Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee:-

During the past year we have made progress toward achieving what would seem impossible. Many of the cities and large towns retain the nine grade system, and all have six weeks more school each year than we have, with normal trained teachers. Many towns no larger than Carmel have 36 weeks school, and at least one normal trained teacher,—a helping teacher, whose work is calculated to increase the efficiency of the schools. We are doing without these advantages, yet our pupils, in our lower grades at least, are making sufficient progress to complete the common school course of study in eight years. With relatively untrained teachers, we are undertaking to prepare for high school in 240 weeks of school, while larger towns and cities give their pupils 324 weeks for the same purpose. This cannot be done without a liberal policy in text-books and supplies. Pinching at that point would reduce efficiency and be wasteful of money as well as of pupils' time. It is, therefore, very gratifying to see the little ones making so good a start and demonstrating that the year of time that we seek to save is being saved early in Here is an economy worth thousands of dollars to the course. the town.

More yet could be accomplished if all would realize that they are teachers when in the presence of a child. Parents should cultivate correct habits of speech in order to assist their children. They should read the hygiene books that are used in school and practice in the home the same health habits that are there taught.

We have to pay out too much of the school money for indirect purposes. Parents sacrifice the interests of their children when they make exhorbitant demands regarding conveyance. Money cannot be spent on the road and still be available for the schoolroom. We are paying more than enough for conveyance to provide music and domestic science teaching, or to employ a physical director to care for the health and bodily development of the children. We should have medical examination of all the pupils. Ponzi never offered as great returns as come from saving the economic loss of poor health.

The price of firewood has much more than doubled within a few years. Conditions at the opening of the year seemed particularly serious, but I feel that the high prices asked were not wholly warranted. These costs will recede with the general fall of prices. It may be possible to hire teachers enough cheaper to effect a saving of 25 cents per capita for the residents of the town. But would that economy be worth while if it reduced the standard of our schools? The best prospect for economy seems to lie in moving two schoolhouses, reducing the number of schools. Changed conditions make necessary the re-opening of the Ash Hill school, and a location is possible that will save conveyance charges. Conveyance has long made this the most expensive school in town in proportion to the number of pupils. If the men would turn out in the good old "bee" spirit and move that school and the one at North Carmel, they would be doing something toward lower taxes. The Five school has become too small for profitable maintainance, and there are too many children in the Village school for one teacher to do good work under modern requirements. Consolidation seems the only way. This has added a conveyance charge to our expenses, but with the graduation of the older pupils that cost should be much less than this year.

The present condition of our school finances results from old causes as well as from the recent increase in costs. The appropriation of \$2000 three years ago left an overdraft of \$700 when the winter term had been paid for. Thus of the \$2200 raised two years ago, but \$1500, less than half enough, remained for the expenses of that year. Last winter the early date of the town meeting, travel conditions and the fact that one school had not closed, prevented our getting in all bills, so the actual deficit was larger than appeared on the books, though the difference was

slight compared with the previous year. The towns of the state increased their vote for schools by about 50 per cent and made a decided increase in the pay of teachers. This compelled us to make some increase. The high tax rate of the whole state and a heavy reduction in the School and Mill fund made our receipts from the state much less than anticipated. Failing to move the North Carmel school cost several hundred dollars more. Thus instead of wiping out last year's deficit, we were able only to reduce it about \$600.

For the coming year, the spring term charges are already fixed and will reach \$1900. If the economies proposed can be effected, the fall and winter terms should cost about \$3000, with \$300 for fuel. We may expect about \$1700 from the state, leaving \$3500 to be raised, in addition to the overdraft.

The increase in high school costs has been even greater than in those of common schools. The academies have increased greatly their tuition charges and are calling on the legislature for many special appropriations for their relief. It has been proposed to raise tuition generally to \$100 a year. Even with the town and state paying tuition, it is more expensive to go away to high school than it formerly was to go to college. Equality of opportunity is an American principle. To limit high school education to those who can go away would be a great injustice. We have 21 eighth grade pupils in town, most of whom should enter high school next year. With probable tuition pupils we should have as large an entering class next year as this. There is good reason to expect a total of more than 50 in the four classes. State aid and tuition receipts should meet nearly half the cost of the school. Without the school, tuition charges would be nearly as expensive. This year we have a special three year classification, to enable us to pay the tuition of five seniors who are completing their studies in other schools, for which we will be reimbursed by the state. But Carmel High is listed in the directory of secondary schools as a class A school.

Two heavy bills left over from last year, the need of new geographies and spellers, histories made necessary by the state course of study and supplementary needs due to increased enrollment, have made our textbook costs very heavy. The tide in paper costs has turned. We shall need American histories for the seventh and eighth grades. Supplementary readers for all grades will continue to be a paying investment. The high school has raised large sums for equipment, and I had hoped that high school textbooks might be purchased in the same way, but we have had to draw on the town for nearly \$200. \$600 will be needed to care for the overdraft and meet the needs of the coming year. For insurance and supplies \$200 is called for. The sale of the "Settlement" property should meet ordinary repair needs.
