CARMEL VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

+ + +

To the Citizens of Carmel:

During 1965, this department was called upon to fight a total of 63 fires. This was the most calls we have had in a single year since the department has been in operation. Of this number 22 were grass fires, 9 were building fires, 5 were chimney fires, 4 were car fires, 3 flooded oil burners, 6 were fires at the Town dump, 2 were false alarms, 4 were miscellaneous, 3 were calls to Hermon and 5 were calls to Etna.

The following things have been accomplished this year:

- 1. A siren has been mounted on the roof of the station.
- 2. A new heating plant has been installed.
- A Resuscitator and tanks of oxygen have been installed on the new truck.
- 4. The parking lot has been enlarged and graded.
- 5. The grounds have been cleaned and graded all around the station.
- 6. Water and toilet facilities are being installed in the furnace room.
- 7. Painting inside and out has improved the looks considerably.

- 8. Several chairs and a table have been added to our furniture.
- 9. Portable lights have been constructed.

"Old Razor Back," our 1937 tank truck, is fast coming to the end of its career. The rear end, transmission and steering is in such bad condition that we expect it will soon have to be replaced. This truck has served us well, but without it our efficiency will be greatly impaired. The extra water it carries has made the difference between success and failure many times. Because of its age no credit was allowed by the New England Fire Insurance Rating Association at their inspection of our department in October.

Our efforts for the past two years to secure a lower insurance rate for the Town by getting a Class E rating finally have been successful. An engineer for the New England Fire Insurance Rating Association inspected for the department and equipment early in October and found the department able to qualify for the Class E rating. Early in January a letter from the New England Fire Insurance Rating Association confirmed his findings and approved the change to a Class E department.

This will mean a lower insurance cost to residents within three air miles radius of the fire station, with the exception of farms which do not qualify for this rating. This will mean approximately 80% of all the residences and business property will receive a reduction of 10% or more in their insurance cost.

NURSING SERVICES

IN CARMEL FOR THE YEAR 1965

Although Public Health is thought of as Community Health, we have to consider that each person dealt with is an individual. Therefore, definite programs may be introduced to a community but family problems are worked out according to the individual's physical, emotional, and economic needs.

The public health nurse maintains a program of education and guidance by teaching health rules, by preventing disease and deformity, and by lessening human suffering.

A statistical summary of the health services given in your town this past year is shown in the following tables:

The clinic services of the Department of Health and Welfare are available to citizens of Carmel when referred by their family physician. These clinics are listed as follows: Cardiac, Orthopedic, Pediatric, Hard of Hearing, Cystic Fibrosis, and the Clinic for Mentally Retarded Pre-School Children.

Your public health nurse wishes to thank everyone who has assisted with the various health programs this year.

CARMEL CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

+ + +

We have received the required annexes for the Town of Carmel, the Civil Defense and Public Safety Organization an operational plans. This was completed and sent to me on May 1, 1965. Completion of these documents renders the Town of Carmel and all that is governed by the town to buy surplus property from the Civil Defense Headquarters in Augusta.

Any organization wanting a film on Civil Defense, and some disasters, such as the Alaskan Earthquake, may contact me anytime. I do have a large list of films to choose from. You have to furnish the projector (16 mm sound).

I entered a float on Civil Defense on August 21, 1965 in the Grange parade. We had many good remarks, but did not take home first prize.

I have received a Citizen Band Radio License for the Carmel Civil Defense, and have made good use of it. We now have over 15 two-way radios in the Civil Defense, and are very active. We meet once a month to discuss activities.

I operaate the radio in the Fire Station every Wednesday night, sending in the weather report and the amount of radiation in the air, taken by a Geiger Counter. I also have all the boys in the area sign in on their radios with me to discuss Civil Defense and any other activities which we may have forgotten at our meeting. This is called a network—every Wednesday night from 8-8:30 PM.

I have showed films from the Civil Defense Office, including the Alaskan Earthquake. We also have what we call a Fox Hunt every once in a while. One man hides with his car and radio and keeps a signal going out every minute on his radio and it is up to us to find him by his signal strength.

This year was a good year in Civil Defense, and next year will be better.

NEW AND REVISED LAWS

+ + +

To inhabitants of town of Carmel:

Your attention is called to new and revised laws enacted by the 102nd Legislature.

Due to limited space only those that will affect most of you are being summarized at this time. The Title, Chapter and Section numbers are being given but exact wording has been substituted by a general meaning of these laws.

Title 12, Chapter 215, Sub-Chapter 5, Section 1355

This law states that any town allowing dumping to continue on town dumps closed by the State because they do not meet clearance regulations will lose the town's right to State reimbursement of ½ the costs of control of any escape fire from this dump during time of closure. This is up to 1% of state's valuation of town.

Title 12, Chapter 215, Sub-Chapter 7, Section 1456-A.

This states no equipment for producing power shall be operated in or near woodlands without approved spark arresters or mufflers. This applies to chain saws, tractors, either manufactured or home-made, or other equipment.

Title 12, Chapter 215, Sub-Chapter 11, Section 1653.

Any person who willfully or negligently causes a fire which burns forest, brush, grass or other lands or who fails to take proper action to control a fire on his own land shall be liable to the state or town for up to \$500.00 of the suppression costs.

Title 25, Chapter 317, Section 2436-A.

This sets up control of debris burning when the ground is not covered with snow. Debris may be burned out of doors only between the hours of 5:00 PM and 12:00 mid-night unless you have an approved incinerator or a special burning permit from your Town Warden or Fire Chief. Incinerator approval may be obtained from your Town Warden when the ground is not covered with snow. To meet approval incinerators must be tight containers with 1 inch holes for draft not more than a foot from bottom of container. Top must be tightly covered while burning with mesh or equivalent with holes ½ inch or smaller. Incinerator is to be set in center of circle 10 ft. in diameter cleared to mineral soil. Pressurized cans shall not be burned and fire shall not be left unattended.

NOTE: This law applies only to debris burning. Permits for burning slash, brush, blueberry land or fields of dry grass must be obtained for any time of day.

Questions on these laws may be answered by your Town Forest Fire Warden, Fire Chief or at the nearest Forest Ranger Station.

SUGGESTION: HAUL, OR HAVE HAULED, DEBRIS TO TOWN DUMP. Old automobiles and animal refuse exempted.

SLASH DEFINED: Slash is defined as branches, bark, tops, chunks, cull logs, uprooted stumps and broken or uprooted trees and shrubs left on ground as a result of logging, right of way construction or maintenance and land clearance.

DEBRIS is any manufactured product, household rubbish, hay or other vegetative accumulations or materials not included under slash.

COMMENTS TOWN OF CARMEL

January 1, 1965 to December 31, 1965

An audit has been completed of the financial records of the Town of Carmel for the year ended December 31, 1965. The audit consisted of an examination of the records maintained by the Town Manager and municipal officials.

The operations for the year showed that the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed amounted to \$3,968.00, per the following summary:

The overlay, the unappropriated balance of excise tax revenue and unexpended balances in the interest and aid to dependent children accounts were the major factors contributing to the amount lapsed to surplus.

The following comments pertain to the accompanying financial statements and to the scope of audit.

ASSETS — The general cash balance of \$2,463.29 was on deposit in the Merrill Trust Company, Bangor, Maine at December 31, 1965. The petty cash fund of \$50.00 was on hand with the tax collector.

Accounts receivable of \$702.13 consisted principally of current charges for State and other municipalities' welfare cases.

Taxes receivable totaling \$28,714.31 included for the most part unpaid current year accounts of \$27,765.05. The remaining balance of \$949.26 represented uncollected prior years' taxes dating from 1959. Tax liens and tax acquired property amounted to \$3,932.03 and \$7,510.09 respectively.

LIABILITIES, RESERVES AND SURPLUS — The accounts payable of \$5,000.00 represented the unpaid balance of the School Administrative District No. 23 current year assessment.

The appropriation accounts showed an unexpended balance of \$12,263.82 that was carried forward to the ensuing year. The major portion of this balance consisted of the property revaluation and concrete bridge fund accounts.

Cemetery funds being held pending acceptance by the town amounted to \$500.00 at the year end.

The unappropriated surplus amounted to \$23,809.07, a net increase of \$3,657.75 for the year. The change was occasioned principally by the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed and State reimbursements for state aid road and veterans' tax exemptions, less a transfer to the property revaluation account.

DEBT FUND — The debt fund, incorporated in the balance sheet as a separate fund, reflected outstanding fire truck notes of \$6,000.00 which are to be retired from future revenue.

TRUST AND RESERVE FUNDS — The trust fund principals totaled \$7,225.00 and unexpended income amounted to \$1,106.75 at the year end. With the exception of the Ministerial and School Fund of \$1,605.00, the trust funds were on deposit in the Bangor Savings Bank, Bangor, Maine.

DEPARTMENTAL ACCOUNTS — The departmental accounts showed a decrease of \$898.14 raised by taxation, as compared with the preceding year.

GENERAL — The use of a portion of the excise tax revenue for specific current operations and a transfer from unappropriated surplus for a property revaluation was authorized by the townspeople.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

The system of internal control was reviewed as pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Count of cash was made and records checked to determine the accuracy of recorded cash transactions.

Cash accounts were verified by reconciliation of bank statements furnished by the depository or by bank confirmation. Verifications were utilized, on a test basis, to determine the correctness of recorded assets and liabilities.

An analysis was made of receipts and deposits as well as expenditures and negotiated checks. Vouchers, payrolls and canceled checks were examined for a selected period.

Excise tax collections were checked with copies of receipts retained by the collector. Debt, trust and reserve fund transactions were examined. Surety bond coverage was reviewed.
