She first joined the office staff in 1986 as a part-time code enforcement officer. Using a door as a desk in the library, she worked tirelessly to maintain the balance of enforcing federal, state and local laws, fairly and compassionately dealing with residents and camp owners, protecting the quality of the town's waters. With the addition of electrical and plumbing inspector jobs, she soon became a full-time employee.

Getting a real desk and moving into the town office room, Theresa was soon learning about motor vehicle registrations, welfare laws, budget and tax processes, Morgan's Beach, public works and cemetery work. More importantly, she came to know the needs and concerns of the people of Enfield. Four town managers from away came and left. As the interim town manager Myron Doane and the selectmen started the search for another new town manager in 2000, they realized that Theresa had the knowledge of what the job entailed, the needs of the Town of Enfield, and the personality to work effectively with the selectmen, the other employees, and the people.

Theresa saw many changes while working for the town: she worked on the sewer project in West Enfield, met with neighboring towns on fire protection, ambulance service and a new bridge over the Penobscot. She saw the dump become a transfer station. Several additions were made to the Town Office and Community building and the town hall was transferred to private owners. She dealt with a variety of selectmen and employees. She even performed a few marriages along the way.

Best wishes and happy retirement. Through your hard work and dedication, you will be remembered as one of the greats. You will be missed, but we wish nothing but the best for you on your retirement. It may be an ending, a closing but it's also a new beginning for Theresa Thurlow-Edwards!

PUBLIC NOTICES

TRANSFER STATION STICKERS

Stickers are mandatory for all resident vehicles entering the Transfer Station and are available at the Town Office. Please be sure one has been assigned to your vehicle. Starting in December 2016 the Town began use of town bags which are available for purchase at the Town Office and Transfer Station. Any questions see the Transfer Station Guidelines flyer in the Town Report.

PERMITS

Any person planning to build will probably need a building, electrical, or plumbing permit. Please contact the Code Enforcement Officer at the Town Office before beginning any such project..

ALL TAXPAYERS

Title 36, Section 706, MRSA states: Before making an assessment, the tax assessor shall give reasonable notice, in writing, to the inhabitants by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or notify them in such a way as the Town at its annual meeting directs, to make and bring to him true and perfect lists of their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation which were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner after such notice is given, does not bring in such a listing, he is hereby barred from making application to the assessor or the County Commissioners for any abatement of taxes, unless the property owner satisfies the Assessor or County Commissioners that he was unable to offer the list at the time appointed.

NOTICE OF AVAILABILITY OF GENERAL ASSISTANCE

The municipality of Enfield administers a General Assistance program for the support of the poor. Pursuant to Title 22, MRSA section 4305, the municipal officers have adopted an ordinance establishing that program, and it is available at the Town Office for inspection. Also available for inspection is a copy of the state's general assistance statutes, as copies of the state law are made available to the municipality by the Maine Department of Human Services.

People who wish to apply for General Assistance may do so by appointment only at the Town Office on Monday Thru Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. People may call the Town Office at 732-4270 to arrange an appointment.

Any person unable to contact the local administrator may contact the Department of Human Services at 1-800-442-6003.

DOG OWNERS

On or before the first day of January, it is the duty of anyone owning a dog six months or older to go to the Town Clerk to pay the dog tax and obtain a license tag. Owners must also furnish proof that the dog has been inoculated against rabies within the past 3 years.

VETERANS

If veterans or their widows wish to become eligible for a property tax exemption or partial exemption, they must file written proof of entitlement with the Tax Assessor on or before the 1st day of April. Certain eligibility requirements must be met. Forms can be obtained at the Town Office.

SHORELAND ZONING PERMIT

All people planning to undertake any type of activity in or near the shoreland areas of Cold Stream Lake or the Penobscot River must contact the Code Enforcement Officer at the Town Office to obtain a permit.

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION

MRSA 36 Section 681 provides a property tax exemption of up to the just value of \$20,000 for each Maine Resident's homestead. To qualify, the applicant must have owned a homestead in Maine for a minimum of 12 months prior to April 1, and declare the homestead they owned on April 1st of the current tax year to be their permanent place of residence. The application for exemption must be filed with the municipal assessor where the homestead is located by April 1. Homeowners who qualified for exemption for tax year 2018 and whose homestead status has not changed for 2019 need not reapply.

INSTRUCTIONS

SECTION 1. Check the appropriate box related to each question. You must check all three boxes to qualify for the Maine homestead property tax exemption. If you have moved during the year and owned a homestead in Maine prior to your move, enter the address of the homestead you moved from on line 1.b(1). Your ownership of a homestead must have been continuous for the 12-month period prior to application. If you did not check all boxes in this section, you do not qualify for the homestead property tax exemption. A person on active duty serving in the Armed Forces of the United States who is permanently stationed at a military or naval post, station or base in this state is deemed to be a permanent Maine resident. A person on active duty serving in the Armed Forces of the United States does not include a member of the National Guard or the Reserves.

SECTION 2. Enter your full name(s) as shown on your property tax bill, the physical location of your home and your mailing address, if different than the physical location.

SECTION 3. This section gives the local assessor information which may be used to determine if you qualify and should support your answers to the questions in SECTION 1. Please check the appropriate box for each of the statements in this section.

At least one of the owners of the homestead must sign this document. Please file the application with your local municipal assessor. If, for any reason, you are denied exemption by the assessor, you may appeal the assessor's decision under the abatement statute, 36 M.R.S. § 841.

DEFINITIONS

Homestead. "Homestead" means residential real property owned by an individual or individuals and occupied by those individuals as their permanent residence. Residential real property held in a revocable living trust for a beneficiary who occupies the property as his or her permanent residence also qualifies as a homestead.

Permanent residence. "Permanent residence" means that place where an individual has a true, fixed, and permanent home and principal establishment to which the individual, whenever absent, has the intention of returning. An individual may have only one permanent residence at a time and, once a permanent residence is established, that residence is presumed to continue until circumstances indicate otherwise.

Permanent resident. "Permanent resident" means an individual who has established a permanent residence.

A cooperative housing corporation may apply for a homestead exemption to be applied against the valuation of property of the corporation that is occupied by qualifying shareholders. To qualify, the corporation must complete an Application for Maine Homestead Property Tax Exemption for Cooperative Housing Corporations.

Representing Maine in the United States Senate is an honor.

I continue my work on the Senate Armed Services Committee, each year authorizing the funding required to build our military capabilities and ensuring that our service members are trained and equipped to defend our nation. I was pleased to be part of a bipartisan effort to enact a new law to simplify the appeals review process to reduce the backlog our veterans are facing, as well as a new law that provides critical funding to the VA Choice Program, allowing veterans in rural Maine to access services closer to home.


While my committee work is important, working to combat the opioid epidemic is one of my top priorities. Although Congress has made some important strides, much remains to be done to provide additional funding for prevention, treatment and enforcement. I am working with colleagues on both sides of the aisle to pressure the Drug Enforcement Administration to reduce the amount of opioids produced and to thwart the flow of fentanyl and other deadly drugs into our country.

I am very optimistic about the integrated, multiagency effort I led with Senator Collins to foster innovation and commercialization in Maine's forest economy. Through the Economic Development Assessment Team (EDAT) we are already experiencing increased federal investments that will strengthen our existing forest products industry and help support job creation in rural communities. Initiatives like Cross Laminated Timber, Combined Heat and Power, nanocellulose, 3D printing with biobased materials and other biobased products will mean that Maine's wood-basket will continue to be a major jobs and economic contributor for our future.

Finally, the coming year will continue the work of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence in the ongoing investigation of Russian interference in the 2016 election. Our Committee has held seven public hearings and numerous classified sessions, reviewed tens of thousands of pages of documents and conducted hundreds of interviews. I remain focused on the security of our elections and committed to developing strategies to prevent interference by foreign governments in our democracy.

May 2018 be a good year for you, your family, your community and our great State.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from this past year.

Maine has the oldest average age in the nation. As Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities for the Committee are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security. Following the Committee's investigation into skyrocketing prescription drug costs, I authored bipartisan legislation to foster generic competition, which was signed into law. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for seniors to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. To support the 40 million family caregivers in the United States, I am proud to have authored the RAISE Family Caregivers Act to create a coordinated strategy to support family members who make countless personal and financial sacrifices to care for their loved ones.

The opioid crisis touches families and communities across our state. As a member of the Appropriations Committee, I fought for significant increases in funding to support community, law-enforcement, and public health efforts. In April, the State of Maine was awarded over \$2 million to fight this devastating public health crisis. Additionally, I have authored legislation to support grandparents and other extended family members who are raising grandchildren as a result of the nation's opioid epidemic.

Biomedical research has the potential to improve and save lives, and also supports good jobs at research facilities here in Maine. Last year, the Appropriations Committee approved a \$2 billion increase for the National Institutes of Health for the third consecutive year. This includes an increase of nearly 30 percent for research on Alzheimer's, our nation's most costly disease. As founder and co-chair of the Senate Diabetes Caucus, I work to raise awareness of the threats posed by diabetes, invest in research, and improve access to treatment options. My bill to establish a national commission of health care experts on diabetes care and prevention was signed into law in 2017.

We owe our veterans so much. Last year, I worked to secure the authorization of a Community-Based Outpatient Clinic in Portland to support the health care of Maine's veterans in the southern part of our state. I also worked to secure funding extensions to help veterans throughout rural Maine receive health care within their communities. I also worked to secure funding for housing vouchers for veterans to reduce veterans' homelessness.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard for construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen our national security and preserve great jobs in our state.

As chairman of the Transportation and Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I worked to increase funding for the TIGER program that has provided Maine with more than \$122 million for vital transportation projects. For housing, I worked to provide \$160 million to help communities protect children from the harmful effects of lead poisoning.


Growing our economy remains a top priority. I supported the comprehensive tax reform bill because it will help lower- and middle-income families keep more of their hard-earned money; boost the economy; and encourage businesses, both small and large, to grow and create jobs here in Maine and around the country. This legislation contains key provisions I authored that are important to Mainers, including preserving the deduction

for state and local taxes, expanding the deduction for medical expenses, and enabling public employees such as firefighters, teachers, and police officers, as well as clergy and employees of nonprofits, to make "catch-up" contributions to their retirement accounts. I led the effort to ensure that the tax cut will not trigger automatic budget cuts to Medicare or any other programs.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As of December 2017, I have cast more than 6,500 consecutive votes, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Fellow Mainers,

It is a true honor to serve on behalf of the honest and hardworking men and women of our Great State. As your Representative, I am proud that, by working with everyone – Republicans, Democrats, and Independents – we were able to achieve some major victories for Maine in 2017.

Creating and protecting jobs has been and remains one of my top priorities in Congress, and this year we had some big successes. Continuing our work from last Congress, I joined forces with Senators Collins and King to fight to ensure the Department of Defense uses American tax dollars to purchase American made products, like the shoes made by the nearly 900 hardworking Mainers at New Balance. Too often in the past, our foreign competitors made these shoes for our troops, but we won the fight this year and now those shoes can be made in the Pine Tree State. This is a huge victory for the 900 hardworking Mainers at New Balance in Skowhegan, Norway, and Norridgewock.

In addition, the House of Representatives voted 418 – 1 to pass my bill to help business development and job creation in Old Town, and the House Natural Resources Committee voted unanimously in favor of my bill to help worm and clam harvesters settle boundary disputes with Acadia National Park. These are two more big wins for job creation in Maine, and I will not let up one inch until they become law.

Thankfully, this year we stopped the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) in its tracks and fought against other unfair trade deals. I testified before the International Trade Commission (ITC) on behalf of Colombia Forest Products in Aroostook County when illegal Chinese products were hurting their business and threatening its 161 workers. I was thrilled the ITC ruled in favor of Mainers and against illegal Chinese manufacturers. Mainers are the hardest working people in the world and we can compete and win against anyone, but the rules must be fair.

As a new member of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, I created a Veterans Advisory Panel comprised of Maine Veterans from all corners of our Great State. This panel gives Maine Veterans a direct seat at the table and a voice in Washington, D.C. Together, we worked to address malpractice at Togus, resolved numerous late payments from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to several rural Maine hospitals, and settled dozens of Maine Veteran's disability claims at the VA.

Unacceptably, this past year multiple members of Congress committed sexual harassment in the workplace. This is reprehensible behavior and should not be tolerated anywhere. As the lead Republican, I joined Democrats and Republicans to pass a resolution that significantly changes outdated sexual harassment procedures in the House of Representatives. Employees should always feel safe and comfortable in their own workplace, and it is past time Congress resolves this issue.

Lastly, I am extremely proud of the services that our Congressional office has been able to provide to help hundreds of Mainers in the past two years. Whether it is helping a Veteran navigate the bureaucracy at the

VA, assisting an elderly Mainer with Medicare issues, or advising a Mainer with a case at the IRS, my office is always available to help. Dear Citizens of Enfield:

For the past seven years as your Governor, my priority has been to make Maine—our people—prosper. Helping you keep more money in your wallet by reducing taxes has been part of that mission.

Too many Maine families are facing skyrocketing property taxes that strain household budgets. Our elderly on fixed incomes are particularly vulnerable to these increases. School budgets are often blamed for annual increases in property taxes. But there's another reason. A tremendous amount of land and property value has been taken off the tax rolls, leaving homeowners to pick up the tab.

As of 2016, towns and cities owned land and buildings valued at nearly \$5.5 billion statewide. Large and wealthy non-profits, such as hospitals and colleges, often escape paying property taxes on their vast real estate holdings—totaling more than \$5.1 billion statewide.

In Maine, nearly 2.5 million acres of land have been set aside for conservation by the federal and state governments and non-profit organizations, including land trusts. Municipalities are losing out on property taxes on an estimated \$2 billion in land that has been either removed from the tax rolls or prohibited from development—shifting the cost of municipal services to local homeowners through higher property taxes.

It's time to recognize the results of taking property off the tax rolls and identify solutions to reduce the burden on our homeowners. My administration's proposals have been met with staunch resistance.

In 1993, about 35,800 acres of land were documented as land-trust owned. That number has increased by an astonishing 1,270 percent. Land trusts now control over 490,000 acres with an estimated value of \$403 million. We must restore the balance. We will be working this session to ensure all land owners are contributing to the local tax base. It's time for them to pay their fair share.

I encourage you to ask your local officials how much land in your municipality has been taken off the tax rolls, as well as how much in tax revenue that land would have been contributing today to offset your property taxes.

I hope 2018 finds you and your family doing well. It is an honor to represent you and this community as your state senator, and I look forward to working hard for Enfield in the upcoming session.


Property tax relief remains a top priority for me, and the Legislature made great strides in 2017. This past year, my colleagues and I fought to increase the Homestead Property Exemption from \$15,000 to \$20,000, protected state funding for local services such as fire departments and road maintenance, and increased public K-12 education funding by \$162 million over the biennium. These efforts will decrease the pressure on municipalities to increase mil rates and ultimately reduce the property tax burden that has been too high for too long.

Additionally, I would like to share some information about the state's unclaimed property list. "Unclaimed property" is money owed to Maine people by third parties, such as former employers, banks or utility companies. It could be from a forgotten account, an overpaid bill or uncollected wages, and could be unclaimed as a result of a change in name, addresses or bank account. Go to www.maine.gov/unclaimed or call 1-888-283-2808 to see if the state is holding any unclaimed property for you.

One of the best parts of being a legislator is bringing students into the State House to serve as Senate Pages. Pages assist legislators by handing out documents during the session, passing messages between senators, and performing other tasks critical to the legislative process. It's an excellent way to see Maine's government in action, and families can make a day of it by touring the State House and other nearby attractions. As spring arrives we think in terms of building, boating, swimming and camping activities on and around the waters of Cold Stream Pond. My theme always seems to be cutting in the shoreline so I won't stray far from it. If we want to keep our water quality at the high standard we now enjoy everyone has to be a better steward of the land.

The ordinance is quite clear on what needs to be done in order to prevent erosion, silt, weeds, runoff and other problems that occur. In order to prevent most of this from taking place, we need to stop cutting trees and vegetation.

The Cold Stream Lake Association members Jim and Laurie Fenwood are working hard to encourage home owners to practice the lake smart formula for a clean lake and protecting the lake for years to come. The Association has a grant to help correct some problems. If you are planning a project on Cold Stream Pond, Penobscot River or any stream or wetland you need to plan for a permit and make sure the application is completely filled out including the site and erosion control plan. This needs to be in place during and after construction to contain any runoff from the project. Cutting in resource protection area around Cold Stream Pond is not allowed unless you are timber harvesting or have applied and received the permit.

The Planning Board continues to work on ordinances, subdivision requests, water quality and various other permits. They meet on the second Wednesday of each month.

General Guide to Consumer Fireworks Use

If your community has no ordinances restricting or prohibiting the use of consumer fireworks in your community, then Maine Public Law Chapter 416, provides the following applicable guidelines for using these products.

1. § 223-A. §§ 8 (A) Consumer fireworks may be used between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 10 p.m., except that on the following dates they may be used between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 12:30 a.m. the following day:
 - (1) July 4th;
 - (2) December 31st; and
 - (3) The weekends immediately before and after July 4th and December 31st.

2. § 223-A. §§ 8 (B) A person may use consumer fireworks only on that person's property or on the property of a person who has consented to the use of consumer fireworks on that property.

A person who violates this subsection commits a civil violation for which a fine of not less than \$50 and not more than \$500, plus court costs, may be adjudges for any one offense.

3. § 223-A. §§ 11 (D) A person under 21 years of age may not purchase, use or possess consumer fireworks within the State of Maine.
4. §221-A, §§1-A The following products are prohibited for use in Maine.

A. Missile-type rockets, as defined by the State Fire Marshal by rule;

B. Helicopters and aerial spinners, as defined by the State Fire Marshal by rule; and

C. Sky rockets and bottle rockets. For purposes of this paragraph, "sky rockets and bottle rockets" means cylindrical tubes containing not more than 20 grams of chemical composition, as defined by the State Fire Marshal by rule, with a wooden stick attached for guidance and stability that rise into the air upon ignition and that may produce a burst of color or sound at or near the height of flight.

Plastic - any item that has the recycle symbol on it.

Drinks - juice bottles, soda cans/bottles, beer/wine/alcohol cans/bottles.



Household Items to be Shredded

Do not bring or leave reusable goods such as, wooden, metal, or plastic furniture, books, CDs, toys, exercise equipment, working electronics.

Household Electronics

TVs, VCRs/CD players, microwaves, computers, cell phones, hazardous materials - fluorescent bulbs, mercury thermometers, batteries. If in doubt check with attendant.

Household Appliances

Washing machines, dryers, refrigerators, kitchen stoves, freezers.

Household Items

Do not bring all items and scrap.

Household items are for non recyclable items

Shingles, asphalt shingles, gypsum board.
