### **EXPLANATION**

Following is an explanation of the change in the apportionment of the several school funds:- The Mill tax act was passed and approved Feb. 29, 1872, but the fund was not apportioned until 1873. For this reason it has been apportioned each year one year later than the school year in which it was raised by the State. The same applies to the Common School fund and the Equalization fund. On notice from the State Supt. of schools that these funds must be expended in the school year in which they are raised and upon his suggestion, the amount of the several funds has been carried to one school fund and the undrawn balance is to be used within the next few years.

### REPORT OF TEACHER'S WAGES, &c.

### SCHOOL No. 1

All 3 terms taught by Iva V. Miller, wages \$7.00 a wk. Spring Term, No. of pupils 9; average 7. Fall Term, No. of pupils 11; average 8. Winter Term, No. of pupils 10; average 9. Miss Miller is an excellent teacher and rendered good service.

### SCHOOL No. 3-PRIMARY

Spring Term taught by Esther M. Morse, wages \$8.00 a wk. No. of pupils 32; average 22. Fall and Winter Terms taught by Georgia P. Chipman, wages \$9. a wk. Fall Term, No. of pupils 27; average 25. Winter Term No. of pupils 25; average 21. Miss Chipman was interested in her work and good results were accomplished.

### SCHOOL NO. 3-GRAMMAR

Spring Term taught by Georgia P. Chipman, wages \$9. a wk. No. of pupils 17; average 13. This was a successful term. Fall and Winter Terms taught by Gladys H. Lowell, wages \$9. and \$9.50 a week. Fall Term, No. of pupils 23; average 19. Winter Term, No. of pupils 24; average 21. Miss Lowell worked hard and we consider these two terms very successful

#### SCHOOL No. 5

Spring Term taught by Agnes Sylvester, wages \$7.00 a wk. No. of pupils 12; average 10. Fall and Winter Terms taught by Mae Kimball, wages \$7.00 a wk. Fall Term, No. of pupils 18. Winter Term, No. of pupils 14; average 11. Faithful work was done by these teachers and good progress made.

#### SCHOOL No. 6

Spring & Fall terms taught by H. L. McLaughlin, wages \$9.00 a wk. Spring Term, No. of pupils 27; average 21. Fall Term, No. of pupils 29; average 21. Winter Term taught by Mary Arbo, wages \$10.00 a wk. No of pupils 25; average 23. Mrs Arbo was very interested in her work and real progress was made.

#### SCHOOL No. 7

Spring Term taught by Vivian Hodgdon, wages \$6.50 a wk. No. of pupils 20; 18. Fall and Winter Terms taught by Elva Orcutt, wages \$8.00 a wk. Fall Term, No. of pupils 19 average 17. Winter Term, No. of pupils 18; average 17. Miss Orcutt did fine work and very good results were accomplished.

### SCHOOL No. 8

All 3 terms taught by Alice McLaughlin, wages \$7.50 a wk. Spring Term, No. of pupils 13; average 11. Fall Term, No. of pupils 12; average 9. Winter Term, No. of pupils 10; average 9. Good work was done by Mrs. McLaughlin.

#### SCHOOL No. 9

Spring Term, -8 wks.- taught by Lottie Moores, wages, \$8.00 a wk. No. of pupils 19; average 17. Fall Term taught by Nettie Herrick, wages \$8.00 a wk. No. of pupils 17; average 14. Winter Term taught by Nellie O'Neil, wages 8.00 a wk. No. of pupils 18; average 16. All 3 teachers did faithful work.

### SCHOOL No. 10

All 3 terms taught by Edna Burrill, wages \$8.00 a wk. Spring Term, No. of pupils 19; average 15. Fall Term, No. of pupils 19; average 15. Winter Term, No. of pupils 14; average 11. Mrs. Burrill did very good work with this school.

Each school had three terms of ten weeks with the exception of No. 9 which had one eight week term and two eleven week terms.

#### REMARKS

We have worked throughout the year to make the schools the best possible. A graded course of study was introduced in all the schools with varying success. The text books purchased were absolutely necessary to make all books uniform and to replace very many which were wornout. \$200.00 raised for text books will pay outstanding bills and buy some more which are necessary. The Supt. made 66 visits to the different schools and put in 450 hours of actual service in school work.
