According to the Merriam-Webster Dictionary, “civic-minded” means “tending to do things that help your city or town and the people who live there.” Albert Duguay, who achieved the age of 90 in February, is one of Fairfield’s most civic-minded individuals.

A WWII navy veteran who married the former Antoinette Turmelle and raised six children on Savage Street. Al is a carpenter by trade. For decades he has been involved with making many changes for our town. He has had either a hand in instigating projects or in assisting others to better our community. While visiting Quebec Province, he saw painted “personality” fire hydrants. Upon his return, he initiated the “Adopt a Fire Hydrant Program.” In the 80’s and the 90s, Al served as Fairfield’s Democratic Party Chair and still currently serves on the Town’s Voter Registration Board of Appeals.

A devout Roman Catholic, Al is a 4<sup>th</sup> Degree Member of Knights of Columbus. With this group he has assisted with the construction of the Memorial Park gazebo, several community handicapped accessible ramps, and with shelving for the Fairfield Interfaith Food Pantry. Over the years, Al has spent countless hours volunteering for various events which have included the Chocolate Fest, Fairfield Days, Seniors Day – including putting up tents when it was on the island, and participated in numerous parades.

If you have the privilege of meeting Albert Duguay, he will greet you with a smile and, “Comment ça va?” (*how are you?*). When a need arises, Al is a visionary who has unbounding energy and the encouragement to get others involved in seeing projects completed. His mantra could be “vouloir, c’est pouvoir” (where there’s a will, there’s a way). So for all that you have done and continue to do for the community of Fairfield, Monsieur Duguay, merci bien (thank you very much)!

- ❖ Taxicab Licenses Expire: May 1<sup>st</sup>
- ❖ Snowmobile & ATV Registrations Expire: June 30<sup>th</sup>
- ❖ Boat Registrations Expire: December 31<sup>st</sup>
- ❖ Hunting & Fishing Licenses Expire: December 31<sup>st</sup>
- ❖ Dog Licenses are Due: December 31<sup>st</sup> and the State late fee will be assessed after January 31<sup>st</sup>.
- ❖ Property is Assessed each year to the owner of record as of April 1<sup>st</sup> & property tax bills mailed in July.
- ❖ Annual Town Meeting: 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of May at 7:00 p.m. at the Community Center
- ❖ Primary Election, even years: 2<sup>nd</sup> Tue of Jun from 7:30 a.m. to 8 p.m., Community Center
- ❖ General/Municipal Election: 1<sup>st</sup> Tue of Nov following 1<sup>st</sup> Mon from 7:30 a.m. to 8 p.m., Community Ctr
- ❖ MSAD #49 Budget Meeting & Budget Validation Election – determined by the School Board (May/Jun)
- ❖ Town Council Meetings: 2<sup>nd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of the month at 6:30 p.m., Community Center

### **WHAT TO BRING WHEN REGISTERING A VEHICLE:**

**Re-Registration:** Your old registration, current insurance card & mileage.

**New Registration (Dealer Sale):** Proof of sales tax paid (this is usually found on the financing statement), blue title application form, window sticker (if new vehicle), current insurance card & mileage.

**New Registration (Private Sale):** Bill of Sale, title for vehicles 1995 or newer, insurance card & mileage.

**New Registration (Transfer):** Same as private sale registration above PLUS registration of the vehicle the plates are being transferred from. This vehicle must no longer be owned by you in order to receive excise tax credit.

### **WHAT TO BRING WHEN REGISTERING A SNOWMOBILE/ATV/BOAT/CAMPER:**

**Re-Registration:** Old registration.

**New Registration (Dealer Sale):** Proof of sales tax paid (this is usually found on the financing statement), ME-assigned number on used rec. vehicles.

**New Registration (Private Sale):** Bill of sale, ME-assigned number and serial number. Horsepower and length for boats.

**New Registration (Transfer):** Same as private sale above PLUS registration of the vehicle the plates are being transferred from.

### **WHAT TO BRING WHEN LICENSING A DOG:**

**Current rabies certificate and neutering/spay certificate** (must be sealed original from the vet).

As required by State of Maine law, every dog over 6 months of age shall be licensed by its owner in the Town/City where the dog resides prior to December 31<sup>st</sup> of every year. The fee for spayed/neutered dogs is \$6.00 per year, and for unaltered dogs the fee is \$11.00 per year. The State mandated late fee of \$25 will be applied after January 31, and court summons commence February 1.

- Local Animal Control Officers and State Humane Agents
- Investigation of animal cruelty complaints & enforcement of animal welfare laws
- Compliance with rabies vaccination of dogs
- Care for sick and injured stray animals
- Return of lost dogs to their owner

*Dear Citizens of Fairfield:*

We began the year of 2015 with a new contract with Bar Harbor Trust Services to manage the financial investments of the Town of Fairfield. Our portfolio is more broadly focused to provide for income along with growth.

While our suit with Time Warner Cable remains unresolved, the Town suit with Robert Dale is coming to a conclusion. Due to these activities, our legal costs exceeded the budgeted amounts, which will ultimately be paid for with the court decisions. We hope to have the Time Warner case closed by the end of fiscal year 2016.

The year was proceeding smoothly until we received the resignation of Josh Reny as our town manager. We quickly changed gears to focus on recruiting a new town manager. After reading through twenty applications and holding interviews with six candidates we chose Michelle M. Flewelling as our newest town manager. Our thanks, and good wishes for the best of success go to Josh Reny! His service and dedication to the town of Fairfield has been most appreciated. Also, many thanks to Cindy Tuttle for her work as Acting Manager during the interim between managers.

The new tasks and challenges are growing for our various boards and committees. The Planning Board has been focused on reviewing the Town's ordinances that will assist in the efficiency of the Town. The Economic and Community Development Advisory Committee has been very active with updating the Strategic Plan, and applying for grants with the assistance of the Central Maine Growth Council for promoting and enhancing recreational trails in Fairfield. One of the Town Council's challenges continues to be the Main Street. The addition of The Dancing Elephant II, the expanding efforts at Sonny's Pizza and Meridians are bringing life back to downtown. It is the Council's hope that 2016 will see more changes. The Budget Committee reviewed the Council's recommendations and made amendments to the budget that kept in mind the Town's growing concern of increasing property taxes. A big thank you goes out to the members for their work during the past year.

The November elections resulted in the establishment of the Charter Commission. They will be working on reviewing the Fairfield Charter; a task that hasn't been done comprehensively in about 30 years. They will be submitting any recommended changes to the charter for a final vote in the upcoming November 2016 election. Public hearings have also taken place at which Fairfield citizens could provide input and suggestions to the committee. The Charter Commission meetings are open to the public. During 2016 they meet every first and third Tuesday of the month at 6:15 in the Community Center.

We ended 2015 with the installation our new town manager Michelle M. Flewelling. She has hit the ground running. Welcome to Fairfield, Michelle!

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from 2015.

Growing the economy by encouraging job creation was and remains my top priority. The tax-relief bill signed into law at the close of last year contains three key provisions I authored to help foster job creation and provide small businesses with the certainty they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. Another provision I authored that became law last year gives a boost to both Maine's economy and traffic safety. This provision permanently changed the federal law that previously had forced the heaviest trucks onto our country roads and downtown streets, rather than allowing them to use Maine's federal Interstates. In addition, I was glad to help secure another significant award for the University of Maine's deepwater offshore wind initiative, which has the potential to advance an emerging industry and create thousands of good jobs in our state.

Maine's historic contributions to our nation's defense must continue. In 2015, I secured funding toward a much-needed additional Navy destroyer, likely to be built at Bath Iron Works. Modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that I have long advocated for were also completed, as were projects for the Maine National Guard.

I was also deeply involved in crafting the new education reform law to better empower states and communities in setting educational policy for their students. The law also extends a program I co-authored that provides additional assistance to rural schools, which has greatly benefitted our state. A \$250 tax deduction I authored in 2002 for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies was also made permanent last year.

As a result of a scientific evaluation of the nutritional value of potatoes required by a law that I wrote, the wholesome fresh potato finally was included in the federal WIC nutrition program. I also worked on other issues important to Maine's farmers and growers, including research on wild blueberries and pollinating bees.

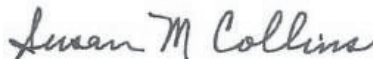
As Chairman of the Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have made combating veterans' homelessness a priority. This year's housing funding law includes \$60 million for 8,000 new supportive housing vouchers for homeless veterans. Since this program began in 2008, the number of homeless veterans nationwide has dropped by one third. Maine has received nearly 200 vouchers to support homeless veterans.

Last year, I became Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee. My top three priorities for the committee are retirement security, investing more in biomedical research, and fighting fraud and financial abuses targeting our nation's seniors. I advocated for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. The Senate also unanimously passed my bill to support family caregivers. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance and has already received more than 1,000 calls.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2015 ended, I cast my 6,072<sup>nd</sup> consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

I appreciate the opportunity to serve the town of Fairfield and Maine in the United States Senate. Dear Friends of Fairfield:

It has been a privilege to serve the State of Maine since being sworn into the U.S. Senate.

Much of my time in Washington this past year has been devoted to the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Select Committee on Intelligence. Protecting our homeland and the people of Maine from terrorism and violence remains one of my top priorities. Through my work on the Armed Services Committee, I was able to secure several provisions in the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act that benefit Maine. The legislation authorizes the construction of an additional DDG-51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer that could be built at Bath Iron Works and expands the HUBZone program to stimulate economic growth at former military installations like the former Brunswick Naval Air Station.

Returning control to teachers, school districts, and states has also been a primary concern of mine. I am encouraged that the Every Student Succeeds Act has become law. It eliminates the burdensome requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act and ensures access to a quality education for all students. A provision I helped author in the bill will give states the opportunity to pilot the use of their own proficiency-based assessments in lieu of federally-mandated standardized tests. Also included in the bill are several measures I secured to promote local input, fund education technology initiatives, and explore new strategies to increase student access to the internet outside of school.

Communities across Maine have taken bold action to improve their broadband connectivity, and I have been proud to foster federal support for these types of projects. My amendments to the Every Student Succeeds Act will promote the type of work already occurring in Washington County, where students who lack broadband access are able to check out mobile hotspots from their local libraries. Additionally, a bill I co-sponsored, the Community Broadband Act, helped pave the way for the FCC to enact rules protecting the ability of municipalities to invest in better broadband. I am excited by Maine's leadership on this important economic development issue and will continue to support local efforts in this area.

After extensive negotiations, the Senate passed a five-year transportation bill that will increase highway and transit funding in Maine and provide stability to improve our transportation infrastructure. The legislation contains provisions I cosponsored to cut red tape and improve predictability and timeliness by streamlining the federal permitting process for large infrastructure projects. Also incorporated in this bill are my provisions to relieve financial regulations on Maine's community banks and credit unions and to reauthorize the Export-Import Bank, a critical tool that supports communities and small business across the state.

Following my inquiries in the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, the National Park Service has announced they will begin exploring strategies to allow park visitors to purchase electronic passes online and will pilot the program at Acadia National Park. These passes would improve access to our nation's most treasured landscapes and would generate resources for years to come. I remain deeply engaged in preserving Maine's natural beauty and strengthening our outdoor recreation economy.

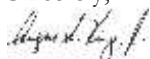
It is with solemn responsibility that I have focused my energy addressing the opioid epidemic in Maine. This work includes convening roundtables with a wide-range of health care and law enforcement professionals to combat addiction; introducing a proposal to safely dispose of excess prescription drugs; cosponsoring a

Senate-passed bill that addresses mothers struggling with addiction and the alarming effect it has on newborns; cosponsoring the TREAT Act, which expands the ability of medical specialists to provide life-saving medication-assisted therapies for patients battling heroin and prescription drug addiction; and calling on the Commander of U.S. Southern Command to increase efforts to stop the flow of heroin at our southern border.

I like to think of Maine as a big small town – and in a small town, the leaders are accessible and eager to listen. In that spirit, I've made it a priority to stay connected with people from all over Maine who e-mail, write, and call with suggestions or questions. If I can ever assist in your interaction with a federal agency, or you have thoughts, concerns, or personal input on a matter that is currently before Congress I hope you will contact me, let me know where you stand, and engage in this critical part of democracy. 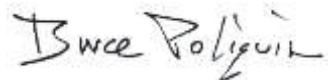

Somerset County Citizens:

Somerset County continues to grow and serve the citizens of the County in many ways. There are 33 communities, as well as 82 Unorganized Territories in Somerset County.

2015 Accomplishments include Tammy Barker, Deputy Director at the Somerset County Regional Communications Center who was named the winner of the Director of the Year Award from the Atlantic Chapter of the Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials. She was presented her award at the annual Atlantic APCO Conference in Vermont. Tammy was selected to receive the Award from a group of nominated Directors, Deputy Directors, Operation Managers, and Supervisors from Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island. This Award recognizes the hard work and commitment she demonstrates for Somerset County on a daily basis. In addition, Mike Smith, Director of Communications and the EMA report that the Communications Center has taken in over 37,000 911 calls this past year with approximately 103 calls a day being answered by three people at any given time. Our communications center covers all of Somerset County as well as 19 municipalities in Kennebec County including Augusta and Waterville. In addition to answering 911 calls, they cover the "Friendly Caller Program" which is a daily check in for seniors or residents living alone; and they participate in the "Wanderer's Program" which allows them to check in on and help track Alzheimer's patients or residents with autism who may go missing.

The Sheriff's Dept. has also undergone many changes in the past year including partnering with the Town of Madison to provide Law Enforcement Services. The Sheriff's office responded to over 12,000+ calls last year and they also added a Detective to investigate sex crimes and successfully requested funding from the State of Maine to add a Deputy in the UT. In addition, Corporal David Cole is working with a 15-month old Belgian Shepherd purchased to replace an aging police dog named Reuger who went above and beyond the call of duty many times to serve this County for over 10 years.

The Jail continues to be a challenge because the State of Maine continues to cut funding and withhold funds necessary to run the jails. Sheriff Lancaster has done a fantastic job of running his Jail with limited funds and we continue to engage with our delegates to fix the system. We ask that our residents also contact their State Representatives and Senators to request funding through a current bill known as LD195.

Our IT Dept. continues to grow and serve the community as well. We are currently partnering with St. Albans (on call), Madison, Fairfield and Skowhegan to provide top notch IT Services. The savings for each municipality may differ but we will continue to collaborate with the municipalities to find cost savings wherever possible. In addition, Kevin Madore, Director of IT Services for the County has done an extremely good job at taking over the IT Department and expanding services and knowledge base. Kevin has also worked hard to defend against security threats and provides training in cyber security to educate us on the dangers associated with our computers.

As we enter a new year, I will continue to reach out to the municipalities within the County to further cultivate a collaborative working relationship. I look forward to serving the people of Somerset County in 2016.

It is with great pleasure that I submit my first report as Fairfield's Town Manager. I started in this position on December 1, 2015, which makes it difficult to inform you of the activities of the Town starting on July 1, 2015; I can provide you with information on the future.

Throughout the rest of this fiscal year and the next, my goal is to ensure that we are doing everything we can to enhance public communication. We will be addressing everything from our bulletin boards, notice posting locations, signs, website and many Facebook pages. If you have any ideas as to how we can help you be better informed, please contact us at the Town Office or e-mail us at [info@fairfieldme.com](mailto:info@fairfieldme.com). This is your government, and it is essential that you be a part of it.

In keeping with the theme of enhancing public communication, we have posted the spreadsheets that were used by the Town Council and Budget Committee throughout this year's budgeting process on the town's website. Have you wondered why we need \$9,334.00 for Elections or \$305,748.00 for Municipal Debt? These spreadsheets provide in-depth information about how the Town spends the funds appropriated by you at Town Meeting and show how the dollar amounts for the 2016/2017 Town Meeting were calculated. Please remember that the Town does not "line item appropriate" and that the individual line items are used for monitoring and projecting needs.

Have you heard about the Charter Commission? The Town voted to establish a Charter Commission this past November to address the potential need to update our Town Charter, which was originally written in 1987. The Town Charter is basically, Fairfield's constitution. It represents how our government is organized and how it functions. These nine Commission members are working diligently to review and recommend future changes so that you can vote on them at the November 2016 election. The Charter Commissioners meet the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday of every month at 6:15 pm at the Community Center. Watch for their Public Hearing Notices! Please feel free to attend any of their meetings or speak to one of them directly, their names are listed in the Town Government, Personnel, Boards & Committees portion of this book or see our website for contact information.

On a more serious note, with continuing decreases in State of Maine funding in Revenue Sharing, State Aid to Education for MSAD #49, (currently projected to be an almost \$480,000.00 loss for the district as a whole) and increased Somerset County taxes due to substantial valuation changes of other member municipalities (Madison & Skowhegan), it is unclear what the overall picture of your next tax bill will look like. We have invited the MSAD #49 School Board representatives to attend a Council meeting this spring to discuss their budget outlook.

I would like to thank the Town Council and all of the Town's personnel for their warm welcome and continual hard work. I would also like to thank the many volunteers that dedicate their time to enhance our community. I look forward to the coming year and hope that you will take an interest in working with us toward a bright future.

The Town Assessor acts as an agent of the State and is governed by State statute and local management policy. The office is responsible for maintaining accurate records of property ownership and the equitable valuation of taxable real estate and personal property located in the Town of Fairfield. This office maintains permanent records setting forth title information, descriptions of land and buildings, the valuation of all properties (taxable and exempt), tax maps showing lot size, and a list of all personal property used in trade and manufacturing. Accurate record keeping of the property cards, tax maps, deeds and transfer documents from the State is ongoing. Change in title from the deeds and declaration of value are processed on a monthly basis. Land splits and new subdivisions are tracked and recorded on all the proper documents, i.e. property cards (hard copy and computer copy) and tax maps.

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### **Property Tax Relief and Exemptions**

There are reimbursement programs and various exemptions offered by the State and administered by the Assessor's Office, which may be applied to real estate and personal property valuations.

#### **Maine Property Tax Fairness Credit**

For residents whose taxes are high relative to their income, the state allows a partial reimbursement of taxes to those who qualify. The application is included in the 2015 Maine Individual Income Tax Booklet Form 1040ME. The refund can be claimed even if no Maine income tax is due. Forms must be filed with the State by April 15, 2016. Forms and information are available from the State at [www.maine.gov/revenue/forms](http://www.maine.gov/revenue/forms), or on our website at [www.fairfieldme.com](http://www.fairfieldme.com), or in the Assessor's Office in the Town Office Building.

#### **Veterans Exemption (Title 26, M.R.S.A. Section 653)**

Any U.S. Veteran who actively served during a federally recognized war, including those honorably discharged or retired, and is at least sixty-two (62) years of age, may be eligible for a partial tax exemption on their primary residence. Veterans receiving a pension or compensation from the United States Government for a total disability, whether service or non-service related, may also qualify. A widow, minor, or mother of a deceased veteran may also qualify for an exemption. Applications may be obtained at the Assessor's Office and must be filed with a copy of the military discharge papers, such as a DD214, driver's license or State ID, and birth certificate on or before April 1<sup>st</sup> of that year.

▪ *The veterans exemption is \$6,000. Paralegic veterans can obtain an exemption of \$50,000 toward specially adaptive housing (The exemption is adjusted by the certified ratio if it drops below 100%).*

#### **Homestead Exemption (Title 36, M.R.S.A. Section 863)**

Homeowners whose principle residence is in the State of Maine are eligible for a \$15,000 exemption on their property assessment. (This exemption is also adjusted by the certified ratio if it drops below 100%). Applications may be obtained at the Assessor's Office. In order to qualify for the exemption, the applicant must meet the following requirements:

- *The applicant must be a legal resident of the State of Maine.*
- *The homestead must be for a permanent place of residence.*
- *The applicant must have owned property in Maine for at least twelve months prior to April 1<sup>st</sup>, of the year for which the application is made.*

Those who qualify need not reapply annually; it will apply to qualified property owners until they sell, move, or the State changes the program.

#### **Blind Exemption (Title 36, M.R.S.A. Section 654)**

Fairfield residents certified to be legally blind by their eye care professional or the Department of Education Division for the Blind and Visually Impaired may file for an exemption of \$4,000 towards their real estate assessment. (The exemption is also adjusted by the certified ratio if it drops below 100%).

Dear Citizens of Fairfield,

During the past year the Planning Board started work on updating the Town of Fairfield Land Use Ordinance, which was adopted on April 14, 1999, and has had many amendments added since that time. The updated Land Use Ordinance work should be completed by the Planning Board in early 2016. Thank you to the Planning Board Members for volunteering their time to the Town of Fairfield with this effort.

From July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015, the Code Enforcement Office has issued a total of 85 building permits and the combined total estimated construction cost on all these building permits was \$7,425,471.00. These permits were for 2 single family residential homes, 5 mobile homes (single & double-wide), 12 decks, 27 sheds, 7 garages, 9 additions and renovations to existing homes and 15 commercial building permits for both renovations to existing structures and new structures.

The Maine Academy of Natural Sciences on the Good Will-Hinckley Campus has completed the renovation and addition to the Moody School Building and classes began in this building at the start of the 2015 school year. This charter high school continues to grow and expand its educational offerings to day students from the local region and boarding students from across the State. Kennebec Valley Community College, on the former Goodwill Hinckley Campus, has completed construction of a new barn classroom building, the restoration continues on the Nutter Fieldhouse building to house the Joinery Timber Framing Lab and the Electrical Lineman Technology Lab and they have additional projects they are pursuing in the coming year.

As the Local Plumbing Inspector, I have issued 32 plumbing permits, including 22 internal plumbing permits and 10 external waste water permits. Total fees collected for these permits equaled \$3,670.00. The amount remitted to the State was \$931.80, and the amount retained by the municipality was \$2,738.20.

It is importance of following local ordinances, State laws and regulations, and permitting requirements. Local ordinances that the Code Enforcement Office is responsible for include the Property Maintenance Ordinance, Land Use Ordinance, Subdivision Ordinance, Automobile Graveyard and Junkyard Ordinance, Shoreland Zone Ordinance, Floodplain Ordinance, and State Laws pertaining to unsafe buildings, the Maine Uniform Building and Energy Codes (MUBEC), and the Maine State Plumbing and Subsurface Wastewater Rules. Fairfield Ordinances can be viewed on the Town website at [www.fairfieldme.com](http://www.fairfieldme.com), or please stop by the office for a copy of an ordinance and/or an application prior to starting any project. General Assistance (Welfare) is a service administered by municipalities for the immediate aid of persons who are unable to provide the basic necessities essential to maintain themselves or their families, per Title 22 M.R.S.A. Section 4301(5). Each year the Town Council amends Fairfield's General Assistance Ordinance to revise the dollar amounts allowed per each eligible household. These amounts are provided to the Town by the State of Maine Department of Health & Human Services, as that agency reimburses 50% (70% starting Jul 1, 2016) of the General Assistance monies spent by the Town. The General Assistance program is available to Fairfield residents as determined by the standards of eligibility provided in the General Assistance Ordinance. The General Assistance Ordinance may be viewed on our website at [www.fairfieldme.com](http://www.fairfieldme.com).

Residents may call 453-7911 to schedule an appointment with the Welfare Director. In an after-hours emergency only, citizens may call the Fairfield Police Department at 453-9321. To report suspected violations or fraud, residents may call the State of Maine Department of Health & Human Services at 1-800-442-6003.

The net cost to the Town of Fairfield for welfare for the fiscal year July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015 was **\$3,442.58**. This represents **\$6,885.17** spent by the Town up front, **\$3,442.59** reimbursed by the Maine Department of Health & Human Services, and **\$0.00** collected by the Welfare Director for liens placed on client assets; such as SSI retro-active payments.

The Welfare Director also administers the Town's donation-funded heating assistance account for those individuals who do not qualify under the general assistance program, but are still in need of heating assistance. For fiscal year July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015; the town collected donations for this fund in the amount of **\$8,500.00** and spent a total of **\$1,426.21** assisting **nine** households. The balance in the heating assistance account on June 30, 2015 was **\$29,002.38**.

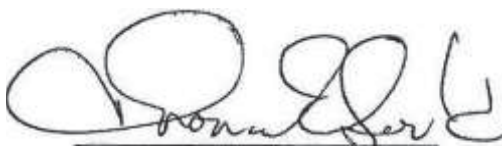
2015 was a very busy year for the Fairfield Police Department. Officers handled 17,627 calls which represents a 3.5% increase from 2014. Of these calls, 7,009 required an in-depth investigation or a report be written. Both of these scenarios take patrol officers off the street. Together, we are working to try and reduce the minor incidents that currently require officers to type reports. This will put them back out on the streets looking for violations.

We wish to thank the townspeople for supporting the bond which allowed us to make department-wide renovations. We replaced the 32-year-old flooring, doors and windows, making the building more efficient. We were also able to add attic insulation and heat pumps which will heat and cool the building much more efficiently. We located some lightly-used desks that replaced the old patrol stations and work desks. Each officer now has their own computer and phone so they no longer have to wait for a place to type or make calls.

We had an officer receive a commendation this year for her actions: Officer Shanna Blodgett was commended for her tenacious investigation into the Casey's Redemption Robbery. In addition, Officers Jordan Brooks and Patrick Mank were recognized as "Officers of the Quarter" twice each.

We continue to search for grant opportunities, and in 2015, our efforts led to the addition of thermal cameras for our cruisers, 2 AEDs (Automated External Defibrillator) which were used by two officers to save a life in February of 2016, and we hope to replace almost half of the computers this Spring. We will be applying for another speed enforcement grant which will add 235 hours of patrol to the streets of Fairfield.

I wish to thank our new Town Manager Michelle Flewelling and the members of the Town Council for their continued support to both the Police Department and our citizens. I would also like to thank the other department heads and members of the Town Office, Public Works and Fire Department for the professionalism and assistance they provide on a daily basis. Lastly, we would like to thank Kecia Blaisdell for donating so much of her time at the station this summer. She spent endless hours as part of an internship program which allowed the detective and officers to spend more time on cases.

Dear Citizens,

I would like to welcome Michelle Flewelling as our new Town Manger and wish her success in her future leading the community. I would also like to thank the Town Council, Benton Selectmen and the other town departments for their help and continued support. The town is due this March for a renewal of the Maine Bureau of Labor's safety award, and thanks to the safety practices of all town employees' we are in good shape to extend this award for the next 4 years.

We have had some trying emergency calls this past year and I commend the emergency service personnel for their continued excellence in providing quality services to those in need. Even here in our small community we are seeing the devastating effects of opiate drug use and an increase in violence toward police and fire personnel.

The department applied for and received a federal Fire Act Grant administrated through the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The award received was \$694,777.00; this grant is for the purchase a Quint type fire apparatus. This type of fire apparatus has both the capabilities of an Engine and a Ladder, the total cost of the apparatus is \$725,000.00, without this grant the purchase would not have been possible. We will have some minor renovations at the station, pay a 5% match for the grant and purchase some equipment; for a total cost to the town of just over \$79,000.00 which will come from TIFS (station renovation) and the departments Capital Reserve Account. We have again this year applied for grants to replace necessary equipment, such as breathing apparatus and radios.

At the 2014 Town Meeting, money from the Natural Gas TIF Development Program was approved towards building a public safety training facility. The four towns of Fairfield, Norridgewock, Waterville and Winslow have been working out the details of building a regional facility here in Fairfield on town owned land.

Two years ago the department started a limited Junior Firefighters program; this program has proved to be a success. Some of these young men and women attend the Firefighter / EMT program at the Waterville Voc Tech. We now have six active members participating in the program. We hope the program continues to be successful as it is getting more difficult to recruit part-time call members and if these juniors decide to stay with the department when they turn eighteen they are trained and are already an asset to the community.

This is our second year of the Interlocal Agreement to provide emergency services to Benton, this has worked well as far as being one department serving both communities with Benton providing a share of the department's operating budget based on an emergency response volume percentage. Providing this service means the department responds to 84 square miles of coverage area and approximately 9,200 citizens.

Looking toward the future we will continue working with Code Enforcement for new construction inspections and further developing our existing building inspection program, continue to look at ways to recruit and retain call members, seek out and apply for grants, and continue to look for more regional opportunities in providing emergency services.

In closing we encourage you to visit the fire station and keep up with news on our Facebook page "Fairfield Fire Rescue" or the Town's web page.

I would like to take this opportunity to publicly welcome our new Town Manager, Michelle Flewelling. I look forward to working together and anticipate many successful years for this department under her guidance and leadership.

We welcomed two new employees in 2015. Tony Kimball and Dustin Gerow joined the crew as Mechanic and Sewer Mechanic Helper respectively.

The spring of 2015 was difficult for our Department. With the heavy winter snow accumulation and a winter that did not seem to want to quit, we were behind schedule with all of our normal spring tasks which includes street sweeping, spring clean-up, and repairing damage to roadsides and lawns during the winter plowing season. We eventually did get back on track by June and was able to help with construction of the new parking lot for the food pantry.

During the summer 2015 construction season we were busy rebuilding the Adams Road and another one-mile section of the Covell Road, which includes ditching and replacing many driveway culverts along section under construction. We also prepared the Ten Lots Road and a one-mile section of the Martin Stream Road for resurfacing. The Fairfield Historical Society is a nonprofit Section 501 C (3) which owns and runs the Fairfield History House. The society acts as a repository for the history of Fairfield and surrounding area and the museum is set up to reflect life in the Victorian period. Central Maine CATV, the only public access television station in this area, continues to grow in community awareness and as a source of information for local events. The Station broadcasts via Time Warner Cable Channel 7 (Channel 11/Fairfield) in nine communities (Fairfield, Benton, Albion, Clinton, Waterville, Winslow, Oakland, China and Vassalboro), reaching approximately 15,000 households, the local colleges, hotels/motels, healthcare facilities, etc.

At this time the Station covers 4 High Schools' home football games and the Lawrence High School's home basketball (boys and girls) games. These games are live streamed on the internet when possible, broadcast on Central Maine CATV, uploaded to YouTube and the Station's website for those who do not have Time Warner Cable, and on the Station's Facebook page - Central Maine CATV Official.

The Station also covers school plays and concerts, summer concerts in the Memorial Park, items of public interest, educational programs with L.C. Bates Museum, local church services, and the governmental meetings of three local municipalities. From time to time the Station accepts special projects ranging from a public service announcement to a documentary.

The Station produces 8 programs of its own on a regular basis. These programs range from gardening, cooking, health news, and public/educational interests, to local sports. In addition, the Station maintains a Community Bulletin Board which is supported by many local businesses, and is available at no cost to non-profit organizations to list their fundraising events, church services, etc. The Community Bulletin Board airs between programming and is also available on the Station's website: [www.centralmainecatv.com](http://www.centralmainecatv.com).

## 2015 Trustees Report

Kennebec Sanitary Treatment District treats the sewage from four communities including the Town of Fairfield. KSTD maintains the Fairfield pump station located on 32 Water St, which pumps 48% of the Town's sewage and all of the Town of Benton's sewage to the treatment facility in Waterville. The remaining 52% is gravity fed through two flow-measuring meters. A 24% reduction of annual flow coming from the northern portions of Town occurred due to the Town's recent efforts in removing ground water entering the sewers.

Fairfield's average daily flow for 2015 was 491,800 million gallons, or 150,000 gallons less than last year because of these improvements. This reduction in flow has meant a savings of \$49,728 over last year's KSTD allocation. The Town is 8.5% of the 2,273 million gallons treated annually at KSTD. The District also treated more than 200,000 gallons of trucked-in septage from Fairfield homes not connected to the Town's sewer system.

The following chart shows a summary of the last three years sewage flows from each community and the 2015 net allocation charges. The complete fair-share cost and allocation process documents are available at the District office, 873-0611 or [tl@kstd.com](mailto:tl@kstd.com).

Fairfield's improvement to the sewer system infrastructure continues to be successful in reducing total flow to the District. KSTD has three CSO outlets with one located at the Fairfield pump station. If the future continues as is, this CSO outlet may be relisted as an emergency release port if the pump station failed. The Town's sewer separation program has successfully reduced groundwater entering the sewers. The Town's continued sewer separation projects will bring additional savings to the Town and will eliminate the need for KSTD to treat these infrequent, high flow volumes in the future. Work still remains to be done in the Savage Street area.

Even with this success each community will need to continue to work in harmony with the KSTD CSO Master Plan, which outlines a logical approach of actions, expenditures and budgeting time tables to reduce Inflow or Infiltration of ground water into the sewers during wet weather conditions, but more importantly stopping release of untreated sewage into the Kennebec River.

KSTD is committed to obtain the limits imposed by DEP/EPA of "treated wastewater" discharged to the Kennebec River. The KSTD facility has considerable capacity available to handle any new industries or population growth in all communities.

The Kennebec Water District (KWD) serves the communities of Fairfield, Waterville, Winslow, Benton and Vassalboro and is the source of supply for the public water system in Oakland. The District provides water for domestic, commercial and industrial uses and also for public and private fire protection systems.

In 2015, KWD replaced the main in Brook Street, one of several replacements in the KWD system. Several water main breaks over the past several years made this replacement a priority.

Also in 2015, KWD staff completed implementation of the SCADA system in the newly constructed Fairfield Booster Pump Station on Center Road. SCADA (supervisory control and data acquisition) is necessary to monitor and remotely control station operations. The new station has added stability and reliability to the water distribution system in the Center Road and Fairfield Center areas.

KWD is currently evaluating its financial capability to replace an additional portion of the water main in Savage Street in 2016. In 2014, KWD replaced another section of that main.

The primary focus of KWD's infrastructure replacement program in 2016, however, is the upgrade of its primary pumping station on Western Avenue in Waterville. The 1970's pumping systems require replacement and modernization. KWD has been approved for State Revolving Loan funding at 1% interest and \$150,000 of principal forgiveness on the projected \$1,500,000 required in the 2016 phase of the upgrade. Completion is expected in mid-2017 with a total project cost of an estimated \$3.3 million. The project is very complex and is expected to consume much staff time.

Unfortunately, after two years of year end operating losses and in anticipation of addition debt service costs related to the Western Avenue project, KWD is currently projecting a necessary increase in rates at the beginning of 2017.

I would like to acknowledge Al Hodsdon, President of the KWD Board of Trustees during 2015 and for 2016, and Mark McClusky, elected trustees from the town of Fairfield.

## Kennebec Regional Development Authority - Annual Report: 2014-2015

The Staff, General Assembly, and the 24 member communities of the Kennebec Regional Development Authority are pleased to present this annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2015.

### Financial Overview

At fiscal year-end 2014-2015, KRDA's government funds reported a positive fund balance (equity) of \$127,648, an improvement of \$335,381 from the previous fiscal year. This is the first positive fund balance since 2001. Annual revenue distributions, to member communities totaled \$227,344. We reduced our long term debt principal by \$377,317. This included paying off the loan balance with Camden National Bank, in the amount of 139,733. This was an unbudgeted expenditure (taking advantage of unanticipated revenues) which resulted in the annual expenditures exceeding revenues. We are still on target to pay off our long term debt in fiscal year ending June 30, 2021. The total long-term debt for the organization stands at approximately \$1,222,034. For investments, we have 2 CD's and a money market account at the Maine State Credit Union totaling \$203,796; a savings account with TD Bank totaling \$242,681 and; a CD with Skowhegan National Bank totaling \$187,898. These cash allocations represent designated funds toward a small operating reserve, and a growing infrastructure reserve. These funds could be used for future capital expenditures should the KRDA membership so decide at some point in the future. We project adequate cash flow for operations and debt service through the coming fiscal year without additional borrowing or increases in the municipal assessments which have remain unchanged since 2007.

### Operations Overview

During FY 2014-2015, the organization began executing a long term operational plan for the development of the existing serviced lots on the park. The first phase – and main effort – of this plan, is to address the demand side of the park. The operating budget increased the marketing effort in order to “establish credibility with investment attraction.” The intent is to triple the marketing effort, over an 18 month window beginning in January 2015, and establish a greater density of leads, through our networking activities. Once this phase is completed, the operational plan will focus on addressing the supply side of the park – to incentivize developers to FirstPark both operationally and financially. Through this process, we hope to develop the remaining serviced lots (which total seven) by the time the debt service is paid off. If we are successful in this effort, this will help with the on-going effort to eventually position the KRDA so that it can operate independently at or about the time the existing long term debt is paid off. The organization will be actively exploring, identifying and securing additional forms of revenue to place the organization in a position to compete with other regions in the US and beyond.

### From the Director's Desk....

The services of our lead generator, Research Consulting International (Montreal, Canada), have been exceptional in support of our networking approach. Their process placed us in front of thirty senior level decision makers of firms to tell our story about the competitive advantages of Central Maine. During the Fiscal Year, we had three firms achieve red carpet status – have followed up on our invitation – to see the value Central Maine has to offer. One firm has incorporated in the state, with plans to locate at FirstPark, when they ready to move over the border from Canada. The other two remain in play.

We have focused all of our networking efforts in Canada – from Halifax to Toronto. This effort has been financially supported with a grant from the Maine International Trade Center, in the amount of \$44,500. This grant is to reimburse some of our travel expenses through December 2017. Central Maine has a competitive value in these Canadian markets. We have intentionally targeted small emerging firms, which are planning their first phased expansion into the US. Supporting this effort, we have built a technical assistance team – from accounting to visas – to help hand hold these firms into our region. I intend to explore additional relationships with developers, some of whom may provide build out solutions for these forthcoming leads into FirstPark. Finally, I am scheduling my attendance at selectmen's/council meetings, to listen and inform.

Delta Ambulance, founded in 1972, is the leading provider of high quality, compassionate emergency services and medical transportation in central Maine. Our superior training, experience and state-of-the-art medical technologies set us apart from other ambulance services. We are pleased to be able to provide emergency Paramedic response and care to the people of your community and to continue supporting your First Response Rescue at no cost to the community.

As a regional not-for-profit organization, we continue to fund our operations solely by reimbursement for patient calls directly from the patient and the patient's insurance policy. This is possible in large part due to our economy of scale. We do write off a significant portion of our charges annually as charitable giving to the uninsured and underinsured. Additionally we continue to support many special community events throughout our coverage area.

In 2016, we responded to 786 911-calls. Of these, 43 calls were for assistance from patients who did not require hospital care. These patients were evaluated by our paramedics and received no charge for service. Additionally, we serve your community by regularly providing non-emergency care and transfer services for patients as well as standby for fire calls.

Our average response times, the time between our receipt of the call and our arrival, for delivery of paramedic care was 10.0 minutes for emergencies.

Paramedic care is the highest level of Pre-Hospital care available. Our Paramedics exceed State Standards for recertification and respond with the latest medical technology available including 12 lead EKG and pharmaceutical interventions. Our care is reviewed in our Continuing Quality Improvement (CQI) program, which is recognized as a leading process in Maine.

Our support for your Rescue Services continues to include continuing medical/rescue education and on-scene replacement of medical supplies used on the call, all at no cost to the town.

Dear Friends,

As one of six school board members elected from Fairfield and the current Chairman of the MSAD #49 Board of School Directors, it is my pleasure to write this letter. The MSAD#49 Board of School Directors, administrators, teachers and staff are dedicated to doing everything in our power to educate our children to the best of our abilities with the resources we have available. We utilize the money entrusted to us by the taxpayers of the district and the people of the state of Maine under the Maine School Funding Formula and grants that we apply for.

MSAD #49 tries to think outside the box when it comes to educating our students. For example, many of our students have been taking advantage of dual enrollment classes to get college credit before going off to school. Students are saving thousands of dollars in future college expenses.

Some of the priorities of the district this year have been working on Proficiency based standards, the Educator effectiveness law, revisions to the science curriculum, updating job descriptions and surveying home-schoolers. We are also continuing with the new Envisions Math program to help improve district math scores.

We have completed our application for a new consolidated elementary school and are waiting for the State to open the process. The application consists of the needs of the district and the condition of the buildings that we need to replace. It takes a substantial amount of money to maintain the buildings we have and we need to decide if it is more cost effective to replace buildings or putting good money after bad.

Bill McManus is also retiring from his position as the Lawrence High School Athletic director and halftime principal. While they will both will be missed, we wish them well in their new endeavors.

As always, residents are encouraged and welcome to attend our public meetings, and participate in the annual budget meeting process; we look forward to seeing you in 2016!

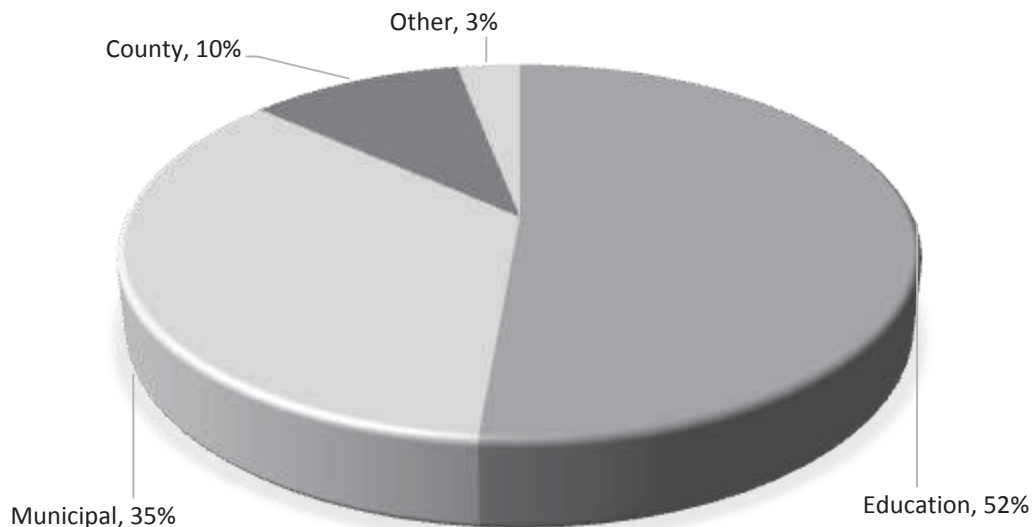

**DISTRIBUTION OF PROPERTY TAX REVENUE 2015/2016**



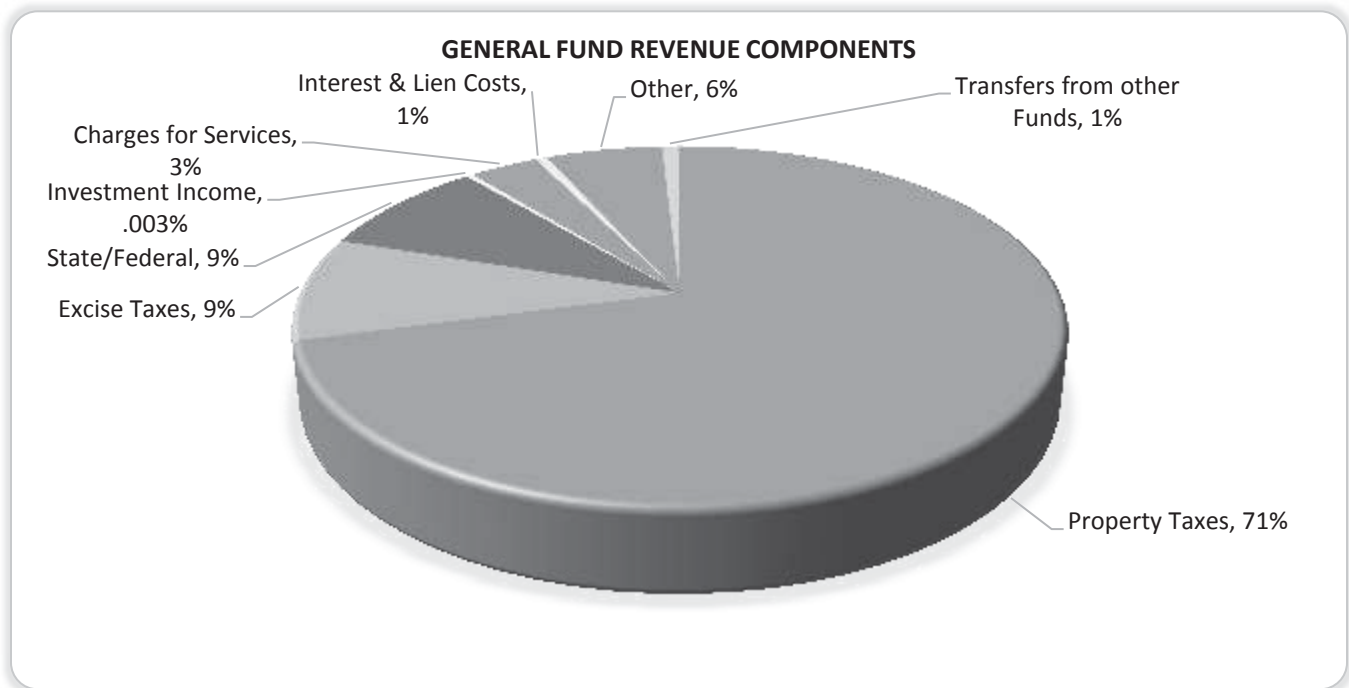

## GENERAL FUND REVENUES TO ACTUAL BUDGET SUMMARY

### Fund Balance

A key indicator of the town's financial condition is the size of its undesignated fund balance. Fairfield's undesignated fund balance as of June 30, 2015 was \$1,809,603, which represented an increase of \$111,201 from last year's balance. The ending fund balance provides the Town with coverage for various liabilities and unforeseen expenses or shortfalls in revenues. The fund balance should not be understood, however, as cash on hand or pure "surplus". There are a number of encumbrances against fund balance, such as reserves for receivables (unpaid taxes), and a recommended minimum cash reserve to cover potential emergencies.

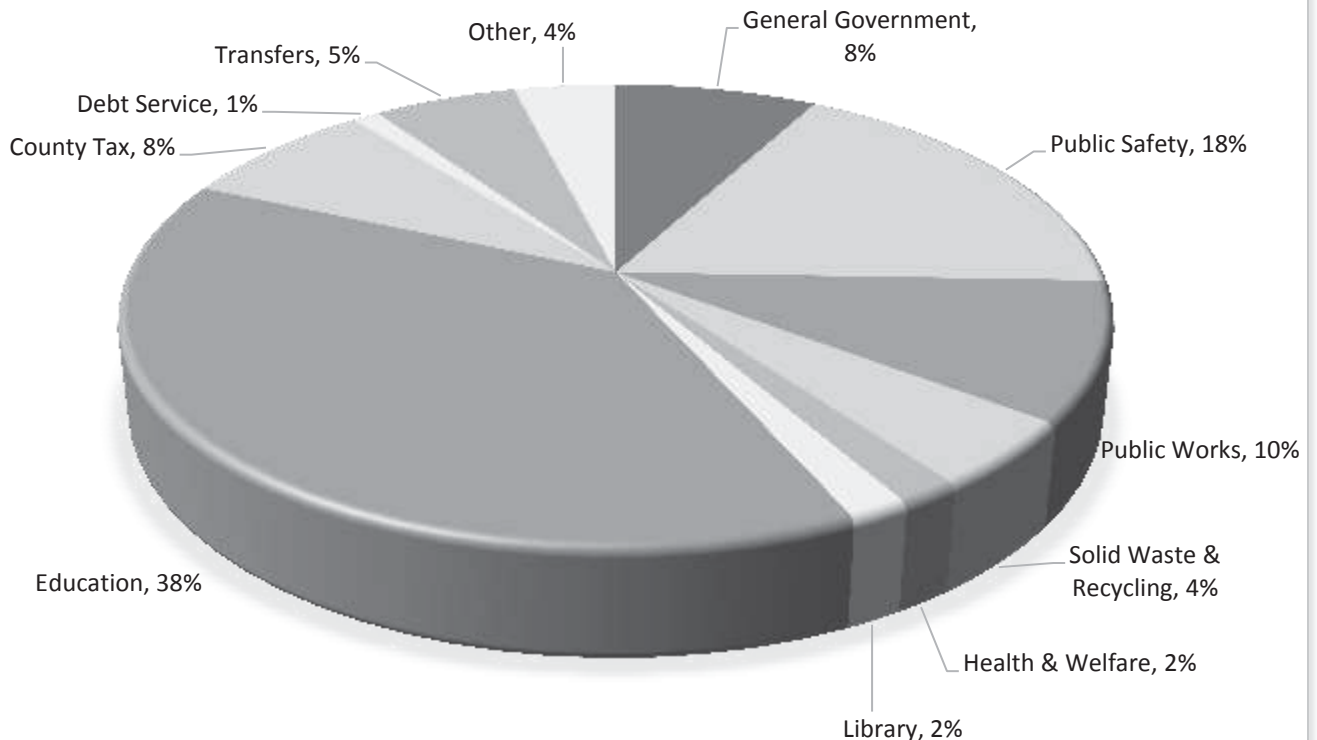

Currently, the Town's unassigned fund balance is currently at a level sufficient to sustain government operations for a period of approximately two months, which is the Town's targeted amount for unassigned fund balance. The Town has been working to build this balance to a sufficient level. As evidence of this, the Town's unassigned fund balance has increased to \$1,809,603 for the year ended June 30, 2015, from \$1,698,402 for the same period in 2014. The Town does maintain significant reserves for future capital and other program needs.

# NOTES OF PROCEDURE

## NOTES FOR VOTERS ON TOWN MEETING PROCEDURE

**Rules of procedure, in general.** It is important to understand two core concepts. First, rules of procedure are not rules of law. Their purpose is to facilitate the conduct of the meeting, and courts will usually uphold a moderator's decision and the actions of a meeting unless clear unfairness or error resulting in misunderstanding or confusion has actually affected the vote. Second, questions about appropriate procedure or the outcome of a vote should be addressed in the meeting itself (see the discussion of "appeal" and "challenge," below). If questionable decisions or determinations of the vote are not brought to the moderator's attention and addressed on the spot, a court may decline to review the issue later, even where it would otherwise be appropriate for judicial review.

**Distinguishing or Separating Voters and Non-Voters.** Please respect any measures in effect for distinguishing or separating voters from non-voters.

**Unanimous Consent.** To expedite procedure, the moderator may from time to time invite or suggest that the meeting give "unanimous consent" to proceeding in a certain way. Cooperation where you can freely give it will usually save time and avoid unnecessary complication, but if you do not wish to give consent simply call out "Objection" or "I object" when the moderator asks for unanimous consent. The moderator may then suggest or invite a motion and vote on procedure and you will then have the opportunity to speak in opposition to the procedure.

**Rules of Debate.** Maine law makes three rules: (1) a person may not speak without being recognized by the moderator; (2) everyone shall be silent at the moderator's command; and (3) a person who is not a town voter may not speak without the consent of two-thirds of the voters present. In addition, the moderator *may* ask that one or more of the following rules be observed, and may invoke others to maintain good order and decorum. Raise your hand or stand, as directed by the moderator, to be recognized, and then state your name and what you would like to do. Stand while speaking unless otherwise directed or authorized by the moderator. Refrain from making negative motions ("I move that Article 16 be defeated"). After a motion has been made and seconded, the moderator will open the floor for discussion. The moderator may call on the Selectmen or other sponsors of an article to speak first on a main motion (a motion to approve an article as printed, for example). Thereafter, the affirmative side speaks. A person who makes a motion is entitled but not required to be the first speaker on the motion and may not vote against the motion but may seek consent to withdraw it. A person seconding a motion may both speak against it and vote against it. Do not make a speech and conclude it with a motion: rather, make the motion and then speak to it after it has been seconded and put to floor debate by the moderator. Address all remarks and all questions to the moderator alone. Remarks must be relevant to the motion. Debate will generally alternate between those in favor and those opposed. No one should address the same subject more than twice without the express permission of the moderator. The meeting may establish a time limit per speaker per question and an overall time limit on a motion. No one may speak a second time until all who wish to speak a first time have done so. Speak to the issue, not to the person, and do not question motives or speak ill of another. Profanity is out of order. Do not read from any document except the warrant without first obtaining the moderator's consent. Listen attentively, do not whisper in the seats, and do not interrupt a speaker. Take conversation outside, and mute all but emergency workers' cell phones.

**Nominations and Elections.** No second is required for a nomination, but the moderator may request or require a candidate's consent to run (and if elected to serve), as a safeguard not only against the possibility that a nominee who is present will decide not to accept an office once won, but also as a safeguard against election of an absent person who when notified declines the office.

**Written Ballot.** State law requires the moderator, selectmen, and school committee members to be elected by written ballot, even if there is only one nominee. On motion and a majority of votes cast, or by unanimous consent, the meeting can determine to require written ballot voting on other offices or on any business or other article on the warrant. Do not fold, and do not allow another to fold, your ballot with another, or they may both be invalidated.

**Appeal.** A voter who thinks it appropriate to follow a procedure other than one announced by the moderator may seek to be recognized and then move a procedure the voter believes more appropriate.

**Methods of Voting.** These are, in increasing order of certainty (and, for most, of the time required): voice vote, show of hands, rising (or standing) vote, division of the house, and written ballot vote.

**Challenge.** A voter who thinks the moderator has not correctly determined the outcome of a voice or other vote short of an actual count and who wishes to challenge the moderator's determination should immediately seek to be recognized, and when recognized, say "I doubt it." The moderator will then determine whether at least six other voters agree. If so, the moderator will make the determination more certain by using a designated other method of voting.

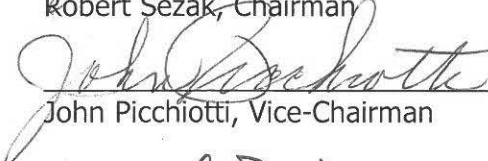

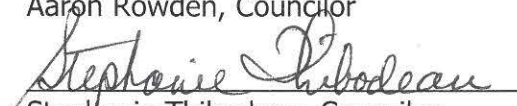

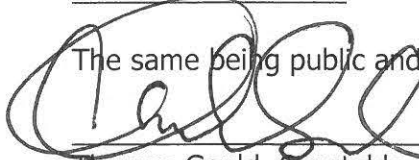

Furthermore, the Town of Fairfield is aware of the requirement that should the Intended National Objective of the CDBG program not be met, all CDBG funds must be repaid to the State of Maine CDBG program.

**ARTICLE 42:** The Town voted via written ballot to authorize the Treasurer to borrow an amount not to exceed \$900,000, in the name of and on behalf of the Town, and to appropriate the proceeds thereof to finance maintenance and improvements of the Town's roads and streets (\$800,000) and buildings and other municipal structures and facilities (\$100,000), and to further authorize the Treasurer and the Chair of the Town Council to issue the Town's general obligation bonds (and bond

anticipation notes) therefore, which bonds shall have a term not to exceed the maximum term permitted by law, with such other terms and conditions, including the rate of interest to be borne by such bonds and provisions for early redemption or prepayment, as may be approved by the Treasurer, and to further authorize the Treasurer and the Chair of the Town Council, in the name of and on behalf of the Town, to take any and all other action, including designating such debt as bank qualified under the Internal Revenue Code and to sign such other loan agreements, documents and certificates as may be necessary or convenient to accomplish such borrowing.

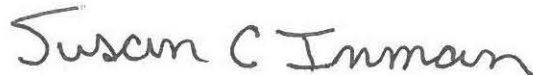
B. Estimated Debt Service Costs:

The Town anticipates the average annual interest rate on the \$900,000 of bonds will be approximately 2.50%. Assuming an average rate of 2.50%, and a 10-year term, the estimated cost of the new bonds will be:

Bond Principal:	\$900,000
<u>Estimated Interest Cost:</u>	<u>\$123,750</u>
Total Estimated Debt Service:	\$1,023,750

C. Validity:

The foregoing represents an estimate of costs associated with the financing and such estimates will change due to market conditions. The validity of the voters' ratification of the bonds shall not be affected by any errors in the foregoing estimates and the ratification by the voters is conclusive and the validity of the bond issue is not affected by reason of any variance of actual costs from the estimates provided above.
