The present Board had a survey made and found 29.5 miles of such rural roads according to actual measurement. This fact was brought to the attention of the State Highway Commission, which refused to change 1938 allocation for the reason that it was based on a signed certificate of the former Board of Selectmen. The Town, therefore, lost the sum of \$247.05 on account of the failure to make proper certificate of actual mileage. If proper certificate had been made, the sum of \$558.21 would have been available last summer from the State for improvement of R. F. D. roads instead of the \$311.16 received. A mileage of 28.75 miles has been certified by the present Board, and accepted by the Commission. The difference between 29.5 and 28.75 miles being the mileage of State Aid and Third Class road built in 1938. The allotment per mile in 1938 was \$18.30; on the same basis the Town will receive in 1939 \$233.33 more than in 1938, or the sum of \$544.49.

WISCASSET SCHOOL REPORT—1939

During the past year a village school and four rural schools have been maintained in the elementary system, with the following enrollments since the opening of the fall term, 1938: Sub-Primary 15; Primary 18; Intermediate 34; Second Grammar 22; First Grammar 28; Ninth Grade 4; Birch Point 13; South 17; North 11; Lowelltown 2. Attendance and progress have been very satisfactory in all schools.

All details as to personnel of teachers, janitors, etc., together with all financial details of the elementary system, and costs of secondary tuition, are shown elsewhere in this 1939 town report, and in the interests of economy it does not appear necessary to duplicate them here.

Since the Birch Point School and the North School now have electric power available, it is recommended that they be equipped with proper artificial lighting. Better light in schools means: 1. Easier work for the eyes of pupils and teachers; 2. Safer conditions for eyes, nerves, and body; 3. More thorough assimilation of knowledge; 4. More efficient and effective education.

The textbook situation is steadily improving, but the changes in modern life are so rapid, however, that it is not adequate in many ways to use material that is out-of-date. Maps, industries, methods of farming, governments, products, and other vital areas of knowledge, are evolving in many cases with greatest rapidity.

Until such time as the Town is ready to launch upon a definite program of consolidation, it seems best to preserve the integrity of the present rural system by herewith recommending in writing, as required by law, that the Town vote to continue the Lowelltown School for another year, if the voters wish to do so. The School Board may suspend for one year, if, upon facts to arise, it should be deemed advisable.

The Sub-Primary and Helping Teacher at the Village School has proven of greatest help, both with the little ones, in helping them get started in their new school life, and with the older ones as well, since a schedule has been worked out so that this new teacher is able to devote about half time to helping individually all the other pupils in the entire Village School. Thus the village children have the benefit of the same individual help which the pupils in the rural schools have. The instituting of a ninth grade to meet the wishes of leading citizens, for those pupils who appear to need extra preparation for high school, will doubtless assist in raising the general average of pupils graduating from grammar school. New courses have been added under the titles of (1) Study Habits; and (2) Guidance, given to every pupil in every grade to teach how to study more effectively, and how to develop all types of abilities to their fullest extent. The results so far have been most worth-while.

May I say that your School Committee has shown a splendid interest in the Wiscasset schools, and clearly wishes to see them compare favorably with the best in the State. With your continued help and support, this will be possible.

In closing this brief report, I wish to extend grateful thanks to all citizens and friends who have so kindly and loyally helped in the efforts made to give Wiscasset boys and girls a better opportunity.

The Birch Point School building was painted two coats outside after necessary repairs were made.

The best quality Sterling Blackboards were installed at three of our rural schools, namely, North, South and Birch Point.

The inside of both North and South School rooms were painted throughout.

Your committee recommends the following repairs for this year:

Graveling Village School yard.

Foundation North School repaired.

Foundation South School repaired.

Drinking fountain on second floor Grade Building.

We also recommend the Town vote favorably on the article in regard to Playground Equipment for our Village School, also on lighting our two rural schools, the North School and Birch Point, now that power is available.

TOWN WARRANT

With Recommendations of Budget Committee Included

STATE OF MAINE

To CHANCELLOR C. BLAGDON, Constable of the Town of Wiscasset, in
the County of Lincoln, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Wiscasset, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at Red Men's Hall, in said town, on Monday, the 13th day of March, A. D. 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see what action the Town will take on the reports of Town Officers and Superintendent of Schools.

ART. 4. To choose three Selectmen for the term of one year.

ART. 5. To choose a Board of Assessors for the ensuing year.

ART. 6. To choose a Board of Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.

ART. 7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the choosing of Road Commissioners.

ART. 8. To choose a Fire Ward for the ensuing year.

ART. 9. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year, including a member of the School Committee for three years.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to have the town books audited at the end of the year by the State Auditor's Department or by a Public Accountant.

ART. 11. To see what action the Town will take relative to an Excise Tax Collector, fix the compensation for collection of excise tax on motor vehicles, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 12. To fix the compensation of Town Officers and Fire Chief for the ensuing year.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid for State Aid Highways for the year 1939, as provided by Section 20, of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes as amended.

ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

ART. 15. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937. (\$900 Recommended)

ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$1106.70 or any other amount for the maintenance of State and State Aid Highways, during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of the Revised Statutes of 1930, and any amendments thereof. (\$1,106.70 Recommended)

ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$588.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Highways, as required by Section 5, of Chapter 173, Public Laws of 1935. (\$588 Recommended)

ART. 18. To see what action the Town will take, if any, with regard to closing rural schools, and providing transportation for elementary pupils.

ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Superintending School Committee to continue and maintain the Lowelltown School, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Superintending School Committee to make a contract with the Trustees of Wiscasset Academy for the tuition of scholars, qualified to attend such school, in accordance with the Revised Statutes and the Public Laws amendatory thereto.

ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to give a 2% discount on all real and personal estate taxes paid within thirty days of the date of commitment and a 1% discount on other real and personal estate taxes paid within sixty days of the date of commitment, or take any action relative to a discount on taxes.

ART. 23. To see if the Town will raise \$50.00 for cooperative white pine blister rust control work with the State and Federal Government, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to become an assenting employer under the Workmen's Compensation Act, and to purchase Workmen's Compensation Insurance for all employees of the Town, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer to deduct fifty per cent from all accounts payable to those who owe taxes, such deduction to apply to such unpaid taxes, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used in connection with the sum already started to accumulate for the purpose of obtaining funds for a general community house, or take any action relative thereto. (\$100 Recommended)

ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150, more or less, for wiring rural school buildings, or take any action relative thereto. (\$150 Recommended)

ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100, more or less, for school play ground equipment, or take any action relative thereto. (\$100 Recommended)

ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the same wage scale as will be established by the Highway Department of the State of Maine, for work on town ways and bridges, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 30. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$91.00 for public health work in Wiscasset, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

ART. 31. To see what action the Town will take regarding storage facilities for old fire engines No. 1 and 2, or the sale of same, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to abate the balance of 1937 and 1938 taxes of Mary J. Fullerton.

ART. 33. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to issue a permit to John H. Dunton for a location for a Trailer, on the Southerly

side of Main Street, near the residence of Mrs. Eliza W. Holbrook, said trailer to be used for lunch purposes, or do or act anything thereon.

ART. 34. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to widen and improve the section of road between Warlands Corner, so called, on the South Dresden Road and the middle entrance to Greenlawn Cemetery or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 35. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a corporate seal for the inhabitants of the Town of Wiscasset, and to designate a town official to be the custodian of the seal.

ART. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, section 82 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

ART. 37. To see if the Town will invoke the provisions of the decree of the Public Utilities Commission relative to the free personal use of Carlton Bridge by citizens or bona fide residents of the Town of Wiscasset for the calendar year 1940.

ART. 38. To see what action the Town will take relative to the issuance of identification cards in connection with the free use of Carlton Bridge, fix fee for same, the compensation for issuing same, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 39. To see what action the Town will take, if any, with regard to locating a street light on Middle Street at the head of the lane connecting Middle Street with Water Street.

ART. 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to adjust and compromise unpaid taxes with owners, mortgagees, or successors in title, and when adjustment and compromise have been made to execute and deliver in behalf of the town such deeds or other instruments as may be necessary to release the claims of the town in and to any real estate on which unpaid taxes have been so adjusted, compromised or paid, whether said claim is by tax deed, tax lien or otherwise, or do or act anything thereon.

ART. 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any property which the town holds by virtue of tax deeds or liens, and to execute and deliver on behalf of the town such deeds as may be necessary to transfer the right, title and interest of the town.

ART. 42. To see if the Town will authorize the Town Officers to expend funds from appropriations in cooperation with agencies of the Federal or State Governments, provided such expenditures are for the purposes for which the appropriations were made, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 43. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate not exceeding the sum of \$2,000.00 from funds in the town treasury not otherwise appropriated for relief and/or relief projects as found desirable by the Selectmen in cooperation with agencies of the State or Federal Governments, or take any action thereto.

ART. 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the town. Such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during the said current municipal year by taxes.

ART. 45. To choose a Budget Committee of five members or take action relative to a Town Budget.

ART. 46. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting a copy thereof, attested by you, in a public and conspicuous place in said town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof, fail not, and due return make of this warrant to the Selectmen or Town Clerk, with your doings thereon, on or before the time of holding said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for correcting the list of voters at the time and place above named.
