Dear Citizens of Carmel:

In 2009, I began my third term in the United States Senate. I remain deeply honored by the trust the people of Maine have placed in me, and I appreciate this opportunity to report on some highlights of my recent work in the U.S. Senate.

A significant accomplishment came in December when the President signed transportation legislation that includes a provision I authored to create a one-year pilot project to allow trucks weighing up to 100,000 pounds to use federal highways in Maine. This is moving heavy trucks off Maine's secondary roads and out of our downtowns and onto our modern, multi-lane, controlled access highways for one year, during which time a study of the impact on safety, commerce and road wear-and-tear would be conducted. In addition, this change helps to level the economic playing field, as neighboring states already have this exemption.

My appointment in early 2009 to the powerful Appropriations Committee has allowed me to have greater influence on the funding of priorities that are important to Mainers, such as shipbuilding, health care, education, and transportation, while also giving me the ability to continue pressing for the elimination of wasteful spending that exacerbates our federal deficit.

As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, I continue to be an advocate for Bath Iron Works, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, the Maine Military Authority in Limestone, and the many other defense contractors and institutions in Maine that contribute so much to our national security. In August, I traveled to Iraq and Afghanistan and had the opportunity to meet with many service men and women from Maine. My conversations with them were the most important aspect of my trip to the region. Our troops are brave, dedicated, compassionate, and highly skilled. I will continue to work hard to ensure that they have the support their difficult missions require.

Perhaps the greatest challenge facing our nation continues to be the struggling economy, and among my highest priorities are getting our people back to work and our economy back on track. That is why in early 2009 I joined a bipartisan effort to pass the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. The bill contains robust infrastructure spending, significant funding for state aid and education, and tax relief for low- and middle-income families and for small businesses. As a result of this bill, Maine is receiving approximately \$133 million for highway investments, more than \$50 million combined for the Clean Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Funds, and \$70.5 million for weatherization and energy efficiency projects.

Energy policy remains another great challenge: America's reliance on foreign oil harms our economy, our security, and our environment. Meeting the challenge of developing energy alternatives will provide great opportunities for Maine to build an economy for the future, with new industries and thousands of good jobs. This endeavor received a significant boost last October when the U.S. Department of Energy announced an \$8 million grant for deepwater offshore wind research at the University of Maine, and Congress also approved \$5 million I sponsored for the Maine Offshore Wind Initiative at UMaine. This January, the U.S. Department of Commerce announced a \$12.4 million laboratory construction grant for the University of Maine. I strongly advocated for these projects because, with some of the strongest winds in the nation off our coast and some of the best engineers in the field, Maine has great potential as an ideal location for offshore wind projects and

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can take the lead in the development of clean, renewable, and affordable energy for America. Estimates are that development of five gigawatts of offshore wind in Maine – enough to power more than 1 million homes for a year – could attract \$20 billion of investment to our state and create more than 15,000 green energy jobs that would be sustained over 30 years.

Of course, this past year brought not just successes. A disappointment was the failure of Congress to produce bipartisan health care reform legislation that would contain soaring costs and provide more choices for struggling families and small businesses. I am deeply concerned about the nearly \$500 billion in Medicare cuts included in the bill.

It is fiscally irresponsible to raid Medicare – a program which already has long-term financing problems – to pay for a new entitlement program, particularly at a time when the number of Medicare beneficiaries is on the rise. The bill would saddle Maine's hospitals with some \$800 million in Medicare cuts over the next ten years, and could push one in five hospitals, nursing homes, and home health providers into the red. Ultimately, such cuts could jeopardize access to care for millions of our nation's seniors.

As the Ranking Member of the Senate Homeland Security Committee, I am committed to ensuring that our nation is as safe as possible and that government is better prepared to respond to disasters. The Christmas Day terrorist attempt to detonate explosives on an aircraft reminds us of the dangers we continue to confront. My homeland security priorities include further strengthening our defenses against terrorism and providing our first responders with the resources they need.

On March 19, 2009, I reached a personal milestone when I cast my 4,000th consecutive roll call vote, continuing a record of participating in every single roll call vote since I first came to the Senate in 1997. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve Carmel and Maine in the United States Senate. Dear Carmel residents and friends.

This past year, Mainers have faced many challenges. Yet as I travel across our state, I am inspired by the stories I hear of people coming together to help their friends, families and communities. I also continue to hear from many people who are worried about losing their jobs, heating their homes, putting food on the table and getting affordable health care. Although there are a few hopeful signs that our nation's economy is beginning to recover, there is much more we need to do to help Maine's economy.

As an example, I am very pleased that late last year the newly-created Northern Border Regional Commission received funding and will now be able to start working to create economic development and job creation projects in the most economically distressed areas of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and northern New York.

I am also pleased that Congress authorized a pilot program that would exempt Maine's interstate highways from the 80,000 pound federal truck weight limit and help get larger trucks off our back country roads. This is a good first step in addressing this issue, and I will continue to work to find a lasting solution that will improve road safety and increase productivity.

Our country has also taken important steps forward in protecting and improving veteran's benefits and health care. In October, I joined a number of my colleagues at the White House as President Obama signed the Veterans Health Care Budget Reform and Transparency Act. The legislation, which I helped introduce earlier this year, authorizes funding for the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) medical care programs one year in advance of the start of each fiscal year, helping to end decades of uneven budget cycles and funding shortfalls that have contributed to the rationing of VA health care and inadequate access to treatment for our veterans.

Finally, my staff and I remain committed to providing quality constituent services whether it is help with cutting through red tape or a question about federal programs and benefits. Message from Senator Debra Plowman

Dear Residents of Carmel:

It remains a great honor to represent your interests here in Augusta and I am thankful you have given me the opportunity to do so.

The Legislature and we as citizens of Maine are currently facing difficult times. There were many challenges in the First Regular Session of the 124th, and those challenges continue into the second session of the Legislature. State revenues have continued to fall far below projected amounts, resulting in yet another massive budget shortfall. In early January this budget hole is \$483 Million and growing.

With very little federal stimulus dollars to prop up the budget this time, Augusta must solve the problem on its own. I know that you and your family are no stranger to the tough choices we must make in Augusta. There was no stimulus package for you, and every day you make the same tough choices; prioritizing your wants and needs, cutting your household budget and finding savings here and there. It's just common sense.

As so often is the case, with every negative, there is a positive. As challenging as it has been, this historic economic downtum has brought renewal to many of our communities and families. We have returned to shopping locally and have spent more time with family, friends and neighbors.

This downturn also gives Augusta an opportunity; the opportunity to look closely at state government and engage in the responsible budgeting and decision-making process that Maine people want and expect from their elected officials. If we have learned anything from the economic upheaval, it is that spending unwisely in the good times only makes it more difficult to weather the bad times. As difficult as these times are, they provide the catalyst to force the tough decisions that will "right-size" state government.

As your Senator, I will continue to seek long-term, sustainable changes that will position Maine to emerge from this downturn, stronger than when it began. And then we then must resolve to be diligent in making choices that keep Maine strong - our parents and children are counting on this.

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

The First Regular Session of the 124th Maine Legislature came to a close in the early morning hours of June 13th. Nearly 1,500 bills were deliberated and more than 250 roll call votes were recorded in the House. As the Lead Republican member of the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs, I would like to share with you the results of some of the work the Committee did during the first six months of the year.

On June 19, 2009 the Governor signed an emergency measure to delay until July 1, 2010 any financial penalties imposed on school administrative units that have not yet restructured or consolidated. In conjunction with this bill, the Governor also signed an executive order making it clear that the penalties are being waived for the sole purpose of enabling school units that have not consolidated to come into compliance. Had this measure not passed, the districts that voted against consolidation or have not yet developed a plan would have seen their state aid reduced.

A proposal to abolish the State Board of Education did not pass in its intended form, but an amended version was accepted and signed by the Governor as an emergency measure. The original bill was submitted due to a concern that the State Board of Education has been progressively taking on roles that are not within the intended function of the Board, which was created to be an advisory group to the Commissioner of Education. The Resolve established a stakeholder group to review the role of the Board and report back to the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs with their recommendations.

A new measure makes changes in the law concerning the Commissioner of Education's funding level recommendations and the Governor's recommendations for the annual appropriation to the General Purpose Aid (GPA) for Local Schools program in the state budget. The bill requires that the amounts appropriated for certain components of the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act that are proposed in any state budget must be shown in a sufficiently detailed and transparent form so that the Legislature and the citizens of the State are able to identify the changes in proposed funding from the proposed budget without need for reference to other documents or explanations.

2009 Selectman's Report

Carmel's Selectmen Meet Monday Evenings at 7:30 PM as Posted

To the Citizens of Carmel:

One thing we learn as Selectmen is that it is a continuous learning experience. As the demographics of the town change; thus do school issues, town economics and service demands. Then throw in state law changes and the need to keep abreast of these changes and we must adjust to keep the town as prosperous as possible.

The Selectmen met regularly during 2009 to oversee the administration of Carmel's business affairs. The town's big item is highway construction and maintenance. The high cost of petroleum is limiting to how much work can be done (see Road Commissioner's Report). We also dealt with Fire & Rescue and General Assistance issues. The only change within the Sheriff's Department in 2009 was that Deputy Garrit McKee took a leave of absence to re-enlist in the National Guard. Deputy Sean McCue has been filling in for him. In dealing with issues that arise from residents or departments, we depend on the input of several town organizations as well as the input of our citizens.

The largest portion of taxes goes to education. The school issue of joining a Regional School Unit is ongoing. We would ask that residents stay informed on the issue. One can do this by attending the SAD #23 Directors Meetings, reading the School newsletter and special updates and hearing notices that go to all postal patrons. You can also call the Superintendent's Office or email him.

In June 2010 we have the primary election for our state legislative officials and in November their election and the referendum election. Looking at an issue from both sides and making an informed decision is the best way to go. Julia has created a link on our website to help keep us updated on upcoming legislative issues.

The economic situation hasn't improved a lot from last year and the State's may be worse. They are looking hard at cutting programs that impact the local taxpayer. If and when this happens, the town may have to cut services or raise taxes or both.

With the economy as it is, it is even more important to recognize the many talented and dedicated volunteers who make the recreational, fun times and town improvements possible. Hats off to the local businesses that help with monetary donations to these events and through buying ads in town publications help cut down the cost to you the taxpayer. Please reward them with your patronage.

Thanks to our Town Manager, Tom Richmond, for having a good year and keeping us updated and to the office staff, Julia Pike, Coreen Sylvester and Patti Overlock for keeping the office running smoothly.

Town Manager's Report

To the Residents:

As we prepare to produce the annual town report, I look back over the past year with a sense of accomplishment. Many of our accomplishments are only possible due to dedicated employees. Each day I look forward to coming to work knowing that we are in good hands.

In anticipation of a rough year due to the economy, we lowered last year's anticipated revenue and as a result had a one and three quater mil increase in the 2009 tax rate. The good news is that we are in a much better position to weather the Governor's continued cuts in state funds.

Major budget item increases for 2010:

Though it is a slow process, I am encouraged to see a change in the direction of the economy. Even though it is a slow growth, we are starting to see sales of new cars and some new home construction.

contractor; he has done a great job keeping the cemeteries mowed in a timely manner.

The Municipal Building, built in 1978, will need some work. Most of the building is covered with T-111 that is 32 years old. The hose tower has

developed a water leak and will need to have new vinyl applied to stop the leaks. With the amount of traffic in the office, carpet just doesn't work and we are looking at replacing it



with tile and runners that can be picked up and cleaned.

Carmel, like many towns throughout Maine, is finding it harder to fully staff fire and ambulance crews. New volunteers are always needed, but most people are working out of town during the day Monday thru Friday which makes it difficult to have firemen available twenty-four hours a day. Thanks to our agreements with surrounding towns, we have been able to fill the voids so far.

As always I urge all residents to vote on local officials on February 27th and attend the Annual Town Meeting on March 1st at the Carmel

Elementary School Gym to vote on the 2010 budget.

Road Commissioner's Report

2009 was a very busy year with Fuller Road construction and ditching and paving of a number of roads throughout the town.

The grading program for Perry Lane, Kings Lane and Preble Lane was extended to include ditching, and we hauled in a number of loads of gravel to provide new surface material.



Around 500 feet of Grist Mill Road was reconstructed in an effort to raise the road and prevent the muddy mess that almost kept even 4-wheel drive vehicles from getting through last spring.

This year's paving program resulted in surface pavement on Five



Road, Hinckley Hill
Road, Hayward Drive
and Safety Lane,
along with paving of
the new construction
on Fuller Road. A
number of roads that
have been paved in
the last five years
have not had the
second coat of surface
pavement applied.

This year during the

Fuller Road construction we changed this method and applied both the 2" base and the 1½" surface. One of the roads that did not get the surface pavement was the Horseback Road from Garland Road to Fuller Road. Obvious signs of deterioration in the base are now showing. Once the base has been compromised, there is no guarantee that these spots will not radiate up through the new surface. We will cut out those areas and patch prior to surface paving. Without this surface, this pavement would require total replacement in a very few years.

The Murray Road is another prime example of a road that has gone beyond the point of saving. Only the last construction of about 800 feet can be saved and re-surfaced.

With the high cost of paving and a paving budget of \$250,000.00, we will again be faced with where to spend those funds. Should we pave the Horseback Road to prevent further deterioration or the Murray Road which has gone past the point of saving?

After looking at used one-ton dump trucks, it has become apparent that our 1987 has less rust and is structurally in better shape than anything on the market. We installed a used transmission and a new pump on the dump body. At some point in time we will need to find a newer chassis and transfer the dump body onto it. I will be asking the Town Meeting to authorize the Selectmen to use up to \$12,000.00 from the Equipment Reserve Account to make the purchase when needed.

The Central Voter Registration program has continued to update and expand. This year we have been able to take care of the many voter registration cards that we had not been able to scan into the system. Of course this leads to another report.

I know that we had a lot of old cards which do not have voter's signatures or are unable to read by scanner. I didn't realize how many until I ran a report titled <u>Voters without Registration Cards</u>. I'm now in the process of sending out the latest version of the Voter Registration Card for the voter to fill out, sign and return to the Town office. I would appreciate everyone's help with this project and thanks you for your assistance.

Will this take your off the voter list; only if the sent mail is returned to the Town Office as undeliverable. If I don't receive the updated card back, then you will need to fill out a new card at the next election you attend.

A note: when you are at Motor Vehicle, you do not need to fill out a request for Name/Address Change if it is for E-9-1-1 address change. I have taken care of all the E-9-1-1 changes. Complete the address change only if you have moved either within Carmel, into Carmel or out of Carmel. If you have moved into Carmel you need to come to the Town Office and fill out a voter registration card. If you are registered in Carmel and your name has changed, all you need to do is fill out this card.

If you have **not registered** to vote in Carmel and you sign a State Referendum petition or a local nomination petition your signature **will not be validated.** To register all one needs to do is bring proof of residence and identification (ie: driver's license, a bill such as electric, phone, and auto registration with a current physical Carmel address (**not a PO Box number**).

Municipal Agent Report

The State is still "Green" and the 2008-2009 Ice Fishing books are still good. Persons wanting permits for Any Deer and Moose will need to go online (www.mefishwildlife.com) and download them.



Registration of snowmobiles increased to \$41 this year with the additional fee increase going to Maine State Snowmobile Association. There were fee increases for most of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife licenses and permits. But ATV's stayed the same.

Motor vehicle registration fees stayed the same this year. We carry most all of the special license plates available.

Annual Reminder:

- Residents can go online at www.informe.org/rrs/carmel. At the site you will need your current insurance card, your present registration and your checkbook in order to complete the new year's re-registration.
- In order to transfer credit from one vehicle to another the ownership of the first vehicle must have been transferred to another owner or the vehicle must have been junked. Current insurance must be shown at time of any registration.
- Due to the time it takes to process new registrations we cannot start them after 7:30 PM on Monday night or 4:30 PM the rest of the week.
- The MOSES System (www.mefishwildlife.com)
 Remember for recreational vehicles, ATV's and snowmobiles, that you do online you can now use your machine as soon as you print out the registration confirmation. No more waiting until you receive the stickers in the mail. The town office has plenty of the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife plastic bags if you need one to keep your registration of Snowmobile, ATV or Hunting and /or fishing license in.

E-911 Address Report

2009 brought some road name changes, address corrections and new numbers added to existing roadways. The State will now be using and depending on the information coming from the E-911 program to track roads within towns. The state will no longer be sending NODE maps out because of this change, unless requested. It is important to keep this information up to date because of the URIP (Urban Rural Initiative Program) payments the town receives.

Believe it or not, a couple of missing signs were found, but we still lost a few road signs. Please keep in mind that besides being an expense to the Town of Carmel, stealing road



signs is also a Federal offense and can be prosecuted. The reason for this is someone could die if emergency help cannot find the correct address in time to provide the needed care.

Please take note of any activity around roadway signs and report it. Thank you.

Points to Remember:

- All residents who still have rural route numbers on their mailbox must replace them with E-911 numbers. (Example: if you live on Project Way and your old Mailing address was RR2 Box 1616, and your new E-911 physical address is 26 Project Way, your new mailing address is 26 Project Way.) Any resident who picks up their mail at a Post Office Box will still use their PO Box as their Mailing Address.

 RR#'s are no longer used and are not a part of your address.
- According to the E-911 regulations, your physical numbers must be displayed on or near your front door (for emergency vehicles) and on your mailbox (for mail delivery). Your house numbers, if not visible from the road, need to be posted so they can be seen by approaching emergency vehicles.
- Signs may be ordered at the Town Office through the Penobscot County Sheriff's Office.
- □ \$12.00 for the PACKAGE two single-sided signs, post and bolt.
- □ \$ 9.00 for one single-sided sign, post and bolt.
- □ \$ 6.00 for one single-sided sign.
- \$ 9.00 for one Mailbox Mount Double-sided sign with hardware. (Make checks payable to Town of Carmel.)

To the Citizens of Carmel:

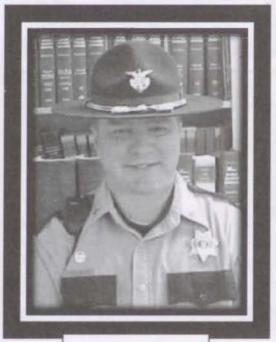

After losing Vivian as Animal Control Officer the town hired Carrie Jo Wescott in November. Welcome Carrie Jo (CJ). Even though Carrie has been on the job a short time we have had positive feedback on her response calls.

Bangor Humane Society became the town's shelter in 2009. If you have lost your pet 1st call ACO or the town office to report the missing animal and to see if someone has found it. This step can save you time and money. Second call the Bangor Humane Society (942-8902) to see it has been turned into them.

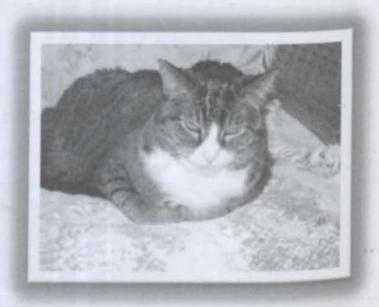

To the Citizens of Carmel

The Simpson Memorial Library provides universal access to those who seek information, recreation and the pleasure of learning. We provide quality reading, educational material and entertainment programming. We welcome patrons and visitors to come in and see what the library has to offer. The library has a vital role in the life of the community. 2009 was a busy year for the library. We saw an increase in attendance, usage of computers and materials. Attendance for 2009 was 3,416, with a total circulation of 4,176. Computer usage more than doubled to 383. We issued 64 new patron cards. Our rolls remain steady, 980 as we update membership. With our book budget we purchased 141 adult books, 61 juvenile books, 3 adult audio books. Our patrons borrowed 205 books through inter-library loan. A special thanks to our 2009 volunteers.

"Get Creative at Your Library" was the Summer Reading Program theme. We had twenty-one children enroll. Jan Zimmermann, storyteller, kicked off the program with African stories and dance. Other guests were Terry Swazy, a crafter from Bucksport, who taught the



children quilting. Ruth Guerette, from Carmel, provided a music program. The children participated in Carmel days with a "Traveling Music Show" float. The 2010 theme is "Make a Splash, READ." Come join us!

Other children's programs included story hour on Saturdays, September through May. In August the 3rd Teddy Bear Picnic, with storyteller Jan Zimmermann, entertained eleven children and seven adults with Chinese stories and dance. This year our Halloween event was held at the library. Twelve children and seven adults attended. Spooky stories, a scavenger hunt and making foam bats were just some of the fun.

Special thanks to the Golden Harvest Grange for providing space for our Summer Kickoff Event and the December story-hour. The theme, holiday stories from around the world, and frosting holiday cookies were a hit with the thirteen children and nine adults.

The library had funds left from the Maine Reads Grant and was able to offer a library visit to pre-k students from Etna/Dixmont and Carmel Elementary. The Etna/Dixmont pre-k children were able to visit the library. The children listened to stories, toured the library and received reading incentives. We would like to thank the Etna/Dixmont and Carmel Elementary Schools for partnering with us.

For the adults the library offered Book Bingo. Participants received a bingo card with various genres in the squares. For every card turned in, which equaled ten books read, their name was put into a drawing. At the end of the year, June Henderson and Gail Tudor were the winners. In 2010 we are offering a book discussion group with a mystery and romance twist.

In 2008 the library received a Gates Grant for new computers. This summer the library purchased 2 new computers, monitors and a fax/printer/copier. The library has raised all the matching funds needed to meet the grant's requirements. We would like to thank all the people who donated time, raffle items, baked goods and money. We would like to thank the LaCrosse family for donating, in memory of their son, Matt LaCrosse, the last \$500 needed to reach our goal of \$2,600. In 2010 the library will be purchasing a laptop computer for patrons to use in the library.

The library's Annual Book and Plant Sale held the 2nd Saturday of May raised \$802. On Carmel Day the library raised \$440.70 from the pie, book and 50/50 raffle sales, along with the returnable bottles. We would like to thank all who donated pies, books, time and energy into this event. The library will continue to have a monthly bake sale through the winter at Ye Olde General Store. In 2009 the library's Drop Box for bottle returns raised \$1,075.50. The proceeds go for the land purchased from the American Legion, Post 107.

The library held a penny drive to raise needed funds for children's programming. The fund-drive raised \$547.50. We would like to thank the Village Market, Dick's Exxon, The Village Creamry, Ye Ole General Store and the Seafood Galley Restaurant for participating.

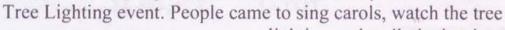
Mrs. Ok and Ms. Franck's first grade classes participated by selling

This Federal status will enable the library to apply for various grants that previously the library was not eligible for and places the library in a better position for future expansion. Donations made to the library, financial and inkind, are tax-deductible. The library is not responsible for placing a value on in-kind donations. The library's main fundraising focus in 2010 will be for our Building Expansion Fund.

We look forward to serving the Carmel community in 2010. Suggestions to improve our services are welcome. Please come visit us!

2009 Carmel Fire & Rescue Annual Report

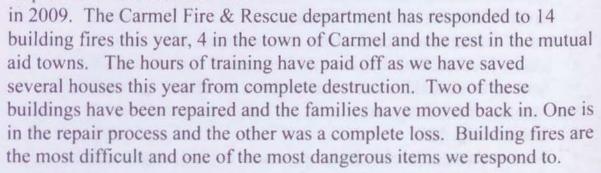
I would like to thank the men and women of the Carmel Fire & Rescue department, who continue to serve their community above and beyond the needs of their own families. As Chief I am not able to do my job without the support, work ethic and energy provided by the members of this crew. I cannot thank them enough for the countless hours of training, maintenance and work details, and then on top of this still respond to calls at all hours of the day and night.

I would like to thank the town manager, town office staff and the Selectmen, who have been extremely supportive and helpful to the fire & rescue department. Without their support, the challenges that face the fire & rescue departments of today would be much more challenging.

I would like to thank the citizens of Carmel. Your continued support of this department allows us to continue serving you with excellent equipment, better training and new ideas leading us into the future. The

face of the American firefighter and emergency medical technician is constantly changing, and your support allows us to be part of that change.

The Carmel Fire & Rescue department has had a busy year. We responded to 215 different incidents



The Carmel Fire & Rescue Department participates in a county wide mutual aid program, as well as a local agreement with the towns of Etna, Stetson and Levant. The town of Carmel provides equipment and manpower to surrounding towns at the report of a fire. These area towns agree to send equipment and manpower to Carmel for all fires. This agreement has allowed us to save buildings, train together and meet the National Incident Management requirements. This in turn allows us to ask for financial grants from Homeland Security, as well as provides benefits to you in the cost of your home fire insurance.

Carmel Fire & Rescue responded to 148 medical calls. These calls range from difficulty breathing, chest pain, trauma, seizure, childbirth, diabetic emergencies, car accidents and any reason an ambulance may be needed. As many of us know, we grow older each day and this causes challenges to our elderly population. Our goal on the ambulance is to provide quick and efficient medical care and safe transport to the hospital.

Carmel Fire & Rescue has responded to many hazardous conditions, such as fuel spills, carbon monoxide detector alarms, flooded basements, utility lines down, and un-permitted outside burning. We use these calls not only to help people, but to educate the Citizens of Carmel on how to

live safely. The call volume breakdown is listed

below at the end of this report.

The children look forward to Fire Prevention Week at the Fire Station in October. We explain the fire gear, show them the trucks, talk about stove safety, fire safety, how smoke detectors work, and how to use and follow an

evacuation plan. Fire Safety is a life long learning event that starts while the children are young. Thank you to the firefighters, teachers and parents who make this event happen every year.

Carmel Days continues to bring our Citizens together every August. The Carmel Fire & Rescue department is proud to participate in the parade, along with area fire departments. This year we were able to have the smoke house for the children to climb through and we participated in the recreational softball game. I cannot remember which team won the game, but next year we will try again and bring more ibuprofen tablets.

Our last big event is the Halloween party. It was successful again this year. It was conveniently on Halloween night. This allows us to have a place for children to go and play, be safe, and keep the children off the street. I would like to personally thank Donna Stanhope for the energy she puts into this event. She has worked tirelessly in the weeks before to get

decorations and candy ready for the children. Without her work, this event would not be as successful.

The future of the Fire & Rescue department looks challenging. Volunteers are becoming challenged to work multiple jobs, yet still are willing to help other citizens. Do you have the interest in helping your community, while at the same time learning lifelong skills?

The junior program on Wednesday nights is an opportunity for high school students to learn about fire and EMS work. If this is something you might

like to do, please contact us for information. Any help provided by the citizens of Carmel is greatly appreciated.

In the year 2010, the Fire & Rescue department is looking to progress forward in training. We will start the year out by completing all the mandated trainings; some of these include blood borne pathogen training, fire extinguishers, workplace harassment, and others. We are also required to complete medical evaluations in order to wear air packs and masks. The department has to guarantee that the fire gear is still in good shape and the firefighters know

how to use it properly. The department will complete pumps I training program following the Jones & Bartlett Pumps curriculum. This will teach

the fire apparatus operators the correct way to handle the trucks, and thus prevent unnecessary pump damage to the apparatus.

The Carmel Fire & Rescue Department is fortunate to have many new members this year. Several of these individuals have fire training from other places. They have chosen to live in Carmel and assist us. There are four people that will be attending the spring Emergency Medical Technician class. This will help the 6-7 that handle all the ambulance calls now. My

goal is to keep Carmel Ambulance staffed and rolling. If we are unavailable,

you have to wait for Hermon ambulance or the City of Bangor to respond.

There are times now that they respond, but our goal is be here and be reactive

to the Town of Carmel's needs.

In closing, I look forward to working directly with the Citizens of Carmel, the Firefighters, and the Emergency Medical Technicians that make this town a

great place to live. If you have any further questions, please contact me at

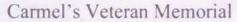
They also did a great job with the meals, snacks and decorations for the annual Christmas party and the 13th District Meeting.

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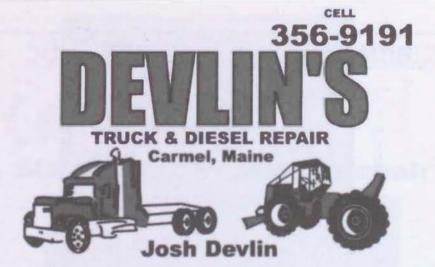
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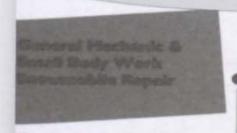


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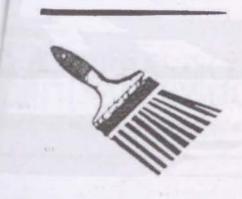
