

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools and School Board of Alfred:

I herewith submit my third annual report as principal of Alfred High School.

School opened September 12, with total enrollment of 48, and a very nearly even distribution of boys and girls.

An effort is being made to maintain a high scholastic standing in our school, and is being reached to a very satisfactory degree. The attitude of the pupils, and their apparent desire to master the academic work is exceptionally good. Their spirit of cooperation, whether in work pertaining to scholastic endeavor, or to extracurricula activities is noteworthy.

I hope I am not too optimistic in believing that the unbroken continuance of pupils thus far this year in high school is resulting from the fact that our school is functioning better than ever before and that parents, in these times of business depression and unemployment, are truly realizing the need and value of keeping their children in school just as long as possible.

Through the activities of the Central York County League, of which our school is a member, and in some branch of which well over half of the student body participate at one time or another during the year, the physical training of the pupil is cared for.

Trophies emblematic of two of the league championships have been won by our school in the past year. Perpetua Dustin in a contest with representatives of the other league members was awarded the public speaking title. Our horseshoe team was victorious for the second straight year. At the present time both the boys' and girls' basketball teams are championship contenders.

The musical training of the pupil is being well cared for under the able guidance of Mrs. Helen Dolley. Such training is especially important in that it serves to interest many students in an excellent way of using their leisure time, which the present economic trend places in so important a place.

In closing I wish to thank the school officials and the citizens of the town for their cooperation and support in all matters pertaining to the school.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools and Citizens of Alfred:

I have been asked to give a brief report of the School Music activities during the past year.

The grades are doing their usual faithful work with excellent results, but we are handicapped by lack of text-books. The "Music Hour" series now in use in grades five and six, are proving very satisfactory and I wish it might be possible to replace the much worn books in the other grades with this most interesting and comprehensive method.

The High school is doing this year, what I consider the best work in music it has ever done. Officers of the Maine Federation of Music Clubs visited the class last June and commented most favorably on their tone production, interpretation, harmony, etc. Here also is felt the need of new working material.

The Junior Schubert Music Club of the High school was well represented at the State Convention of the Federation at Lewiston last October, and Elizabeth Kelley appeared on the program with a well rendered piano solo.

A prize was awarded Clara Marshall for a dramatization of incidents in the life of the composer Haydn, by the Junior Music club magazine "Appoggiatura," early last fall.

A branch of this club has been organized in grades seven and eight, called the "Pioneers," and is doing some very painstaking work in the preparation of study programs.

An event of much interest was the purchase of a small Radio by Mrs. Hattie Clark, teacher of grades one and two, from money received as their share of the operetta given two years ago.

This instrument brings the fine concerts given by the New York Symphony orchestra under the direction of Walter Damrosch, to the school on certain dates which are announced in advance. Mrs. Clark is generously sharing these programs with the high school and upper grades thereby affording them a splendid opportunity for music appreciation study, for which we are all very grateful.

I wish to convey herein, my sincere appreciation to our Superintendent, Mr. Wright; to the Board of Education; to our Principal, Mr. Brawn; and to all the teachers, for their fine cooperation and support that has made this year so successful.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF PARSONS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

To the Legal Residents of the Town of Alfred:

In accordance with our annual practice the Directors of the Parsons Memorial Library submit for your consideration the following report.

During the past year the work of the Library has been very satisfactory. The continued patronage evinces a keen appreciation on the part of the residents of the advantages which a modern, well-equiped and efficiently conducted library affords to the community. The exterior of the building has been put in first class condition and all joints where the cement was loosened have been permanently filled with lead. This work was done at a considerable expense but was necessary to preserve the face of the structure.

Our finances are in fair shape although the appropriation from the Town was cut \$50.00 in line with the other necessary municipal reductions. This year the State stipend in all probability will be cut off if present plans in State finances are carried out.

The interior of the building is kept in first class condition under the supervision of our very efficient librarian.

We regret to say that some of the younger patrons of the library fail to realize that the building and grounds were not donated as a place to loaf or cause annoyance to the librarian and to the public by boisterous conduct.

A little home instruction on the part of parents would go far in correcting what at present constitutes a rather disagreeable situation.
