REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Alfred:—

I sumbit herewith the annual report of the School Department.

Registration in the Elementary Schools at the present time is as follows: Grade 4—28; Grade 2—14; Grade 3—19; Grade 4—21; Grade 5—24; Grade 6—9; Grade 7—19; Grade 8—14; Shaker Village—12. Total registration—160. The High School registration is shown in the report of the principal. The last school census shows the following: Number of persons between the ages of 5 and 21—132 boys; 134 girls. Total 266. Attendance during the current term has been somewhat handicapped by the prevalence of sickness.

There have been a few changes in the matter of instruction. In the four upper grades we have put music and penmanship on a departmental basis and have found this arrangement to be very satisfactory. Through a tentative arrangement with Nasson Institute we are getting the benefit of instruction in domestic science and manual arts in these grades. Under this arrangement this school is a practice school for Nasson students who are in training. Although handicapped in the matter of equipment, our pupils have profited by the scheme and are showing a very keen interest in the work. Thus far there has been no expense involved. If continued, however, there will be a slight cost. I would, nevertheless strongly urge the continuance of instruction in these subjects.

Work in music has continued to prove a profitable addition to our curriculum. For a more detailed account of this subject I refer you to the report of the Supervisor of Music.

The Maine Public Health Association is still rendering profitable service. The annual inspection was made at the opening of the present term.

We have made repairs on the building as needed. During the latter part of the Fall term we had part of the windows in the High School weather-stripped by the Chamberlain Weatherstrip Co. I would recommend that some of this work be done each year until all windows in the building are tight. A saving in fuel would result. A roof has been built over the steps leading from the new part of the building thus overcoming the danger of falling ice from the roof above. A new book cupboard has been built in the Grammar School.

One of our greatest needs at the present time is a play room for pupils on stormy days. If part of the basement, especially that part under the recent addition to the building, were cemented this problem would be solved. There are many ways in which such a room could be used. Pupils who bring their lunches need a more suitable place in which to eat.

There seems to be no need for increased appropriations to maintain schools on the present basis. Nevertheless, we do need an extra teacher in the elementary grades. At one time this year there were 57 pupils registered in the primary room. The High School is also growing. Present indications point to the fact that next year we shall probably have over sixty pupils. It is a generally accepted

fact that High Schools having fifty or more pupils should have three teachers. I suggest these facts for your consideration.

I wish, in conclusion, to express to the members of the Committee, the teachers and the citizens of the Town my appreciation of their loyalty and support during the past year.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools and School Board of Alfred:—

I submit for your consideration the following report of Alfred High School.

Total number of pupils registered 54. Girls 30, boys 24. Seniors 7 Juniors 13, Sophomores 15. Freshmen 19.

The scholastic standing of the school is of vital interest to all. This standard has been advanced just as far as possible with a group of 54 students. Parents can lend much assistance in raising this scholastic rating by insisting upon regular hours of home study for their children.

The Senior play which was given in March was very generously supported by the community, the proceeds being used to meet the expense of graduation.

Two hundred copies of the "Garnet" were printed and sold or sent to other schools for exchange. We were able to have a larger paper than the previous year due to the success of student business management.

Spring baseball was a success. We began by making minor improvements on the community field such as, grading, a new backstop, benches and bleachers. The loyalty and generous support of the community have made possible the addition of much needed equipment.

During the year a sum of \$40.00, was raised by the School from the sale of magazines, published by the Crowell and Curtis publishing companies. This money was used as a library fund for the purchase of a book-case, a set of history reference books and various magazines.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Superintendent, the School Committee and Citizens of the Town for their kind co-operation and loyal support.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools and Board of Education, Alfred, Me.

Gentlemen:-

There seems to be a remarkable similarity in these reports from year to year as the same course is followed with slight variations. As a whole it seems to me that the progress of all the schools has been quite satisfactory.

Perhaps an outstanding feature this year is the rendering of three part music by the High School chorus, for the first time since music was introduced into the public schools. The present chorus have had the advantage of musical instruction since the sixth year and are now seeing definite results therefrom. The new Laurel Songs books especially arranged for soprano, alto, and bass parts, which have been adapted in the High School are excellent. They are the latest of the Birchard publications and are being enthusiastically received all over the country.

Won't you visit our music period some Wednesday morning from 10.45 to 11.30 and hear our program?

We appreciate very greatly the work of Mrs. Josephine Gould as accompanist for the upper grades. These classes are singing quite difficult two and three part songs very creditably.

The abrupt transition from second grade to practically fourth grade work; also from fourth to sixth, works the hardship for the children eliminating many really important fundamental. We are overcoming this difficulty in a measure by dividing the lesson period for each grade but more time is much needed for satisfactory results.

I wish to express my appreciation to our Superintendent, to the Board of Education, and to all the teachers for their cordial support and co-operation throughout the year.

In presenting this the twenty-fifth annual report of Parsons Memorial Library we are glad to be able to say that there has been a steady, if not large

increase, in the use of the library again during the past year both by our own people and by those of adjoining towns. As we keep no account of the reference work done we cannot give any definite report but during the year we know a good number of scholars and older people came to the library for help on various subjects.

We have loaned 7,110 books besides sending some to a neighborhood where the people could not easily get to the library.

There have been 146 volumes added and 18 magazines bound, also 12 books have been rebound.

The number of books in the library, 9,739.

The number of cards outstanding, 386.

We have been presented by a friend with a set of "The Bible and Its Story" in ten volumes and "The New Self-Interperating Bible Library" in four volumes. Also five other books have been given us by the authors.

We have in the reading room 20 magazines and one weekly paper, The Sanford Tribune which is sent us through the courtesy of the editor.

We are again having printed in the Town Report a list of the new books purchased during the year.
