# TOWN WARRANT

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Penobscot, ss.

State of Maine.

*To L. D. French, Constable of Carmel, in said County,*

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Carmel, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March sixth, A. D. 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the Municipal Officers.

Art. 4. To elect three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 5. To elect a Town Treasurer.

Art. 6. To elect one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or authorize the Selectmen to act as Road Commissioners.



Art. 8. To elect a Road Commissioner if the town so votes in the preceding article.

Art. 9. To elect a Fire Warden, Sextons, Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber; Fence Viewers, Tramp Constable, Town Agent.

Art. 10. To fix the compensation of our several officers: First Selectman, Second Selectman, Third Selectman, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner, Superintending School Committee, Fire Warden, and raise money for the same.

Art. 11. To elect one or more Town Constables.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the following purposes:

Roads, Bridges, Sidewalks—Summer.

Snow Fence.

Common Schools, Textbooks and Supplies, Lights.

Insurance on Schoolhouses.

High School.

High School Repairs.

Schoolhouse Repairs.

Salary of Superintendent of Schools.

Interest on Common School Fund.

Note Due on New Building.

Support of Poor, Veterans' Aid, Dependent Children.

Cutting Bushes, State, State Aid, Third Class Highways.

Memorial Day.

Care of Cemeteries.

Contingent Account.

Street Lights.

Aid of Dependent Children.

Simpson Memorial Library.

Snow Removal.

Interest on Notes Payable.

Art. 13. To elect a Collector of Taxes and fix his compensation.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for State Aid Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and what sum for maintenance of State and State Aid Highways within the limits of said town under Sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Special Resolve Maintenance under Chapter 124, Public Laws of 1927.

Art. 17. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$667.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Roads, in order for the town to be entitled to Third Class apportionment under the provisions of the amendments of Section 5, suspending Section 46 of Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for ditching and smoothing the Five Road from State Road to Fuller Road.

Art. 19. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$100.00 for the maintenance of the Fuller Road, so-called, beginning at the John Hewes place and extending to the John Smith place.

Art. 20. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to have the village school yard plowed.



Art. 21. To see what action the town will take relative to the use of the Town Hall by the schools and local charitable organizations.

Art. 22. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$183.57 to cover the overdraft of 1937-1938 common school account.

Art. 23. To see what wages the town will pay for trucks, teams and men working on highways, for the ensuing year.

Art. 24. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 from A. L. Chase in trust, the interest to be used for the care of lot in Highland Cemetery.

Art. 25. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$100.00 for the maintenance of the Horseback Road, so-called.

Art. 26. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$90.00 for public health work in Carmel, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provision of Chapter 5, Section 82 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 28. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$367.50 to pay note on schoolhouse well.

Art. 29. To see what sum the town will vote to raise for the control of blister rust within the confines of the town. The State will add 50% to the appropriation or it will be supplemented with WPA labor if available.



Art. 30. To see what action the town will take in going 50-50 with other town organizations in fixing up Town Hall basement for dining room and raise money for same.

Art. 31. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to deduct from wages of all town employees, truck service, either of the following portions—25%, 33 1-3% or 50%, the same to be applied on taxes.

Art. 32. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of reducing the town indebtedness. The sum of \$2,167.95 is recommended by the State Department of Audit.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on payment of cash and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Art. 34. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow from any bank or persons, in the State of Maine, as a temporary loan or loans, to and for the use of the Town of Carmel in anticipation of taxes for the year 1939, sums of money in the aggregate not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) and fix rate of interest for same and authorize the Treasurer of the town to execute negotiable note or notes therefor, payable within the time specified.

Art. 35. To see what action the town will take in regard to WPA or PWA project and raise money for the same.

Art. 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting and raise money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon of said meeting.

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## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Carmel:*

I hereby submit the annual report of the schools of Carmel for the municipal year ending February 15, 1939:

### TEACHERS

Schools opened August 29th with the following teachers and enrollment:

Village Grammar—Willis Hussey,	36 pupils
Village Intermediate—Mittie Downs,	33 pupils
Village Primary—Madelene Buck,	40 pupils
Horseback—Nina Hewes,	20 pupils
Partridge—Arlene Ford,	18 pupils
Hinckley Hill—Dorothy Perry,	12 pupils
Damascus—Lillian Coburn,	27 pupils
High School—Farrell Ingalls, Mary Rowe,	51 pupils
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Total enrollment,	217 pupils

The new teachers, Mr. Hussey, Mrs. Hewes, and Mrs. Coburn, are normal school graduates with experience. Miss Rowe is a graduate of Bates College with summer school attendance at the University of Maine. Miss Downs has had two years' training at Castine Normal School. Mrs. Hewes, Miss Perry, Mrs. Ford, and Miss Rowe attended the University of Maine last summer. Your teachers show a willingness to keep up their professional standards that is very commendable. It is not easy to evaluate a teacher's



work from day to day, but I believe that you have a loyal, hard-working staff who merit your strongest support.

The attendance for the fall and winter terms has been very good. I think that both the parents and the children deserve credit for the fine attendance record.

Several projects for the improvement of the schools have been completed this year through cooperative work of teacher, pupils, and parents. In Damascus, electric lights were secured. At the Partridge School, the parents and teacher papered the schoolroom. At the Village, a piano was purchased for the building. These very fine projects speak well for the interest taken in the schools.

## REPAIRS

The greater part of the repair money was spent at Damascus this year. The windows were placed on the south side of the building, and the interior painted. With the electric lights available on dark days, this schoolroom is now well-lighted and pleasant. The south boundary fence was re-built. All of the school buildings in Carmel now have standard lighting as recommended by the State. The interior of the Horseback School is very unattractive and should receive attention soon. This will be an inexpensive job. In general, your school buildings are in excellent shape.

## HIGH SCHOOL

With the active cooperation of Principal Ingalls, the S. S. Committee, the P. T. A., and interested citizens, the main room at the high school was painted, the desks re-finished, a new floor laid in the English room, and a drinking fountain installed. This work was completed before school opened in the fall. A decided improvement in the morale of the school has been noted this year, which is due, in part, at least, to the improved surroundings. The teachers have worked whole-heartedly to carry out the State require-



ments, and the interest has been excellent on the part of the students. We have had seven tuition students from Etna, and can count on at least eight or nine for the coming year. Those of our graduates who have gone to higher institutions have shown adequate preparation. Carmel High School costs are no greater than other schools of its size, in several instances are less, and it compares favorably with them as to results. I firmly believe it merits your continued adequate support.

## FINANCES

The State Equalization Fund received in December, 1938, enabled us to raise teachers' salaries and to have thirty-six weeks of school, as recommended by Dr. Packard. Since Carmel will not share in Equalization in 1939-40, it will be necessary to raise a larger amount for Common Schools. The reasons why Carmel lost the Equalization for the fiscal year 1939-40 were: the change in basis of distribution made by the State, and the low municipal tax rate. The average for the State was .05732, Carmel's rate, .048.

Your committee and I have given the budget careful consideration. We believe that it will be necessary to maintain the same salary schedule as at present. We also think it will be necessary to cut the school year to thirty-two weeks, a step backward which we very much regret.

In concluding this report, I wish to thank all those who have helped to make this year a pleasant one in my school work. I wish especially to thank the S. S. Committee for their valued support and counsel, the teachers, the municipal officers, and the parents and children.

## REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

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*To the Superintendent and the Superintending School Committee:*

I herewith submit my report as Principal of Carmel High School.

School began on August 29 with an enrollment of fifty-one as follows:

The large Freshman Class is an above-average group with excellent training and ability. The scholastic average of the whole school is at its highest point in four years. One indication of this is the large number of students who are doing excellent work in first year Latin, a difficult subject usually avoided. With few exceptions the daily class work is of excellent quality. We have nearly a 100 percent participation in extracurricular activities which include basketball, table tennis, checkers, dramatics and prize speaking.

I recently talked with a schoolman who boasted that his school always had a certain number of failures. Such an idea has no place in our philosophy of education. We believe the failure of a pupil is in many respects the failure

of the school. Since secondary education is a process of guidance by which the adolescent may find himself and his place in the social order it behooves us as educators not to neglect those adolescents who may be having a difficult time in adjusting themselves. It is easy to teach the gifted—in fact, they teach themselves if left alone. The real art of teaching must be brought into play when dealing with the so-called failure. To the adolescent the “square on the hypotenuse,” “quadratic equations,” “the Roman Empire,” or “the law of the lever” may seem like vague fragments of things far removed from the realism of every day living. To evaluate such intellectual interests in terms of his experience is our constant task.

I should like to thank Mrs. Carter and the Committee for their aid and cooperation, Miss Rowe for her splendid assistance, and all those who have contributed to the success of the current school year.
