The following is the report of this department for the year ending February 1, 1933.

TYPHOID FEVER

Four cases of typhoid fever occurred at York Harbor last summer. All of these cases occurred in one house. There was no indication that the source of the infection was in York.

The confining of the cases to one household afforded a contrast to the epidemic of 1914. Then the economic life of the community as a summer resort was threatened; this year I do not believe there was any undue alarm. Our summer residents maintained an intelligent questioning alert-

ness which demanded reassurance. I was gratified with the opportunity to have my own activity in this respect fortified by a visit and the generous aid of Dr. George Coombs, the Director of the State Bureau of Health; of Dr. John Pepper, the District Health Officer; of Dr. Elmer Campbell, the Director of the Division of Sanitary Engineering; and by a friend whose kindnesses are of inestimable value in the matter of local contacts as well as of a scientific investigation, Dr. Howard Karsner of York Harbor, the Professor of Pathology at Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio.

Sewage is the source of typhoid infection. Events of last summer demonstrated that a septic tank affords adequate protection of the bathing beach against this contamination. With the advice of the State Bureau of Health and the Assessors of the York Harbor Corporation, I have requested every householder whose sewage is deposited in the salt water, from the Railroad Bridge to Eastern Point, to install a septic tank in the line of the sewer draining his house.

It is pleasant to be able to record that arrangements have been completed for the installation of a permanent chlorination apparatus at Chase's Pond. This, with the

chlorinator which now treats Folly Pond water, will assure to every user a pure water supply without unnatural taste or odor, so long as proper supervision is maintained over apparatus and water shed.

SCARLET FEVER

Twenty-seven cases of scarlet fever have occurred in eleven houses in York this year. There have been five separate outbreaks, each except the last, occurring in and staying confined to one family. One death resulted from this disease, the majority of the other cases being mild.

UNDULANT FEVER

Bang's Disease or "abortion fever" is becoming more frequent in the herds of New England cattle. The economic loss by the untimely termination of pregnancy in otherwise healthy cows is assuming formidable proportions. More pertinent for the purposes of this report is the fact that the disease can be contracted by humans in a form known as undulant fever by drinking the milk of infected cattle or by careless handling of them. It is a serious disease and is being reported more frequently in recent years. This year the first case known to have occurred in York was reported by me.

The important thing is that the three diseases thus far discussed can all be transmitted by milk, and all danger of their transmission by milk can be avoided by proper pasteurization. It is a sad irony that the farmer lad who was made ill with undulant fever this year drank infected milk from his own herd, and then sent the milk along to a pasteurizing plant where it was made safe for everybody else.

TETANUS

The case of tetanus—"lockjaw"—deserves a line because it is a preventable disease—fatal in the majority of cases when it does occur. All wounds infected with garden soil, manure, street dirt, gun powder and wadding, etc., are possible sources of tetanus infection. A timely inoculation with a harmless serum is a preventive—the efficacy of which was demonstrated under war conditions in 1914-18.

TUBERCULOSIS

Two cases of tuberculosis were reported this year, one of which has died. The table appended shows that a winning battle is being fought against this disease—and also demonstrates what still is to be accomplished. The York Lions Club this year has been active in urging earlier hos-

pitalization of these cases—a form of treatment of great value to the individual afflicted and of greater value to all the rest of us in removing danger from the community.

GENERAL MEASURES

In March free vaccination against small pox and inoculation against diphtheria were offered—with again a gratifying but not satisfying response.

In addition to these two measures which will be offered as usual this year I desire to do the Shick Test on as many as will appear for it. This is a test for immunity to diphtheria and should be taken by all who are hesitant about having the toxin-antitoxin and by all who have had it to be absolutely certain that their immunity has been established.

Mr. Thomas Thumith and Mr. George Stover have been reappointed plumbing inspectors under the statute.

Food handlers were examined as usual. The importance of this work is better understood when it is realized that any food handler entering the town may be a typnoid carrier and cause many cases.

The County Health Nurse continued her annual examination of school children, as did the Dental Hygienist supported by the Red Cross and Lions Club.

The inspector from the Department of Agriculture made his annual visit and inspection of dairies, accompanied by the writer.

No unusual nuisances or acute problems of sewage disposal were encountered this year. Many faulty sewage systems continue to exist but conditions are prejudicial to any attempts at remedy at present.

FINANCES

This year a smaller but adequate laboratory was established in the Fire House at York Village, a structure already owned by the town. This will result in a yearly saving of approximately \$200, without any essential sacrifice, allowing a budget reduction of about 17 per cent.

Last June the children of Mr. George Curtis of York Village were quarantined by me for scarlet fever. Proper care in the protection of the community seemed to require the employment of a nurse to be quarantined with the children during the period when they were too sick to care for themselves as there was no mother to care for them. Mr. Curtis was unable to pay the nurse at that time, so I loaned him sufficient funds, secured by a note from his hand payable on or before February 1, 1933. Attempts to collect this note have been unsuccessful in time to erase any record of it from this report.

STATISTICS

In preparing an address to be delivered before the Woman's League of York I learned from the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company that the expectany of life from birth had increased nearly 20 years in the past 75 years. The company attributed this increase very largely to lowered death rates from typhoid fever, tuberculosis, nutritional disorders of childhood, and communicable diseases of childhood. I was interested in going over the statistics of deaths in York; which have been recorded for the lour decades since 1892, to find a similar increase. I append these figures just as they occur in the Town Clerk's records without any attempt at correcting or editing.

I think these are important figures and furnish someKnowledge concerning preventive medicine far exceeds its actual practice, and responsibility for its failure greatly exceeds authority granted to use it.

REPORT OF THE

Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of York:

I herewith submit to you my annual report as superintendent of your schools.

At the present time the town of York is maintaining twenty elementary schools with an enrollment of 429 pupils. According to the school census of last April there were 685 boys and girls in this town between the ages of five and twenty-one. This year the town of York received \$5,141.90 from the State School Fund. In a recent letter which I received from the State Commissioner of Education he stated that the apportionment of the State School Fund to the towns and cities of Maine for the coming year will entail a shrinkage of approximately twenty per cent. Whereas the town of York received \$5,141.90 this past year, it will receive approximately \$4,100 this coming year.

During the past year our school system has shown a marked degree of progress. This progress has been largely due to the fact that there has been only one change in our teaching corps. Your schools are being taught by experienced, capable teachers, who, I believe, have been faithful and conscientious in their work. Much credit for the progress can also be given to the parents who have cooperated excellently with the teachers of their children.

At the close of the Winter term the annual eighth grade prize speaking contest sponsored by the local chapter of the D. A. R. was held in the High School auditorium. William Young and Rosie Tonnetti, pupils of the York Village Grammar School, were awarded the first and second prizes respectively.

In June a class of twenty-seven young men and women, one of the largest classes to ever graduate from York High School, received their diplomas.

During the Fall term, Mrs. Aletta Snyder, a dental hygienist from the State Department of Health and Welfare, examined the teeth of all the elementary school children of York and cleaned the teeth of the children of the first four grades. This valuable service in our schools was made possible by contributions by the local chapter of the American Red Cross, Woman's League, Lions Club and Auxiliary of the American Legion.

During the Spring term through the activity of the Lions Club and the cooperation of Mr. William Hancock, school boy patrols were organized at the York Village Grammar School and the York Beach School. The object of these patrols is to teach boys and girls rules of precaution and safety on the highways. These patrols are doing splendid work.

The teaching of music in our schools this year is under the supervisorship of Miss Florence Homer. The pupils are doing very creditable work in vocal and instrumental music under her supervision.

The enrollment of the High School has increased nearly twenty per cent. The present enrollment is 151 pupils with indications that next year the number of pupils who will attend high school will be approximately one hundred seventy. Obviously this increased enrollment necessitates an increased cost of maintenance of the school.

Miss Evelyn Anderson and Mr. Kenneth Nason have continued their excellent work as teachers of home econ-

omics and manual training. The boys and girls enrolled in these departments are receiving a practical training which will be valuable to them in later life.

During the Summer the boys' toilets at the York Village Grammar School were repaired and several hundred slate were replaced on the old part of the High School roof to prevent leaking. Some work was also done on the High School chimneys and all the school buildings were cleaned and the floors oiled.

At the present time all the school buildings are in good repair except the Agamenticus building. Some repair work must be done on that building this Summer. During the Fall term the pupils of the Brixham School earned enough money to install electric lights in their school building.

There is a widespread belief among the citizens of our country today that there should be a reduction in taxation. However, I do not feel that this reduction should come very largely at the expense of our public school system. Because of the fact that we are paying at the present time the lowest price possible for our fuel and we are buying only those school supplies which are absolutely necessary if any reduction of school tunds is made, it must be made at the expense of those employed in our schools. Maine stands thirtysixth in the Union as to salaries paid to teachers. average salaries of our teachers are lower than any other New England State. I believe that this is a time for rigid economy in the expenditure of public school funds but do not believe that we can decrease teachers' salaries to any great extent without a corresponding decrease of efficiency in our school system.

Mr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, Secretary of the U. S. Department of the Interior, has recently said, "What we do in our public schools with our children determines what our Nation shall be. In spite of temporary economic difficulties, it is no time for back-tracking in education. It is more vital for us to have better education and more of it to protect us from our own ignorance and follies. Men are chil-

dren but once and during that period the grown-up can at least afford opportunity to the child."

I am confident that the citizens of York will see to it that the present generation in our public schools are not deprived of their share of educational opportunity.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the splendid cooperation of the school committee at all times, of the loyalty and faithfulness of the teachers and of the helpful interest of the citizens of York in our schools during the past year.

REPORT OF THE

Principal of York High School

To the Superintendent of Schools, the Superintending School Committee, and the Citizens of York:

This, my fourth annual report of the condition and achievements of York High School, is presented with the feeling that because of conscientious effort on the part of the teachers and the friendly cooperation and sympathy of parents and school officials an average degree of success has been attained.

The high school attendance has increased substantially over the average for the past few years and this would seem to indicate that continued increase may be expected from year to year. This record represents an increase in enrollment of 25 pupils over last year and of 43 over the preceding year.

It is gratifying to note that four members of last year's graduating class, rather than waste their time in unprofitable idleness, have returned to school to continue their studies.

School Program

On account of the lack of a sufficient teaching force, it was found necessary to rearrange our school program by the addition of sixty minutes to our school day—a twenty minute, and a forty minute period. This allows thirty-five minutes in the morning for study, assembly, and clubs. It also provides another full period at the close of school for teachers to give particular aid to pupils who are deficient or who need individual assistance. The extra period in the morning also made it possible to introduce special training in penmanship to a limited number. This is a short course taught by Miss Willman in conjunction with the English classes.

It is necessary not only to keep the school at the same high scholastic standing but to increase that average whereever possible. In this endeavor, we sincerely ask the cooperation of parents who can so materially aid the pupils by sympathetic encouragement and worthwhile advice.

Extra-Curricular Activities

The third annual field day event was held last fall. The weather permitted our holding the contests out of doors instead of in the gymnasium as formerly, thereby making it possible for us to vary and to lengthen our program.

The foot ball team encountered with difficulties last fall which interfered with its success. Because of these unfortunate circumstances it was deemed advisable to discontinue the sport for the year. In the early part of the season two of the players received serious injuries which incapacitated them from further participation for the year. One of the boys was confined for several weeks at the York Hospital. The High School A. A. sponsored a benefit movie, "The All American," which netted a profit of about \$100. This money was used to help defray the hospital expenses. The members of the high school wish to express their grateful appreciation to those interested townspeople who so willingly gave their generous assistance and support.

In order to be certain that the girls and boys participating in basketball were physically fit, they were examined at the high school building by Dr. E. M. Cook who kindly gave his services for this purpose.

The discontinuing of foot ball offered an opportunity to give the boys more training and experience in basketball. An inter-group cournament was organized with the object of inducing all pupils who were desirous to take part in actual competition. About fifty boys were enrolled and seven teams were organized. From this group Mr. Schroeder was able to make a selection for the school squad. Physical activities of this type offer great possibilities to every pupil to train himself in beneficial physical exercise.

The girls' and boys' basketball teams are well handled by Miss Ingham and Mr. Schroeder, both from the standpoint of the welfare of the pupils and from that of the winning of games.

Improvements

One of the most appreciated improvements in our physical equipment this year has been the furnishing of the auditorium with seats. This saves the inconvenience of waiting until seats can be obtained from the Lancaster before making it possible to meet the pupils in a body at the opening of the school year.

Twenty tablet arm chairs have been bought for the class rooms.

Recommendations

In view of the expected larger registration, it would be necessary to use the auditorium for a study hall and the present study rooms for class work only. This condition will make imperative the purchase of at least thirty tablet arm chairs.

The commercial room is equipped with eleven typewriters which is insufficient to accommodate the increasing

number of commercial students. This year it was necessary to divide the beginner's typewriting class into two divisions, and because of the full schedule Miss Willman was forced to conduct a class in bookkeeping, while at the same time to supervise a class in typewriting. This condition is entirely antagonistic to good teaching principles. The logical solution is to construct a glassed in partition between the typewriting and the recitation room. This would remove to a major extent the distracting noise and confusion of rapidly working typewriters.

It, is very essential that pupils have access to library materials. The present library accommodations are entirely inadequate for our needs. This could be remedied, in part at least, by the use of suitable sectional bookcases placed in the five study rooms. The school needs at least three large Webster dictionaries.

The school grounds are in very poor condition and need grading and care. The present parking space at the side of the building is too small to accommodate the number of cars. There are also days when the ground is too soft to drive cars in and out. This forces the pupils to park their cars in the only available space, which is in front of the building. This condition must be endured until a suitable parking space can be provided.

Conclusion

I take this occasion to extend my thanks to our Superintendent, Mr. Small, to the School Committee, and to the teachers for their encouragement and support. May I also express to the parents and other interested citizens the pleasure I have derived from their cooperation with us and their interest in the welfare of the school. We appreciate the untiring efforts of our janitor, Mr. Barr, in keeping our school clean and comfortable.

REPORT OF THE

Director of Manual Training

To Superintendent E. O. Small, the Superintending Schoq^p Committee, and the Citizens of York:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report of the Manual Training Department.

Our projects in woodwork have been arranged to give a practical acquaintance with the principal woodworking tools, which will function later in life. Special attention is given to the method of planning and analyzing of the various tool operations involved in the construction of the object. Projects have been worked from plans and drawings made by the pupils or by the use of Blueprints.

In our High School work, after the completion of one small project (Easel picture frames) special projects have been supplied by the pupils. These projects are being carried out from detail plans or on blueprints. Stock for these projects is furnished the student at cost. You will note in another part of my report that seven large sized cedar chests appear among the list of projects. Inlaying was done on several projects this year.

Repair and school project work has given a wide range for construction work, that is, as to the proper joints, methods of fastening pieces, tops, and staining.

The following repairs and projects have been made:

Primary table, a small table, and refinished piano for the Cape Neddick School.

A hanger for a fire extinguisher, and a corner bookcase for the Primary Department, at the York Beach School.

A screen frame for Primary Department, and several chairs repaired at the York Grammar School.

A set of footlights for the High School stage, several desk tops and chairs, and four new typewriting tables for the High School.

Lumber for repairs and projects built for the different schools amounts to twenty dollars and fourteen cents (\$20.14). This has all been taken from the Manual Training stock.

MECHANICAL DRAWING

Mechanical Drawing has this year included the making of simple detail drawings, projection drawing, and assembly drawings, as well as work in tracing and blueprinting.

During this last year, a complete drawing, tracing, and blueprint of the seating plan for the High School Auditorium, has been made. A blueprint, tracing of the seating plan for the Woman's League Hall was made, also. Drawing, tracing, and blueprint of typewriting tables now under construction have been made in the Manual Training Department.

The work in Mechanical Drawing has not at first followed the same course of models or problems as the boy follows in woodworking. It has been parallel or closely related to the shop work, and, in its later stages, occupying the same relation to the shopwork that the draftsman's work bears to that of the mechanic.

The subject of blueprinting has received some attention in our High School groups. Nothing is so certain to capture and hold the pupil's interest as the opportunity to make a blueprint from one of his own tracings.

The course in Elementary Electricity has been carried on in connection with the General Shop idea.

This makes a total of 108 pupils.

The High School group of pupils meet every day in two groups. The sixth grade at York Village, including Beech Ridge, Brixham and Lincoln, has been divided into two groups.

Projects

Sixth Grade:

Calendar Stand, Letter Holder, Tie-Rack, Cat Door Stops, Pen and Pencil Holders, Small Stool or Stand.

Seventh Grade:

Bookcase, Card Table, Brush Broom Racks, Tilt-Top Table (4), Ash Tray Stand (2), Candlesticks (3 sets), Flower Stand, Sea-plane, Sailboats (2), Destroyer (1), Foot Stool, Table, Seat Bench, Knife Racks (3), Taboret.

Eighth Grade:

Cedar Chests (2), Book-Rack and Lamp (2), Smoking Stands, Bedside Tables, Dressing Room Seat, Glove Boxes, Picture Frames.

High School:

Picture Frame (class), Mantel Clock Frame (4), Book Ends, Mission Library Table, Sewing Screen Table (3), Ash Tray Stand (3), Living Room Table, Nail and Screw Cabinet, Card Table (4), Wall Memorandum (4), Floor Lamps, Small Cedar Chests (3), Large Cedar Chests (8), Medicine Cabinets (3), Tilt-Top Tables (3), Smoking Cabinet, Smoking Stand, Lamps (5), Knife and Fork Box (2), Mount for Deer Head (2), Sailboat (2), Pool Table, Telephone Stand and Seat, "Spirit of Time" Clock.

After the completion of one project in the seventh and eighth grades pupils have been permitted to build special projects. The cost of the stock is paid for by the pupil. This has not been made compulsory, however, it has given the pupil the opportunity to build a larger project.

An exhibition of the work will be held later in the year.

I wish to thank the boys for generous help and work they have done for the schools this year.

In closing I wish to thank all who have in any way helped to make this a pleasant year.

REPORT OF THE

Instructor of Domestic Science

To. Mr. Elmer O. Small, Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Committee, Citizens of York:

I wish to submit my report of the work accomplished in the Home Economics Department.

This year a course for Sophomores is being given. It is elective as is the Freshman course, with credit given toward graduation.

The girls have been studying clothing so far. The first garments were made from woolen materials—three piece suits, skirts, blouses and coats; velvet or woolen jackets with jumper dresses—all of which had some tailoring and problems with difficult construction. The second problem was a silk afternoon dress.

Now these girls are studying children's clothing, making garments for other members in their families. Some girls are making over dresses, which they have outgrown, for their younger sisters. Some of these Sophomore problems were on exhibition the evening of the Lions Club dinner.

The food study for this group will be a course on how to feed a family intelligently and economically so that each member will be well nourished; how to select wholesome foods and to know how and when to buy in quantity.

Few families are so fortunate as to entirely escape illness. When there is sickness, there is special care given the patient and often a special diet. Here we will study the most common diseases, the treatments and the special diets.

During vacations some girls go away and stay at a place where it is necessary to buy their meals already prepared for a limited amount of money. It is then necessary to have some knowledge in selecting foods that will be wholesome and adequate at a minimum cost. That is the third problem.

In this course is also given a study in planning, preparing and serving various types of foods especially for suppers and special occasions for larger groups of people.

The third semester will be devoted to the study of Home Management problems. The preservation of the finest type of American home life demands the active cooperation of every member of the family. The aim of this course is to solve the question, "What contribution should the home of today make to the family and to society and what is a High School girl's responsibility?" Included in this course will be Child Care and Training, Emergencies in the Home, and Business of the Household. Intelligent people plan carefully the details of a business enterprise. Home making is the greatest business of the nation. If the family is to provide for all of the needs of all of the family a careful plan for its expenditure is necessary. High School girls may cooperate with other members of the family in securing a fair division of its income if they understand its value. Here the aim is to teach the girls how to cooperate and not to expect more than their share; to understand "Where the dollar goes."

This year a very interesting field trip was taken to Portsmouth on a Saturday. The whole class visited Badger Farms to observe the pasteurization of milk, bottling, making of ice cream, the freezing system, etc. The girls also visited several types of stores to score them as to their reliability, modernness, sanitation, courtesy of sales people and service. We also visited several places of interest—the Library, the Broadcasting Station, theatres and restaurants, scoring them also. This type of trip gives the girls a chance to apply the knowledge they have gained in class.

The Freshman girls have just completed a semester of study and practical work in House Selection and Furnishing. Each girl planned and furnished a home for an imaginary family of five with an average income. Every girl has kept a notebook which includes the study of floor plans, building restrictions, water supply, types of homes, heating, plumbing and lighting systems, wood finishes, wall coverings, furniture and other furnishings.

The girls have been studying how to have a comfortable and attractive home without spending a great deal of money. This includes budgeting. Each girl made a budget showing the percentages spent for food, clothing, operating expenses and advancement.

The practical work in conjunction with this was either to add new furnishings or to refurnish the girls' own bed rooms. They made bed spreads, curtains, draperies, pillows, scarfs, boudoir dolls, etc.

This term the Freshman girls are studying clothing. Each girl keeps a notebook for this course also. It includes the study of dress appreciation, textiles, costume design and budgeting. Individual color readings will be given, clothing inventories made and then clothing budgets made for the average High School girl. All this is for the purpose of planning a wardrobe for a school girl economically.

The practical problems include some garment of underwear, blouses and skirts, sweaters, a school dress, then an afternoon dress, and last a light summer coat or jacket.

These girls buy their own materials, which teaches them to be economical, good shoppers and encourages them to be individual as well.

Last year in connection with the textiles work a very interesting trip was taken to Biddeford. The girls visited the Lady Pepperell Mills to observe the processes from the raw cotton to the finished blankets and sheets. A similar trip is planned for this year.

On the evening of February first the Freshman Girls entertained the Lions Club at a dinner party. It was given in the High School auditorium and the girls planned, prepared and served the dinner which was a success.

A course in Hygiene and Sanitation will be given later. In this course we study what a girl should know in order to appear attractive because of her good health. How she may help to make her home and school a desirable part of the community, and what she should know about certain health provisions to be an intelligent citizen, are also taken up.

The sixth grade girls have been studying clothing and have made their uniforms to be worn during the next semester. The uniforms consist of aprons, caps, holders and towels. Desk sets were make at Christmas time to be used for gifts.

In this grade the objectives are to develop a spirit of helpfulness at home and in school; to learn stitches and processes needed in constructing simple articles useful in every day activities. After these articles are made the girls learn how to care for them and to judge the quality in them. Here we begin the study of cotton and linen garment materials.

The second semester is devoted to food study—foods in relation to health and hygiene of the worker. Here the aim is to give the understanding that the study of foods means more than food preparation and serving. We wish to teach the class how to select foods that will meet their body requirements, to develop the desire to establish the right eating habits in order to insure individual health. The practical work consists of the preparation and serving of a school child's breakfast.

Many of the school children take their lunches to school. The first unit of our seventh grade luncheon work was a discussion of the school lunch box. The object was to teach the importance of a sanitary lunch box, containing a well balanced lunch. Each girl planned and prepared a lunch and packed a lunch box.

The second unit was devoted to the planning, preparing and serving of a luncheon. This includes menu planning, marketing, a study of food requirements, table service, and gives the girls an understanding of how to select a well balanced luncheon. The girls worked in groups of four and each group planned a menu and gave a luncheon at the close of the semester.

Seventh grade girls are now studying clothing, working on guest towels, bridge sets, dresser scarfs, luncheon sets, pillows, babies bibs, laundry bags, stuffed toy animals and handkerchief cases.

In this class the use of sewing machines is taken up and commercial patterns to be used for the next assignment, which is some garment of underwear—and the last problem—beach pajamas and kimonos.

The aim of the course is to develop a practical knowledge of fabrics as an aid in purchasing intelligently suitable material and clothings; to develop skill in technical sewing processes and correct use of proper tools.

A semester of foods has just been completed by the eighth grade girls. The three units in this course are: First, canning and preserving; second, preparation of a supper; and third, preparation and serving of a dinner.

The aims in this course are to give a clear understanding of the principles underlying canning; to show what is meant by a well balanced dinner or supper.

The practical work consisted of jelly making, then the preparation of a supper for invalids, and last, the preparation of a dinner. Here also the girls worked in groups of four, planning their menus and serving their dinners at the end of the semester.

This class also has started the clothing work. The first lessons were on care and repair of clothing on hand. Next we discussed the clothing needs of a grammar school girl.

The second practical problem was some article of underwear—pajamas, kimonos, etc. The third problem is a cotton school dress. Here more difficult construction processes are used.

The last semester will be divided into two units, the first, Home Nursing and First Aid Problems; and second, Child Care Problems. Here the girls will get some knowledge of how to help with the care of younger children in the family and then in the case of illness what a Junior High School girl may do in the home to make a patient comfortable.

The York Beach, Cape Neddick and Brixham girls have the same course of study. The Cape Neddick girls come to the Beach, and the Brixham girls come to the Village.

Exhibitions of the second and third semester's work will be held in the spring.

In concluding my report I wish to thank Mr. Small, the School Committee, parents and my 115 students for their hearty co-operation during my fourth year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE

Supervisor of Music

To Elmer O. Small, Superintendent of Schools:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first report of the Music Department of the York Schools.

Music, the universal language of the world is coming to mean more and more to the boys and girls of America and we are relying on the parents to make the pupils feel that music is as important a part of their school work as the other subjects that are taught. Of course the talented pupil has more interest in the subject but each and every child is given his or her chance to do the best they can and should be encouraged to do better work and we are trying to teach our boys and girls to listen intelligently especially now that the radio brings to city and country child alike the best that the world has in music of all types. It is very wrong to tell a child that they cannot sing for there are very few who cannot be taught to sing at least with others; this work, of course, must be started in the first grade as it. is the ears that must be trained to know whether the voice is reproducing what the ears hear.

It is always a difficult task to begin work in a strange town but I feel that a good start has been made and that more and more will be done as the year progresses; the spirit among the pupils is very fine and nearly every grade is doing acceptable work as a whole, there are of course a few cases where the pupils could do much better work but I am very glad to say these cases are few.

The Christmas Pageant which was given at the High School by the Grammar Grades was enjoyed by the pupils and we hope the parents and friends who attended also enjoyed it. It is hoped that another affair of the same type may be given before the end of the year with a different group of pupils thus giving each and every child as far as possible an opportunity to appear in public. This work is carried on with as little outside work as possible and the material used is suitable for the regular work in school so practically no time is wasted.

Several of the schools outside the village had excellent Christmas programs and others are planning programs to take place in the near future. At the Beach school a Glee Club of girls is doing very good work and we are planning to add some boys voices very soon.

The High School Glee Club of about thirty voices has a number of musical numbers that they are studying and we are hoping they will have an opportunity to appear in public soon.

The orchestra work both in High and Grammar schools is improving and a great deal of interest is shown by the amount of work the pupils are willing to do outside in practicing the music for the next rehearsal. The High School orchestra is playing frequently at assemblies and has appeared twice in public, at the Senior play two nights and at the Better Business Bureau meeting held at the League Hall. The Grammar School orchestra played at the Christmas Fageant and we hope will have other chances later in the year. I wish the people of York to feel free to ask the different school organizations such as the orchestras and Glee Clubs to take part in public affairs; if notified in time we will do our best for the community.

In several schools rhythm bands have been started with toy instruments and the pupils have improved greatly during the last few weeks. In some schools where the older pupils are studying real instruments they play with the younger pupils thus giving them not only rhythm but tune as well. A piano has been placed in the school at Cape Neddick and we wish to express our appreciation to Mr. Nason for helping to restore the case to such good condition. It is much enjoyed by the pupils and will be a great benefit to the upper grades in their part singing.

Possibly not many of the townspeople know very much about the fine ALL STATE ORCHESTRA which meets the last two weeks in August at Castine for intensive work and then appears in a concert at the State Teachers Convention each fall. This next summer will be the fourth and the improvement each year is very marked and the time spent there is of great value to the boys and girls of the State. We are hoping that York will be represented this summer by at least two or more pupils and I am sure that the people will feel proud to know that some of the pupils are anxious to attend and after the work there will be not only a credit to the town but great assistance to the orchestras next year.

The violin classes are doing good work, a new class is being started at the Beach school and it is hoped if enough interest is shown that a teacher of wind instruments may be found who will come to the town and give instruction. The time to start this work is in the fourth and fifth grades so that with the orchestra work in the grammar grades the pupils will be well advanced and thus make the High School orchestra of a high standard.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Small and all the teachers throughout the town for their splendid cooperation and help as it has meant a great deal to me this first year in getting my work started.

Warrant for Town Meeting

March 13, 1933

To Arthur E. Bragdon, Constable of the Town of York:

In the name of the State of Maine you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of York qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town House in said town on Monday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D., 1933, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

First—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second—To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Assessors of Taxes and Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes and Constable, one member of School Committee, one Road Commissioner, one or more Fire Wards, one Auditor of Accounts and all other officers necessary for the ensuing year.

Third—To fix the remuneration of the town officers for services for the ensuing year, also price for labor on the highways.

Fourth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to defray the incidental expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

Fifth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for repairs of highways for the ensuing year.

Sixth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for repairs of bridges for the ensuing year.

Seventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of the Poor for the ensuing year.

Eighth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for aid to Dependent Mothers for the ensuing year.

Ninth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitors' services, con-

veyances, text books, reference books, and school supplies for desk or laboratory use.

Tenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for repairs of school buildings for the ensuing year.

Eleventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote for instruction in industrial education in the schools for the ensuing year.

Twelfth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for insurance on school property for the ensuing year.

Thirteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for water supply for the ensuing year.

Fourteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for Memorial Day.

Fifteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for care of grounds, walks and shrubbery around the Town House.

Sixteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Seventeenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay interest on and for the reduction of the debt of the town for the ensuing year.

Eighteenth—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the Town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

Nineteenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the Health Department for the ensuing year.

Twentieth—To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as

provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Twenty-first—To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Twenty-second—To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town under the provisions of Sections 9, 18, 36, 37 and 38, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Twenty-third—To see what sum the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of third class roads in accordance with provisions of Sections 43 to 47 inclusive of Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, as amended by Chapter 151 Public Laws 1931.

Twenty-fourth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purpose of removing snow from the highways.

Twenty-fifth—To see what sum of money the town will vote in aid of the York Public Library.

Twenty-sixth—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the maintenance of the York Hospital for the ensuing year.

Twenty-seventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the service of the Public Health Nurse.

Twenty-eighth—To see if the town will vote to cooperate with the State and Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, and raise a sum of money therefor. Twenty-ninth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Thirtieth—To see if the town will vote the sum of \$500.00 to assist in the maintenance of a permanent fireman at the York Beach Station.

Thirty-first—To see if the town will vote the sum of \$600.00 to gravel the road from York Grange to the Henry M. Lytle property, on petition of Fred Fillis and twenty-six others.

Thirty-second—To see if the town will vote to reimburse Emma F. Ramsdell, widow of Charles H. Ramsdell, a Civil War veteran, in whole or any portion of the amount paid by her in taxes upon property exempt from taxation by Chapter 119 of the Public Laws of 1921.

Thirty-third—To see if the town will vote to require all taxes to be paid not later than Oct. 1, 1932, and that interest at the rate of 1 per cent per month be charged on all taxes not paid on or before Oct. 1, 1933.

Thirty-fourth—To pass any other vote or votes that may be necessary and legal for the administration of the town for the ensuing year.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters on Friday and Saturday, March 10th, and 11th, from one to four o'clock P. M.
