence westerly over the land of said Emery H. Gibbs, about sixteen rods, thence crossing the

hereinbefore mentioned south line of the said Emery H. Gibbs, to land of Etta M. Barnes, thence continuing in a westerly direction over the land of the said Etta M. Barnes, for a distance of about sixteen rods to the State road, known as the Atlantic highway, and the proposed road to be two rods in width; and to appropriate and raise such sum of money as may be necessary for construction of the proposed road, and for land damages, or to do or act in any way in relation to same.

- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Superintending School Committee to make a contract with the trustees of Wiscasset Academy for the tuition of its scholars, qualified to attend such school, in accordance with the provisions of Section 84, of Chapter 16, of the Revised Statutes.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for maintenance of a free high school for the ensuing year.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to continue the Lowelltown School, so called.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to borrow on the faith and credit of the town such sums of money from time to time during the ensuing municipal year as may be necessary for the payment of town charges, such sums to be paid during the said year.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for outlay on the town cemeteries.

- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for one-fifth part of the maintenance of Westport Ferry, and keeping the landing in safe condition.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the removal of snow from the highways.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to replace any of the old wooden sidewalks with a more permanent material and what sum of money it will appropriate and raise therefor.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the repair of wooden sidewalks.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for electric street lights for the ensuing year.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to oil the principal streets of the village as heretofore, and what sum of money it will appropriate and raise therefor.
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the payment of hydrant rental for the ensuing year.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise money and what sum, for Wiscasset Public Library.

- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to install and mantain an electric street light on the pole near the end of Edgecomb bridge, between the Turner Centre Creamery and Wiscasset Grain Company buildings. Also on pole near the residence of Alfred Higgins, on Flagg Street.
- Art. 39. To hear the reports of the Superintending School Committee, relative to the survey of the south boundary of the school lot, and see what further action the town will take in said matter.
- Art. 40. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of placing signs at the intersection of streets showing the name of the streets or do or act anything thereon.
- Art. 41. To see if the town will cooperate with the State and Federal government in controlling the white pine blister rust, and raise a sum of money for the purpose.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$100 toward the maintenance of a rest room, to be operated in the same manner as last year.
- Art. 43. To see what action the town will take regarding the removal of snow from the sidewalks of the village.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to deed to Joseph L. Neal, its claim by virtue of a tax deed in the wharf property, known as the Neal wharf, upon payment by the said Joseph L. Neal, an amount equal to the sum for which the property tax would have been assessed since 1916, together with a reasonable rate of interest and expense of tax sale by Collector.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to sell a portion of the school house lot, on the northerly side of said lot, easterly of the residence of Dr. W. E. Gorham.

Art. 46. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting a copy thereof, attested by you, in a public and conspicuous place in said town seven days at least before the time of said meeting.

Hereof, fail not and due return make of this Warrant to the Selectmen or the Town Clerk, with your doings thereon, on or before the time of holding said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the time and place named above.
