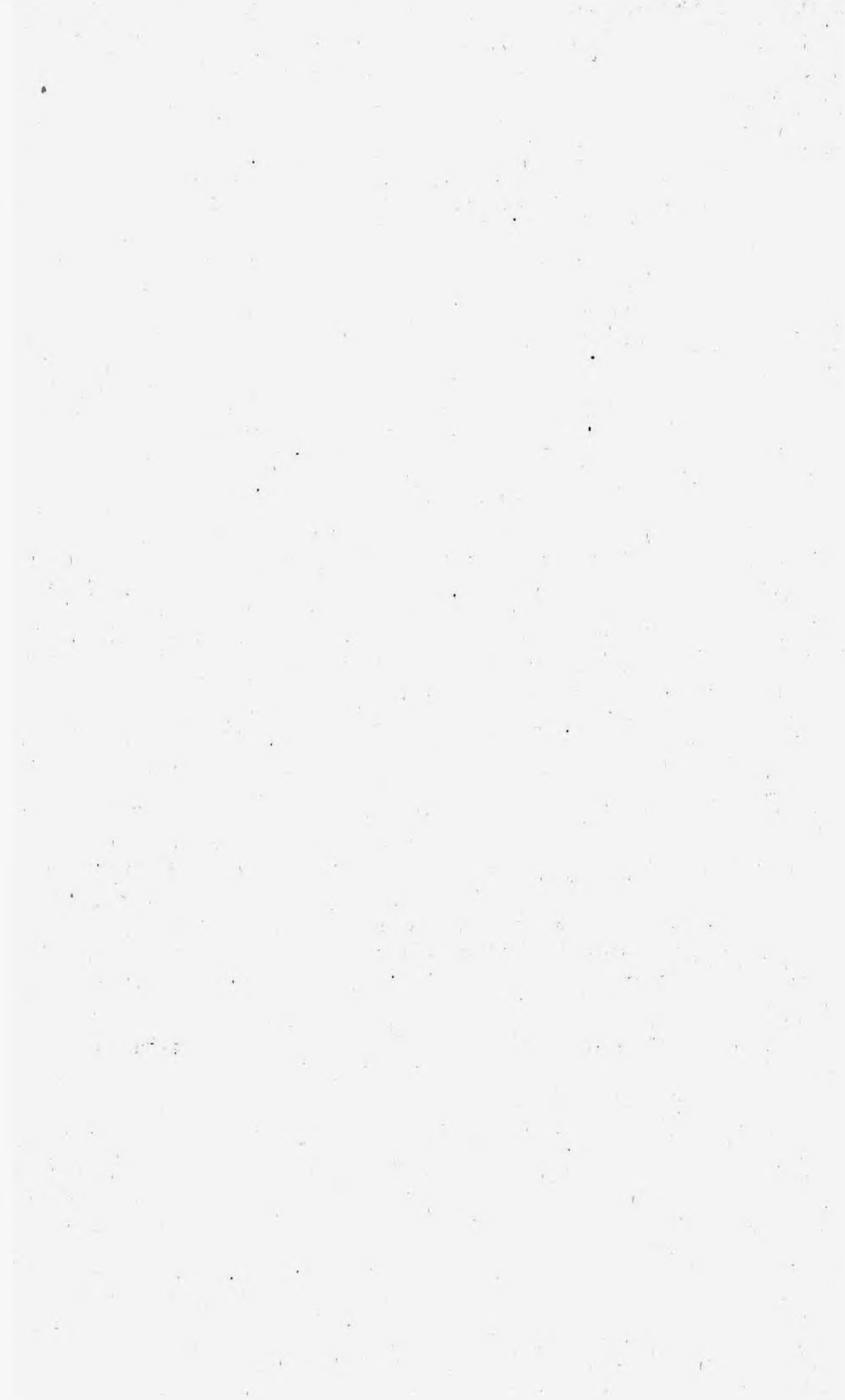

COMMITTEE REPORT

To the inhabitants of the town of York qualified to vote in town affairs.

Action by the town in the matter of retaining the Grammar school building in the Village for the purpose of public utility, the same being recorded, lead to the appropriation of \$1000 by the town at the annual meeting held March 7, 1915.

The undersigned were elected a committee to so change the interior of the structure, that the second floor was made a hall with seating capacity of approximately 500 people, and in the opinion of the "carpenter and builder," member of the committee, strength to sustain a distributed weight of sixty five thousand pounds. One half of the first floor as quarters for Chemical Auto or Fire Engine, and Hook and Ladder Truck, also ante room for firemen.

In the basement a safe, sanitary lockup. It was considered necessary to do some grading at the rear of the building in front of the entrance to the fire quarters. From time to time, as the work progressed, the Selectmen drew on the Treasurer of the town for the payment of bills for labor and material, for all of which, they received the attested vouches of the Committee. While it was not a great undertaking, by careful management the work was accomplished with the money available by vote of the town. There is remaining in the basement a number of outside windows, and lumber of an appreciable value.

The Committee served without pay. In closing we suggest that the exterior of the building be treated with one coat of paint at the least. It was voted that the Committee have full charge of the building for the fiscal year, which year has expired. The Selectmen have assumed the duty.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town of York, Maine.

The Department of Health has the honor to submit the following report for the year ending February first, 1916:

The Department was organized February first, 1915 with Mr. W. E. Brown as Health Officer. At the start a laboratory was established and equipped for general laboratory work. During the year more than one hundred examinations have been made for tuberculosis, diptheria, typhoid fever, malaria, etc. Routine examinations of the milk and water supplies have been made, and much assistance has been rendered the local physicians. In some instances the services have been extended to the nearby towns.

Under new ordinances all dairies have been inspected and licensed, milk analysed and thus the supply improved and safeguarded. The milk producers have given in every instance their cordial support. In all 40 dairies have been licensed.

From time to time the local water supply has been analysed and in every instance found free of pollution or infection. Many private supplies have been examined and the necessary recommendations made.

The town has been especially free of communicable disease. Most cases that have occurred have been imported in one way or another. All cases have been properly isolated and measures taken to prevent their spread. The schools have not been closed nor has the public suffered any inconvenience. There was one outbreak of scarlet fever which was limited to three cases. There have been nine cases of measles confined to three families. Four cases of typhoid fever occurred at widely separated intervals. Two of these cases were clearly imported from some other locality.

By a regulation of the Department all cesspool and privy work has been done by one individual licensed by the Department and under the direction of the Department. This has proved a satisfactory solution of the sewage problem.

Much of the work of the Department has had to do with the abatement of nuisances. More than sixty were reported, inspected, and properly abated.

Seventeen individuals were licensed to collect garbage under the supervision of the Department. A good system of garbage removal is solely needed during the summer months and it is hoped that a proper system may be put in force in a short time.

The hotels have been inspected and the proprietors advised as to the means of improving existing insanitary conditions.

A system of medical school inspection was inaugurated for the purpose of improving the physical welfare of the school children. The various sanitary features of the schools were studied during the year. Pediculosis was found in several of the schools and methods of eradication were enforced.

The Annual "Clean-up and Paint-up Week" was held last Spring and as a result many of the back yards and unsightly rubbish piles were cleaned up. The first principle of Public Health is a clean and wholesome environment.

During the year articles have been published in the local paper on Health topics. Pamphlets on matters of especial interest have been published and distributed. Lectures have been given to various bodies of people. It is hoped that more can be done to spread the note of Public Health Preparedness.

In submitting this very meagre report the Department wishes to express to you it's appreciation of the generous response which your Board has made to its various requests for help. Furthermore a deep sense of gratitude is acknowledged to the people of all parts of the town for the co-operative spirit which has been manifested. It is hoped that the work of the past year, in spite of it's failures and in spite of the handicaps of primary organization, has proved of help to the town and to its citizens.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee of the Town of York:

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the State law I herewith present to you and to the citizens of York, my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The year just passed has been one of unusual advantages along certain lines. The increase in wages made to the common school teachers, during the previous summer, accomplished its purpose in inducing the majority of our teachers to return last fall for another year. Only four of our common school teachers resigned at the end of the school year in June and of that number, only one resigned to accept a better position as a teacher.

The customary epidemics of measles, whooping cough, mumps, etc., which have been the rule rather than the exception, during the past few years, have been almost wholly lacking this year. Consequently the work has been carried steadily forward with very few interruptions.

The past four or five years has been a time of construction in the York schools. New buildings have been erected and new courses have been introduced. It seemed best this year to use our time and energy, not so much to introduce new things as to perfect what we now have. We have striven therefore to improve our school by trying to improve the methods and practices of teaching within them. The first step along this line was the adoption of a uniform course of study prepared by the

State Department of Education. By using a uniform course of study in all of the schools, the work of the different schools may be much more readily compared and pupils who are obliged to change from one school to another, may do so without seriously interrupting their work.

Four teacher's meetings have been held during the past year, at which the best methods of teaching the different subjects have been discussed. As the result of such meetings, the younger teachers have been able to profit by the experience of their seniors and the older teachers have gained new interest and enthusiasm in their work. In endeavoring to find out just what is being done in all the schools, I have made 115 visits and 231 calls to deliver books and inquire regarding the needs of the school, etc. That you may not think that this work has all been done in the Village, where calling is easily done, I will add that I have made 10 trips to North Village, 13 trips to Clay Hill and 18 trips to Cape Neddick. I believe that these visits have been of great benefit to our schools for three reasons. First, I have been able to advise many of the younger teachers regarding many important questions; secondly, all of the teachers have been kept well supplied with books, paper, etc; and finally, and what is of greatest importance, I know by experience as a teacher, that the teachers have put more time, more thought and more energy into their work because they have been expecting frequent visits from the Superintendent. I believe that the work being done in the majority of our schools, ranks very favorably with that done in many of the cities of our state.

A summary of the financial condition of our different departments, may be found following this report. In connection with the figures given, it may be well to say just a word regarding the increase of the totals over last year. As I understand it, it has been the custom in the past for the Superintendent to close his books on Feb. 15. This gave so short a time for those working on the town report to get their report arranged and printed, that it seemed advisable last year, to change the time of closing the books to Jan. 30. Consequently the time

covered by last year's town report was from Feb. 15, 1914 to Jan. 30, 1915, while the time covered by this year's report is from Jan. 30, 1915 to Jan. 30, 1916. In other words this report covers 15 days more time than the report covered last year. Since the cost, while our schools are in session, is about \$530 per week the addition of two weeks makes a considerable difference in the totals.

A question which naturally arises, in looking over the figures for our common schools is, "How is it, that the bills were paid last year, with an appropriation of \$2000 by the town, and leave a balance of \$360.74, while this year, with an appropriation of \$4000 and no substantial increase in salaries, there is a balance of only \$75.74?"

By examining the reports of the two years you will find that in addition to the \$2000 appropriated two years ago, there was an unexpended balance of \$1485.82, so that the amount actually used this year has been \$1463.14 more than last year. The explanation is as follows: During the summer of 1914 a much needed change was made in the arrangement of teachers. Three new teachers were added and the salaries of the old teachers raised so that the weekly pay roll was raised from \$208.75 to \$259. Since this was done in the summer, during one half of the year covered by last year's report the teachers were paid under the old schedule and one half under the advanced schedule, while this year we have been obliged to pay the advanced schedule during the entire year. This makes a difference of \$804. Again the increase of two weeks in the length of the time covered by this report makes a difference of \$518. We have raised salaries enough to make a total increase of \$80.80. The fuel this year has cost a little more than last year. These items account for the increased expenditure.

In making plans for our common schools for another year, it may readily be seen that, if we are to continue our present policy of employing skilled teachers, an even larger appropriation than was voted last year will be needed. We are now paying our common school teachers an average salary of \$11.54

per week. This, considering the price of board in York, is not above the average for the county and below what is paid in many towns in the county. Biddeford pays \$12.17 per week, Old Orchard \$12 per week and Sanford \$14.05. The salaries which we are paying are the lowest possible figures at which we can hire teachers of the same quality as we now have, so that it is simply a question of paying the price or employing cheaper teachers.

If no change in salaries is made next year and we get the same amount from the state which we have received this year, it will require an appropriation of \$4374.16 to pay our bills. There is one change which I would strongly recommend. Mrs. Baker, the Principal of our Village Grammar school, has informed me that she does not plan to teach another year. If a change must be made I believe that our Village school has reached the position where a man should be placed at its head. If this is to be done it will call for an appropriation of about \$500 more.

In my opinion the work at our High School has been unusually successful this year. Although we were obliged to make four changes in our teaching force, at the beginning of the fall term, we were exceedingly fortunate in securing the services of teachers of ability and, with but one exception, teachers of considerable experience. While we have had many good teachers during the past four years, our experience this year should teach us to follow the example of the larger schools of our State and of other States in deciding that the majority of our teachers must have had some experience in actual teaching before we will employ them. While one or possibly two inexperienced teachers may be safely employed, provided they are willing to take suggestions from others, the new teacher must necessarily do much experimenting and our High School has reached the size where too much experiment may prove disastrous.

From all that I can see and learn, the addition of another man to our teaching force has been a great success. We were exceedingly fortunate in securing the services of a man of abili-

ty, good judgment and common sense.

If we are to retain these teachers, or others of equal ability, we must have a larger appropriation this year than was made last year. An examination of the State school report shows that the average appropriation for High Schools about the size of ours all over the State is \$3295, while our appropriation added to the Clark and Emerson fund, which was \$798.98 this year, makes a total of only \$2798.98. Our High School teachers are obliged to pay \$6.75 per week for board and room, which is probably as high as is paid in most any place in the state and much higher than the average. Our custom has been, until this year, to hire teachers just out of College who could be hired very cheaply, keep them until they had gained experience and then allow some school, with more money than we have had, to step in and take them. This year we have had teachers of experience and I strongly recommend that either these same teachers or others of equal ability be retained another year. To do this will call for an appropriation of \$2800.

The Committee found itself in a rather difficult position when the voters decided that they would not raise money for a new school house at Cape Neddick and yet did not solve the problem as to what should be done. After investigating the matter the committee did what they considered the best thing to be done for this year. A partition was put into the present building making two rooms. While we have been able to get along this year with this arrangement, it is far from satisfactory. The rooms are not shaped as they should be for school rooms, being 30 ft. long and only 12 1-2 ft. wide. Each room meets the requirements, as far as air space is concerned, for 15 pupils while, in the primary room, we have had 25 pupils this year with the probability of more next year. Being on the north side of the building and somewhat surrounded the primary room is very dark during a part of the school day. Something should be done to improve conditions before another year. At Beech Ridge we have another similar condition. The room where the primary school is now held will be far too small to

accommodate the pupils next year. Something must also be done here before another year.

Quite extensive repairs were made at the High School during the summer when some partitions were removed from some small rooms making a large room. This change has not only given us a much better room for our typewriting class than was used last year, but has saved the extra expense of heating the large school hall as was done last year. At North Village a chimney was built and the roof shingled.

The work in Manual Training and Music is fully explained in the reports of the teachers who have charge of these subjects.

The action taken by the town in paying part of the car fare to the High School has, I am sure, been fully appreciated and has been a great help to very many.

The School Board recently held a meeting at which the needs for another year were thoroughly discussed and I was instructed to recommend, in behalf of the committee, the following appropriations.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MANUAL TRAINING

E. S. Foster, Superintendent of schools.

My dear Sir:-

It is with pleasure that I submit to you, briefly the work accomplished in Manual Training during the past year. The pupils have advanced rapidly, and the energy and enthusiasm with which they enter the work ought to convince the voters of York that they made no mistake in taking the action they did at the special meeting last April. It is hoped that results have been satisfactory enough to win for Manual Training a permanent place in the public school course.

In elementary handiwork, which is the term applied to all of the work in the first five grades, the object is to teach the hand to act as the mind directs, and to this end paper folding, paper cutting, weaving, card sewing, color work, clay modelling and construction work are introduced. The teachers have heartily co-operated with me in the work, and much credit is due them for the success along this line. Included among the many articles made are posters, calendar mounts, pin cushions, pen wipers, post card holders, napkin rings, baskets, boxes, dolls' hammocks, dolls' caps, socks, mats, match cases, valentines, and one 4th grade is furnishing a log house, which the boys of that grade are helping to build. Special stress is laid upon paper construction in the 3rd, 4th and 5th grades as accuracy in measuring furnishes a firm foundation for work in the higher grades.

When the 6th grade is reached the girls begin sewing. Simple stitches are first practiced and then holders, bags, caps and aprons are made. Work is not wholly confined to sewing for raphia pillow tops, and rag rugs are woven, also, bead making and stenciling have found a place in this grade. Girls in the two higher grades have practiced the more difficult stitches, and are now engaged in making articles of underwear, kimonos and aprons which they have cut from patterns thus acquiring some knowledge in the use of patterns. Besides sewing and mending

some time is given to making reed and raphia baskets. That this work is fascinating and practical is proven by the fact that some of the 8th grade girls of last year's class are continuing the work at home, though now students of the High School.

Thirty-six chairs in the hands of as many 6th grade boys have been receiving new cane seats, besides refinishing when needed. Many are completed and all are nearing completion. This has been excellent work, and has proven the mettle of the boy. The patrons of this industry furnished twenty-five cents to meet the expense of material used. During the remainder of the year these boys will study saws and planes and practice the correct method of using and adjusting the same. Special stress will be laid upon the squaring up of stock, and the making of one piece projects.

The 7th grade boys are continuing the study and use of different tools, kinds of woods, and nails. They are making projects with "assembled parts" which require greater accuracy. The square butt, and dowel joints are included in the projects constructed, some of which are tea-tiles, book-racks, hat-racks, shelves, post card racks and flower stands.

The 8th grade boys have acquired ability and confidence in their work, and the boy who said last year, "An eighth of an inch makes no difference," has learned from experience his mistake. Many of the boys paid for their own material, and are making taborets, foot-stools, umbrella racks, tables, shaving cabinets, sewing screens, clock frames, knife trays, book shelves, blotter pads, and neck-tie racks. This work necessitates the making of mitre, mortise and tenon, square butt, locked, and dowel joints, which have not proven too difficult for them to master. Class work in this grade includes the further study of woods—shrinkage, method of sawing and wood finishing.

The Rural Schools are taking a no less active part in all branches of the work, and while it is regretted that time cannot be given to elementary drafting in any of the schools, it is practically impossible under present conditions.

We neither expect nor wish all York boys to become cabinet-makers or carpenters, nor York girls to be dress makers, but whatever their vocation in life they are acquiring habits of neatness, accuracy, and diligence, in industrial work, which must make them better and more useful citizens of to-morrow.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Mr. E. S. Foster, Superintendent of Schools:

Dear Sir:-

I herewith submit my report on the work of the music department of the York schools for your consideration.

On beginning my work last fall I found that the pupils had been well instructed and were as far advanced as could be expected, considering that they had had music but two years. It will be readily seen that the full effects of public school music upon the music and social life of the community can not be manifest in two or three years, nor can the child receive the full benefit in so short a time, any more than he would be able to work any mathematical problem after having studied arithmetic only three years. When the present third grade graduates from the grammar school, they will be able to demonstrate to you what school music really means. Each grade has its difficulties and they must be studied systematically to gain the best results. I hope that deliberation on this phase of the subject will secure its continuance in York.

In the first grade, the work consists of rote songs, scale exercises and singing games. Board work is begun in the spring term. This consists of reading, melodies from board and writing on the board musical phrases sung to them. The second and third grades have been doing the same kind of work, only more advanced. The third grade have just begun to use music readers. The fourth grade has been using books for some time. In the country schools, the pupils have books as soon as they can read

a little, as it helps to hold their interest.

Two-part music has been taken up in the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades and at the Clay Hill and Beech Ridge and Lincoln schools. The pupils seem to be interested in the work and I have never found brighter or more courteous children to work with.

Special attention has been given in all the schools to rythmn, as I found that to be their weak point, modern educators advocate the use of folk dances and singing games to help, in this very necessary part of their music drill, so in the lower grades we've been using some singing games. We are handicapped at the village and many of the rural schools by the the lack of a musical instrument.

Lately, some little time has been spent in learning the patriotic and folk songs that everyone loves to sing and all should know.

We are rehearsing an operetta to be given by the village school the last of this term. There will be one at the Beach the middle of next term and we are already planning to have May-day exercises in several of the schools. Working on an operetta does not interfere with our regular work as much as might be supposed. Many of the songs are used as sight reading exercises (placed upon the blackboard), excellent drill is given in rythmn, and the chorus singing is a necessary part of the scheme of school music.

All over town the best results are obtained in the third, fourth and fifth grades, not because of lack of interest or ability in the upper grades, but on account of the diffidence of boys and girls during the adolescent age. In a few years this will be overcome as the children will have more confidence in their own ability after they have had music longer.

In a few years we may expect to see the benefits of public school music apparent in the music of our churches.

Warrant for Town Meeting

March 13, 1916

To Bradford S. Woodward, Constable of the Town of York.

In the name of the State of Maine you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of York qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble in the Town House, in said town on Monday the thirteenth day of March, A. D., 1916, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

FIRST—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

SECOND—To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Assessors of Taxes, and Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes and Constable, one School Committeeman, one or more Fire Wards, one Auditor of accounts and all other officers necessary for the ensuing year.

THIRD—To see what sum of money the town will vote to defray the incidental expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

FOURTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for repairs of highways and bridges the ensuing year.

FIFTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of Poor the ensuing year.

SIXTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of Common Schools the ensuing year.

SEVENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of a Free High School the ensuing year.

EIGHTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purchase of text books and supplies the ensuing year.

NINTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the repairs of School Buildings for the ensuing year.

TENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for janitor service and fuel for the High School for the ensuing year.

ELEVENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for instruction in manual training and music in the schools for the ensuing year.

TWELFTH—To see if the town will vote to pay all or any part of the expenses in transporting scholars to and from the York Free High School and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

THIRTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for water supply the ensuing year.

FOURTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for Memorial Day.

FIFTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for care of grounds, walks and shrubbery around the Town House.

SIXTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for street lighting for the ensuing year.

SEVENTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate for the destruction of brown tail moths for the ensuing year.

EIGHTEENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay interest on and for the reduction of the debt of the town for the ensuing year.

NINETEENTH—To see if the town will vote to instruct and authorize the Treasurer to hire money on the credit of the town to meet pressing liabilities when so directed by the Selectmen.

TWENTIETH—To see if the town will vote to continue the Health Department and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

TWENTY-FIRST—To see if the town will vote “yes” or “no” on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

TWENTY-SECOND—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$1,333.00 for the improvement of the sec-

tion of state aid road as outlined in the report of the state highway commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges: The above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

TWENTY-THIRD—To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of state highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

TWENTY-FOURTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote for the purpose of removing snow from the highways.

TWENTY-FIFTH—To fix the remuneration of the town officers for services for the ensuing year, also price of labor on the highways.

TWENTY-SIXTH—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the maintenance of the York Hospital the ensuing year.

TWENTY-SEVENTH—To see what sum of money the town will vote in aid of the York Public Library.

TWENTY-EIGHTH—To see if the town will vote to purchase a combination chemical and hose motor truck and hose, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

TWENTY-NINTH—To see if the town will vote to install street lights from Cider Hill Junction, so called, to the Westerly side of Rice's Bridge, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

THIRTIETH—To see if the town will vote to paint the old Grammar School Building and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

THIRTY-FIRST—To see if the town will vote to buy a certain plot of ground (one half acre more or less) belonging to David S. Farwell and adjoining the present site of the Cape Neddick Public School, for a play ground for the children of said school and to raise a sum of money in payment for said lot, on petition of R. H. Winn and thirty-nine others.

THIRTY-SECOND—To see if the town will vote to erect a new two-room school house for the Cape Neddick Public School and to raise a sum of money therefor, on petition of R. H. Winn and thirty-nine others.

THIRTY-THIRD—To see if the town will vote to sell at public auction the present building now used for the Cape Neddick Public School, on petition of R. H. Winn and thirty-nine others.

THIRTY-FOURTH—To see if the town will vote to install electric lights along the Raynes Neck Road, so called, from the end of the present line near the driveway leading to the residence of Fred Moore to the house of Martha O. Lucas, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of Benj. Lucas and nine others.

THIRTY-FIFTH—To see if the town will vote to discontinue that portion of the old town highway leading from York Beach to Cape Neddick, as runs parallel to and is supplanted by the new state highway or trunk line leading from said York Beach to Cape Neddick, on petition of Charles A. Nason and ten others.

THIRTY-SIXTH—To see if the town will vote the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars to widen and raise a portion of the road leading from Sewall's Bridge to the Post Road, said portion being known as "Denney Brook," the distance being about one hundred and fifty feet in length, on petition of C. W. Goodale and thirteen others.

THIRTY-SEVENTH—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money sufficient to complete the outlet of the main sewer at York Beach, on petition of Harry H. Norton and eighteen others.

THIRTY-EIGHTH—To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to complete the outlet of the pen-stock at York Beach, on petition of H. G. Duff and nineteen others.

THIRTY-NINTH—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to build a branch sewer beginning at or near the Homestead House, so called, thence down Broadway to connect with the main sewer near the Vermont House, on petition of C. L. Worthen and thirty-four others.

FORTIETH—To see if the town will vote to install electric lights along the highway from the residence of Dwight Bardwell to Long Beach Boulevard and vote a sum of money therefor, on petition of A. M. Bragdon and twelve others.

FORTY-FIRST—To see if the town will vote to install an additional drain at some point on Long Beach, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of C. P. Dustin and forty-five others.

FORTY-SECOND—To see if the town will vote to install a street light near the Hastings Lyman Hotel on Freeman Street, on petition of Geo. A. Procter and ten others.

FORTY-THIRD—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1250 for the purchase of a Ford Chemical and Combination fire truck the same to be kept and operated by the York Beach fire department. They agreeing to respond to any fire alarm within the town with said apparatus, on petition of Austin McKowen and twenty-six others.

FORTY-FOURTH—To see if the town will vote to install a hydrant between the residence of Frank Donnell and James P.

Eaton, on the road called Barrell Lane and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of James P. Eaton and twelve others.

FORTY-FIFTH—To see if the town will vote to establish three hydrants at the section of the Town called Pine Hill, and authorize the selectmen to contract for the same and raise sufficient money to pay rental therefor on petition of Geo. A. Ramsdell and twenty-nine others.

FORTY-SIXTH—To see if the town will vote to add an extra room to the Beech Ridge School House and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of J. W. Moulton and nineteen others.

FORTY-SEVENTH—To see if the town will vote to install a hydrant on the Long Sands Road at or near the Easterly end of the York Heights Road, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of A. G. McCollum and ten others.

FORTY-EIGHTH—To see if the town will vote to install seven hydrants, one between the Morrison House, so called, and

the bridge on the road leading from Cape Neddick Corner and York Beach, one at or near the house now occupied by Mr. Charles Farwell on the road leading from Cape Neddick Corner to Baptist Church, one at or near the old parsonage now owned by Rev. Wm. Fletcher on road leading from Cape Neddick Corner to store of Mr. Geo. Currier, one at or near the residence of Mr. E. H. Todd on road leading from Cape Neddick Corner to Passaconaway Station, one at or near the house owned by Mrs. G. A. Donnell and now occupied by Mr. Ralph Winn on road leading from Mr. Geo. W. Currier's store to Mrs. E. G. Brewster's, one at or near the residence of Mr. Grafton Hutchins on road leading from Mrs. E. G. Brewster's to York Beach, and one near the Geo. Donnell Property, on the road leading from Cape Neddick Corner to York Corner, and raise a sum of money therefor, on petition of Frank L. Gardner and twenty-six others.

FORTY-NINTH—To see if the town will vote a sum of money to repair Barrell's Bridge, so called.

FIFTIETH—To see what sum of money the town will appropriate to extend the electric lights from Smith's Corner, so called, near the residence of Albert Simpson by the residence of M. H. McIntire, to the residence of J. A. Farish, on petition of J. A. Farish and ten others.

FIFTY-FIRST—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to straighten and grade the road from York Bridge to Smith's four corners leading to So. Berwick, on petition of J. A. Parsons and twelve others.

FIFTY-SECOND—To see if the town will vote to install electric lights along the highway from the residence of Fred Moore to the residence of Geo. L. Payne and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the same to have yearly service and to be installed June 1, 1916, on petition of John F. Voudy and twenty others.

FIFTY-THIRD—To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$75.00 for the purpose of repairing and making safe for the public travel, that part of the highway at the junction of the trunk line and state aid roads near the Long Beach Railroad Station, on petition of Harmon Varrell and eleven others.

FIFTY-FOURTH—To see if the town will vote to place two electric lights on Moulton Lane between the Norton Inn and York Harbor Station, on petition of C. B. Hobson, and ten others.

FIFTY-FIFTH—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the doings of the selectmen in laying out a town way at York Harbor, starting at a point on Norwood Road near the house of Albert Langille, thence in a general southeasterly direction following the course of the present private way which leads to the house and land of A. H. Wintersteen, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

FIFTY-SIXTH—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old town way leading from a point near the farm formerly owned by Martin H. Kingsbury running in a northwesterly direction to the town road leading to "Bell Marsh," so called, thence in a northeasterly direction over said Bell Marsh Road to the place formerly owned by Sumner Shaw.

FIFTY-SEVENTH—To pass any other vote or votes that may be necessary and legal for the administration of the town for the ensuing year.
