School Report

To the Superintending School Committee:

My report must cover four terms of the Carmel schools, though I have had the administering of only two. The winter term, 1919, was still in session when the last report was made. This accounts for the expending of \$5,611.40, as the schools cost a total of about \$1,400 a term.

The heavy overdraft (\$1,371.72) is greatly to be regretted, yet it was inevitable. Money has not half the power that it had a few years ago, yet in our school administration it has certainly gone much more than half as far. The money spent on the Carmel schools during the past four terms, even including the Town's share in the cost of the High School, would pay for less farm labor, hay, wood, lumber, milk, food supplies or dry goods, at present prices, than that spent on three terms a few years ago at the prices then prevailing. While teachers' wages have been slightly increased, the great increase has been in cost of fuel and conveyance, provided by citizens of the town. Since high prices are unavoidable, every economy should be practiced that does not sacrifice efficiency. Every citizen should render service to the schools at the lowest possible charge. Conveyance should be provided only when absolutely necessary. Stoves should be arranged and run to heat the rooms with the least consumption of fuel. Consolidation of schools should be effected in every way possible. schools and better schools should be the aim.

To this end I suggest that the North Carmel schoolhouse be moved to the four corners, commonly called Mason's Corner. This will necessitate remodelling the building, which is greatly needed in any case. This change will make the school much more accessible to the children who attend, and by conveying the children on the State road to the village, one school and one conveyance will replace two schools and two conveyances. The economy effected should be more than \$400 a year.

The Ash Hill school was maintained during the spring and fall terms, and proved a very expensive venture, in proportion to the number of children benefited. Hinkley Hill school opened November 3. The building is not wholly completed, though the expenditure has reached nearly \$1,000. I feel, however, that to spend more than \$400, or even more than \$100 on a school building, without adapting it to the needs of the children as shown by recent discoveries in school hygiene, would be money thrown away.

The work of all the teachers has been very good, for the training they have had. They are all earnest, conscientious young women, devoted to the welfare of their pupils. Most of the pupils have responded well to the efforts of the teachers and have done good work. The exceptions have been due to irregular attendance, where parents have kept children at home on slight pretexts. Some children whose parents were employed to convey them to school have been specially irregular, the attendance being distributed to keep the team going, as though the parents cared only for the pay, not for the education of their children. The work of the attendance officer must be held in honor and well paid for, that citizens may be more willing to render that service.

The textbooks needed are English books and Geographies for the common schools, and probably \$75 worth of books for the high school. Report of the High School Principal

To the Citizens of Carmel:

Your annual town meeting, the second since the establishment of this school, is at hand, and it is with pleasure that I submit to you the following report:

Carmel High School through the kindness of public patronage has earned the money which has purchased its water cooler, secured the State lending library, paid for parts of its chemical apparatus, beautified to some extent its school grounds, painted the interior of the school room, making a decided improvement in lighting facilities, and paid each instalment on the piano when due. The school has also paid for setting such glass as defective sash work and not carelessness of pupils or negligence of teaching force has at various times necessitated, the expense being met by individual pupils when at fault.

The school maintains the approved B grade standard required by the State, and in spite of weather both parents and pupils have done their best to have good attendance, which is most commendable.

This school, both teachers and pupils, wish to thank the public for donations of desks, tables and various other things by way of equipment, also for the untiring efforts of the ladies, and the general and generous public patronage as well as opportunities extended by Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Friend, Mrs. Alberta Haskell, the Young Men's Dancing Club, and Mr. B. W. Faden for earning money, which at various times they have placed at its disposal.

In closing, I would like to call your attention to the fact that these boys and girls are willing workers, trying to make the most of what you give, and are, I think, deserving of your consideration as are also the members of the eighth grade who are undoubtedly looking forward to entering next fall. Since these boys and girls must in a few years serve you as citizens of your community, I would ask you not to forget them this annual town meeting, but to do all in your power to give them a high school education.
