STATE OF MAINE.

To B. W. Faden, a Constable of Carmel in said County.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Carmel, qualified by law to vote in said town affairs to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the third day of March. A. D. 1924. at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit.:

Art. 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Report of the Municipal Officers as printed.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 7. To elect one or more Town Constables.

Art. 8. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation for the same.

Art. 9. To elect one or more Fire Wardens and fix compensation for the same.

Art. 10. To see if the town will elect one or more Highway Commissioners.

Art. 11. To see what sums of money the town will raise for Contingent Expenses; for Support of Poor; Repairs of Roads and Bridges; Support of Schools; Repairs on Schoolhouses; School Books and • other Town Expenses.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State-aid as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25, of Public Laws, 1916.

Art. 13. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the Improvement of the section of State-aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the Care of Highways and Bridges under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State Aid Highway within the limits of said town under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes, 1916.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the Special Resolve Road.

Art. 16. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$30.00 and donate the same to C. K. Johnson Post for Memorial Day expenses.

Art. 17. To see if the town will reimburse Albert Powell for the tax on his barn destroyed by fire in 1922.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise money to repair the road on Ring Hill on the Five Road by making suitable ditches and raising the level of the road at the foot of the hill.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to move the North Carmel schoolhouse and if so, how much money you will raise for the same.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to purchase a lot and build a new school building in Carmel village.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to sell its bonds to build a new school building in Carmel village and if so, how much.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to continue the Hinckley Hill School.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to discontinue any school.

Art. 24. To see if the town will build a suitable Fence on the Bemis Road, so-called.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to pay Asher G. Kimball \$350.00 for eight lambs killed by dogs in the month of May, 1921, ten sheep killed in the month of November, 1921; two lambs killed in June, 1922 and fourteen sheep killed in September, October and November, 1922.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money sufficient to complete the board fence on the west side of the cut on the Five Road and erect the same before the winter 1924-25.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to buy a Tractor for Highway Purposes and raise money for the same. The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town House in said town at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon of said meeting.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 10, 1924

To the Superintending School Committee:

To you and to the citizens of Carmel, I herewith present my second report as Superintendent of your schools,

During the past year there have been seven schools maintained in town, which have been for the most part in charge of earnest conscientious and efficient teachers, who have encouraged the pupils to do their best and have in nearly every instance accomplished the work required in their respective grades.

Although the teachers have done excellent work, the schools have not accomplished as much this year as they did last, owing to the decrease in the school year from 36 weeks to 30. I cannot help but feel that this is a step backward and it has already made itself felt by compelling us to add the ninth grade to our course of study in order to have the pupils fully prepared for High School. This means that our boys and girls will have to attend school nine years instead of eight and in these nine years with only 30 weeks, will not have received as many weeks of school by 18 as they would have with 36 weeks and eight years. It also means that all pupils now in the eighth grade will have to attend school one year more in order to obtain credits to enable them to graduate.

I feel that the attendance in the majority of the schools is not what it ought to be or what the taxpayers have a right to expect. Parents should realize that no pupil can do good work or accomplish what they ought unless they are in school every day. Not only are they doing themselves a lasting injury, but are injuring others in using the teacher's time helping them over the work that they missed. In addition to this irreparable loss to the pupils, there is the monetary loss, as the funds awarded by the State are reckoned partly according to the attendance.

I wish that during the coming year the parents would visit the schools more than they have in the past. I think that if both fathers and mothers would call and see their children doing the every-day work of the classroom, it would greatly increase the interest in our schools and be the means of bringing about a closer relationship between the school and the home. Please keep this in mind and when the next visiting day comes, make plans to spend at least a part of the day observing the work done in the different grades. It is not necessary for me to say that I should be very glad to have you do so.

HIGH SCHOOL

The High School has been under the instruction of Mr. J. W. Barbeau who was with us last year and is too well known to need any word from me to recommend him. He was assisted during the Fall Term by Mary Osgood. At the end of the term it became necessary for Miss Osgood to leave and we were very fortunate in securing the services of Miss Velma Briggs, who is a graduate of Colby College and has had experience in teaching in the schools of Maine and New York. It is not often that in schools the size of this that we are able to obtain teachers with as much college training as our present teachers have.

I have heard the High School criticized much the past year and I cordially invite constructive criticism. I am free to admit that it has not done as good work this year as last, owing to a combination of circumstances. In schools of this class, the State requires us to maintain a College Preparatory Course and in this course we have to teach the studies that are required for admission to college. This does not give the students that are taking a General Course an equal chance with the others and these are the ones that need it most as a majority of the students are taking this course. Under the present conditions this cannot be remedied, owing to lack of room. With plenty of room we could add an Agricultural and a Domestic Science Course to those we already have and maintain a three teacher school with no more

expense than we already have with two teachers. This is brought about by the increase in appropriation from the State for the two special courses added.

In conclusion, let me say, the schools of your town compare favorably with other towns of its size in the State. I also wish to thank the School Committee and citizens of Carmel for their kindness and support during the past year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Voters of the town of Carmel:

The Superintending School Committee of your town herewith present their annual report for the year 1923-24.

SCHOOLS

There were seven schools maintained in town during the past year. We feel that they have made a steady and thorough advancement although we have not had as many weeks of school as last year.

REPAIRS

We wish particularly to call your attention to the condition of the school buildings in this town. During the past year all of them have been inspected by the State Agent for Rural Education. The ones at Damascus and Philbrick were accepted as complying with the new law. The others, he said, would have to be remodeled with the exception of the Partridge and that to be built new. He also recommended moving the one at N. Carmel as there is not space enough about the building to allow the addition of sanitary toilets. We also wish to call your attention to the building in the village. The size of the grounds make an addition impossible as the law reads, "That no school building shall be built within 50 feet of any dwelling." In short, we see no way that a building to meet our present and future needs can be made out of this present one on the lot where it now stands.
