The stock on the farm show that they have had the attention of the Superintendent, and he deserves much praise for the improvement made about the premises. He has built a road across the piece of swamp land in front of the dwelling house, which is a great advantage in going to and leaving the premises.

In looking over the dwelling house we find the roof in a very bad state, leaking considerable, and it is evident some repairs to it should be made very soon. The barn also is getting in a bad situation, and will require some repairs in a short time.
